WORK ON DOUGLASS HOTEL PROGRESSING

Work on T & P Shops Started

Railway Shops Being Rebuilt; Enlargements Made and Fireproof Materials Are Being Used

The work of the rebuilding the machine shops of the Texas & Pacific Railway Company in Big Spring to replace the one destroyed by fire several months ago is now in progress.

A fire-proof structure 44x144 feet will be erected. With a concrete floor and sheet iron on steel frames, this building cannot be destroyed as were the two machine shops in the past.

A space is being left between the round house and the new building as a further protection against possible fire damage. The building is so planned that an addition can be easily added in case it is found necessary to enlarge the machine shops.

The oil development in West Texas has increased the business of the railroad to such a degree that it is now apparent that there will be need for a large repair shop on this division of the Texas & Pacific Railway and the company was looking to the future when deciding upon the construction of this large machine shop. This is only one of a number of larger projects which oil development has caused the Texas & Pacific Ry. to plan for Big Spring.

A special crew of steel workers were brought to Big Spring to erect the new machine hop.

BANK RESOURCES CONTINUE TO INCREASE

As an indication of the way prosperity is making its appearance in our city and county just notice how the resources of the local banks continue to increase. The First National Bank showed total resources of \$1,200,000 on Oct. 10, 1927, and on Nov. 1 the resources of this bank were more than \$1,300,000—the greatest since the bank was organized.

Telephone Co. to Start Building

Improvements Totalling \$172,700 to be Carried Out Just as Rapidly as Material Can Be Received

M. H. Moore of Abilene, district manager for the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. here Thursday brings the good news that the telephone service in Big Spring is to be made first class just as soon as it is possible to carry out the big improvement program the company has mapped out for the Big Spring telephone system.

Bids for the new building which will house the telephone exchange and plant in Big Spring will be opened today (Friday) November 4, and one week after the bid has been accepted work will be started.

The building will be erected at the corner of East Fourth and Runnels streets. The building will be a two story brick 45x53 feet, with provision for an addition to be erected later. It will front on Runnels street. On the first floor the lobby will occupy a space 8x14 feet and the commercial office will require a space 19x23 feet. The first floor will also house the terminal equipment and battery room.

The second floor will be used for both local and toll switch boards; with a rest room 19x28 feet for the operators. There will also be erected a garage of three car capacity and also storage for the battery equipment.

All the needed equipment to rebuild the Big Spring telephone system has been ordered from the manufacturers with the expectation of starting installation of the new switchboard about the latter part of January.

The equipment for the new plant will be ample to take care of local and long distance needs up to 1932. The building is also planned on an estimated growth of 8 years, and there is space on the property for additional building when needed. A board in one section of the trouble board and one blank section with a six section toll board will be fully equipped with 1100 lines or a capacity of 3680; also a capacity of 42 rural lines.

The switchboard to be installed is a number 11 Cameron Battery switchboard, one of the most modern obtainable.

The entire telephone system should be practically rebuilt and in operation by next July.

The total expenditure for the improvements will be \$172,700.00

BIG SPRING HEROINE'S FATHER RECEIVES MEDAL

The Carnegie Hero Fund Commission of Pittsburgh has recognized the heroic act of Mildred V. Thompson, aged 14, of Big Spring, who lost her life in Birdwell tank in the southeast part of the city May 24, 1925, while trying to save the life of a girl companion from drowning.

A silver medal was bestowed upon L. V. (Babe) Thompson, father of this girl.

Mildred Vena Thompson, 14 years lost her life by drowning at four o'clock Sunday afternoon, May 24, 1925. The tragedy took place at Birdwell lake, while she was trying to save the lives of two girl companions, who while wading had stepped off into a deep hole in the lake. Mildred succeeded in keeping the two girls Nancy Jones and Pearl Bostle from drowning until assistance arrived, but in doing so she lost her own life.

Forty-six heroic acts were recognized by the commission; four silver and forty-two bronze medals being awarded. Mildred Thompson was the only girl to lose her life in the performance of an heroic act. Seventeen heroes in the United States lost their lives and were recognized by the commission.

City Federation Plans Club House

Committee Appointed to Select Site and Make Definite Plans; Report to be Made at Next Meeting

A suggestion made by Mrs. Henry DeVries, that of building a club house for Big Spring met with unanimous approval by all members present at the regular monthly meeting of the City Federation which was held in the rest room at the courthouse Tuesday afternoon. Many of the members present stated that the possibility of building a club house for Big Spring had been uppermost in their minds for a long time but they had never acted on this matter and when placed as a motion before the Federation it carried unanimously.

A committee composed of Mrs. J. I. McDowell, Mrs. L. L. Freeman and Mrs. Henry DeVries was appointed by the president of the Federation, Mrs. C. W. Cunningham to select the site for the club house, and to make plans for its erection. The report from the committee will be heard at the next regular meeting and immediate action will be taken when the plans are accepted by the Federation members. It is hoped that the club house will be completed by spring. The City Federation has a "nest egg" to start this project with and plans for making money will be entered into so that rapid progress can be made. It is certain that the citizenship of Big Spring will cooperate heartily and donate liberally to this enterprise. The club house will be practical for the women of the city and will be a credit to the town.

In planning to build a club house Big Spring is simply falling in line with many of the towns and cities throughout the state. Abilene, Anson, Haskell, Lamesa, Yuleta, and other Texas towns have already completed club house, and find them a great asset and well worth the money invested in them.

