PANHANDLE SHORT LINE.

Mr. Holcomb Makes Favorable Report on the New Road—Is Pleased with the Panhandle.

Boston, Mass., July 8.

Gentlemen: Agreeable with your request of recent date, I visited Texas and by fast automobile, accompanied by Messrs. J. E. Howard and J. P. Snyder of Hereford, journeyed over the territory to be traversed by the proposed Panhandle Short Line Railroad from the city of Hereford, in Deaf Smith county, Texas, southerly to the town of Stanton, Martin county, Texas, located on the Texas and Pacific Railroad, a distance of about 200 miles, and beg to report:

This company is incorporated under the laws of the state of Texas with a present authorized Capital stock of Two Hundred and Ten Thousand Dollars, (\$210,000.00), and it is proposed to authorize an issue of bonds to the amount of Two Million Dollars, (\$2,000,000.00), payable in gold at the end of Twenty years, with interest payable semi-annual at 6 per cent per annum, redeemable at any interest payment after five years at 105. The said bonds are to be issued at the rate of \$10,000.00 per mile of first class standard gauge steam road, the proceeds of which to be used for the

corporate needs of the Company, as follows, to-wit:

To construct and equip 200 miles of road, including sidings and terminals, as surveyed from Hereford to Stanton.

This will give transportation facilities for a large territory, full of endless wealth and already dotted here and there by pretty little towns and highly developed farms and stock ranches, the inhabitants of which, despite the lack of railroad facilities, having established many of the advantages, comforts and conveniences of advanced civilization, such as telephone connections, automobile lines, rural mail delivery, etc.

This vast territory is practically a treeless prairie of a deep alluvial soil of rare fertility, and, being underlaid by an inexhaustible flow of pure, wholesome water at a depth of from 40 to 170 feet, is singularly adapted for agricultural, and horticultural purposes. The yielding powers of this territory is enormous, the varieties of cereals, vegetables and fruits that can be grown being practically unlimited. Everything grown successful in the North and Middle West thrive there prodigiously. For the past ten years the average yield per acre of wheat has been 15 bushels, as against 14.7 for Iowa; 14.2 for Minnesota; 11.6 for

Missouri. There is no rust or insects to destroy the crop because of the high altitude and lack of humidity in the atmosphere. Corn yields from 26 to 50 bushels per acre; oats from 40 to 60; Kaffir corn, millet, alfalfa, broom corn, flax, blue grass, rye, barley, apples, peaches, plums, cherries, grapes and all kinds of berries do well. Locust and hardy Catalpa grow rapidly and within four years attain the size of fence post.

Owing to the tremendous immigration to this particular territory during the four years past, and the active and vigorous development work still going on apace, this entire country, from Hereford to Stanton, should, upon the completion of the proposed road, team with towns and cities of unusual prosperity.

As there are but few heavy embankments and no rivers, and but few small creeks to cross, the gradation can be done at a minimum. From Hereford to Dimmitt, a distance of about 21 miles, the gradation is 150,000 cubic yards, which at the contract price of 14 cents, will cost \$21,000.00. The 230 lineal feet of trestle at \$10 will cost \$2300.00. The rest of the embankments are practically inexpensive. The grading is completed within four miles of Dimmitt and will be completed to this point within three months. Along the entire line a little over \$200,000.00 have been subscribed, besides townsites and lands, as a bonus to the road, and the citizens are eager for its speedy completion.

The summers are long but without excessive heat, and the mornings and evenings are always cool and refreshing; the winters are mild, in so much that live stock need no sheltering. Plowing can be prosecuted ten months in the year; in fact, this territory is considered the very best part of Texas, excelling as it does in delightful climate, deep, rich, chocolate-colored soil, ample rainfall, abundant water supply and splendid opportunities for capitalist and homeseekers alike. In former years these vast unbroken ranges were ideal for stock ranches; now they have become the mecca for farmers and fruit growers as well as live stock breeders. The altitude is about 3600 at Hereford. Diseases common to low altitudes and water

soaked soils, such as tuberculosis, malarial, etc., are never contracted here.

