City Annexes 48.87 Acres

Final action on annexation of two tracts of land was taken by Hereford City Commissioners Monday night, and a total of 48.87 acres was brought into the city.

Annexed were eight blocks in South Hereford totaling 45.1 acres, and a tract of land in the north part of the city with 3.77 acres.

Blocks 1 through 8 in the Ricketts Addition, property which faces Austin Road on the north and South Main Street on the west, was officially brought in on the final reading of a petition calling for the annexation. The other property annexed lies between Fifteenth and Sixteenth Street and Avenue I and H in the Stark Addition.

TV Set Taken At Local Motel

Science Fair Set

Plans have been announced for the fifth annual Hereford Science Fair, to be held Feb. 20-22, 1969 at the Deaf Smith County Bull Barn, according to local fair officials.

As in previous years, any boy or girl interested in science who attends a school and is in the fourth grade or above, is eligible to enter. There will be seven major classifications for competition with the Intermediate Division consisting of grades 4, 5 and 6 with boys competing only against boys and girls against girls; and the Senior Division, grades 10, 11 and 12, with competition rules the same as those for the Junior Division.

Hereford Bit By Flu Bug

Hereford has been hard hit by the flu bug, but still remained out of the epidemic stage Wednesday.

Dr. Noble Ballard, county health officer, said a conservative estimate as to the number of persons battling the flu would be 500 around the city, and felt like the estimate could be as high as 15 to 20 percent of the population.

Hong Kong flu, which is most severe, was suspected in some cases here, continued Dr. Ballard, but physicians cannot be certain until they receive word from Austin. Tests had been made on those cases and sent to Austin for analysis.

\$35,172 Collected United Fund Drive Is Officially Over

The 1968 United Fund campaign officially closed out its active solicitations Tuesday morning with a total of \$35,172.01, slightly short of its goal of \$37,100.39.

Although UF officers and drive workers were reluctant to close out the drive so close to their goal, they felt they had reached their limit in seeking funds from local residents.

Clark first said he believed there could be better organization of the campaign in the future, with the lack of organization being due partly to officers and workers not understanding completely what the United Fund is and does.

He suggested meetings in which the majors and officers worked closely with the drive captains so that they understood their duties more. "I believe everyone should have had a better understanding of their responsibilities in the drive," said Clark.

Clark and any other officer or drive worker, was urged to put suggestions on paper and submit them to the executive committee of the UF for decisions. The board will appoint a nominating committee in January and new officers will be chosen in February.

Jose Uvalde of Route 5 was listed in good condition Wednesday morning at the Deaf Smith County Hospital where he is receiving treatment for stab wounds.

Uvalde told police that he and his wife were visiting her mother in the 300 block of Avenue E, Sunday, and he went to the Grand Avenue Grocery between 7:30 and 8 p. m. As he left the store, he walked up an alley directly east of the store and headed north.

School Plans Are Now On "Go" Signal

Hereford Independent School District Board of Trustees and Administrators had a special called meeting at the Caison House Wednesday morning where they discussed and submitted educational specifications for the new elementary school building — a modern hexagon type — in South Hereford.

Also at the meeting was Herbert Brashear, the architect with Brashear, Goyette and Rapiert of Lubbock.

Date for beginning of construction is still not definitely set, depending upon final approval of plans, but reports indicate that "it will be very soon."

Specifications submitted to Brashear include that "the building should be designed to adequately house 575 pupils in the regular program for grades one through 6, and approximately 80 students in special programs. The building should be designed to facilitate sound innovative practices in teaching techniques, instructional equipment and materials, and organizational patterns."

Superintendent Johnny Clark Jr. reported, after careful study from various sources, that the building should include:

- Classroom pod areas that will accommodate three and four teaching stations arranged with maximum openness for cooperative instruction, and adaptable to single room concept.
- Special rooms designed for special education and special instructional programs for kindergarten and/or reading.
- A library media center located in the center of pods that will house a wide variety of teaching aids; individualized instructional materials; audio-visual equipment and materials; library books; and centers for individualized, small group, and/or large group activities.

— The playground area should be carpeted and air-conditioned.

— The building should be located on a site in such manner as to provide for off-street loading and unloading, adequate staff parking, and large playground areas.

— The playground area should contain one large asphalt activity area, at least 100 feet by 100 feet, for conducting games and activities prescribed by the Texas Education Agency.

