

> The expenditures in local service stations alone, for gas, oil repairs and incidentals in the past year added up to \$3,528, 000. By way of comparison, five years ago it was \$2,720,000.

The facts and figures on auto populations and operating costs are given, for all parts of the country, by the Standard Rate and Data Service.

It shows that there are 137 passenger cars in use in Deaf Smith County for every 100 families at the beginning of this year, a relatively high ratio.

In addition to the better incomes earned today, which have brought car ownership within the reach of most families, other factors that have contributed to the increase in the auto population are the better roads that are now available and the greater need of the automobile transportation, now that so many more people are living in suburban areas.







Other equipment furnished by the project include 1957, furniture for children's wing —collected \$5,537.55; 1958, furniture for obstetrics department — collected \$3,348.95; 1959, operating room table and isolette—collected \$2,912.35; 196, money given to Community Center — collected \$1,700.00; 1961, kitchen equipment — collected \$1,251.5; 1962, obstetrics table — collected \$1,106.25, 1964, respirator — collected \$1,229.05; 1965, cast table — collected \$1,411.59; 1969, defibrillator, infant resusitator, obstetrics anesthesia machine, and balance on cardiac equipment — collected \$2,052.46.



#### Psychoanalyzing Businessmen

Before the General Electric strike began last month, the unions made the familiar charge that GE was "refusing to bargain" or, at the best, bargaining only on a "take-it-or-leave-it"

Such accusations are to be expected in the heat of union-management confrontations. What's regrettable is that the unions could once again find sympathy in the National Labor Relations Board and the courts.

The basis of that fear is an NLRB decision, recently upheld by a Federal court, on issues arising from 1960 bargaining between GE and the unions. Although the circumstances are by no means identical, some of the main issues are much the same.

Prime among the findings of the board and the court was that GE had failed to bargain in "good faith." That sort of finding requires more than a study of the facts; it demands what amounts to psychoanalysis of the employer's motives.

The facts are simple. GE considers its workers' needs, the unions' demands and its own situation and then comes up with what it believes to be the best possible offer it can make in the circumstances. It holds nothing back to bargain away, but it will-and does-change its offer if the union provides persuasive new information.

GE also publicizes its offer widely. both among its employes and in the communities where it operates. That, in essence, is what the unions angrily dub "Boulwarism," after the GE official who long headed the company's employe relations.

How, exactly, is this illegal? Labor law provides that an employer must bargain collectively with the duly named representatives of his employes. But it also specifically states that this obligation "does not compel either party to agree to a proposal or require the making of a concession."

In other words the law says that an oyer can sit at the bargaining table until doomsday without budging an inch from his first proposal, as long as he is willing to go on talking and listening. GE assumed no such rocky stance, since it did in fact make certain concessions. And, the board acknowledged, the company was at all times not only willing but eager to sign a new contract.

As for the company's telling its side of the case to its employes, labor law again is explicit: "The expressi n g of any views, arguments, or opinion, or the dissemination thereof, whether in written, printed, graphic or visual form, shall not constitute or be evidence of an unfair labor practice. . . if such expression contains no threat of reprisal or force or promise of benefit." No one even charged that GE used threats or extended promises.

What the court did say, in backing up the board, was this: "We hold that an employer may not so comb in e take-it-or-leave-it bargaining methods with a widely publicized stance of unbending firmness that he is himself unable to alter a position once taken." The court could not so read the facts without being able, simultaneously, to read the employer's mind.

Aside from those concessions GE did make, maybe the company had indeed resolved to be "unbending." But it surely smacks of Orwell's "1894" when the Government starts punishing businessmen for what it thinks they think.

This sort of Governmental attitude already is well enough formed that many businessmen fear they cannot convince the NLRB they are bargaining " in good faith" unless they do in fact grant concession after concession. So a section of labor law is, for practical purposes, being rendered meaningless by twisted official interpretation.

The obvious way out is to change the law, or at a minimum to strengthen it so that all can understand it. Certainly Congress never intended to write a statute that would lead the labor board and the courts to dabble in psychoanalysis. -Wall Street Journal

"Snow" Means Heavy Fall When a forecast contains the word "snow" without being quamittent," the Weather Bureau expects a steady fall that will probably continue for several hours without letup. "Heavy snow" usually means a fall of at least four inches within 12 hours. or six inches within 24 hours.

