

MAN HERE TO STUDY SITUATION

LABOR TROUBLES

Company is Reliable, But is Faced with Material and Labor Shortage

A representative of the paving company which did the paving for the city three years ago, was here last Monday for the purpose of making an inspection of the paved streets and to learn its actual condition.

With members of the City Commission, he went all over the pavement and saw with his own eyes the actual

He promised the Commission that men and material would be sent here within the next sixty days to repair all of the defective places

He explained in detail that the company had no disposition to shirk any responsibility or to avoid any duty that it was under to repair the paving, but said that the delay had been caused on account of the unsettled conditions and the impossibility to get material, labor and transportation.

He explained that from his viewpoint the contractors in general had suffered more from the unsettled conditions than any other class of employ-However, he assured the members of

the Commission that this matter would receive attention just as soon as the ontractor could possibly attend to it. He said that it was probable that the material and equipment with which to make the repairs would be shipped here already prepared for use, with the exception of re-heating, and skilled men would also be sent to do the work.

It seems that the ice plants in surrounding towns have a local demand for all their output at fancy figures, and are indifferent whether they ship out any ice at all. When they do the price is almost

The disparity of the he can induce people to notice him. rate of expansion between the railroads and the business of the country has had the effect of awakening the people to the fundamental importance of the transpertation system in relation to our prosperity, and as a result the prevailing mood of the public mind is to "give the railroads whatever they need" to restore the system to a standard in keeping with our industrial and agricultural development,

There is danger in this very mood, for having convinced themselves that the restoration of our transportation system is of sufficient importance to justify almost any cost, the people are likely to be impatient with any prolonged continuance of railroad inadequacy. And yet, in spite of the increases, our railroad problem is far from being solved. It was a recognition that investors would be slow to be attracted to railroad securities that provision was made for Government assistance in financing for a period of transition. But there is no way to bridge over the period of transition so far as the actual providing of transportation for the public is concerned. The new rates go into effect on Sept. 1, but we will still have a considerable period of inadequate transportation. Cars and equipment cannot be supplied by magic, and in consequence the people must pay increased rates without a corresponding improvement in the service for some But it was impossible to avoid that, for no improvement could she expected until the increased revenue had been provided.

Th public, therefore, must be patient with the railroads during the period just ahead. The railroad executives have shown a willingness to get a maximum of performance out of roads with the present equipment, and, indeed, propose to do more than has ever been done before with such equipment But at best the relief will be slow in coming, and we shall continne to have railroad troubles in the way of ear shortages and inadequate service for some time to come. We must expect that and not look for miracles. On the other hand the management of the ratiroads of the country have been placed on trial. The people, through the Interstate Commerce Commission, have said to the executives: "We will do what you think necessary. Now show us." And it is up to the railroad executives to "show us." . The vigor with which they push the program of rehabilitation will determine the extent of their right to public confidence in the future. Moreover, a joint responsibility will rest upon railroad employees both during the transition period and afterward, to cooperate to the limit to get a maximum of service out of the roads. A good portion of the increase almost half of it, in fact-will go into increased wages, so that the public has right to expect a new spirit among the men. There ought to be a period of security as regards labor troubles, for industrial peace on the railroads during the work of rehabilitation will be quite as important as any other factor. OF FIVE THOUSAND OR LESS POPULATION

of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by increasing the total tax rate that may be levied by cities and towns having a population of five thousand or less than onefourth of one per cent to not exced-ing one and one-half per cent, and making appropriation therefor. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the

Section 1. That Section 4, Article XI of the Constitution be so amended as hereafter to read as follows:
