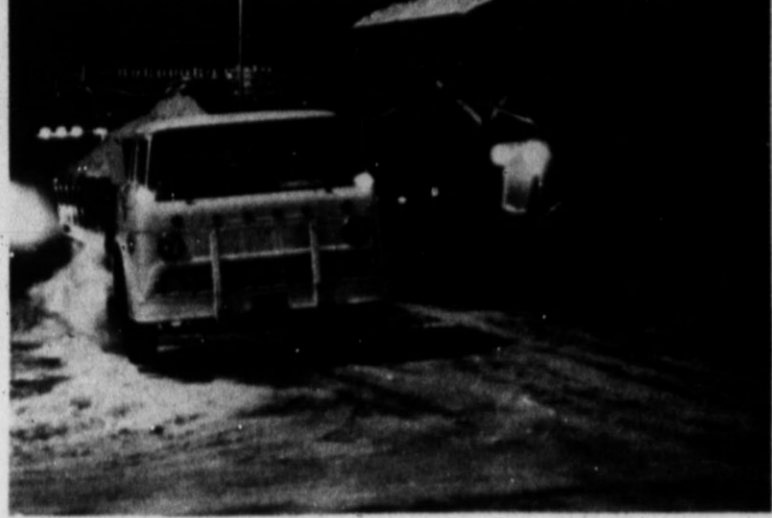


Voters Approve Hospital Bonds

## Hunting Carries Responsibilities

AUSTIN — The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department wishes to remind sportsmen that hunting is a privilege that carries with it certain responsibilities.

First, the hunter has a responsibility to the law. He must obtain the proper hunting license, have permission to enter private property, use only legal means of taking game, and hunt only legal species.

Second, the hunter has a responsibility to the landowner. He must respect the property rights of the landowner and remember that he is a guest.

He should remember to leave gates as he found them and not to shoot near livestock, houses, or barns.

The hunter should know the boundaries of the land on which he hunts, and he should cross fences in a safe and proper way.

Fire is always a hazard, and littering can make an enemy out of the landowner in a short time.

As an act of courtesy and a gesture of good will, the hunter should offer to share game with his host if he is hunting free.

Third, the hunter has a responsibility to himself.

He must know his physical limitations because over-exertion can mean a heart attack or other serious physical ailments.

Using the right firearm and ammunition and a well sighted-in rifle will not only make hunting easier, but safer besides.

The hunter should learn all he can about the game he hunts. This will increase his chances for a successful hunt and make hunting more enjoyable and exciting.

The hunter should be sure of his target and aim for a clean kill. If he wounds an animal, he should make a conscientious effort to retrieve it.

For safety sake, he should make his presence known to other hunters so they will not mistake him for game.

The hunter should practice good sportsmanship always and obey the 10 commandments of shooting safety.

The accident occurred as one vehicle, traveling west on Country Club Drive on the wrong side of the road struck the left front of the other vehicle, which was traveling east.