Clark added that "recognizing that these specifications are general in nature, that the detailed specifications will of a necessity be included in the architect's plans, it is respectfully requested that the general format as described be accepted and that the architect be instructed to proceed with final specifications."

The new school was approved by voters here in a \$600,000 bond issue on October 11. Included in the same election — and also approved by local voters — was \$150,000 for football stadium improvements. Clark said that plans for the stadium will not be entered into until school construction is definitely underway, since the trustees and administrators felt that the school was far more important at this time.

It has also been reported that school construction may not be completed by September 1969, as originally planned, because plans for this new type of building must be gone over carefully so that other costly delays will not result.

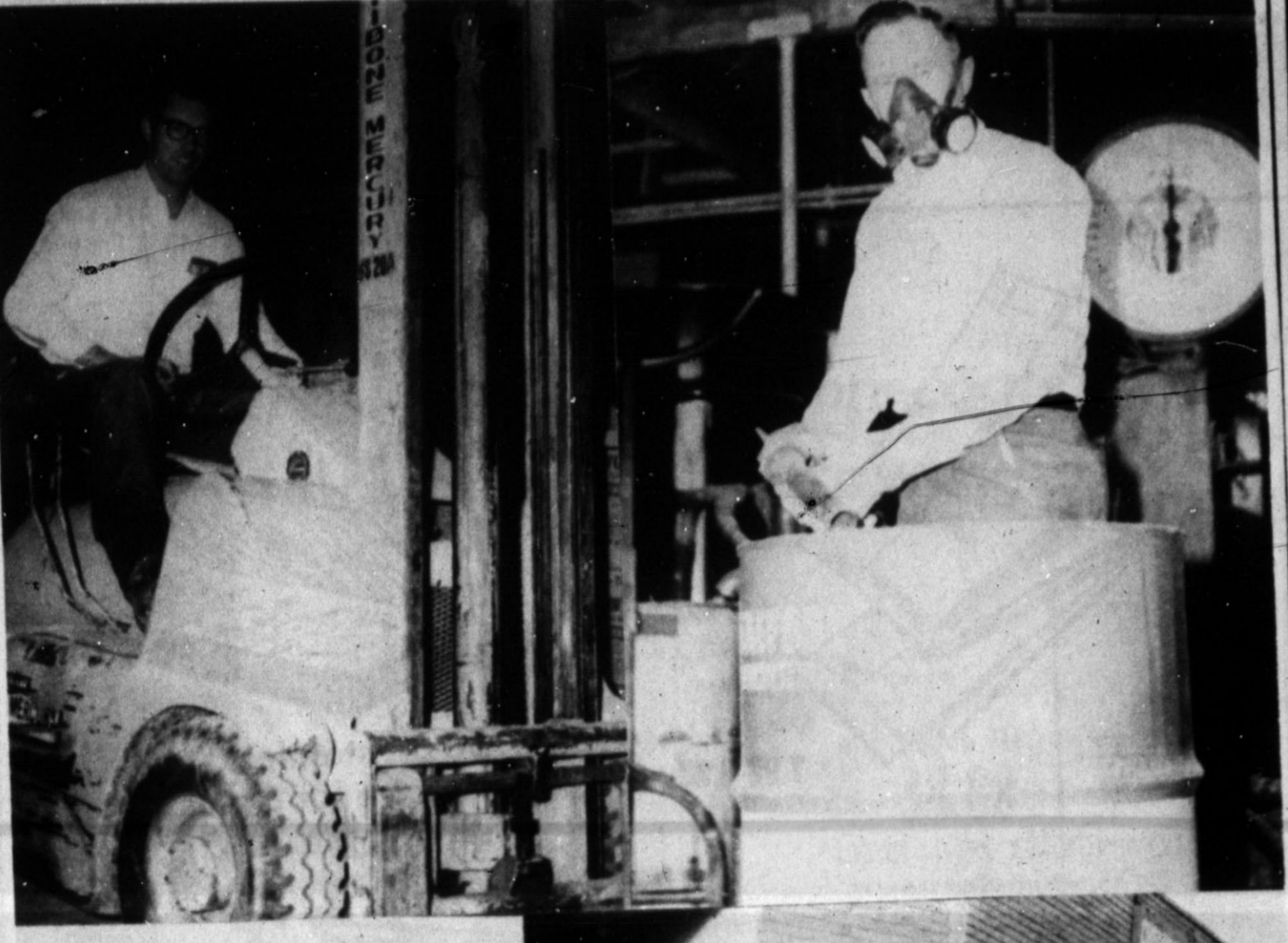

Expansion Plans Revealed By Local Chemical Firm

Showing a steady growth since it was originated just east of the Hereford city limits in 1956, the Chemical Company of Texas hopefully will be starting the new year off right — with construction of spacious new facilities.