The City Federation was organized for the purpose of helping the town and it has ever been the aim of this organization to make Big Spring a finer and better place in which to live. What these women have done in the way of social, educational, religious and civic improvement need not be enumerated but their good work continues to grow and has spread thru our entire community. This forward step of erecting a club house to be used as a social center for the women of Big Spring is in keeping with the other good worthwhile projects that have been put over by the club women and is being enthusiastically received by all.

The attendance at this meeting was very good and it is hoped that the good interest continues and even more come out to the regular meetings. The routine business was disposed of after which the Big Flower show sponsored by the City Federation, and to be held Saturday in the Walcott Motor Co., was discussed.

The work of laying the Magnolia Petroleum pipe line from Midland to DeLeon is progressing rapidly. The work of laying the line across Howard County from east to west will soon be completed. An eight inch welded line is being installed to transport oil from the Crane and Winkler fields to the Magnolia refineries. The Magnolia is the second big oil company to build a pipe line thru this territory, and it is rumored that at least one more line will be built from Midland to Ranger.

COTTON RECEIPTS AVERAGE 200 BALES DAILY HERE

Cotton has continued to roll into Big Spring at the same rate it has been coming the past month which has been around 200 bales per day. The total received at the Compress warehouse so far this season totals 1257 bales. There has been ginned at the Keisling gin in the city 2136 round bales; equivalent to 1068 square bales, not included in the above total.

Many growers are holding for an advance in price as is evidenced by the 5000 bales now in storage at the Big Spring compress warehouse.

J. W. Carpenter, public weigher, states that during all the years he served as public weigher he never saw as much good cotton as is being brought in this season. Practically all the cotton weighed so far will grade middling basis or better.

EXPRESS SERVICE EXTENDED

On Tuesday, November first the American Railway Express Co. extended their delivery service to reach a territory about six blocks east of Main street and a large section north of the railroad.

They expect to use a motor truck for this service as soon as the truck can be secured.

Southern Ice Co. Retail Ice Station

Company Plans an Attractive Retail Ice Station on Main Street; Plans Designed by Mgr. E. A. Kelley

The Southern Ice and Utilities Company announces the early commencement of work on their projected service station for ice, to be located on property recently acquired at the corner of Ninth and Main streets, just at the geometrical center of the built-up part of the city.

The plans, designed by Manager Edwin A. Kelley, call for a stucco building about 26x27 feet in ground plan, facing west, and set back 65 feet from the sidewalk. This building will contain an insulated vault capable of holding thirty tons of ice, and will be equipped with refrigerating machinery.

Running north and south across the front of the building will be a fifty six foot concrete serving platform, somewhat less than three feet high. In front of which will run a concrete slab of equal length, four feet wide and elevated six inches above the driveway. The serving men will stand on this lower slab, on a level with their customers, and will take the ice from the platform and lift it across to the cars in one motion.

The ice in the vault will have been scored in grooves an inch or so deep by a so-called scoring machine, insuring absolutely correct weight when the block is split at these lines, and it is the purpose to install an automatic device which, by the simple pulling of a lever, will throw out on to the platform a piece of ice of any of the standard sizes. By this means both freedom from meltage and speed in delivery will be assured.

The driveway, paved with concrete, will sweep up to and away from the building in a semi-circle one hundred feet in diameter, with a branch exit leading out also on to Ninth street.

The grounds are to be laid out in grass and flowers and will constitute one of the really attractive spots of our city.

With acreage near the Magnolia oil company's big gusher, Dora Roberts No. 1 on section 136, Block \$1000 per acre the scramble to secure holdings near the big well is on and many tests are due for that territory. The F. H. E. Oil company purchased an 80 acre tract just north of the 80 acre tract on which the Magnolia well is located, paying \$1000 an acre for this lease. They are going forward with preparations to drill on this tract.

Glasscock Brothers owning offset acreage on the south are shaping up to start a deep test on their holdings. Owens and Sloan owning a tract just east of the Magnolia tract in which they have a shallow producer are to drill a deep test.

Clark & Melat drilling for Henshaw and others on section 135 will drill on down after the deeper pay. The Texon Oil Company will drill two or three deep tests on section 159 and 134.

The test well of Henshaw and Achers on section 6 will also be deepened in an attempt to hit the Magnolia pay. A number of the large oil companies were watching the California test on the B & J 77-er ranch and the Marland test on the Connally ranch and if either of these hit pay there will be some real activity. More than twenty-five big oil companies own acreage in between the test in question and an intensive drilling campaign would be inaugurated if either of these tests bring in a commercial well.

At W. S. Martin Test

Considerable interest is now being shown in the W. S. Martin test 12 miles northwest of Big Spring. Six inch casing was set at 3050 feet, and the drill is pounding away slowly in a blue shale and lime formation.

If a commercial well is secured it will mean big things for Howard County.

California's Iatan Test

The California Company has not yet made public the location of their number four well in the Iatan section. It is to be two locations west of their Foster No. 3, but whether it is to be one location north or south is yet to be determined.

Peer Oil Co. 2300 Feet Deep

The Peer Oil Co. is now drilling below 2300 feet in their test well in the northwest quarter of section 25, block 30, Tsp. 1N on the C. D. Reed ranch, in the eastern part of Howard County.

