Hereford competed in both these contests, Clyde Kibbe and Jarvis Rayzor appearing in declamation, and Robert Wilson and Paul Guthrie in debate.

According to the judgment of competent authority the boys acquitted themselves most creditably, and each one of them may justly feel proud of his effort.

In the debate, there were four opposing teams, Clarendon, Hartley, Amarillo and Hereford. Hereford was matched with Amarillo in the preliminaries, the debate being given before three judges—two of whom were residents of Amarillo, and one, Prof. Sone, Superintendent of Tulia schools. The decision was given to Amarillo by a vote of 2 to 1. Tulia voting for Hereford and the two Amarillo judges voting for Amarillo.

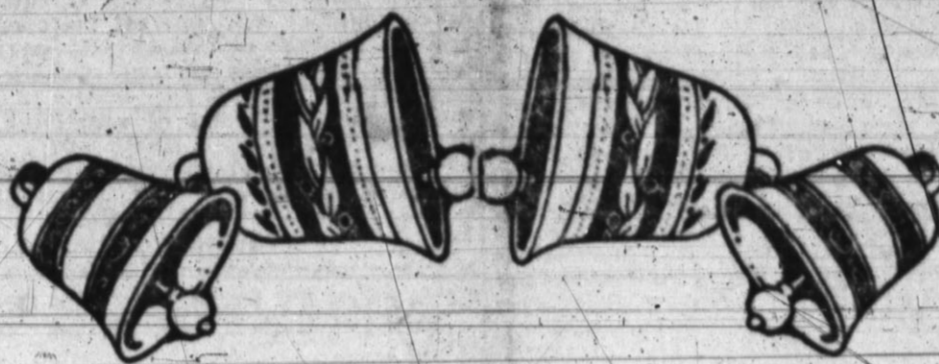
Thinks This Fine Country

HEREFORD POST OFFICE 2ND CLASS

Receipts of Office Show Steady Increase During Past Two Years

The postal year, on which the government bases its classifications and salaries, ended March 31st.

According to the receipts as shown by the books of Postmaster Barnett, the Hereford post office is entitled to enter the second class. For an office to get second class rating the receipts for the fiscal year must reach \$8000. The Hereford office passed that this past year, the total receipts being \$8,100 an increase of \$1400 over last year, and an increase of \$2100 in the past two years. When the office is made second class the postmaster will receive a minimum salary of \$3000 and be allowed assistant postmaster and at least two clerks paid by the government. It also makes city delivery possible.

Hereford was at one time a second class office, but when hard times came and the boom days collapsed, it went back to third class.

This time the business comes as a steady growth based on home business and shows that the country is on a substantial basis, and is not likely to go back once it is re-classified. Postmaster Barnett and his assistants are to be congratulated upon the good work they have done with insufficient help and unenviable quarters. It is to be hoped that these conditions may be improved when the office is reclassified.

County Gets Gas Tractor

The County Commissioners have had their new gasoline tractor that arrived last week, out dragging roads. It has a three drag attachment, and takes the entire road at once. It also has a roller and grader attachment. It is a machine that will do much for the roads of the county, and the commissioners are to be commended for this enterprise. The commissioners of Parker county were here this week examining its work.

On Friday, of this week, the West Texas Normal, at Canyon, will be dedicated, and not Canyon, alone, but all west Texas takes a personal pride in this great institution with its unsurpassed facilities and equipment, and rejoices that this part of the state has at least been granted this much consideration. The building is magnificent, and will be adequate for all requirements for years to come. But now, we want an A. & M. College situated in near enough proximity to our homes that its experimental and demonstration work may have the greatest practical value for the boys and girls in this part of the state. Much that the pupils receive in A. & M. is worthless, owing to different conditions of soils, climate etc. We would not discredit the work of this worthy and efficient institution, but we want one just like it.

"Go to church next Sunday."

Shakespeare, the immortal world-poet, will receive within the next few days, in the great tercentenary celebration, an ovation of greater extent and splendor than any that has yet been accorded to this transcendent genius.

In all the larger cities of this and other states, and of all countries of the civilized world, the Shakespeare anniversary will be celebrated in various ways, all on a scale of extreme magnificence.

The students of our own State university have shown a most praiseworthy zeal in planning and executing one of the most elaborate of these spectacular demonstrations to blazon forth glory of the Elizabethan dramatist. Club women and others all over Texas, will observe the anniversary in fitting manner, but to the university will doubtless belong the credit of the largest and most brilliant pageant, probably the greatest thing of its kind ever witnessed in the Southwest. The university at Austin is a great institution. It has done, and will do much for the people of Texas, but no movement which it has inaugurated, or in future may inaugurate, will be more far-reaching in good results, than this Shakespeare celebration.

In view of modern day cynicism, it is nothing less than heroic for a school, especially an institution supported by public money, to attempt such an elaborate exhibition, with culture as its sole aim. The old cry, "To what purpose is this waste?" voices even today a familiar and deplorable standard of values.

That it has become popular to scoff at all pretensions toward appreciation of Shakespeare as affectation, is a regrettable fact. The result of this pernicious influence may be seen in any classroom in English—and is the greatest obstacle that stands between the teacher of English and the results at which she aims.

Many persons who are sincerely appreciative of Shakespeare, and who keenly feel the master touch in his writings, are prone to keep these preferences in the back ground for fear of being thought snobbish. It is not difficult for the reasonably educated and intelligent mind to learn to love truth and beauty in literature and to appreciate the wonderful instinctive-ethical sense which is the touchstone of Shakespeare's greatness, else it were surely a mistake to place the masterpieces before the students of the public school at the very beginning of their school life.

If the university, by this week of festivities, shall awaken the present dormant interest in this great master of modern drama it will have erected to itself a monument superb and lasting.

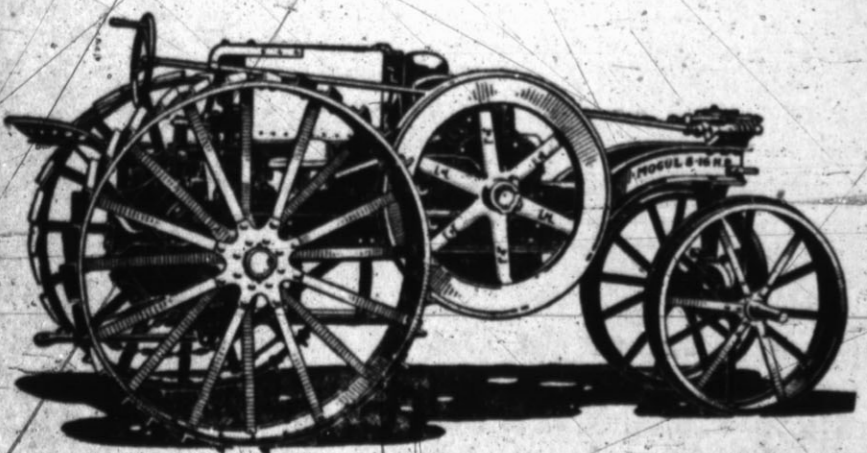
