The bills- there are two of themwould not only give to the Secretary of Agriculture the authority to investigate the operations of dealers, but upon complaint of any person the Secretary would make a report of the transaction record or business of any dealer or bandler.

The Secretary might also provide for a Board of Arbitration for adjustments and disputes in which any approved handler or dealer has a financial interest involving the grade, quality, condition, value, deterioration, handling or distribution of farm products. The important point in the arbitration plan is a provision that the finding of such a board would be prima facie evidence in the courts.

Senator McNary is a practical man, Perhaps no Senator has a more fundamental knowledge of the difficulties of the farmer or a deeper appreciation of the injustice under which he has suffered at the hands of the middleman, and it is hoped the legislation he has prepared will not be emasculated in com-mittee by thorists and political economists who left unchecked are likely to sink the ship before it gets under way. The outrageous exploitation of the farmer at the hands of the middleman must come to an end, and McNary will bring a good deal of it to an end if given a free hand.