This territory is still, in great measure, but sparsely under cultivation owing to the lack of railroad facilities, the greater part being still used for grazing purposes. Lands sell readily at from \$10 to \$100 per acre. With the advent of the steam locomotive, the big ranches will give away to the agriculturist, which will certainly make the proposed road an

unusually profitable dividend payer, after all fixed charges, betterments and depreciation of values are allowed.

Hereford is a city with a busy and prosperous population of about 4000. Four years ago the population was not over 1,500. Its leading and aggressive citizens are bankers, professional and up-to-date business men of integrity and far-sightedness from all parts of the Union, who

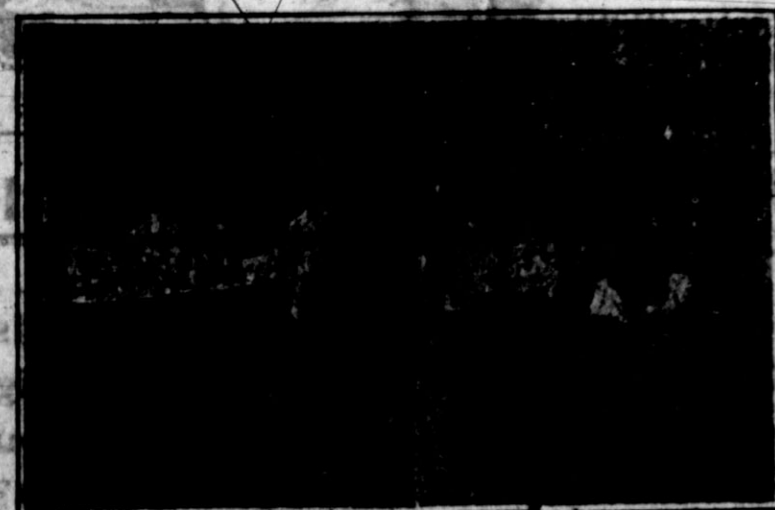

come here with means, and are possessed with a firm belief in the great possibilities and opportunities and investments that obtain here on every hand. The public school system is modern, Hereford College and the churches, together with business blocks and residences, are on the whole attractive; in fact, Hereford has laid the broad foundation for a modern and prosperous city.

It is the intention of the Company ultimately to extend the proposed road northwesterly and tap the coal fields of Trinidad, Colo., a distance of some 300 miles.

I feel justified from the data gathered, (only a small portion of which is herein mentioned), in anticipating from the very first year's operation of this road, ample earnings to pay all fixed charges and leave an ample surplus for dividends, betterments, depreciation, etc. Respectfully,

Experimental Farm.

The subscription list circulated by the citizens of Dalhart, according to authoritative reports from that place, has reached a total of \$10,000. Of this, about half is to go for the use of the United States experimental farm which the city wishes to capture from Amarillo and the other half will go toward the promotion of the trans-Canadian fair.

Besides the money subscribed by Dalhart, the city offers the department all the land necessary for the farm and at a location which best suits all parties concerned. The citizens of the north plains town intend to play the farm heavily and to make it a feature of their advertising—when they get it. They have complied with the requests indicated by the department and if Amarillo fails to meet the modest requirements of the farm, the enterprise is practically sure to go to Dalhart.—Daily Panhandle.

The experimental farm now located at Amarillo seems to be hunting a new location and from the outlook,

it appears that Dalhart is about to take it from her big sister, From Wednesday's Daily, one would conclude that Amarillo was about to fail to raise the required \$3,500 to keep the farm near that city.

A NEW COLLEGE.

Presbyterians to Establish Training School in the Panhandle.

A new college or training school in the Panhandle to be organized, endowed and maintained under the control of the National Presbyterian Church is one of the projects now on foot. Where this institution is to be located is still to be decided but at the last meeting of the Presbytery for this district the delegates definitely determined upon the enterprise and a commission was appointed to take charge of the plans.