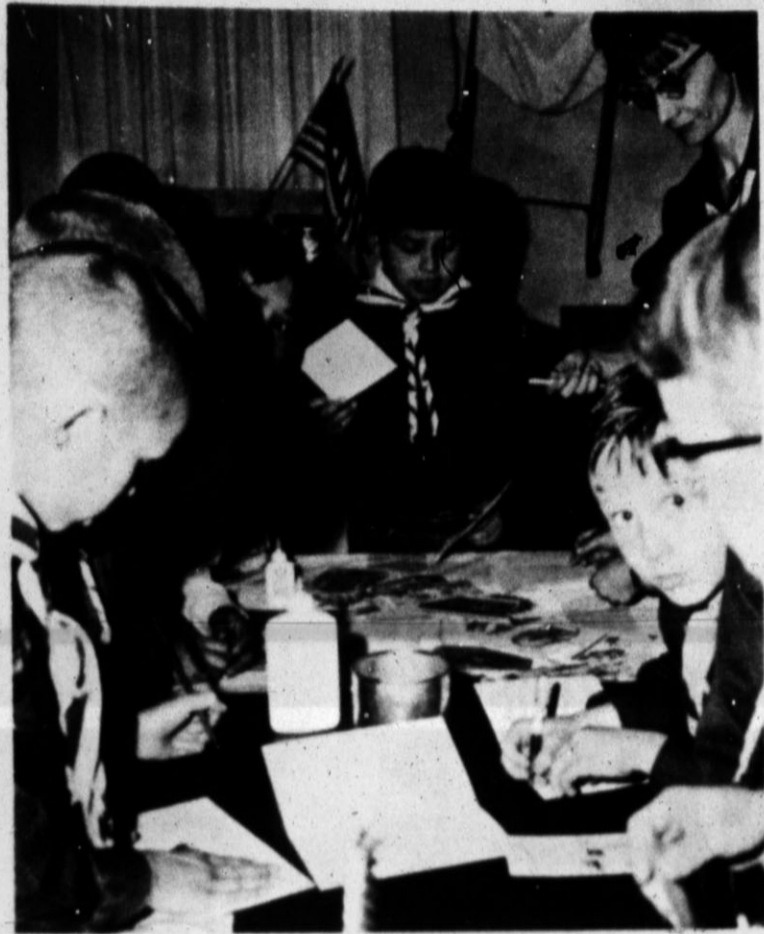
The driver of one auto was taken into custody and booked for DWI as well as the driver of the other auto and two passengers.





# Licensing Division Of DPS Prepares For New Changes Cotton Market Is Now Fluctuating

The Department of Public Safety was given final permission Monday at a County Commission meeting to install its driver licensing division in permanent headquarters in the basement of the Deaf Smith County Courthouse. It is the same room the division has occupied for several months on a parttime basis.

To be open five days a week, tentative plans now call for actual written and driving tests to be given on the same two days of the week, Monday and Friday, as was the former schedule. However, new clerk Mrs. Beverly Tisdale, who began her duties in that capacity Monday, will be in the office all week giving standard eye examinations and taking photos of applicants for license renewals under the new changes in the licensing law effective January 1.

Pictures can not be taken until January 2, however, Jim Ward, local patrolman administering driver testing in this county, pointed out. License renewal cards for the new type permits are already being sent out, he said, but the applicant should not come in to have the picture taken until after January 1.

An important point Ward emphasized about the renewal cards is that they should not be bent, folded, or otherwise mutilated, as they must be inserted into a metal frame in the photo machine. If the card has been mutilated, another information sheet will be typed out by Mrs. Tisdale, Ward said, but he urged applicants to preserve intact the card sent by Austin.

Again calling attention to changes effective January 1, Ward pointed out a law already in effect since the latter part of August sets minimum licensing age at 18, with some exceptions. Youngsters aged 15 may be licensed after first having had a course in driver education, and the license will be restricted to having an older licensed driver ride in the front seat. Drivers aged 16 may be retested to have this restriction removed, provided he has had driver education, part 2.

Cost of the new licenses issued after January 1 will not change, Ward said. Present licenses with numbers ending evenly will be renewed for a period of four years at double the cost of the old license, while licenses with numbers ending unevenly will be renewed for two years at the same price as the old.

Commercial and chauffeur licenses will also follow this pattern, with even numbered renewed for two years and odd numbered renewed for one.

At the expiration of the first renewal under the new change, all operator licenses will be renewed for the maximum time, four years, and all chauffeur and commercial licenses for two years.

Advancement from operator to commercial or chauffeur license will require a new driving test in a commercial type vehicle, Ward said, and advancement from operator to commercial will require both written and driving tests.

Motorcycle drivers are receiving attention under the new law, too. These drivers will be tested and their licenses stamped with the approval to operate a cycle. Applicants applying for this license must bring a car and another licensed driver with which patrolman will ride during the actual testing.

Emphasis is being placed on helmets which are now required for cycle drivers. Purchasers of helmets are urged to check with DPS officers before buying helmets because of new specifications for the headgear. Drivers wearing standard helmets can be ticketed as if they were wearing no helmets at all.