Bill Lamm, division manager, said company officials hope to begin construction within 30 days of a new building which will contain some 10,000 square feet of warehouse and office space. It will be directly east and adjacent to the present building, which then will be used for storage also.

About 18 months ago, Producers Chemical Co. of Borger purchased the Chemical Company of Texas. The local firm was set up as a division of one of the parent company's subsidiaries, Chemical Industries, Inc.

Main function of the company is formulation and distribution agriculture herbicides, insecticides and fungicides, plus any type of chemicals along that line Lamm explained. A full line of welding supplies also is available.

The firm has some 36 types of formulas registered with the United States Department of Agriculture under the trademark of Hereford Brand. The formulas generally are worked up by Lamm and the other employees from instructions of the chemical manufacturer. Assistance is available from company chemists in Borger.

Lamm explained that the formulas are registered whenever the chemicals are mixed, changed or cross the state line when delivered to consumers.

Across U. S. 80 and directly south of the company's main building, there are facilities where a cotton and milo defoliant called chlorate-borate is mixed. The company also subcontracts the formulation of a weed killer for the Santa Fe Railroad, which uses the chemical to spray its right-of-ways.

Those facilities consist strictly of mixing equipment, with about three-fourths of it being water storage, said Lamm.

The company has six year-round employees, and three others who work during the summer, when business hits a peak. It is expected that the number of employees will remain about the same after the new facilities are completed.

Lamm has been with the company since 1959, coming here as office manager from Amarillo. He was named division manager in July.

Rodney Hammons is the present office manager, Holland Cook is plant superintendent, Phillip Treadway is warehouseman and makes deliveries, Henry Hernandez is laborer and Lanny Bezner is territory sales representative. Darrell Sparks, who has been working part-time

GO SLOW — Turkey producers and processors, meeting recently in Washington with USDA officials, are calling for a hold-the-line on 1969 turkey production. The group said that an increase in next year's production would bring lower prices to producers and too many carried over in storage. The demand for turkeys in 1969 will be only slightly higher than in 1968, in the face of expected larger supplies of red meat and broilers.

FARM CO-OP BUSINESS UP — Dollar business volume of farmer cooperatives, for the July 1, 1966 to June 30, 1967 year, exceeded \$16.5 billion, reports the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Farmer Cooperative Service. This is an increase of 6 percent over the previous year and 59 percent over the volume of 10 years ago. Total number of cooperatives decreased almost 3 percent and membership by 5 percent from previous year totals.

TWIGS ON THE GROUND — The twig girdler is the insect responsible for girdling small twigs and branches on trees, causing them to break and fall to the ground. They work mostly in the fall when their eggs are laid on a branch. They move back and then girdle the branch and shortly thereafter it falls to the ground. If they aren't removed, these fallen twigs become the source of infection the following year. Therefore, it's a good practice to pick up and burn the girdled twigs.

Education Is Key To Income

COLLEGE STATION — Four years of high school on the average will return 16 percent more income at age 21 and 38 percent more income over a lifetime, reports an Extension home management specialist at Texas A&M University.

The average income in 1966 of 21-year-old men who had completed high school was \$3,021. According to Wanda Meyer, expected lifetime income for the high school graduate was \$341,000 and for the elementary school graduate, \$247,000.

At 18 the high school graduate has the disadvantage of no work experience. On the average, the specialist reports his income is below that of elementary school graduate who has been working for some time. However, at age 19 the high school graduate may anticipate income nearly equal to that of elementary school graduate, and from 20 on to have considerably higher income, reaching a peak of \$8,387 at age 48.

This contrasts to peak income for elementary school graduate of \$6,054 at age 44, says Mrs. Meyer.