The drill is pounding away in a hard gray sandy lime.

Marland to Drill North of Coahoma

Gellay and slush pit have been completed and rig material is now being moved to location for a deep test by the Marland Co. about six miles north of Coahoma.

This test is in the center and about 1320 feet from the west line of section 12, block 31, Tsp. 1N.

Fire Destroys Star Rig

When someone carelessly struck a match at the Harrison et al well on section 156, block 29, the gas issuing from the well ignited and the star rig was destroyed.

This well had recently been drilled in and was good for 50 barrels or better daily production.

Rig Destroyed by Fire

The rig at the Marland's Clay E1 well, was destroyed by fire, Tuesday night. This rig was at the deep test being put down by the Marland company on section 139, Block 29

Santa Anna — The ten thousand mark has been passed in cotton ginnings at Santa Anna already this season.




tion and to provide living quarters for a fireman. Standard fire equipment has been ordered which will arrive by the time the construction work is finished.



HEALTH Subjects Edited by

THIS column will be given to discussion of matters pertaining to public health. Any questions regarding public health administration, prevention of diseases, child care, sanitation, etc., will be answered in succeeding issues of this paper. Questions in regard to cure of diseases will not be answered, as the scope of this Department includes only disease prevention. Address Question Box, State Department of Health, Austin.

Two little girls, and their mother, had teeth, but have no milk. Are there any ways that I can give them milk? (Mother, Brownfield)

My child's teeth are filled when decayed. How can I have the decay removed? (Mother, Brownfield)

Leafy vegetables are generally good for children, is that not so? (Mrs. A. D. L., Detroit)

Exercise is responsible for the human ailments of the back? (Athlete, Navasota)

What is the best manner of walking? (Navasota)

What is the best way to clean their value as enameled and body builders, vegetables and whole breads, should be in the children's diet in order to get good teeth. These include calcium, phosphorus, which are all important in tooth building. Cod liver oil is splendid for this purpose. The children should be in direct sunshine as much as possible.

At the first signs of decay, a child should be taken to a dentist for treatment. It is better to have a dentist twice a year when his teeth are good, as small cavities are easier to remove by parents, and to go until the tooth is ruined. It is very necessary that the possible be done to keep teeth in children.

Leafy foods which is often eaten early enough in the day is the leafy vegetable. It is especially good for small children. They should be taught to eat as well as other vegetables.

And it leads to many other interests that broaden the outlook, multiply the contacts of life, and uplift the heart. The home owner feels a keener concern about neighborhood conditions. He has a more definite interest in the extent and character of community development. He is a freer and more important participant in local civic affairs. He knows himself to be identified in a permanent way with the very soil of his holding and that he is something more than a mere transient sojourner.

He is minded to plant a tree in his yard, because it is his yard and the tree will be his; and he feels that the care and nurture of it will repay him and his in grateful shade

through the years to come. He is moved to beautify and adorn his home, because it is his and he looks forward to a continued enjoyment of it, and not to its early surrender to some succeeding tenant. There is a fine pride to be experienced in stamping his individuality, a bit of himself, upon his home and its surroundings, to be passed on to his children and grandchildren. — Elks Magazine.

W. N. W. survey on the Clay ranch in the southeastern part of Howard county. Electricity was the power used to operate the machinery at this test.

An oil formation was encountered in this test between 2500 and 2600 feet, but the Marland was to make a deep test and passed up the showing without testing same. The well is now about 2900 feet deep.

Texon Settles No. 3 Hits Pay

The Texon-Marland Settles A1 on the W. R. Settles ranch fifteen miles southeast of Big Spring encountered the pay at 1363 feet Sunday night. The oil sand was about ten feet in thickness and oil rose about 800 feet in the well.

This well is not rated as big a producer as the Texon Settles No. 2, one half mile south, which swabbed 600 barrels per day.

The owners may decide to drill on down in search of a deeper oil formation such as is found in the Magnolia Roberts No. 1 which is located two miles east of the Texon Settles A1.

Settles A1 is located in the southwest quarter of section 134, block 29, W. & N. W. Ry. survey in Howard County.

Texon Oil Company to Drill 2 or 3 Tests

The Texon Oil company has made location for two more tests on section 159, block 29, W and N. W. Ry. survey. One of these will be one-half mile due west of Settles No. 1 and the other will be one-half mile west of Settles No. 2. It was also decided that if it did not show to be a good well after a swabbing test, A1 on section 134 will be drilled on down to the 2955 foot depth in search of the oil formation which the Magnolia discovered in their gusher. Roberts No. 1 on section 136 block 29 W. & N. W. survey.

Good progress is now being made by the California Co. on their B. & J. Fisher No. 1, on the Fisher ranch 6 miles south of Big Spring. The drill is going thru anhydrite near the 2600 foot depth.

It is expected that one of the oil formations found in the Magnolia Roberts No. 1 to the southeast, or in the Texon Harding No. 1 to the West will be encountered between 2900 and 3100 feet. Oil men are closely watching this test.

California Currie No. 2

The California Co. is drilling past 800 feet in their Currie No. 2 on the W. B. Currie ranch about 21 miles southeast of Big Spring. This well is located on section 213, block 29, W. & N. W. survey in Glasscock County.

It is four miles south of the Magnolia Petroleum Co.'s big well, the Roberts No. 1, on section 136.