Regarding some changes in the law which have created confusion, Ward outlined some facts and fancies which should clear some misunderstandings.

FACT: There will be no more renewing of licenses through the mail, except, for example, those persons out of state in military service.

FACT: All other applicants for renewal must make an appearance in person at a local license office to be photographed by a clerk or patrolman.

FACT: All licensed drivers must pass the state minimum eye examination using the Snellen chart. If in doubt about vision, much time may be saved by checking with a doctor or optometrist prior to visiting the DPS office.

FACT: It is not true that all persons who hold a valid license must take another written and driving test. Patrolmen may retest if there is some doubt about that person's ability to operate a vehicle properly.

Applicants applying for the first time for license-examination must present a birth certificate at the time of application. Drivers having old licenses renewed need not present the certificate.

Color photos of the driver will be added to all licenses issued after January 1, and licenses will be laminated between layers of clear plastic.

## DPS To Combat Holiday Mishaps

Behind that split second decision just before every automobile accident, there usually is a history of minutes and hours of bad driving practices.

To combat the upcoming holiday tragedies on Texas highways, and for the convenience and safety of Texas motorists, Captain J. W. Blackwell, who commands the Texas Highway Patrol in the Amarillo District, says he will press into service every available man and part of unit over the holidays.

"Youngsters and grownups alike know and attempt to preserve the legend of the most special time of the year, 'Christmas.' It is a most colorful holiday, shared by all. Yet, to many persons, the season has become a nightmare of unhappy tragic statistics," Captain Blackwell said.

"If we could, by some miracle reach every person in Texas and with that same miracle, provide an extra ounce of caution, then truly this would be a happy occasion," the captain added.

Perhaps it is the very nature of the holiday that helps to make it the most dangerous for drivers and pedestrians. Last year 351 persons lost their lives in Texas in motor vehicle accidents during the month of December. No other month exceeded this astounding useless loss of lives on our streets and highways. "This was a sad holiday, indeed, for those families, and for thousands more who celebrated Christmas on crutches, in a wheel chair, or from a hospital bed," Blackwell stated.

In speaking for the Texas Department of Public Safety, Captain Blackwell says, "Have a happy holiday season and drive safely so that others may live."

They were instead controlled mostly by the trade which might or might not sell to a given mill. And, since mills wanted to make, certain their raw cotton requirements were covered well ahead, they entered the market determined to buy at whatever price was necessary.

While there were many mills bidding against each other, prices were bound to go up. And they did. But as more and more mills acquired sufficient cotton to fill their needs well into next year, buying interest dropped off quickly, and so did prices.

Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., believes this was especially true on the High Plains, which is primarily a "mill market" as opposed to a "trader market."

For 1968, unless estimated supply-demand figures prove to be completely out of kilter, Johnson believes prices for quality cotton will again be strong.

Just how strong will depend on several factors. The first indication will come in March when cotton producers have made known their planting intentions for 1968. This will be the first hint of just how close the nation's farmers will come to reaching USDA's projected 13.5 million bale production next year.

Another indicator will be the level of domestic cotton consumption in the months ahead. USDA is now guessing that a

little over 9 million bales will be consumed in the 1967-68 marketing year and a similar amount in 1968-69. Signs that this is too high would of course have a depressing effect on marketing prospects.

More significant on the off-take front, however, is likely to be the amount of cotton the U. S. is able to export during the remainder of this year and next year. Exports have traditionally varied more from year to year than has domestic consumption.

Currently, exports are running some 20 per cent below last year when foreign markets took 4.7 million bales of U. S. cotton. But USDA is so far standing firm on its estimate that exports will reach about 4.5 million.

"It would take a 1968 crop well above the 13.5 million bales USDA is hoping for, plus a sizable reduction in total off-take to bring about anything like an overly plentiful supply of cotton next year," Johnson said, "so an active cotton market with prices above the loan rate in 1968 is a completely reasonable expectation."

