



The committee decided to launch an educational campaign on the subject, hoping to bring the startling facts to the attention of the community in order that some plan can be devised whereby it will be wiped out in this community.

The County Library has a book by Dr. Thomas Parran, "The Shadow of the Land," which the committee recommended, and from which they quote much of the following information.


