# Commissioners Discuss Hospital Bond, Purchase Pickup

Possibilities of a hospital bond election in the near future for additional expansion highlighted the business of County Commissioners Court at their regular session Monday, along with approval of bids on gas and oils and a pickup truck.

Representatives of Pioneer Natural Gas Co. of Amarillo and Bryant Brothers appeared before the commissioners and a deal was worked out providing for specifications on gas and water line crossings throughout Deaf Smith County.

Wayne Thomas, local attorney who is on the Deaf Smith County Hospital Board, described current needs and preparations in motion for additional hospital space at this time. Although nothing has been finalized in either the architectural or future bond plans, he

pointed out that a master plan for future expansion will also be included in view of population increases computerized for the immediate area.

Thomas reported that the hospital had risen to almost a million dollar business here and that a visit to the hospital at almost any time would reveal the increasing needs for additional room. A consideration included is whether a wing will be added to the ground floor ("there isn't too much space left on the ground at this time," he related) or addit i o n a l floors.

· Also under discussion was the possibility of creating a hospital district in Deaf Smith County at a later date. An architect for the proposed project is also under consideration.

Thomas said, however, that the mat-

ter of any hospital additions 'would be left entirely in the hands of the voters" and that details of the ent i re plan would be turned over to them "as soon as possible."

He and the commissioners agreed that the best policy was in giving the people of the county "all the facts in detail" at the earliest feasible time.

In the action regarding future pipeline crossings beneath county roads, both Pioneer Natural Gas and Bryant Brothers (who do much of the construction work for the gas company) were in accord with whatever safety provisions were stipulated by the Court. They assured commissione r s that they were as eager for such measures as anyone else, in view of the fact that they could be held liable in cases of accidents resulting from poor

Commissioners agreed that "all gas lines crossing county roads shall be crossed by drilling so that the road is left in exactly the same condition as before the gas line was placed

under said road." They also added a provision for water lines:

"All water crossings must be of steel. All ditches crossing county roads must be water packed to its original compaction and run at right angles to the road."

These additions were reportedly enacted upon by the Court due to a gas line crossing (old pipe being removed and new pipe installed at the same time) at a site in Precinct 1 prior to the last rain, which caused was washed out and had to be replac-

The company representatives also agreed to road warning signals of some appropriate type at construction sites in the future.

The county gas-oil bid went to Texaco, after commissioners computerlast year's gallon consumption against this year's prices and found the saving to be \$42 over the other two bids. Gulf Oil Company and Philips 66 also entered bids — all three were "very close together" in prices.

For Precinct, 2, a bid of \$1,225 for a pickup truck was accepted over one other bid of \$1,232.18. Low bid was Orsborn Chevrolet with the slightly higher bid by Orval Watson Ford, both of Hereford.

A floor scrubbing machine, ow by the Deaf Smith County Hospit but reported as too large for their purposes, was "sold" to the Deaf Smith County Bull Barn for their use - while the hospital plans to pur-chase a smaller one. Commissioners pointed out that the purchase was simply a matter of transfer of funds in

Precinct 2 Commissioner Marcus Latham reported that the necessary maps which will be provided by the State Highway Department before pu-rchases along U. S. 60 can be made for widening purposes have still not been received by the Court.

Latham reported that he had talked to highway representatives who said that "it could be two months longer" before they will be received here.

Two geographical areas have been selected in De a f Smith County in which costshare assistance could be approved for installing new recharge wells. One area is northwest of Hereford about 20 to 35 miles out. This would be in loose, coarse sand. The other approved area would be in east Deaf Smith County in a fine, unconsolidated sand area,

To receive cost-share assistance for the recharge modification, the irrigation well must be dilled new and meet the specifications of the Soil Conservation Service, Brown said. The recharge well should be located in close proximity to playa lakes that have a drainage area of at least 200 acres and an average surface area of not less . than 25 acres.

The texture will not scar surfaces, and they will not leak and stain tables tops or other surfaces. They can be made very attractive, if coordinated with room decor.