Between now and then, the market will doubtless "fluctuate."

## Briscoe County Farmer Has Near Record Micronaire

It is a quite interesting story to hear the experience of Mr. Joe B. Mercer, a member in the Briscoe County Co-Op Gin, who lives in Silverton and farms on the High Plains near that city, as he relates his experience with a new cotton that was first released in 1966. Mr. Mercer has a verticillium wilt problem on his farm and he planted the new Gregg 25V that has the glandless seed, both years of 1966 and 1967, and no wilt showed up in the cotton. In 1966 he watered in July and then again just before the rain started around the 20th of August, which lasted for 4 or 5 weeks, and he says the cotton didn't make at all. This year he planted the same cotton again, but he managed it differently and he has a quite different story to tell.

Out of 97 wrap-ups from approximately 48 acres he had 80 bales ranging in micronaire from 3.7 to 4.3 with only 11 bales falling below the 3.5. The lint yield per acre averaged 1054 pounds compress weights; there were 61 percent of the staples ranging from 1 inch to 1-1-16; with 30 percent being 31-32, and the remainder 15-16. The planting was finished by April 18, and harvesting was completed by November 12.

Here is a salute to you, Mr. Mercer, a farmer of the Plains on the northern fringe of the cotton belt with a record like this or with infested ground, in a bad year for micronaire like '67. When Mr. Mercer was asked how he watered the cotton in '67, he replied, "I watered it July 20th, and that was it; and it never rained any afterwards." He also states that he had a neighbor who had the 25V in '66, and that he watered in July but had not watered again when the rains started, and that he had one of the best fields of cotton around.

Just a reminder that the fully stormproof Gregg 35 in which a large percentage of the south Plains has been planted in the past is still a good cotton. And if you like a high-production cotton you cannot pass up the new Gregg 45. The 35 and 45 are not tolerant to verticillium wilt. Gregg Seed Farms, 2700 Lockney Highway, Plainview, Texas. (Adv.)

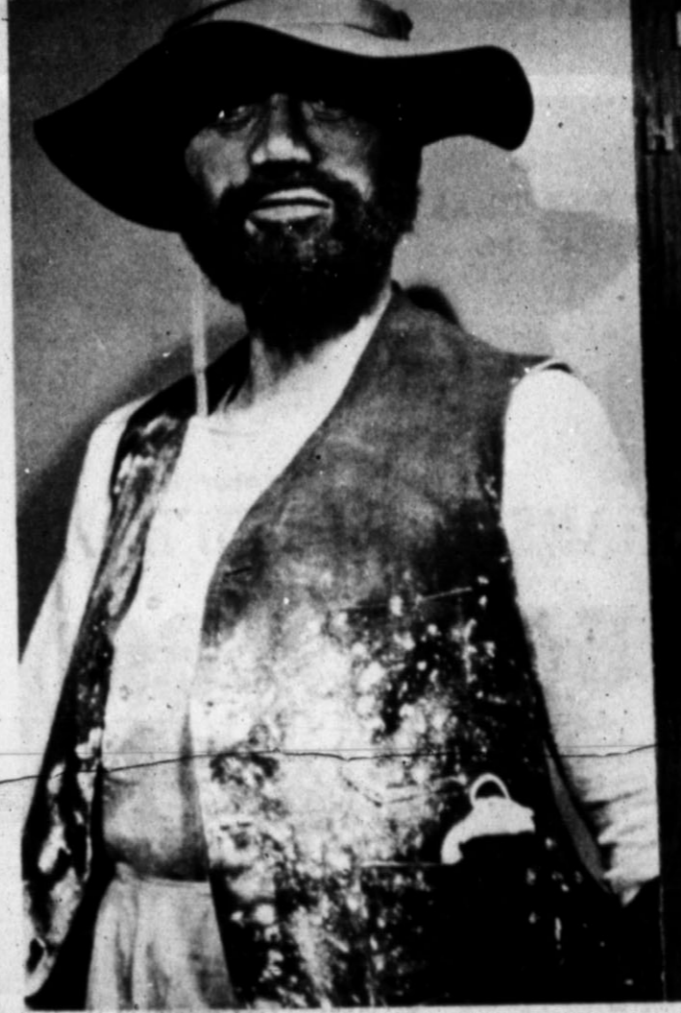

Q — Will the VA issue any type of insurance to men entering the service now?

A — No. However, unless a serviceman submits in writing his refusal to be insured, he is automatically covered under the Servicemen's Group Life Insurance program.

Q — I was rated 100 per cent while I was hospitalized for my service-connected disability. Please advise me why my permanent rating was not increased.

A — The 100 per cent evaluation was assigned because you were hospitalized in excess of 21 days and not because the permanent residuals of your service-connected disability were considered totally disabling. Upon your discharge from the hospital, the findings in the report revealed no increase in the pre-hospitalization level of permanent disablement.

Q — I attend school under the new G. I. Bill. I have a wife and two children. What must I do to get an increase in educational allowance now payable for dependents?

A — Prior to October 1, 1967, the VA was permitted to pay only for two dependents. However, the Veterans' Pension and Readjustment Assistance Act of 1967, which was signed by the President last August 31, not only increased the amount of the educational allowance but also provided an allowance for more than two dependents. Under the old allowance structure, you received \$150 a month for full time training. This was the maximum authorized for a veter-

Sighting Rifle Properly Can be Very Important

HUNT — Two hunters on the Kerr Wildlife Management Area 28 miles west of Kerrville in Kerr County found they might as well throw rocks as to shoot at deer with rifles which are not properly sighted in.

Melvin Andregg, biology technician for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, reported that one hunter shot seven times and another six times at deer with less than spectacular success.

The reason? Both had purchased new guns because their names had been drawn for the hunt and had assumed that they "must be in good shape" since neither rifle had been fired.

If you have not already done so, you should notify your nearest VA office of all of your dependents, and furnish a record of birth (preferably a copy of birth certificate) for each additional child or children.

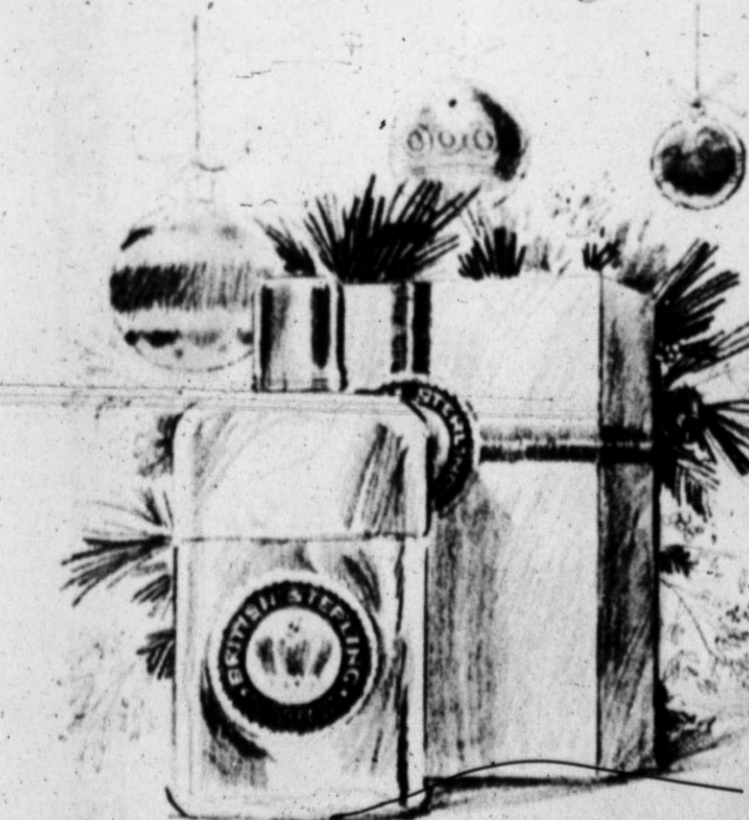
**STILL STAYS DRY BANGALORE, India** — Mysore State, which scrapped prohibition on Oct. 15, found it still would be comparatively dry.

