

## Court Approves Plan

Deaf Smith County Commissioners Court approved the Texas County and District Retirement System and have scheduled it to be placed in effect on Dec. 1 covering all county employees (with the exception of those employed at the Deaf Smith County Hospital.)

The commissioners agreed to the 7 per cent deposit rate, which is to be paid from the employee's salary and a matching mount from the county.

This plan was discussed by the commissioners with TCDRS director J. Robert Brown of Austin during special session on Oct, 1. Official action could not be taken until their next regularly-scheduled meeting then.

Brown had described the requirements of the system at that time and stated that the plan does not interfere with Social Security. The plan, he said, pays either a standard benefit to the employee or any one of four options which the employee may select. It also has disability be-

The situation is different today in that we have not been bombed by an enemy nation. We have not had a unifying blow such as Pearl Harbor. But the ultimate goal of the communists is no different than that of Adolph Hitler or the military leaders of the Japanese nation thirty years ago. Both were beat on world conquest. No doubt we'll never have another world conflict such as World War II, but the communist brush fires will continue to break out wherever they detect a weaklink in the chain of free nations.

Meanwhile, we're having a few problems on the loc al front. Farm prices are still down although efforts are certainly being made to aleviate the situation. But that's not all. Sugar content of the High Plains beet crop is at a very low level due to excessive moisture and cool weather at the wrong time and now the early freeze may have done a great deal of damage to the lettuce crop. Growers were hesitant to make a statement early this week, but there is a possibility that the lettuce crop has been damaged. The milo crop however, should not be hurt. 

#### One American In Six Will Have TB Germs

Urging residents of Deaf Smith County to support the 19-69 Christmas Seal Campaign against tuberculosis, emphysema, and other respiratory diseases, president Bert Nuckols of the Top of Texas TB Association warned today that one American in six is infected with TB germs "and most of them don't know it."

Stating that Texas had over three thousand reported new cases of active TB in 1968, plus 412 relapses, Nuckols stated that TB causes over two million deaths per year throughout the world, and that the United State has over three hundred thousand cases of TB under medical supervision now.

"The crying need in TB con-

ple to the need for tubercul i n skin tests as part of their physical examinations. The x-r ay alone will not, and cannot, rule out TB infection. People sometimes have a false sense of security from a negative X-ray, when actually they may be loaded with TB germs that can become active at any time. Those people need to have a skin test to detect their infection, and the TB Association's medical men recommend they have a year of medication with INH pills to keep the dormant infection from becoming active."

Nuckols emphasized that the TB Assn, doesn't ask much money from anyone. "What we do ask is that everyone who can give a small amount to Christmas Seal Campaign so we can carry on our work against TB, emphysema, and other respiratory diseases."



A. No, they are not, and there is quite a bit of confusion due to the similarity in the names. Medicare is the term generally used to describe the federal program of hospital and medical insurance for persons over 65. The hospital insurance is financed by payroll contributions, and the medical insurance by premlums paid by the individual and matched by the federal government, Medicald is a state program providing health insurance for needy persons receiving various types of assistance, Inquiries about Medicald should b quiries about Medicaid should be directed to the State Department of Public Welfare.



## Social Security

By TRAVIS C. BRIGGS Q. How old do you have to be to apply for a social security

A. There is no age requirement and no need to present a birth certificate to get a social security card. We do suggest that you wait until you need a card before applying. You will need a card if you plan to get a job, or for tax identification purposes if you have a savings account in a bank, credit union, or savings and loan association. Young children should be accompanied by a parent, or should have a note from the parent indicating the need for a card, when they call at the office to get a card. This will lessen the possibility of establishing two or more records for the same person, which can create a problem in later years.