The Weather Bureau varies its terms by areas. In places where a four inch snow is common, the use of the term "heavy" generally means six or more inches. However, in metropolitan areas outside the snow belt, a predicted fall of only two or three inches can bring a "heavy snow warning."

"Snow flurries" means snow falling for short durations at intermittent periods, with little accumulation on the ground. However, flurries may reduce visibility to one-eighth of a mile or less. A "snow squall" is a brief, intense fall, comparab le to a summer rain shower, accompanied by gusty surface winds,

A "blizzard" means winds of at least 35 miles an hour, accompanied by considerable falling or blowing snow, and temperatures of 20 degrees Fahrenheit or lower prevailing for an extended period. A "severe blizzard" means wind speeds of at least 45 miles per hour, plus greater intensity of falling or blowing snow, and a temperature of 10 degrees or lower.

Car Kit Suggested The Weather Bureau urges winter motorists to "be ready for the worst." In addition to "winterizing" the family car. motorists in the snow areas are encouraged to equip themselves with a winter storm kit containing a variety of items for emergency use.

Suggested contents of such a kit are blankets or sleeping bags, matches and candles, facial tissue, paper towels, extra clothing high-calorie non-perishable food, compass and road maps, knife, first aid kit, shovel, sack of sand, flashlight or signal light, windshield scraper, booster cables, two tow chains, fire extinguisher catalytic heater, and axe.

If trapped on the road by a blizzard, the experts advise remaining in the car if possible. It is much easier for a rescue crew to find a buried car than a person, wandering in strange country. A window should be cracked on the downwind side to keep fresh air in the car. The motor and heater should be run sparingly, and the dome light turned on to aid searchers. Have a nice winter!

#### Talk of Texas

FOOTNOTE TO HISTORY - William Goyens was a versatile man who amassed a fortune as a real estate operator. gunsmith, blacksmith, hotel owner, wagon manufacturer. grist mill operator and proprietor of a profitable freight line. Perhaps the most remarkable thing about Bill Goyens,

however, is the fact that he was a Negro. Born in North Carolina in 1794, the son of a white man and a freed slave, Goyens came to Texas in 1820 and settled in Nacogdoches. An illiterate who could barely scrawl his signature, he became one of the most successful businessmen in all of Texas. When he died on June 20, 1856, he owned a 13,000-acre estate outside of Nacogdoches and was one of the community's most revered citizens.

WHAT'S IN A NAME? - Winedale, in Fayette County, began life as a town named Truesbal.

When its founder, a German named Charles Windwehen, discovered that the grapes he grew fermented into a nectar as good as any that he had tasted in the Fatherland, he changed the community's name to Winedale.

FLAG TOWN - The Stars and Stripes flies daily in front of most of the homes and businesses in Edna, Jackson Coun-

The little Gulf coast community plans to keep flying the flag until an honorable peace comes in Vietnam.

BLIND MAN'S TOWN - Marble Falls, located where the Colorado River forms a natural falls in Burnet County, was conceived and planned by a Confederate general who lost his sight in the Civil War.

General Adam Rankin Johnson had located the site on which he hoped to build a town when he came to Texas in 1854 on a visit from his native Kentucky. He stayed on as a surveyor and began buying land. Then the Civil War erupted and he had to forget his plans for a new town in Texas. He returned to Kentucky and enlisted.

While leading a charge in a skirmish with Federal troops, he received the wound that cost him his sight. However, he returned to Texas after the war, entered business in Burnet and, in 1886, finally laid out the town that had been his dream for 32 years.

TRAVELING TEXAS -Waxahachie, in Ellis County, probably boasts more beautiful old historic homes than any other spot in Texas.

More than 80 of these houses, plus some Victorian public buildings like the county courthouse, have been permanently marked. They can all be visited by getting a map from the Chamber of Commerce called "A Drive Along Gingerbread Trail."

LADIES' GAME -Pool halls, like saloons, usually were 'off limits" to nice women in the good old days -but not in the Reeves County town of Pecos.

The old Orient Hotel (now an excellent local museum) welcomed ladies to its public rooms where mixed games of billiards were the favorite pastimes.

This is far from being the case, however; the word "barbecue" was originally "berbekot", a name used by the Indians of the West Indies and Northern South America to signify the wooden framework upon which they grilled meat and fish. The Spaniards took up the expression and passed it on to the English, who used it to designate an elevated platform either for sleeping or cooking. It later acquired the meaning of any large animal cooked over an open fire. Still later, the term came cooked over an open fire.
