Big Spring needs seriously to consider her airport. It does not belong to the stockholders alone. Those men and women simply put their money in to make it possible for Big Spring to have an airport.

And its a good one.

However, twenty to thirty thousand dollars is needed right now to provide additional land and equipment that would make it an AIA port.

The value of having a really modern airport has about become an established fact in the minds of most people. That aviation is here to stay and will become more and more an integral part of the national transportation structure is certain.

Once there was lots of fighting and scrambling between the then small towns of West Texas to obtain railroads such as the Santa Fe and the Texas and Pacific, when the initial routes of those systems were being decided upon.

The towns through which the railroads came are here today. Most of them hundreds of times larger. Those the railroads missed either have not grown at all, are now but villages or have disappeared altogether.

The situation in aviation is quite like that. The network of regular air lines is rapidly becoming fixed. Before many months the routes of all air mail lines the nation will need for years will have been designated.

Will Big Spring be on the real air map?

Something's got to be done about it; something more than griping because Midland or some other town is accorded more recognition in aviation.

That won't get it.

Midland Host To Physicians

Members of the Medical Society of Midland, Martin, Ector and Howard counties, in a regular monthly meeting, convened Monday evening at the Scharbau hotel in Midland, and heard several papers and discussions of clinical cases.

Following the session in the hotel the medical men saw a motion picture in a Midland theatre. It was for the purpose of more vividly explaining certain operative procedures.

Safeway Lines Carry 26,654 Passengers

Flying a total of 934,649 miles and carrying 26,654 passengers is the record by a fleet of ten tri-motor Ford planes of the Southwest Air Express during the fiscal year closed April 1, according to figures issued by Earl P. Halburton, president of Safeway.

That business was for the first year of the line's operation. Safeway inaugurated daily plane service on three lines—St. Louis-Tulsa, Kansas City-Tulsa and Dallas-Fort Worth-Tulsa—on April 2, 1929. At that time the total number of employees was about 50, and the company's monthly payroll was about \$8,500. Last month the payroll was over \$25,000, which went to over 100 employees, 80 of whom were pilots.

During the first month of operation, 323 passengers were carried. During the month of March, 1930, 4,313 people took passage on Safeway planes.

The company added its Sweetwater-Big Spring-Midland line late in 1929, and 13 planes arrive and depart from Tulsa over the four routes each day. Property owned by Safeway is valued at approximately one million dollars.

SHEPPARD'S RESOLUTION TO PROBE COTTON PRICE DROP ORDERED BY SENATE GROUP

Secretary Of Agriculture Will Study Reasons For Sharp Declines In Price Structure Of Staple

WASHINGTON, April 8 (AP)—A favorable report on the Sheppard resolution to request the secretary of agriculture to investigate the causes of the 1929, 1927 and 1928 price declines in cotton was ordered today by the senate agriculture committee.

Under the resolution, the secretary of agriculture would ascertain the amount of short selling and by whom it was done and any further information which will enable the farmer to know the true state of conditions and the parties responsible for the declines.

A favorable report also was ordered on the Harrison bill to authorize the secretary of agriculture to investigate cotton ginning with a view to developing improved equipment. The measure authorized an appropriation of \$100,000 for the inquiry.

Gibson Rites Will Be Held

James Samuel Gibson, 79, who died at Ackerly Monday night, was to be buried in the Odd Fellows cemetery here Tuesday afternoon following funeral services from the Charles Eberly chapel in charge of Rev. S. B. Hughes. The Odd Fellows were to perform a graveside service.

Mr. Gibson is survived by one daughter, Miss Martha Gibson of Denver, Colo., two sisters, Messdames A. B. Burns of Ackerly and I. Harris of Rotan, and a brother, Bill E. Gibson.

MIDLAND LAUNDRYMAN FOUND SHOT TO DEATH

MIDLAND, Texas, April 8 (AP)—James Hiett, 20-year-old laundryman, found lying across a bed in his home here last night with two bullet wounds in his head, died today. The only witness to the shooting was Hiett's 18-month-old son, who lay in his crib in the room where Hiett was shot.

Sanitation Improvements Talked At Weekly Rotary Club Luncheon

Better sanitation in Big Spring was the subject of a report by C. W. Cunningham at the Rotary luncheon Tuesday. He recommended all other clubs be invited to join in the movement and that speakers be appointed to appear before the five parent teacher associations, the City Federation and the Business Men's Luncheon Club.

