4-H teaches young people the im-

cluding record books as part of $4-\mathrm{H}$ work. Members are encouraged to keep records of what they learn the size and scope, expense and income and plans for expanding in each pro-

foreigners for the first time Aprill. foreigners for the first time Aprill. Since the breakup of American
Telephone \& Telegraph Co. a year ago, Japanese manufacturers have flooded the U.S. market with equipment ranging from telephones to
sophisticated switching gear. Now, sophisticated switching gear. Now,
the Federal Communications Commission wants U.S. manufacturers to have the same access to Japanese
consumers.
The Japanese market for communications products is the second largest in the world, behind the Unieustates. And to make sure U.S. manufacturers are treated fairly in
that new marketplace the FCC shat new marketplace, the FCC is
studying retaliatory options in the event Japan does not give equal treatment to American and Japanese companies.
In ordering a study of those op
tions, FCC Chairman Mark tions, FCC Chairman Mark S. regulatory program could be used "to assure reciprocal openness", and "a free and open marketplace." not with Uncle Sucker," Fowler said a month ago when he confirmed the still uncompleted study was being conducted.