Union Oil Company Enters Field

The Union Oil Co. with headquarters in Los Angeles, Calif., are now interested in the Big Spring territory and a representative of the company is purchasing some choice acreage near wells which are being drilled.

They are expecting big development in this territory within the coming year.

Marland's Richardson No. 1 Spudded

The Marland Oil Co. spudded in their Richardson No. 1, four miles east of Big Spring the latter part of last week and good progress is being made.

This test is said to have an excellent chance to come in a commercial well, according to the opinion of geologists who have worked over this territory.

Texon Settles A1 Swabs 23 Bbls.

The Texon Settles A1 well on section 134, block 29, fourteen miles

southeast of Big Spring shows to be good for around 175 barrels of oil daily after it is placed on pump. The well swabbed 200 barrels in ten hours Wednesday.

MITCHELL COUNTY BUILDING HIGHWAY

Several road building gangs are now at work grading a ten mile stretch on the Bankhead highway in Mitchell County. Beginning near the west line of the county they are working on the Iatan Flat section, which has been the sore spot on this important transcontinental highway.

It took the good road boosters in Mitchell County a long time to educate enough citizens to put over the big road improvement project, but when they did get busy they planned a real program. Mitchell County's section of the Bankhead Highway when completed is going to be one of the best stretches on the entire highway.

TELEPHONE COMPANY TO ERECT BUILDING

Fox Stripling this week purchased from the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., the six room residence at the corner of East Fourth and Rannels street. Mr. Stripling has let the contract for moving the frame building to a lot in the 800 block on Gollad street.

The Southwestern Bell Telephone Company purchased the property at the corner of Fourth and Rannels as the site for an exchange and office building, and they expect to start work on the building in the very near future.

J. P. Dodge left Sunday night for Marshall where he went to undergo a physical examination in the T. & P. Hospital there. He is reported to be getting along nicely and the doctors there believe that it will not be necessary to operate Mr. Dodge.

A WAY TO ENCOURAGE SIDEWALK BUILDING

There isn't much use to advocate a sidewalk building campaign until the city commission will agree to have grade lines established in all sections of the city. They must guarantee these grade lines and if at some future date they be changed it shall be up to the city to bear the expense of rebuilding such sidewalks.

We have had a number of grade lines established in our city, each engineer having a different idea as to the plan and as a result property owners have been put to quite a bit of expense. Then, too, a great many ups and downs are to be found along many of our sidewalks.

THE WORTH OF A BALE OF COTTON

T. F. Nabors says it would take a better statistician than he is to tell how much more a bale of cotton is worth this year than it was in 1927. He said he might give you a few figures and you could work the problem yourself. He sold a bale of cotton and seed, Tuesday for \$154.10. The picking cost him \$23.37 and the ginning \$8.19 or a total of \$31.56; leaving him \$122.54 for his work and worry for this one bale during the year. On some bales towards the close of 1926 he did not realize much more than \$10 after picking and ginning expenses were paid. According to this comparison one bale this year is worth ten times as much to Mr. Nabors as was some of the 1926 crop.

Poultry has proven especially profitable to those who have given it proper attention. It is one of the easiest of farm work to handle and can be made most productive. "METROPOLIS" IS BIGGER AND BETTER CINEMA FARE

The motion picture reviewer of The New York Daily News had this to say about Paramount's import from Europe "Metropolis" which comes to the R. and R. Lyric theater in this city for showing next Monday and Tuesday, Nov. 7-8.

"Metropolis" is cinema fare in that bigger and better form they're always talking about but hardly ever accomplish.

With a worthy story, a capable director and an excellent cameraman, it is a two hour glimpse into a future seen by the makers of movies. Fritz Lang, who presided over "Siegfried," directed this one. Karl Freund, responsible for the camera angles in "Variety" has contributed wonderfully to the new picture. Channing Pollack adapted and titled the picture for American audiences. And everybody ought to be happy. Pollack's is a comprehensive treatment of material which mightn't have got over so well if it hadn't his heartfelt co-operation.

"Metropolis" has to do with the weight of capital upon labor, and vice versa. The film visualizes a great city of the future with brain dominating brawn. The working classes are so far beneath the materialists they occupy a separate world, far beneath the earth; far beneath the machines of which they are but spokes in the huge wheels.

John Masterman, with wealth untold, rules the city of Metropolis. Hundreds, thousands of laboring swain are under his cruel, capitalistic rule. Should such a thing as an explosion occur during any part of the ten-hour shift, killing men, injuring others, it's mere detail to John Masterman. He will not be bothered with such trivial matters.

Masterman has a son, Eric, brought up in luxury, far above the working world, knowing nothing of the suffering of those who are his father's subjects.

On rare occasions the children of the workmen's world are allowed to visit the upper world, under proper guardianship. So it is that Eric, in his father's stadium, comes upon Mary, a workman's daughter, guiding her neighbor's children that they may see their "brothers."

There comes to the boy a desire to see how other men live—these men whose constant toll brings forth his own luxuries; whose efficiency gains his father's wealth.

Eric goes down to the workmen's world. And he sees. He comes upon sights horrible to his unknowing eyes. A laborer collapses at a huge machine. Eric, changing clothes with him, takes his place.