The report was adopted by the club. E. Reagan was chairman, in absence of President W. T. Strange, Jr. He gave a short classification talk and urged bringing together leaders in various professions and business. He pointed out that there are fifty Rotarians here and that fifty classifications are vacant, declaring that the club should contain a more complete cross section of local community life.

Miss Lucile Hailey, Rotary scholarship student in Texas Technological College, was a guest, making a talk to the club and expressing her appreciation for their assistance.

Mrs. M. R. Showalter, county health nurse, told of sanitation and health work in the school of the city and county. She outlined studies of sanitation being promoted in the schools.

Other guests, who made short talks, were Fred Phillips of Daltner, former president of the local club; Kenneth Ambrose of Midland; Rev. Lindley, who began his ministry with the First Christian church Sunday.

President C. W. Deats of the Kiwanis club and Frank Boyle of the Lions club were guests. Both pledged assistance of their clubs in the movement for better sanitation. The chairman appointed three men to nominate six or seven members from which two directors will be elected for the year beginning June 1. Those named on the committee were R. T. Piner, Tom Ashley and Rev. Dow Heard. There are five holdovers and two to be elected.

MARYVILLE, Mo., April 8 (AP)—The Farmers Trust Company, one of the oldest financial institutions in northwest Missouri, suspended business here today. The company was capitalized for \$200,000. Its resources were given as \$1,697,713; loans \$1,239,048; cash on sight exchange \$226,331, and total deposits \$1,182,386.

CONVICT PARDONED

AUSTIN, April 8 (AP)—Oscar G. Brown, serving a five year sentence for burglary from Donley county, was pardoned from the penitentiary by Governor Moody today. He was convicted last November.

Governor Moody said he pardoned Brown at request of District Attorney James C. Mahan, who stated Brown's testimony in a murder case pending at Cleburne.

Settles Hotel Half Completed; To Rush Remaining Structural Work

The Settles hotel is fifty per cent completed and will be practically finished by August 1, E. V. McCright, head of E. V. McCright & Company, the general contractor, said here Tuesday.

In point of actual construction the job is forty per cent finished. As to time it is half finished he said.

By August 1 the hotel owners may begin putting in the furnishings, said the contractor. Unusual speed has been made on this project since February 1, when a long siege of cold weather ended, but, said Mr. McCright, "We're getting to where we can show some real speed."

The concrete and steel framework for the first floor was poured January 4. Operations were held up until February 1. Beginning from the ground level the sixteenth floors including the two, totaling seventeen levels, were erected in sixty days, having been completed last week.

Due to inability to get certain materials here on schedule time it was necessary to start brick work from the fifth floor upward. The bricklayers will reach the top of the structure within two weeks. The interior brick and stone work, including considerable ornamental work, will then be done on the first five floors.

Interior partition and lath work will begin next week. Plastering will be started ten days later.

"Mr. Tinley did himself proud in buying elevators for this hotel, which is going to be one of the finest in Texas in every respect," said Mr. McCright, referring to M. L. Tinley, manager of the interests of Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Settles, owners of the hotel.

THREE CITY COMMISSIONERS TO TAKE OATH FOR OFFICES AT REGULAR MEET TUESDAY

J. B. Pickle, R. L. Cook And C. E. Talbot, Winners In Election April 1, Assume Duties; Mayor To Be Elected

Three city commissioners elected April 1 will be sworn into office Tuesday night in a regular session of the body and a new mayor to succeed C. W. Cunningham will be elected for the next year.

Men to take the oath of office are J. B. Pickle, who served several months of an appointive term before being elected; R. L. Cook and C. E. Talbot. Mr. Cunningham and R. T. Piner, the only members of the former commission to leave office, were not subject to reelection.

Before the new commission can consider business of the regular Tuesday night session, a mayor to be elected, according to provisions of the Big Spring city charter.

BANK ROBBERS FACING TRIAL

Notorious Kansas Gang Charged In Colorado Court Of Murder

EADRS, COLO., April 8 (AP)—Charged with the murder of Sheriff E. A. Hickman of Eads, three men, who have confessed the slaying and the robbery of the state bank of Manter, Kas., today faced trial here for their lives.

Hickman was slain during the flight of the trio following the robbery, March 14. The prisoners, John Walker, Clyde Ray, and Andrew Halliday, were arrested by a posse. Hundreds of other citizens joined in pursuit of the robbers, combine the rough Arroya country of the Colorado-Kansas state line.

Punishment of death is to be sought by the state. After arrest of the three men in Kansas, Governor Clyde M. Reed agreed to extradition if Colorado officers would promise to ask such a penalty. Capital punishment is not legalized in Kansas.

Federal Highway Allotment Will Allow Texas To Do Construction Equal To 800 Miles Of Pavement

AUSTIN, April 8 (AP)—Allotments to Texas from the federal government for highways would permit Texas to do construction equal to building 800 miles of concrete roads during the next three years, Governor Moody said today, in pointing out that his administration was probably entitled to some credit for the existing amicable relations with the federal bureau of roads.

"The people will recall that before my administration had its inception in 1927, the federal government was threatening to withdraw aid from Texas entirely, and I went to Washington in the fall before my inauguration to assure the federal bureau that I would appoint a new commission," Governor Moody said.

At that time the state highway commission owed \$6,200,000 and had on hand \$600,000. I promised the government that if they would continue their aid I would give Texas an honest and capable administration of highway affairs.

"The \$7,336,534 Texas will get from the government for the fiscal year beginning July 1, if continued for the next three years, will be sufficient to construct an airline concrete highway across Texas from any angle to say nothing of the construction money Texas will add to federal funds.

"The \$3,000,000 supplemental funds Texas will receive for the balance of the current fiscal year would build a concrete highway 100 miles long.

"That is just an illustration of what efficient highway administration will do. I feel Texas made good its promise to the federal bureau and I am proud this was done under administration of my appointment. It seems that a new era in highway construction has opened up and if we take advantage of it on an honest, efficient basis, we can get our long sought permanent, connected system of highways in Texas and which Texas badly needs.

CONTACT IS MADE WITH MESSENGER

Elder Bristow Known To Be Alive And In Health

OKLAHOMA CITY, April 8 (AP)—The Oklahoma City Times, in a copyrighted article today, states that Obie Bristow, former University of Oklahoma football star, and two companions carried the sum of money necessary to effect the release of J. E. Bristow, Oklahoma and Texas oil man, from Mexican bandits who have held him captive for nearly a month, from Mazatlan to Ahuatlan, in gold sewed into sacks.

The article states that agents of the younger Bristow have made contact with Cruz Delgado, bandit leader, and that it has been established that the elder Bristow is alive and is in reasonably good health.

One of Obie Bristow's companions on the ransom journey was Merle Blakely, staff representative of the Times, who joined Bristow at Mazatlan two weeks ago.

Membership Cards Sent C-C Members

Members of the Big Spring Chamber of Commerce Tuesday received official 1930 individual membership cards, which the board of directors asks that they carry as identification certificates of their official connection with the organization.

On the folder enclosing the cards the statement is made that it is the ambition and aim of "your directors and management to direct every effort toward removing obstacles and providing facilities that we may grow and prosper as a community."

Some of the aims for the interest of the community which it is declared the organization has for this year are: more roads leading to Big Spring; two main highways paved across Howard county; active support and endorsement for a north-and-south railroad; recognition of aviation possibilities and close cooperation with a program of popularizing and advertising the Big Spring airport; aid to the development of a wider market for farm products, especially the dairy and poultry products; advertising the agricultural and industrial possibilities of the Big Spring area; cooperation with local industries in matter of markets and trade extension.

CLIMAX REACHED

OKLAHOMA CITY, April 8 (AP)—A climax in the negotiations between Obie Bristow, former University of Oklahoma football star, and bandits who were holding his father, J. E. Bristow, 60 years old, for ransom was believed to be at hand today. A special dispatch to the Oklahoma City Times from its correspondent at Ahuatlan, Nayarit, Mexico, gave this information.

The son maintained a hopeful vigil in the isolated Mexican village today, the dispatch said, hoping that the end of his long search for his father was near. Obie Bristow went to Ahuatlan with two American friends who had been aiding him in his efforts to pay the ransom and free his father.

MESSENGERS ENROUTE

Messengers were said to have the ransom money and were on their way into the desolate hills between Ahuatlan and Ixtlan. In the neighborhood of Jal. Promises brought to Obie by Indian runners, the dispatch added, were that on payment of the demanded money, the elder Bristow would be freed at a designated spot in the wilderness where guides would meet him and escort him to Ahuatlan to join his son.