**Casa de Amigos**

By David Rader

VISTA is a group of over 4,000 men and women ranging in age 18 on up. They spend one year of their lives (and often more) working as employees of the U. S. Government. By monetary standards they are the lowest status federal employee, (an Army private receives \$92.) They live away from their homes in an "undesirable" neighborhood, under uncomfortable living conditions. Their jobs are vague, their methods even more vague. Why do they join VISTA, what do they do and how do they do it?

VISTA volunteers live and work in the midst of poverty to help the poor climb out of the endless tunnel of hopelessness created by the culture of poverty, and into the light of abundance and self respect the rest of our nation takes for granted. Even though volunteers have very little training (5 to 8 weeks of extremely informal lecture sessions and practice in the fields), they are better able to affect real change in the lives of the poor than practically any other anti-poverty workers, at any level of government. The reason for this is that they are not hobbled by bureaucracy, not tied by endless rules.

Another reason is that they live with the poor. They see poor people as human beings not just statistics. They come to identify with the poor, suffer because their friends and neighbors are suffering. Unlike the

average social worker who lives in the suburbs and commutes each day into the slums, or spends his time in an office downtown, the VISTA worker lives with poverty day and night. His home may be in an Indian reservation, or a New England farm community, an Eskimo village, a slum in one of the nation's largest cities, a Latin American village in Puerto Rico or along the Rio Grande, a southern Negro town or a migrant labor camp.

A VISTA may be anywhere there is a large concentration of the poor. They work with whites, Negroes, Spanish-Americans, Indians, Eskimos, unemployed miners, untrained, obsolete workers in city slums, victims of prejudice, and industrial advancement, school dropouts and those without schooling of any kind. VISTA volunteers work with those people who are not quite American citizens; the 20 percent of America that doesn't participate in our culture, but are merely spectators longing to enter our society of abundance. They are people of another culture — the culture of poverty.

The many duties of a VISTA volunteer can be broken down into three categories. The first is the most tangible, and therefore the easiest to describe. This is social work. Most areas of the nation cannot afford to hire an employee to work with the poor. VISTA volunteers provide this help without cost to local communities.

All over the nation VISTA's are working with the poor as teachers, tutors, medical aides, advisers on construction projects, assistants for Community Action Programs, counselors, social caseworkers, and simply as friends. They work in schools, day care centers, community centers, housing projects, Indian reservations, and Casas de Amigos.

cause they have grown up in poverty — not only material but the more serious educational and spiritual poverty. Throughout their lives they have been conditioned to failure. Their failure, represented by poverty, is natural to them. What is not natural for them is to meet success. Therefore few do succeed.

What VISTA's can do is to expose them to success. This success can't be given to them. They must carve it out for themselves. Their success, or their failure, must be their own. They alone can build self-respect.

Since those in poverty are poor mainly because of educational, cultural and social deficiencies, few can cross the high barriers by themselves. But together they can succeed. This is the foundation of community development. Alone a man is a stick — he can easily be broken. However together, working as a community to raise all of its members, the individual sticks become a bundle. All working together they can all meet success. The confidence they gain can lead them into other fields — both as a community and as individuals. They can be made to see that the various avenues leading to success were also made for them. Then, and only then, can true free enterprise begin.

VISTA volunteers can have a central role in this process. However his role must not be that of a paragon, or boss man, telling them what to do. He is a salesman and a guide. He advises them when advice is asked for. But he leaves the decision making to the people.

The VISTA project in Hereford is just now moving along these lines. Meetings are being held bi-weekly for parents of our pre-school children. Perhaps this can be a nucleus for large scale community cooperation. Working together the people can clean up the camp, wage a war against rats and insects, fight disease, obtain help of various kinds for their children. Perhaps they can begin a credit union — a form of business enterprise at its most basic level. The most important goal, however, is success — both for material reasons, to help their family live better, and psychological reasons, to make them realize that they can succeed.