Will the ten hour shift never come to an end? Eric struggles and sweats, sympathizing meanwhile with these men who know no other life. At the closing hour he is induced by some of his fellow workers to attend a lecture session given by Mary, the workman's daughter.

"Between brains and hands," Mary tells the mob of unkempt and fatigued workers, "there must be a mediator. The mediator is the heart."

Whereupon Eric realizes that his father is entirely without heart, without soul.

He labors thereafter to make his father believe that machines cannot be made of men; that both are equally important to civilization. Masterman is hard to convince. Not only does he feel that machines can be made of men, but he and a half crazed inventor are producing a machine into which may be inserted human life.

The human machine is completed, human without a soul. In doing Masterman's will it does wrong. The result—war, chaos, destruction.

Camera work on this production is more than remarkable. It is unsurpassable. Gustav Froelich and Brigitte Helm share honors for excellent performances.

Rudolf Klein-Rogge, resembling Emil Jannings in character, deserves too of plaudits. "Metropolis" is a marvel movie.



Switchboard Important Part of Telephone Equipment



Switchboard Mathematics
The heavy lines, numbers 1, 2, and 3, show the talk tracks possible between three segregated pairs of telephones. The dotted lines show the communication lines added when the six telephones are interconnected through a switchboard.

Makes Communication Possible Between All Telephones In the Nation

The invention and development of the switchboard has been the one thing which has made possible a telephone system, whereby each subscriber can talk to any other subscriber. Without the switchboard it would be physically impossible to have a telephone service such as we have today.

The illustration to the left shows the number of telephone tracks which would be necessary in order that any one of six telephones might be connected with any other one. Each telephone would have to have a line to the other five telephones, a total of 15 separate talk tracks. However, by the use of a switchboard only six lines are required, a line from each telephone to the switchboard. Thus the switchboard with only six actual telephone lines affords 15 possible lines of communication.

VOICE TRACKS
In a city with 500 telephones, connected through a switchboard, there are 124,750 lines of communication; in a city with 10,000 telephones there are 49,995,000 lines of communication. Thus it is evident that the switchboard is a very important essential in the supplying of telephone service.

BARGAIN RATES
Bargain rates for long distance telephone service are in effect every day after 7 in the evening. These rates apply on station-to-station calls, that is, on calls where you agree to talk to anyone who answers at the called telephone.
You will be surprised at the reasonable charge for calls placed during the bargain hours. Between 7 and 8:30 in the evening rates are about 25 per cent less than the day rate, and after 8:30 p. m. the reduction is about 50 per cent of the day rate.



plant at Odessa, a one-hundred per cent enlargement of the plant at Big Spring, and a one-hundred per cent enlargement of the generating station at Eastland. The Texas Electric Service has done its part to help the rapidly growing cities of the state and new oil producing fields which serve in the counties of Elmer, Crane, Midland, Glasscock, Howard, Sterling, Nolan, Scurry, Ward, and others.

In addition to extensive power plants and enlargements, the Texas Electric Service Company has a large system of transmission lines which feed electric energy to every section of West Texas. The transmission lines are interconnected to the big central transmission system of the Texas Power and Light Company which has the largest generating resource of any power company in the world.

The Texas Electric Service Company has answered the big demand for power in a section of West Texas which needed power, the only power which would solve the problem was electric power. Owing to the mineral content of the water available, it was impossible to operate a steam generating plant in the immediate vicinity of the oil producing area. Therefore it was necessary to install the large internal combustion engine at Odessa and the plant at Big Spring, both of the same character. But at Eastland, water for boiler operation is satisfactory and plentiful and that steam plant is being used to take care of not only present requirements, but future requirements. These plants, together with the availability of the Texas Electric Service Company to supply the entire resources of the Texas Power and Light Co. transmission system, have given to the West Texas served by the Texas Electric Service Company the best electric power service in one of the most dependable areas which engineers and scientists have been extended to the Mesquits, Crane and Wink counties which never had electric power before. White way street lighting systems have also been installed in Midland and Odessa. The company supplies electric power for the water supply for all of the towns.

Hundreds of workmen were employed in power plant transmission line construction in the West Texas development program. The demand for construction, augmented by the demand and insistency for immediate service, necessitated the employment of extensive crews. Hundreds of workmen continued uninterrupted power line and plant construction to such a degree that the line into the Chalk field area was completed in 15 working days. The 100 horsepower generating plant at the new Odessa plant were completed in 40 days after work on the service lines, originating from the 40,000 volt transmission line at a centrally located sub-station were completed overnight in 24 hours.

FORECAST TEXAS AS GREAT OIL FIELD MANY YEARS AGO

In 1852, A. D. in the city of Berlin, Germany, a highly technical book was published, of course in the German language. The title of the book was "Kreidbildungen von Texas," and its author was Dr. Ferdinand Roemer (pronounced R-a-y-m-e-r). Translated into English it means simply "The Chalks of Texas."

Dr. Roemer had spent practically all of the years 1844, 1845, 1846, 1847 and 1848, traveling over Texas, studying the lime and chalk formations which abound throughout the state.

Deeply learned, already eminent in his profession and regarded as a world authority, the publication of that volume was received by the geological profession as a valuable addition to its text books. It was read by the German professors and used in the German schools and higher institutions of learning, but outside of Germany, and except for the very limited number of persons in this country who took up the study of geology more than 75 years ago, and even fifty years ago in the United States, the volume was as unknown to the average individual as if it had never been published, as if the eminent savant had never spent five years of his life living in a wilderness in order to add to the world's store of knowledge and to ascertain and prove the existence of the world's greatest storehouse of oil.

