J. E. GARRISON FUNERAL LARGELY ATTENDED

One of Hereford's Best Known Business Men Laid to Rest Last Friday

The funeral of J. E. Garrison, who died at Panhandle last Wednesday week, was held at the Presbyterian church in Hereford last Friday at 3 o'clock, followed by ritualistic services by the Masonic order at the cemetery.

The services at the church were conducted by Rev. W. M. Baker, pastor, assisted by the other pastors of the town, each of them taking part in the service.

Rev. Baker took for his text the thought embodied in 1st Corinthians 12th verse: "For now we see through a glass darkly, but then face to face." After giving a short biographic sketch of deceased, he spoke of the strong faith always exercised by Brother Garrison that enabled him to fully trust where he could not see nor fully understand, believing that all mystery would be cleared in that life that is to follow this. He spoke of his loving devotion to his family, to his brothers and sisters, and loyal support of his pastor in every Christian effort as superintendent of the Sunday School, as teacher and elder his was a consecrated service.

Rev. Farmer spoke of his good work in the Brotherhood, an interdenominational organization. His Christian character was broader than denomination.

Rev. Henson of the Methodist church read the Scripture lesson and Dr. Faris of the Christian church, led in prayer. A selected choir rendered "Nearer My God to Thee" and "Abide With Me." A quartette composed of Messrs. Broadwell and Powelson and Mesdames R. N. Mounts and Ezra Norton sang, "Sometime We'll Understand."

At the cemetery the Masons gave their ritualistic service. The floral offerings were many and beautiful.

The attendance at the funeral was very large, attesting the high esteem in which Mr. Garrison was held in the community. Probably no man that has passed away in years here has been more sincerely mourned.

HIGH SCHOOL CIRCUS

Show of Unrivalled Excellence Staged by Pupils of Hereford High School

"All's well that ends well" and when late Saturday evening the spectacular demonstration, presented by the high school, closed in a blaze of glory amid the plaudits of a vast throng of enthusiastic admirers, it was compensation, ample, for all the labor, discouraging delays, and frustrated plans with which these energetic school people had to cope.

There was no feature of the parade that was not distinctly creditable and but for lack of space each one would be given the notice it deserves. Suffice it to say, however, that individually, and as a whole, it was an unqualified triumph of mind over matter and furnished a really excellent entertainment within itself. Then in the evening "We went to the animal fair."

The birds and the beasts were there, and it unquestionably had the earmarks of the genuine circus. The red lemons, the tall woman and the small man, the snake charmer, the fortune teller, the bareback rider, all were there, to say nothing of the rare zoological specimens, to

be seen for only 5c.

All in all, it was a great day, aside from the fact of its value in dollars and cents.

NEW COMMISSION INSTALLED

William Knight Enters on Third Term as Mayor; Ashbrook and Cardwell Commissioners

The old City Commission met last Thursday evening and canvassed the returns of the city election and declared William Knight elected Mayor, and D. F. Ashbrook and J. H. Cardwell commissioners. On Monday the new officers took the oath of office and were installed.

The following resolutions were adopted:


Resolved, by the City Commission of the City of Hereford, that it is the desire and intention of the Commission to secure the construction by property owners, of much needed additional sidewalks; and that the city shall construct additional street crossings as fast as its financial condition will permit.

Resolved further, that in the judgment of the Commission, two committees should be appointed, one representing the east side, and the other the west side of town, to work with the Commission in the matter of securing the building of more sidewalks in the city and in soliciting property owners on such streets as may be designated for sidewalk extensions to construct sidewalks along the property owned by them on such streets to the end that more sidewalks may be constructed and that the city may lay crossings to connect sidewalks wherever possible.

Resolved further, that Carl Gilliland and W. E. Dameron are hereby requested to act as chairmen, respectively, of the two committees mentioned and to select and appoint the other members of their respective committees, and the two committees, when organized, are requested to confer with the commission in regard to carrying out the spirit of these resolutions and conducting a campaign to increase largely the convenience of sidewalks within the city.