The commission which consists of C. Kirkes, of Amarillo, as chair-

man; Rev. Dalton, of Wichita Falls; Rev. M. E. Frank, of Canadian; Hon. John H. Stephens, of Vernon; J. A. Kemp, of Wichita Falls and M. W. Cunningham, of Amarillo, has just issued an address to the people of the district which outlines the plans as follows:

"It is proposed to limit the scope of this institution to the work of the academy or training school with music and business departments and not to undertake university or college work beyond possibly the first college year. It is proposed to do thoroughly the work attempted and make the school second to none within the lines it undertakes, and with the wealth and prestige of the National Presbyterian church behind it there will be no lack of either funds or pupils.

"The object of this address is to outline our plans and to suggest that the school will be located in that city of the Panhandle which offers the most substantial inducements. The commission has received intimation that a number of cities will be active competitors for the school among which may be mentioned Wichita Falls, Amarillo, Quanah, Vernon and Hereford. However, any city within the limits of the presbytery as outlined above is invited to communicate with the commission."

This is an institution that will be of untold benefit to the town that gets it. Hereford could offer ample inducements to the committee to select our city, if only our citizenship could grasp the situation. Hereford is entering upon a new growth and it behooves the business as well as the educational interest to look into this new enterprise. There is nothing that will add a good class of citizenship to a town quicker than the organization of schools. With a well graded public and two denominational or private schools, Hereford would at once become the educational center of the Panhandle.

It may seem selfish on the part of the writer to place Hereford in nomination for the location of the new college, but where one school has already been established, it is much easier to build up another on account of the general and special interest in education. The cities of Denton, Waco and others are examples.

Few can understand what a good school means in a financial way. Suppose that the college already established and the new school should bring just 100 students to the town for each year. Every dollar that these students and teachers spend will be put into immediate circulation. The average expenses of boarding students for the year, counting everything will exceed \$30 per month. This would put in the hands of the merchants and others \$25000 per school year. The 20000 Club will, no doubt, take this matter up and communicate with the committee.

Water the Trees.

Beautiful homes adorned with plenty of trees are a source of great satisfaction to the people of any town and especially so in the west where there is such an ominous lack of shade trees. Hereford has made a fine start in setting out a large number of trees well adapted to the country, and the next thing in order is to give them proper care. All the attention that a tree needs here is to keep the weeds away and give it plenty of water. Trees here make a good growth with nature's supply of rainfall but it will double and quadruple this with proper watering during the spring and summer. With an abundant supply of water close to the surface, Hereford, the city of windmills, should be the best shaded town in middle or west Texas. Most of the trees about town look healthy and green but some are badly in need of more water. Even those that look fresh and green would double their growth if given a good watering every week or ten days. People of other towns envy us of our abundant supply of water so close to the surface and consequently so easily gotten. Let us avail ourselves of this advantage and with a small outlay in pipes and hose, and a little time in digging trenches and running the water to our trees make Hereford the best shaded town in the Panhandle.

The trees in the court house yard at Clarendon at seven years of age were eight to ten inches in diameter. Secret, plenty of water. Let us do likewise all over town.

THERE is little use to lock the door after the horse has been stolen. This is an old saying but still serves its purpose. The BRAND does not think that the country is full of thieves or that our horses are in danger, but it is well known that a feeling of security is often the signal of sudden defeat and loss. The building of cities has become the pride of the American people, but no town or city can begin to lay claims to permanent growth without ample provisions for the protection of life and property within its bounds. Last week the BRAND called attention to the immediate need of facilities for the protection of property by the organization and full equipment of a fire company. Now, this is the right thing to do, for no town can feel secure without ample protection from the fire bug. The BRAND has reference to the absolute need of a complete sewerage system. Hereford is well located for such a system. The gradual incline of the surface towards the river, the freedom from depressions below the average elevation, and the proximity of an outlet, will reduce the first cost to the minimum. The City Council should take the initiative in this important matter and push it to a successful end. The BRAND can safely assure the hearty support of the citizens in whatever way the Council may undertake to accomplish the desired purpose. Will the city fathers resolute and then execute?

Pending Coal Famine.