The book lay for many years upon library shelves virtually forgotten except by the geological student or by the learned amateur delving into some "forgotten lore." Being printed in German and in highly technical terms at that, as time wore on, the book was read and studied by fewer and fewer outside of the geological profession, and they mostly in Germany. This remained the case until after 1901 when Spindletop came in and brought Texas into the spotlight.

Then "The Chalks of Texas" began to receive attention, and the United States government honored Dr. Roemer by naming several members of the fossil shell family for him as he had discovered them and mentioned them in his books.

Yet, all the time in the half century which elapsed between 1852, the year of the publication of Dr. Roemer's book and the bringing in of the Lucas gusher at Spindletop, there had reposed between the lids of "The Chalks of Texas," this remarkable statement deduced by Dr. Roemer as a result of his wanderings over the State and his studies of the geological formations he found:

"Ninety-six and four-tenths per cent of the entire surface area of Texas is underlaid with submarine, sedimentary deposits, MORE OR LESS OIL-BEARING."

How accurate was Dr. Roemer's deduction—as a result of his scientific study of Texas geology, is now seen by the oil fields scattered over practically every section of the State, with the sum of the equation yet undetermined, for vast areas remain untouched by the drill, and will remain untouched probably for another generation.

Attention is called to this remarkable work of Roemer's merely to remind ourselves of how little we really know about our own State. Yet there are many unlearned persons who constantly decry the usefulness of geology in determining oil territory. Reference to Dr. Roemer's book on Texas ought to convince such skeptics that there is something to scientific geology. Else, how could he so accurately have drawn the conclusions as he did regarding Texas oil-deposits, and that seven years before the first oil well was ever drilled in the United States? — McCamey Tri-County Tribune.



Oil in Sterling County

The low price of crude oil has retarded development around Sterling for the past six months, but when the time comes, there will be something doing here. The one small producer just south of town is a pointer that big oil lies not very far from it. 



A HUGE FUND FOR ROADS

Advocates of a well connected, first class system of highways for Texas have cause to rejoice in the statements that have come out of Austin recently concerning highway finances. The latest is the expectation that for the fiscal year, September 1, 1927 to September 1, 1928, the State will have for highway improvements purposes a total of \$40,000,000. And this is exclusive of sums to be supplied by counties in matching the funds furnished by the State. Deducting an estimated \$10,000,000 for maintenance, \$500,000 for operation of the Department, the State's net fund for construction during this period should be approximately \$24,000,000. On a basis of equal State and county aid, the county matching the State dollar for dollar, this should mean the enormous sum of \$48,000,000 available for highway construction in one year.

Of course the figure will not reach this sum, for it is not necessary for the State Department to provide more than 50 per cent aid. It is even necessary in some of the counties where population is sparse and taxable values low for the State to pay all of the cost, in order not to leave an unfinished gap in an important highway. But whatever the sum may be, the figures indicate that Texas will have far more money than ever before in its history for actual highway construction and through systematic, businesslike handling it should mean that the State will make more progress in road building than ever before in its history.

The biggest factor, of course, in providing this huge sum of money is the increase in the gasoline tax, from one to three cents; and just how much this has meant is shown by the figures of money received since this increase became effective. From March 17, when the new law went into effect, to September 1, the State received \$11,115,748 from the gasoline tax alone. Of this, the Highway Department received \$3,353,311 the remainder going to the common school fund. During the year the Highway Department also received \$10,510,826 from automobile license fees; and both of these sums are State revenues only. They don't take into account the federal aid allotted to the State and available on federal designated highways.

The State is certain to receive an enormous increase in revenue next year from both gasoline and motor vehicle taxes. There has been an enormous increase in the number of motor vehicles, the latest figures showing a total of 1,240,000. The tax on these for the next calendar year is expected to reach \$15,000,000. But under the law the counties will receive 30 per cent of the weight fees, not to exceed \$50,000 for a single county. This money goes for county roads strictly. But even with this deduction, it is estimated the State will obtain at least \$12,000,000 from license fees.

The building of highways itself increases the revenues of the Highway Department. The better the highway the greater the use of motor vehicles. The greater their use the more gasoline consumed and consequently the greater the revenue.

Of course the 3-cent gasoline tax is not a fixture. The law under which it was enacted refers to it as an emergency measure and specifies that after September, 1928, the tax shall be reduced to 2 cents. But the figures cited show that for one year at least there will be spent on Texas highways a sum that a few years ago would have seemed unbelievable. With such a program and a proper maintenance system, Texas ought to have a highway system that will be the pride of every citizen and one of the greatest factors in the State's upbuilding. — Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

**NEW MEXICO SEEN
 AS RUBBER CENTER**

Washington, Oct. 26.—Species of shrubs which grow in New Mexico and southern California have been found to provide a satisfactory substitute for the natural guayule rubber, the bureau of standards has

announced following extensive experiments.

For several months scientists at the bureau have been analyzing elements in these shrubs, with view to making a workable substitute for guayule rubber available in this country. It has been necessary in the past to import the products from equatorial regions, and much has come here from South America.

