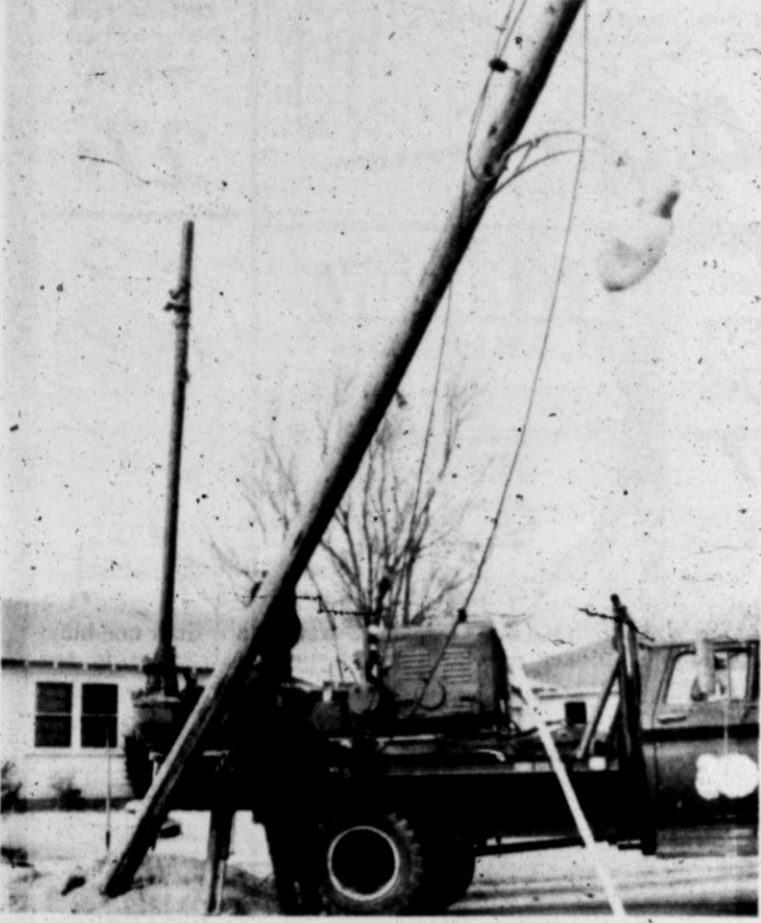

## Local Collegiates Totals From 1960

Where have Hereford High School graduates gone to college since 1960? What percentage of each graduating class has entered college?

Answers to these two questions have been researched and compiled by HHS counselors Wilma Braddy and Robert Thompson. Their figures indicate that — percentage wise — each year since 1960 the college enrollment figures have increased — except for the last two years (and one per cent down in 1964). However, the 1968 class had the largest actual number of college enrollees.

The record also shows that West Texas State University at Canyon always drew the largest local enrollment (67 in 1968) with Texas Technological University at Lubbock always running second (18 last year). Seventy-nine other universities, colleges, junior colleges and trade schools have been represented over the past eight years.

## Taxpayers Ask IRS

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

**Q — When will I be getting my income tax forms?**

**A —** The tax forms will be available at local IRS offices as well as many post offices and banks soon after the first of the year. Most taxpayers will receive copies of the forms and instructions in the mail.

If you receive a 1040 tax form in the mail, you may have a form that is printed in two colors. This is to draw attention to certain parts of the form that were troublesome to taxpayers last year.

Color is not used on the 1040-A forms or the 1040 Forms that may be picked up at IRS offices and other locations.

**Q — How did you get involved with the administration of Federal gun laws?**

**A —** IRS has administered Federal gun laws since 1934 when the National Firearms Act was enacted. The basis of this law, which imposed taxes on the transfer and making of firearms was the taxing authority given the Federal government by the Constitution. As IRS is responsible for collecting other Federal taxes, it was given the responsibility of administering the gun law.

**Q — Business has been good the past few months and my income is considerably above what I declared on my estimate. Should I make a change on my next quarterly payment?**

**A —** Yes, you can file an amended estimated tax return when the next quarterly payment is due January 15, 1969. Make the change right on the notice you receive.

You do not have to pay the fourth installment if you file your 1968 tax return by January 31, 1969, and pay the balance due at that time.

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**Q — Are you required to report on stock reported the year declared or the year received?**

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## Taxpayers Ask IRS

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

**Q - When will I be getting my income tax forms?**

**A -** The tax forms will be available at local IRS offices as well as many post offices and banks soon after the first of the year. Most taxpayers will receive copies of the forms and instructions in the mail.