Panhandle Groups Offer Water Plan

A draft of proposed legislation to enable creation of Master Import Authorities was submitted to the Board of Directors of Water, Inc. at a meeting held Monday at its Lubbock office. The High Plains Water District, and the North Plains Water District, and the Panhandle Water District cooperated in drafting the proposed legislation.

Bill Clayton, State Representative from Springlake and Chairman of the House Interim Water Study Committee explained the probable functions of a water import authority and led the discussion. Twenty-two Directors were present for the meeting.

The Corps of Engineers of the U. S. Army and the Bureau of Reclamation of the Department of Interior have been given almost a million and a half dollar grant by Congress to determine if there is surplus water in the Mississippi River, the location and how to get the surplus water to West Texas and Eastern New Mexico. They are working diligently on this study and will be completed in about 18 months.

The Texas Water Development Board was scheduled to release its new Texas water plan Tuesday in Austin.

Water, Inc. objective is to have surplus water imported into the area with its many facets by this time. The tri-state area now has 3.3 million people with



Electric Company Plans Expansion In Service Area

A 1969 construction and improvement program which will add nearly \$16,000,000 to the company's investment in its 45,000 square mile service area was announced today by Roy Tolk, president of Southwestern Public Service Company.

"1969 will be the 22nd consecutive year in which we have increased our investment in our service area by 10-million dollars or more a year, with the average annual investment during the last 10 years being more than 20-million dollars. This investment is made for two reasons, both of them customer-related. The first reason is to stay ahead of the demand for electric service, while the second is to keep that service as efficient and economical as possible. Ever-increasing inflation is making economy more and more difficult, but we are taking every step that we can to keep our expenses down," Tolk said.

Transmission lines and substations will account for a little more than 6-million dollars of the 1969 program, slightly less than 5-million will be for new distribution facilities, the lines and equipment which bring service to the customer, while a little less than 4-million will be for power plant additions and improvements, including the start of construction on a new generating station near Lubbock with an original capability of 210,000 kilowatts.

The major transmission line project will be construction of a 230,000 volt line from the Tucco Interchange, north of Abilene, to the South Lubbock Interchange. In addition to providing another major power source for the South Plains area, the new line will be constructed so that it can be used as the first transmission circuit when the new generating station near Lubbock goes into service in 1971.

The new generating station will be called Clifford B. Jones Station in honor of the West Texas civic leader and President-emeritus of Texas Tech, who has been a director of Southwestern Public Service Company for more than a quarter-century.

Once again the company will contribute to the water conservation efforts of the area by using sewage effluent purchased from the City of Lubbock as cooling water when the new plant goes into operation. Nichols Station, near Amarillo, was the first of the company's generating facilities to utilize sewage effluent for this purpose.

Highlighting the economy efforts of the company will be the installation of special equipment on two generators at Plant X which will make it possible to shut down the two units during the night hours of power consumption and yet bring them back into service quickly for peak periods of power usage.

"We anticipate saving about \$30,000 a year on our fuel costs with this equipment, so it will soon pay for itself. Normally, you can't just shut down a generator when you don't need it, because it takes too long to get it back on the line when you do want it. So, normally, you keep the things running with a minimum load, which is the most expensive way of operating until you need more production.

With this new equipment we'll be able to completely shut down the two generators, load the units still in service at the most economical level and still, and

Loves Fishing, Yard Work and Music

HHS Choral Director Has Compiled Good Record

Fishing and yard work are two of the most enjoyable things to Bill Devers, but foremost in his life is his profession — singing. Devers is the choir director at Hereford High School, but looking at him, people would not think him to be vocally inclined, until they had heard a few stanzas flow forth from his throat.

Strange as it may seem, Devers, though only 25, had very little connection with music other than playing in the high school band at Spearman. Born in Shidler, Okla., he attended 10 years of school there before he and his family moved to Spearman. Since there was no choral department at Spearman, Devers went into the next best thing and that was band.

Following graduation from Spearman High School, in 1961,

televised world premiere scheduled in this area over television and its showing at the Star Theatre.

John Wayne, who appears in person on the live color telecast of the activities kicking off the premiere for Universal's new movie, "Hellfighters," says this is one of the most exciting stories he has ever filmed, according to Armbruster.

"Hellfighters" premiere scenes will be shown locally over KGNC-TV (Channel Four), Amarillo, tonight at 10:30 following the local news, weather and sports.