Results of the experiments will be communicated to farmers in the western regions found fertile for the shrubs which have been segregated. It was considered likely that the department of agriculture will



Oil News From Other W T Fields

Scurry County Oil News

Gas flames mounting to a height of thirty feet from a six inch casing has been done at the Camp Springs well, with a water pressure of between 1600 and 1700 pounds to the square inch between the point of the gas pocket and the final break into the air. This information comes from Messrs G. A. Morgren and E. J. Miller, who have been identified with the Camp Springs project for more than three years.

The Douglas Oil Company, with offices at Tulsa, Amarillo and San Angelo, are now in full charge of drilling operations at this well. Both Mr. Morgren and Mr. Miller, while still holding their interests in the Camp Springs project for the time being, will devote their personal attention to their other oil holdings in the Camp Springs project for the time being, will devote their personal attention to their other oil holdings in North Texas.

It had been intimated here that the Marland Oil Co. had taken over the Camp Springs Oil & Refining Co., but this rumor was without foundation. The Marland Oil Co., however, are interested in the Camp Springs neighborhood, and are now putting up a new steel rig five miles north of that town. At the present time a California group is putting up a new steel rig five miles due south of Camp Springs on the southeast corner of Section 220, near Martin Reep's pasture.

That gas is really in the Camp Springs Oil & Refining Co.'s well is shown in a photograph at the Times Signal office. It has been intimated for many years that Scurry County would have the next oil boom—and this may be the forerunner of that prophecy's fulfillment. Scurry County Times-Signal (Snyder.)

Pecos County Oil Land Deal

Oklahoma City, Ok., Oct. 28. — Edwin Rae Cosby, who Saturday bought an oil lease on sixty acres of land in eastern Pecos County in Texas, Thursday said that the purchase price was \$300,000. Reports that the consideration was \$3,000,000 were erroneous, he said.

The land, adjoining the eighty acres on which the Mazda Oil Company and the Savoy Oil Company recently brought in a producer, was purchased from H. P. Nichols, Dr. Emil Ott and Rudolph Grossenbacher of San Angelo.

Sulphur Well Turned

Into Oil Producer

Houston, Texas, Oct. 29.—Union Sulphur Company's No. 721, one of its old sulphur test holes on its sulphur mining property at Sulphur, La., which was brought in about a year ago making 150 barrels, has been deepened to 3350 feet and is flowing at the rate of 1200 barrels daily. Their second old sulphur hole deepened, which came in a month ago for 150 barrels, is still flowing thirty-five barrels daily.

Texas Co. to Drill in Ector County

Ector County got a new location this week when the Texas company erected a fourth derrick on the Connell ranch near Judkins. The Texas Company recently acquired half of J. S. Cosden's leases and operating control on this property, and apparently is intent upon thoroughly developing it. There already is one producing well on the Connell ranch.

Winkler and Crane Oil News

What transpired at a meeting in Fort Worth Friday of oil operators interested in the Winkler County field, remains a secret, and thus far the situation in Winkler is unchanged.

Production fell off slightly there during the past week, indicating the uncertainty of future plans.

So far as could be ascertained, preparations for greater production in Winkler County are being continued by the companies interested there, and any big increase in production must await these preparations, consisting of more pipe lines and more storage tanks.

Crane County activity continues at full blast with a number of wells drilling, and many storage tanks in process of construction. Average daily production in the Crane fields last week was 110,640 barrels. — Odessa News.

Magnolia Buy 80-Acre

Lease in Crane County

San Angelo, Texas, Oct. 29.— Besides new production in the Dora Roberts No. 1 well in Howard County, completed the first of the week, the Magnolia has branched out in Crane County, purchasing the eighty-acre lease owned jointly by George Church, Bob Fields, former San Angelo operator, and Bert

Weekly, former San Angelo drilling contractor. The block sold for \$150,000 cash and \$250,000 in oil. Weekly drilled in the discovery well in Crane County in the Church-Fields pool.

Weekly, Church and Fields saved eighty acres a few miles from the discovery well and it has developed that this acreage has been in the middle of the largest of the oil pools in that county. They have three wells on the property with a daily average production of 1600 barrels.

The Magnolia paid these operators \$150,000 cash for this lease, with them retaining a one-fourth royalty, which itself is about 400 barrels a day.

Crockett County Test

Standard rig is being moved from Crockett County to the C. Fremont Day well to be drilled in the McCamey-Yates pool in Pecos County on the north 20 acres of Lot 1, section 58. Contract has been let for the well to Harvey Hite of Houston and according to information here last Saturday he had already started moving the rig. It should be set up and ready to start drilling in a few days.

The 20 acres was the only tract said to be in the field not held by a major company and was secured recently by McKnight. San Antonio people have joined Day in drilling the well.—Ex.

Coleman Well Has Good Gas Flow

Coleman, Oct. 25.—Paul English et al, drilling on their No. 1 Harris, 150 feet north of the south line of block 1, San Augustine University survey 519, and one mile south of Goldboro in the extreme northwest corner of Coleman County, encountered a gas producing sand Monday afternoon at 4060 feet, while drilling in the black lime which was encountered at about 3985 feet. Present gas flow estimated at 1,500,000 cubic feet.

This well is being watched closely by the oil fraternity here as it is five miles from any other deep test, and sixteen miles west of the gas wells drilled by Canary and Midwest Exploration Company on the Morris ranch, eleven miles due north of Coleman. These last named wells are now supplying part of the gas or Winters, Ballinger, Rowena, and San Angelo through an eight inch welded line recently completed by Barney Carter, and the Western Gas Service Company.