**Q - If you receive a 1040 tax form in the mail, you may have a form that is printed in two colors. This is to draw attention to certain parts of the form that were troublesome to taxpayers last year.**

**A -** Color is not used on the 1040-A forms or the 1040 Forms that may be picked up at IRS offices and other locations.

**Q - How did you get involved with the administration of Federal gun laws?**

**A -** IRS has administered Federal gun laws since 1934 when the National Firearms Act was enacted. The basis of this law, which imposed taxes on the transfer and making of firearms was the taxing authority given the Federal government by the Constitution. As IRS is responsible for collecting other Federal taxes, it was given the responsibility of administering the gun law.

**Q - Business has been good the past few months and my income is considerably above what I declared on my estimate. Should I make a change on my next quarterly payment?**

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**Q - Are year-end dividends on stock reported the year declared or the year received?**

# Book Of Short Stories, New

A book which consists of twelve short stories and another book about the Texas Panhandle, its people, ranches and cattle, are just two of the many new books which can now be found at the Deaf Smith County Library.

**AND OTHER STORIES**  
 By JOHN O'HARA

This volume contains twelve brilliant new stories, all written in the two years following the completion of "Waiting For Winter" (1966). One of them, "A Few Trips and Some Poetry," is a novel of medium length.

Mr. O'Hara says in his foreword, "I am writing a strange play, and I am well along with a long novel. But the writing of short stories is becoming an expensive luxury at my age. In energy and time they have become costly because the energy and time come out of resources that I must budget for the long novel." It is possible, therefore, that a few years may have to go by before another book of O'Hara stories is ready

for publication.

The quality of "And Other Stories" which contains some of the author's finest work shows what a great amount of his energy and time has gone into it. But since in the first eight years of the 1960's he has already produced more and better work than most writers manage in a lifetime, it is clear that Mr. O'Hara's "Budget" will not be too restrictive. As he said in an earlier foreword: "I have work to do, and I am afraid not to do it."

**THE LS RANCH**  
 By DULCIE SULLIVAN

In the spring of 1881, W. M. D. Lee and Lucian B. Scott, wealthy business men of Leavenworth, Kansas, purchased land in the upper Texas Panhandle to establish the Lee-Scott Cattle Company. Their range sprawled across four Texas counties and extended into Eastern New Mexico. About six months later, fifty thousand head of mixed cattle, branded -LS-, grazed those thousands of acres of free grass.

This book is the story of Lee and Scott's LS Ranch from the tempestuous years of the open range to the era of "bob wire." It is also the story of the pioneer men and women whose efforts developed the LS into a cattle empire: W. M. D. and Lena Lee, Lucien and Julia Scott, "Mister Mac" and "Miss Annie" McAllister, and Charles and Pauline Whitman.

Here are accounts of chuck wagons and wagon bosses; prairie fires, blizzards, and hog holes; Ranch management problem and cowboys on strike; Lobo Wolves and romance; wild sports in Tascosa and its "Hog-

town" sector; LS cowboys fighting against a gang of organized rustlers in a feud that ended in tragedy; Those same cowboys on the long trails to Dodge City and Montana.

Eighty-seven years have passed since the first Longhorn cattle were burned with the LS Brand. Today, Hereford cattle, successors of Whitman's first registered bull, Salisbury, graze upon grass that is part of the original Lee and Scott range. The LS is still a proud and productive ranch.

Drawing upon stories told to her by men and women who were with the LS during the 18-80's and later years, Dulcie Sullivan presents her narrative in a clear, straightforward, but sympathetic manner that gives the reader a vivid sense of how life was really lived there in these times. Especially telling is her occasional use of an almost poetic incident: The steers bedding down around a campfire to listen to the chuck wagon cook play his fiddle, or the suit of spanish armor found in a spring, or the hail-battered trees attempting to renew themselves, despite their grotesque shapes.

Dulcie Turner Sullivan attended St. Mary's Academy in the Texas Panhandle city of Amarillo and received her R. N. from St. Anthony School of Nursing there. She became interested in the LS Ranch while listening to stories told men and women who were with the ranch in the 1880's. She wrote down the stories, and, with some further work, this book resulted.