The final question is, why do volunteers join VISTA? The answer is different for different people. For some it can be found in the slogan "join VISTA and see the world" — the real world. VISTA can be an educational experience — education through action, taking responsibility at an early age. For some it is a way to learn about people, for others it is an adventure. Some believe it is their moral duty to help those in need, others do it simply because they enjoy it.

Russell will begin calling meetings within the next several weeks in anticipation of the drive for the purpose of getting together various area leaders, teen leaders, and volunteers for the Mother's March.

Working closely with Melvin Jayroe and others, plans now call for the two men to personally contact several of the larger city business in hope of receiving some larger contributions which will set the pace of the drive.

School leaders are considering the selection of some student clubs for area teen leaders, and Russell said one women's study club had been contacted to furnish leadership for the women's march.

A goal for this year has not been set at this time. Previous local drives have raised around \$3,000 for the fight against polio and birth defects.

With the problem of polio largely solved because of the vaccines National foundation emphasis now is being placed on the fight against birth defects. Annual March of Dimes campaigns throughout the country has been a leader in financing the various projects involved in the search for a cause and prevention of this crippler.

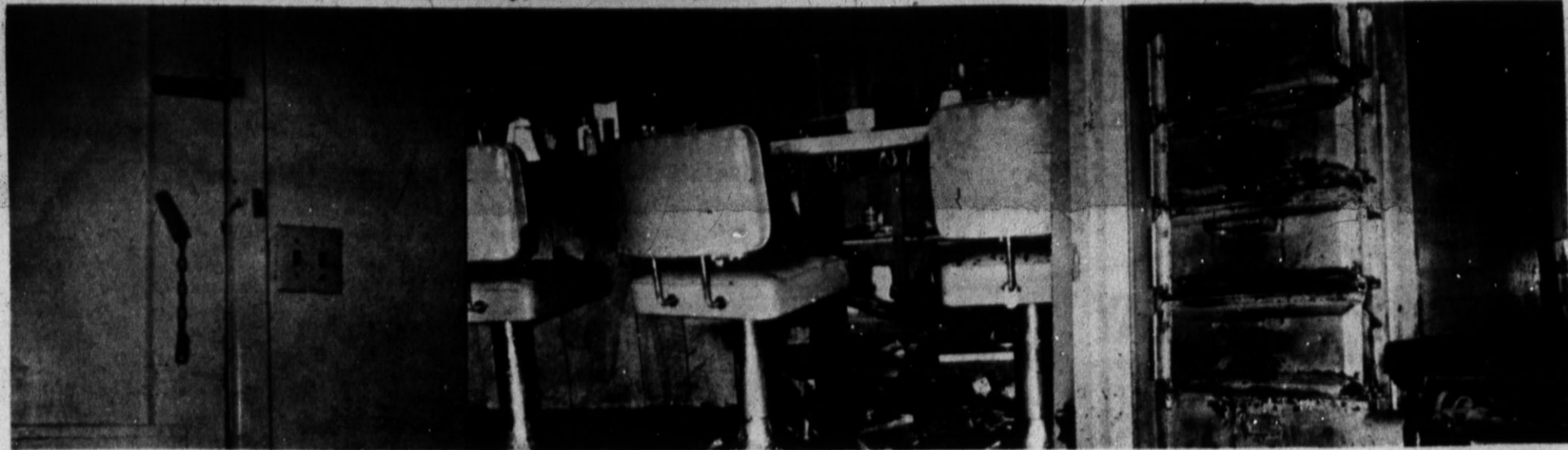

# Trustees Discuss Variety Of Items

Members of the Hereford Independent School District Board of Trustees discussed many important items at length during their monthly meeting Tuesday night, but took official action on only a part of the agenda.