The Paul English No. 1 Harris is expected to drill deeper to test out this sand. If not made a commercial well at this depth, it will be carried to probably the greatest depth of any well ever drilled in

Coleman County. They have five and three-sixteenth casing set to the top of the black lime with the hole in good shape.

The deepest well so far drilled in the county was Roth & Faurot, one mile west of Valera, with total depth of 4302 feet.—Brownwood Banner-Bulletin.

EX-SERVICE MEN BONUS TIME TO EXPIRE JANUARY FIRST

Time limit is Jan. 1, 1928 for ex-service men to make application for the bonus, the adjutant of the American Legion advises. He has application blanks and urges eligibles to fill them out immediately.

Ex-service men are entitled to it the adjutant says. The bonus averages \$2.50 or more each day the ex-service man was in service. It may be used as collateral for loans after the first two years for about 5 per cent of the face value of the policy per year.

COTTON CROP OF BROWN COUNTY UNUSUALLY SHORT

The Brown County cotton crop is shorter than in many seasons, and has matured earlier, according to local cotton men.

It is said that an estimate of 8,000 bales for the county is liberal, and it is believed that most of the crop has already been ginned and disposed of.

Brown County's crop usually averages around 14,000 to 16,000 bales, and this year's production probably will be about one-half an average crop.—Brownwood Banner-Bulletin.

This state of affairs would have caused a near calamity a few years ago when Brown County farmers had the one crop idea, but never again, for Brown County farmers have dairy cows and poultry to bring in enough to make their living expenses and cotton is a sideline.



AN EPIC OF SCIENCE

radio broke upon the coun-
try it came with such instan-
taneous force that the public was
astonished to when it was discov-
ered who invented it. Most
thought it a development of
the past that had been kept a secret
for that period and then for
unexplained reason turned
upon the country without
warning. The mere fact that no
receiving sets were being
manufactured and that there was
no broadcasting station
large enough to this belief. Lis-
tening, for the most part, were
home-made contraptions and
satisfied with anything that
came over the air. The question
of how good the reception
was or the quality of the pro-
gram was not on the mind; it was to get
the farther away the bet-
ter. It was no more than a
game of sound. Radio then was a
new plaything. Now it is
regarded as one of the amazing
developments of the age, a source of
entertainment and
to millions of people; a
medium of world-wide communi-
cation.

back of this story of unpre-
cedented development in a period
of more than four years, one
may see a story that is an
epic of science. Like every other
story that has come into general
use, it is the story of the develop-
ment of the present development
of the science. It goes back to
the use of the vacuum tube many years
ago. According to Dr. Leo De For-
est, the pioneer in radio, it
was known as far back as 1865
when J. C. Maxwell announced
the existence of heat and visible light
consisting of electrical vibrations of the
ether. Heinrich H. Hertz, another
pioneer, 22 years later proved
that they would carry electro-
magnetic waves, which thereafter
were known as Hertzian waves.
Guglielmo Marconi, in 1896, invented
the vacuum tube fill-
ing with loose metal filings that
together and formed a path-
way for electric waves. These dis-
coveries, it is said, really made pos-
sible the invention of the
transmitting and receiving sets.
The impetus to the scientists
came with the invention of
the vacuum tube by
Dr. De Forest, and the
years 1898 and 1908 have
marked the turning point in
development. The shipping
of the first accepted wireless
research scientists were
their attention to wireless
communication. The first recorded ex-
periment in radio telephony was
made by DeForest sent a message
to the Eiffel Tower in Paris, us-
ing a vacuum tube. The next
reports of wireless sta-
tions it has been received a
distance of 300 miles away. Ex-
perimental work continued in Eu-



A Tip from Mrs. Rorer

Mrs. Sarah Tyson Rorer, pioneer cooking teacher, and famous as the author of "The Philadelphia Cook Book," advises one to make the dessert and salad dressing the day before, and to plan meals which do not require lots of "last-minute" attention. This gives us more time to spend with our friends.

You will find the following menu tickles the palate and is easily prepared for a large group. Proportions are given for the serving of 12.

- Chipped Veal
- Mashed Potatoes
- Succotash
- Harvest Salad
- Caramel Cream
- Bread and Butter
- Beverage

You can easily make the caramel cream the day before, and have it ready for the "company" meal. Use Mrs. Rorer's recipe.



Caramel Cream

Put 4 tablespoons of sugar in a saucepan over a burner at full heat. Shake until it melts and turns a dark brown. Take from fire. Add a quart and a half of milk, 6 more tablespoons of sugar and bring to a boil. Stir in 4 tablespoons of cornstarch dissolved in a cold water. Stir over the fire until creamy. Take from fire, add 2 teaspoons of vanilla. Serve cold.

The modern oil stove is a convenient piece of kitchen equipment. Full is convenient only when needed. Quite a number of stoves which need to be watched into action, and take a long time to cool off after the cooking is done.

Mayonnaise Dressing

Make your mayonnaise the day before, too. Mrs. Kate B. Vaurha, director of the household economics department, Los Angeles Evening Express, uses the following good recipe:

- 2 tablespoons lemon juice or vinegar
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- Pepper, paprika, and mustard to taste, if desired.