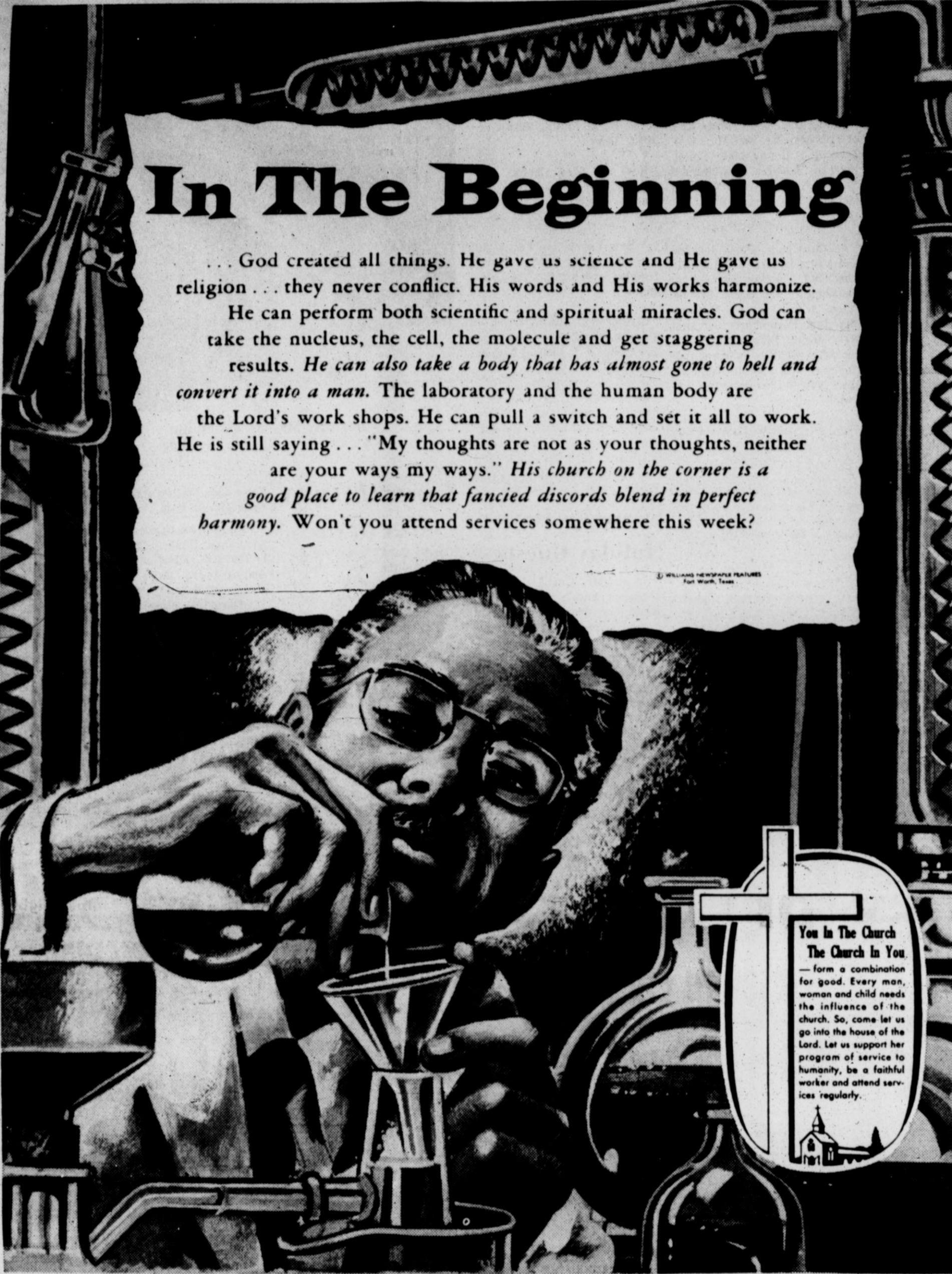

# Jacksons Leaving For Pakistan Soon

Mr. and Mrs. Clinton Jackson, Hereford, will leave for an eight-week tour of Pakistan on January 12 through the Farm Leader Exchange Program of Farmers and World Affairs, Inc. Clinton Jackson handles insurance for the Farmers Union, which he and his wife, Jerry, are active members. Both are prominent in local community and farm-related organizations. The Jacksons are part of a team of eight farm leaders who will meet in Washington, D. C., for orientation before beginning their journey. The group will travel extensively in East and West Pakistan as unofficial guests of the Ministry of Agriculture, seeing first-hand the agriculture and rural life of the country. In some areas they will stay with Pakistani farm families.

This is the sixth group of U.S. farm leaders to visit Pakistan since the inception of the exchange with that country in 1962. Seven teams of Pakistani agriculturalists have come to this country for a similar tour. FWA has exchanges with India and Venezuela, also.

FWA works with the Farm Bureau, the Farmers Union, and the Grange, in cooperation with the U. S. State Department, in arranging these two-way exchanges. This program was set up to increase understanding and friendship between the rural people of the U. S. and of the exchange countries.