The trustees took a close look at the latest enrollment figures for Hereford schools, as the report showed a total of 4607 students attending classes as of Tuesday. Supt. Johnny Clark pointed out that the total was 247 more than were enrolled on the same date in 1966 — an increase of about 5 per cent.

A breakdown shows 515 students enrolled at Aikman Elementary School, 633 at Bluebonnet, 397 at Central, 553 at Northwest, 446 at Shirley, 555 at La Plata Junior High, 524 at Stanton Junior High and 789 at Hereford High School.

A further breakdown shows 598 first graders, 405 second graders, 416 in the third, 407 in the fourth, 349 fifth graders, 369 sixth graders, 386 seventh graders, 341 eighth graders, 352 freshmen, 324 sophomores, 219 juniors and 246 seniors.

Enrollment figures from the Adult Education program revealed 37 students in typing, 13 in shorthand, 35 in bookkeeping, 32 in conversational Spanish, 17 in welding, 11 in tractor engine repair and tune-up, 14 in automobile engine repair and 5 in amateur radio communications. Of the 164 students in the classes, there are 71 men and 93 women.

Tom Harkey, coordinator of special services for the school system, was appointed as "Custodian of the Books" by trustees, with the responsibility of handling all textbooks in buying and selling.

The board also adopted a policy that school buses will not pick up students less than one-fourth of a mile from the state approved route — except in certain instances. Clark and Harkey pointed out that the school had made a practice of delivering students to the home, in bad weather, when possible, and when it was otherwise impossi-

ble for the students to walk the distance.

Board members told the administrators to use their judgment in the decision. It was brought out during discussion that many students living in the city walk much more than one-fourth of a mile to school.

In other action, the board agreed that an open house for the new Vocational Building will be held Jan. 8. Trustees also discussed taxes, the athletic and band programs and other items, but no action was taken.

## Two Citations Given In Wreck

Two tickets were issued Tuesday evening as the result of a collision between a 1964 Ford and a 1966 Volkswagen at the intersection of Park Avenue and Miles.

The Ford, which had \$100 damage, was driven by David Lee Combs, Rm. 19 Plains Motel, and the Volkswagen by Jerome Curtis Coker Jr. of 324 Circle Drive in Odessa. The V.V. was owned by Standard Imported Motors of Odessa, and received \$125 damage.

Citations were issued for improper turn by being in the wrong lane and the other for passing of a vehicle signalling for a turn.

One vehicle was traveling east on Park Avenue, attempting to make a right turn onto Miles. The other auto was also traveling east on Park Avenue and attempted to pass the car on the right side. The right front of that car hit the left side of the other auto.

1/2 cup finely cut candied cherries  
1/4 cup finely cut pineapple  
1 cup chopped walnuts  
1/2 cup milk  
3 eggs, separated  
1/4 cup sugar  
2 1/4 cup sifted all-purpose flour  
3 t. Baking powder  
1 t. salt  
1/2 t. mace  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup butter

Sift flour with baking powder salt, mace, and 1/2 cup sugar. Cut in butter with pastry blender. Stir in fruit and nuts. Add milk to well-beaten egg yolks and combine with flour mixture.

Beat egg whites until soft peaks forms. Gradually add 1/4 cup sugar and beat until stiff. Fold into batter. Pour into greased 9x5x3 inch loaf pan.

Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for 60 to 65 minutes. Cool on rack. Makes 1 loaf. Wait several hours before slicing.

education and find a job. There is already a group that prefers to live on welfare checks, and critics contend this group would be vastly expanded if Internal Revenue Service started sending checks to all who lacked money.

Contrarily, the Brookings book contends the plan would supply an incentive now lacking. This argument is that present Social Security and welfare systems penalize those who do earn some income, reducing payments on a dollar-for-dollar basis. There would be no "means test" under the negative income tax system.

It is argued that the proposal would either "remove the stigma of being poor" or "destory individual dignity", depending on whether you support or oppose the plan. One opponent, Rep. Roy A. Taylor (D., N. C.), said in a recent speech that adoption of the scheme would allow a person who does not want to work "to enjoy his poverty."
