



TEXAS Sec. 1. If any person or persons shall loaf or loiter or assemble in any vestibule or entrance to the upper story of any business building in the City of Hereford, or shall sit on the stairs in any such entrance or vestibule or shall in any way obstruct such entrance or vestibule, he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine in any sum not less than five dollars and not to exceed Two Hundred Dollars.