FWA conducts a Farm Leader Training Program which brings specially selected young farmers from various developing countries for six months or a year of practical supervised training on U. S. farms. In cooperation with India's national farm organization, the Farmers Forum, FWA has a project of agricultural extension work in rural villages, combined with support of the Indian government's family planning programs. It arranges world affairs conferences in the U. S. with farm organizations.

FWA is a non-profit educational organization founded in 1956. Its work is supported by contributions which are tax deductible, and some grants in aid of foreign currencies from the U.S. Department of State.

## Earnings Stated By Friona Plant

R. E. (Gene) Frye, president of Missouri Beef Packers, Incorporated, today announced the Company's consolidated audited earnings for the fiscal year ended October 26, 1968.

Net sales were \$124,460,581 compared to \$100,499,414 in 1967 showing an increase of 24 percent.

Net earnings were \$926,124 compare to \$1,060,090 in 1967.

Earnings per share of common stock were \$.87 per share compared to \$1.15 in 1967, exclusive of extraordinary credits and adjusted for a 2 1/2 to 1 stock split.

Shares outstanding in 1968 increased by 169,157 shares, or 18 percent due to the public offering of 150,000 shares of common stock in March, 1968 and the exercising of stock options.

During 1968 total assets increased by \$3,857,690 or 44 percent and Shareholders' equity increased by \$4,516,232 or 91 percent.

Earnings were adversely affected by start-up costs at the Friona plant, the 10 percent Federal income tax surtax and labor problems which resulted in a 28-day work stoppage at the Rock Port plant and a strike at the Friona plant which commenced on Oct. 17, 1968 and ended on Dec. 2, 1968, when the members of the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen of North America AFL-CIO, agreed to return to work.

A three-year labor contract was entered into with Amalgamated, effective December 16, 1968. All start-up expenses and additional expenses incurred in fiscal 1968 due to the work stoppages are reflected in the consolidated audited figures.

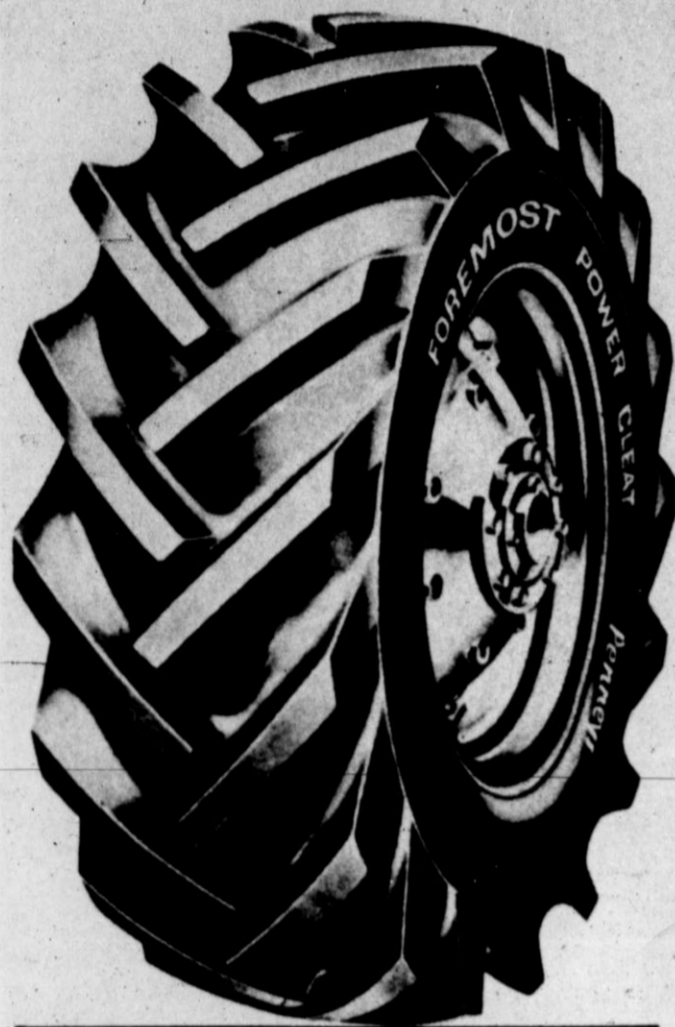

**World War II Story, New**

The story of a young Jewish boy during World War II and a book about self-improvement are just two of the many new books waiting to be read at Deaf Smith County Library.

**THE TWO OF US**  
By CLAUDE BERRI

The time is World War II, the place is 'unoccupied' France. Claude, a nine year old Jewish boy, adorably mischievous, keeps getting into the most amusing trouble, which would make little difference were it not war time. But it is, and his parents, who love him very much, fear that his pranks will result in their exposure to the Nazis. Reluctantly, they give him a Christian sur name, teach him the Lord's prayer, and send him off to the country to live with

an old peasant and his wife, Pepe and Meme.