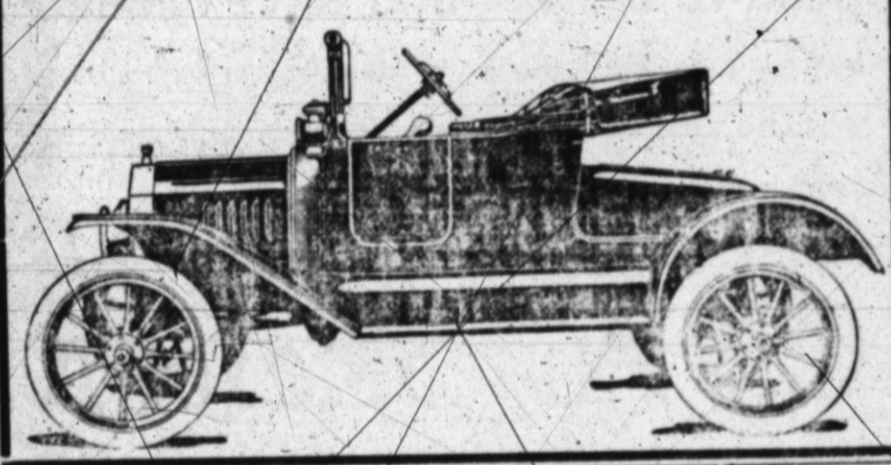

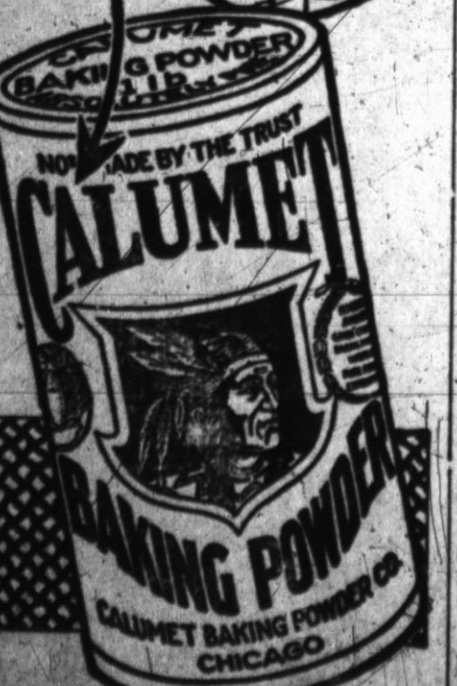

MAYOR URGES CO-OPERATION

To The Brand:
 Permit me to say something that has been suggested by the sentiment expressed in Mr. S. J. Williams' recent communication, "Let's Pull Together." The new City Commission will need the co-operation of all the people to accomplish the best results.

If that co-operation can be had, a great deal can be accomplished during the next two years in building up the town and making it a better and more comfortable place in which to live.

Since I have been again placed at the head of the city's affairs, it seems appropriate that I should call attention to some things that, in my judgment, ought to be accomplished, and which can be accomplished, if the right kind of co-operation can be had from our people.

I am aware that some complaints have been expressed because more physical improvements have not been made. Some fail to appreciate the financial embarrassments under which the city affairs have had to be administered. It would take too much space to go into that in detail, but if you are sufficiently interested to examine the city's books, the most of such complaints will be found without merit. Doubtless some mistakes have been made, but the most of people make some mistakes in their own personal affairs.

But it is a fact that the several committees who have annually gone over the city's books and accounts, (and they have been composed of the most competent business men in the community,) have, without exception, publicly and privately stated that the city's affairs have been well and efficiently managed. In some instances, their private statements about the matter have been highly complimentary. But be that as it may.

All of the old floating debt of over \$6000 has been paid off and considerable improvement has been made in various ways. The financial condition of the city is good, and it is in a better condition to make improvements than it has

been in six or eight years. One of the greatest needs now existing is more sidewalks and more street crossings. With the right kind of effort among our people, there is no reason why more sidewalks should not be constructed this year than we have ever built in the city, and I favor putting in street crossings just as fast as the finances will permit. I think an active campaign should be carried on to secure a large extension of sidewalks. When properly solicited and shown the necessity of them, I have no doubt that many property owners will cheerfully put them in. I am sure the commission will do all it can in putting in the crossings.

A new sewer line should be built to accommodate the new High School and something like 20 residences accessible to such a line. The sewer line running through the tier of blocks west of Main Street, should be extended and thus accommodate about twelve residences right in the heart of the city, now without sewer accommodations of any kind. Some of the property owners on this line have offered to assist the city in building it by advancing a part of the money required. It will cost something over two thousand dollars to construct these two sewer lines, but I think the matter can be financed without serious difficulty. The health of the community is of the first importance, and the way to insure that is by making the town sanitary.

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