Exact amount of the ransom paid to the messengers was not disclosed. Original demand of the bandits were for \$15,000. Various reports said that the bandits raised their demands, but reports yesterday were an agreement had been reached for the release of the elder Bristow for \$1,500.

RELEASE PROMISED

The special stated release of Bristow had been promised by dark today. Plans of the captive and his son after the release were indefinite.

The bandit gang was said to be camped in a valley between two extinct volcanoes, in one of the most inaccessible spots in the country. It was believed that recent activity of two columns of troops put the bandits in a mood to deal directly and quickly with young Bristow.

SAN ANGELO, April 8 (AP)—The

San Angelo Times today said that an emissary of Mexican bandits holding J. E. Bristow, San Angelo oil and mining operator, had accepted 3,000 pesos gold ransom and that Bristow's release was believed certain.

The money was said to have been

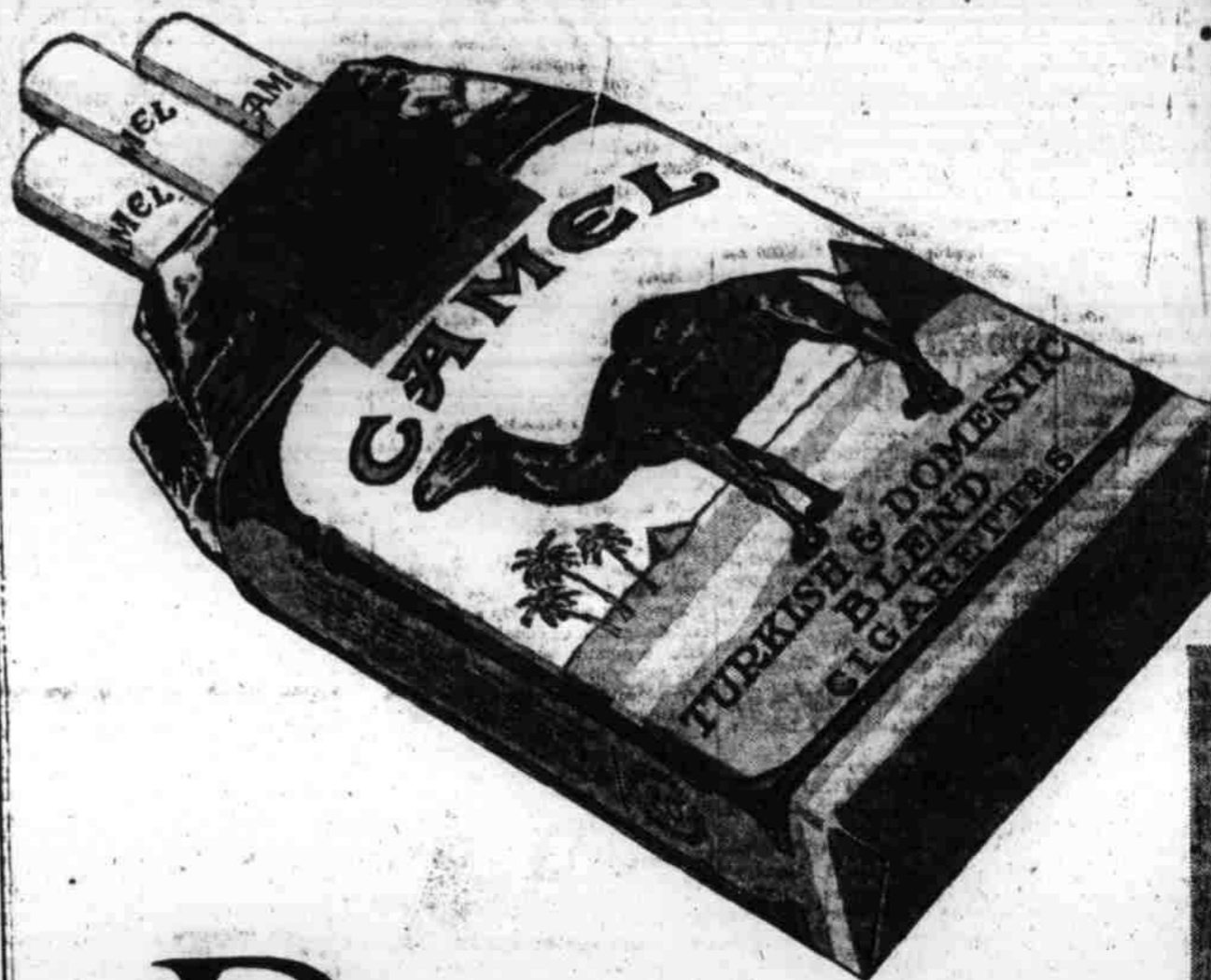

Two West Texans Continue To Be Mentioned As Possible Candidates For Governorship In 1930 Election