Pepe is a fantastic character: Petulant, sly, grumpy, proudly independent, vegetarian, funny, warm and tenderhearted — He is entirely lovable. But he is also an outspoken, if unthinking, anti-semitic.

As they share a life together, the old man and the boy grow to love one another. And their love deepens while each day, with the allies advancing, brings nearer the end of the war and so the time of the boy's departure. They care of Kinou, Pepe's ancient dog, whose stomach gets upset every time he hears bombers overhead; they boycott Meme's splendid rabbit dishes; they listen to allied broadcasts on a radio hidden in the attic;

they write a scandalous postcard to Dinou, Claude's girlfriend.

Their relationship, intense and touching, is threatened only by the prejudice of the old man, who has no idea of the boy's origins.

THE TWO OF US tells a marvelous story, and in this telling it illuminates a special corner of a world in turbulence, a corner where two people get caught up in one another for a brief time and celebrate their life, one life new and one life old. ## Sundae Age Dessert

This dessert is for the young and gay — who can usually down a triple-threat affair.

**TRIPLE-THREAT?** Yes. Pastry shells are filled with ice cream and topped with chocolate sauce. Picture that!

And these shells are special. They're made with butter pastry plus chopped salted peanuts.

One thing we know. The combination of ice cream, chocolate sauce and peanuts is one that goes down well. It came on the scene a dozen or more years ago when a New York City restaurant began rolling balls of vanilla ice cream in chopped salted peanuts and then laddling on the fudge sauce. Since that time innumerable menu-makers both restaurant-style and home-style have adopted it as a specialty

of the house. If you're one of these, you'll probably enjoy trying this latest variation on the theme.

**CHOCOLATE PEANUT TARTS**

1 cup unsifted regular flour  
3 tablespoons confectioner's sugar

1/2 teaspoon salt  
6 tablespoons (3/4 stick) butter  
1/2 cup finely chopped salted peanuts

3 tablespoons water  
Vanilla ice cream  
Chocolate Peanut Sauce (see below)

In a medium mixing bowl thoroughly stir together flour, sugar and salt; with a pastry blender cut in butter until it is in pieces the size of small peas. Add peanuts. Sprinkle water over mixture, a tablespoon at a time, mixing lightly with a fork

after each addition. Gather up dough with fingers; shape into a ball. Divide into 8 equal portions and shape each into a ball. On a floured pastry cloth with a floured stockinet-covered rolling pin, roll each ball into a 5-inch round. Shape over back of 3 1/2-inch by 1 1/4-inch tart pans; prick with fork. Place on a cookie sheet. Bake in a preheated 400-degree oven 15 to 18 minutes or until lightly browned. Allow to cool 5 minutes; remove from pans onto wire rack to cool completely.

At serving time fill with ice cream and top with Chocolate Peanut Sauce. Makes 8 servings.

**CHOCOLATE PEANUT SAUCE**

In a 1-quart saucepan heat together 1/2 cup semi-sweet chocolate pieces, 1/2 cup light cream or half-and-half; stir constantly until chocolate is melted and sauce is smooth. Cool. Stir in 1/2 cup chopped salted peanuts. Makes 1 cup sauce.

If your son or daughter is going to school during the year, but was also married and depending on you for his or her — or his and her — support, you need to observe several rules in order to claim the exemption on your return:  
Don't let the married students file a joint return on their income, (if any). Since they must file separate returns, they will have to split their income and each file on their community half. You must have provided principal support for one or both married students in order to claim the dependent or the dependents. Be careful to maintain your support records on married student dependents and on their dependents. They can also claim, and must claim, personal exemption on their own return, however, they cannot claim any grandchildren if you claim them.

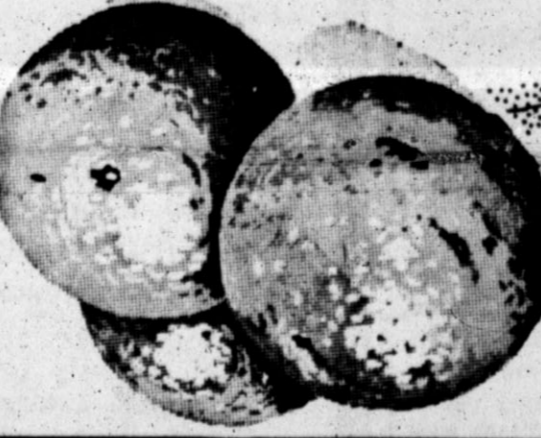