The premiere originates live in downtown Houston at the Majestic Theatre and will be carried into a 10-state area on 33 television stations. This large number of states receiving the premiere activities makes it by far the largest network ever assembled for this purpose. Armbruster said, "Conservatively, the TV audience estimated seeing this production will number around 6 million."

Well-known master of ceremonies, Cactus Pryor of Austin, a favorite entertainer of President Lyndon Johnson, will handle the interviewing chores. Pryor can be depended upon to draw out the star's personal feelings and experiences which they had during the filming of the picture. Because of the close proximity of realistically simulated out-of-control oil-well fires, danger was always prevalent. "In fact, the coveralls worn by John Wayne during one sequence actually caught fire," Armbruster reported.

"Hellfighters" is the story of men who face oil well fires. It is the life and vocation of the world famous Red Adair and his crew who headquarter in Houston, and who acted as first-hand technical consultants — when they were called out of town to actually fight one of these raging infernos.

Much of the feature was actually filmed around Houston and locations near Midland.

Telecast of the premiere activities will feature almost all the stars of "Hellfighters" includ-

Devers entered West Texas State University where he became active in the choral department, majoring in music. He served as tour manager and student conductor at the University under the guidance of the well-known U. S. composer, Dr. Houston Bright, who aided him in getting his start. Royal Brantley, also with WT, gave him a little nudge in the right direction with voice studies while at the college.

With a considerable amount of his college life filled with music in one way or another, Devers did not let it stand just there. During the school and summer months between 1963 and 1966, he joined forces with three Amarillo men to form a Barber Shop Quartet performing at various places in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and even as far west as California. When graduation time rolled around for Devers and his three college chums, it was evident that the group had to disband, but, recently things have begun to fall back into place as the group has performed for numerous organizations and are considering regrouping.

College offered other opportunities for Devers as he also appeared in two musicals — "Showboat" and "Music Man" — and was a member of Kappa Kappa Psi, the honorary band fraternity at WT.

Suddenly, college life was over for Devers, and he found himself stepping into a new world as he was hired by the Hereford school system to teach music at La Plata Junior High. He taught there for two years, then was assigned to the high school choral department at the beginning of the 1968 school year. "The change from the junior high to high school le-

Armbruster said that among the scenes will be spectacular footage of manmade fires shooting 250 to 300 feet into the air. In order to achieve the tremendous geysers of flame needed, the 18-man special effects department of Universal Pictures used a total of 35,000 gallons of diesel oil and 60,000 gallons of raw propane, as well as an untold amount of water which was pumped at a rate of 4,000 gallons per minute. An actual oil rig, 138 feet tall and weighing 250 tons is destroyed and crumbles into a tangled mass of metal by the tremendous fire heat.

"Hellfighters" will open in Hereford at the Star Theatre "soon for an indefinite time period," Armbruster reported.

vel," he said, "was quite an experience. It was like stepping into a new world because the music was harder. I had to get to know the kids all over, and the voices I was dealing with were more mature than those in the junior high level."

With the beginning of his work with the Hereford school system, Devers still found time for extra enjoyment with his singing during the summer months following school, as he has been a member of the cast of the Palo Duro Canyon production of "Texas." With this as a "filler" for his off months from school teaching, Devers says that this is "mostly for the experience," not for the pay.

Rehearsals for the Amphitheatre production take considerable time from Dever's regular day as the cast works eight hours a day seven days a week beginning around the first of June up until the opening around the first of July. After the pre-opening rehearsals, things get a little lighter for the group as they perform every night for about two-and-one-half hours. Devers has estimated that he and the cast has performed to about 183,000 persons during his three summers with the play.

Still, the high school choral students rate foremost in Dever's enjoyment as he has compiled a good record with his groups. With the La Plata students, in his first year as choral director, he gained two II ratings with his mixed choir and a III and IV with his girl's group. The following year, things were even better when the boys hit with a I and II ratings and the girls jumped up from their previous year to gain a II and a I rating.

This being his first year of work with the high school department, Devers has not had the opportunity to test his group as there have been no contests. His bright spot this fall has been in All-Region competition where he took eight of his students to compete against all schools in the Panhandle and came home with six of his eight entries making the elite All-Region choir. His groups have also held three concerts and has had the mixed choir taped for playing on area radio stations.

Presently, the group and Devers is hard at work on the Rodgers and Hammerstein production of "Oklahoma," which will be presented Jan. 24 and 25 at the High school auditorium. Musical inclination does not stop with Devers himself as his wife Elva, was also a music major while she was attending West Texas State University. Hoping to carry on the music tradition is their two-year old daughter Diana Lynn and, as Devers added, "so is the boy we are going to have in March."

this is the part that's important to our customers, keep adequate spinning reserves in the event that we lose a generating unit for one reason or another," Tolk said.

Speaking of reserves, the company anticipates a 1969 peak load of 1,462,000 kilowatts, and will meet it with generating capability of 1,835,000 kilowatts, providing a reserve capacity of 373,000 kilowatts. The largest generating unit on the system has a capability of 210,000 kilowatts, so that the reserve capability is large enough to handle the loss of the largest unit and still maintain a 150,000 kilowatt reserve.

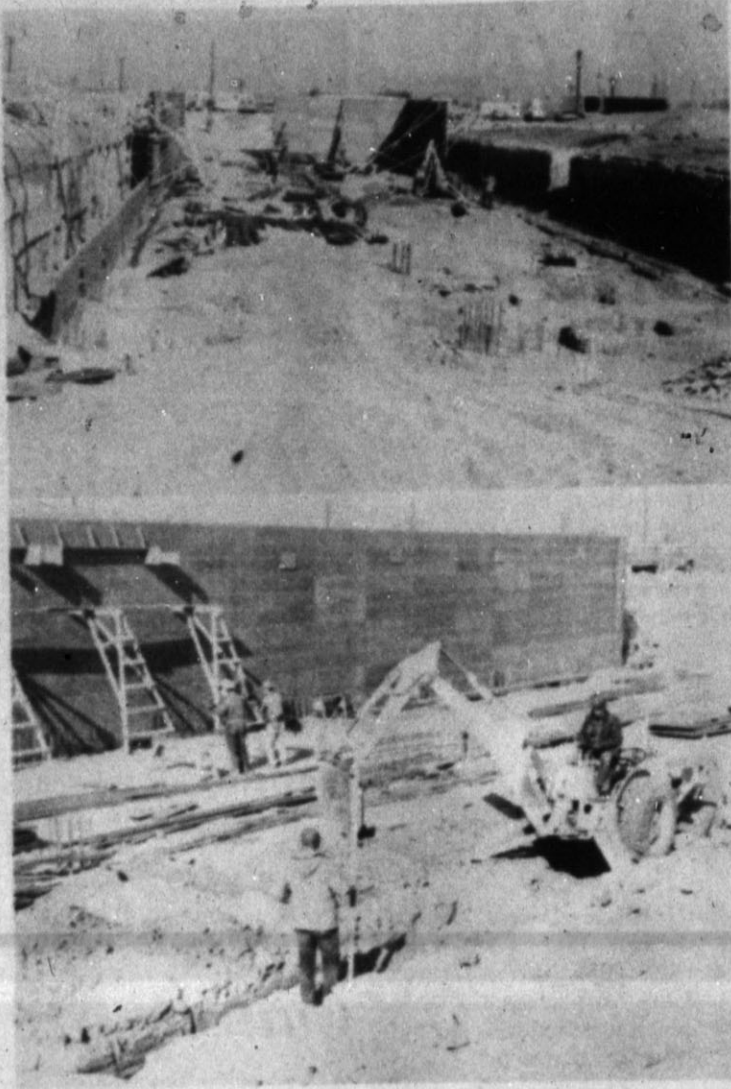

Education Is Key To Income

COLLEGE STATION — Four years of high school on the average will return 16 percent more income at age 21 and 38 percent more income over a lifetime, reports an Extension home management specialist at Texas A&M University.

The average income in 1966 of 21-year-old men who had completed high school was \$3,021. According to Wanda Meyer expected lifetime income for the high school graduate was \$341,000 and for the elementary school graduate, \$247,000.

At 18 the high school graduate has the disadvantage of no work experience. On the average, the

specialist reports his income is below that of elementary school graduate who has been working for some time. However, at age 19 the high school graduate may anticipate income nearly equal to that of elementary school graduate, and from 20 on to have considerably higher income, reaching a peak of \$8,387 at age 48.

This contrasts to peak income for elementary school graduate of \$6,654 at age 44, says Mrs. Meyer.