Washington, June 19.—Strenuous measures have been adopted by the government and by the railroads to avert a fuel famine in the west and northwest which is thought to be impending this winter. Howard Elliott, president of the Northern Pacific railroad, recently wrote to Commissioner Lane of the interstate commerce commission suggesting the probability of a fuel famine in the west and northwest next winter that might exceed in its serious possibilities the famine of last winter. He advised that every effort be made by the commission to induce consumers, including the government, to lay in supplies of coal during the summer months, pending the movement of the crops in the early autumn. Commissioner Lane immediately took up the matter with Secretaries Garfield and Taft, urging that coal supplies at all depots of the government be put in at as early date as possible. The subject was considered at the last cabinet meet-

ing held before the president left Washington and it was decided that the suggestion should be adopted.

Secretary Garfield wrote to Commissioner Lane in response to a letter which the commissioner had written to him on the subject, his letter containing this paragraph:

"I beg to acknowledge your letter of June 7, with the enclosure from the president of the Northern Pacific. His suggestion is an admirable one and will be acted upon by the departments."

Commissioner Lane has received from B. T. Stanton, chairman of the railroad commission of Montana, a circular which the commission has issued respecting an investigation into the subject of coal supply now in sight and to be available for the use of the citizens of Montana during the winter months of 1907 and 1908. The inquiry shows that a coal shortage exceeding that of the past winter is not only possible but probable, unless steps are taken to avert it and the commission advised

the people to put in their supply of coal at the earliest possible date.

Commissioner Lane has been advised that the city of Los Angeles, California, has made arrangements to put in a full supply of coal during the early summer months and has learned that the railroads of the west and northwest are placing at their various supply depots all the coal that they can store conveniently.

The Passing of The Pass.

The general managers of the railroads in Texas are sending out letters to those holding passes asking all who have been enjoying a free ride to return their passes to the proper authority on or before July 11. The letter reads as follows:

"The anti-pass law of the state of Texas, effective July 12, 1907, prohibits the issuance of passes to any person or person except the following:

The actual bona fide employees of any railway company and the dependent members of their immediate families. The term employee shall be construed to embrace the following persons only: All persons actually in the employ and engaged in the service of any such companies, including its officers, bona fide ticket, passenger and freight agents, physicians, surgeons, general attorneys and attorneys who appear in courts of record to try cases and who receive a reasonable annual salary.

Ex-employees within four months after leaving the service of any such companies and while seeking employment.

Persons actually employed on sleeping cars and express cars; line-men of telegraph and telephone companies; newsboys employed on trains; railway mail service employes, postoffice inspectors, chairman and bona fide members of grievance committee of employes; bona fide custom and immigration inspectors; state health officers and assistants, federal health officers, state rangers, sheriffs in pursuit of duty; members of the live stock sanitary board, not exceeding twelve in number in one year. Trip passes may be issued to certain other people, such as necessary caretakers of live stock or poultry enroute and return, indigent poor, sisters of charity and persons returning home from wrecks.

No person who holds any public office in the state shall at any time be entitled to any such free pass or transportation, privilege or frank or substitute for fare or charges over any railway."

This law is the result of a long discussion in the political circles of Texas and will effect a large number of officers, both county and state. Even the otherwise privileged newspaper man, who has always carried

AN ORDINANCE

Pertaining to the Scavenger Work.
Be it ordained by the City Council of the city of Hereford:

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or association of persons except the duly appointed city scavenger, to haul off any carcasses of animals, or to haul off garbage of any description for hire within or from within the limits of the city of Hereford.

Section 2. Any person, firm, or association of persons violating any of the provisions of the preceding section, shall upon conviction be fined in any sum not less than five or more than fifty dollars.

AN ORDINANCE

Prohibiting the Keeping of Hogs in Certain Limits.
Be it ordained by the City Council of the city of Hereford.

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or association of persons to keep any hogs, shoats or swine of any description within the limits of the territory lying south of the Northern Texas railway and within the blocks numbers twenty...

Section 2. Any person, firm or association of persons violating any of the provisions of the preceding section, shall be fined any sum not exceeding five dollars. Each day that such hogs or swine shall be kept within the limits mentioned above shall be considered a separate offense.