AUSTIN, Tex., April 8 (AP)—Names of two West Texans persist in bobbing up wherever politicians gather to discuss the impending gubernatorial campaign. They are both Senators and warm personal friends—Clint C. Small of Wellington and Pink L. Parrish, "the big boy," of Lubbock. Small is a sharp lawyer, former district judge and shrewd legislator. He was the author of the now famous "river bed bill," giving land owners instead of the state title to dry creek beds where the channels were more than 30 feet wide under the law before Small changed it. Dry creeks and river beds were "navigable" if they were 30 feet or more wide and hence belonged to the State and as State land could be filed on for mineral purposes. Some of them were valuable for oil and gas. Over Governor's Veto After the governor vetoed Small's bill, the Wellington senator gracefully put it through both houses over the executive's veto. He has the knack of stepping in

and taking hold of things when the old boat begins to wobble. For instance: He was favorable to the move to adjourn the legislature sine die and go home about a week before the constitutional limit sent it home during the fifth special session, but he was also in favor of staying on the job in event anything could be accomplished. The vote on the adjournment motion was about six and six. Small voted to stay in session and his vote settled the issue, but he smartly moved to reconsider and spread on the journal, giving notice he would call the resolution up if the legislature did not get busy. He held a nice advantage and he manipulated it to a nicety. Parrish Has Gift of Gab Parrish is a jovial, easy-going fellow with a marked physical resemblance of the late Gov. James S. Hogg, champion of the common people and outstanding hero of Texas politics. He has the "gift of gab," to use a slang expression, and could warm the hearts of the "common" people from the hustings. It was he who discovered that many county officials were

drawing in excess of \$12,500 annually in fees and salaries of office and set out to limit their remuneration to that figure. He was in favor of lowering it to \$10,000, but he could not get much support in the legislature in fixing that maximum. He started the "ball a rolling out" which brought legislation to curb the practice of counties paying excessive commissions for collection of delinquent State and county taxes.

Mrs. Lee J. Rountree of Bryan, successful newspaper woman, has announced her candidacy to succeed W. S. Barron in the legislature. The report is that she will be elected without opposition. Her late husband was a legislator of outstanding ability for several terms. She would be an acceptable acquisition to the existing coterie of woman legislators—Mrs. Helen Moore of Texas City and Mrs. Laura Burleson, Negley of San Antonio in the House and Miss Margie Neal of Carthage in the Senate. Women are taking an increasingly larger interest in making laws and have quite a hand in it now. There are Miss Overta Culp of Houston, House parliamentarian who may aspire to one of the Harris County places, and Miss Carl Phinney, chief clerk of the House, who is scheduled to hold that important place as long as she cares to keep it.

THE LEADERS

Lion Negotiating For Pure Lease

Lion Oil Refining Company of El Dorado, Ark., is reported to be negotiating for the purchase of Pure Oil Company producing leases in three West Texas counties, Howard, Upton and Crane and in two Panhandle counties, Gray and Hutchinson. Nine wells on these leases have a daily average production of 871 barrels of oil. It is understood the deal will involve three wells in Howard county: No. 1 Scrivner, a 35-barrel well at 2,200 feet; No. 12 Otis Chalk which pumps 275 barrels daily and No. 3 Hooks, which produces 58 barrels daily.

Texas Co. Granted Injunction Against Secretary Wilbur

WASHINGTON, April 7. (AP)—Holding that the secretary of interior has the right to fix the price at which oil taken from government owned lands under lease may be sold, the District of Columbia court of appeals today reversed an action by the District of Columbia supreme court granting the Texas Company a permanent injunction against Secretary Wilbur.

Secretary Wilbur refused to approve a contract made by the Cody Petroleum Company to sell oil from the Oregon basin in Wyoming to the Texas Company for 53 cents a barrel and insisted on a price of 85 cents per barrel. The Texas Company sought and was granted a permanent injunction against the secretary by the District of Columbia supreme court.

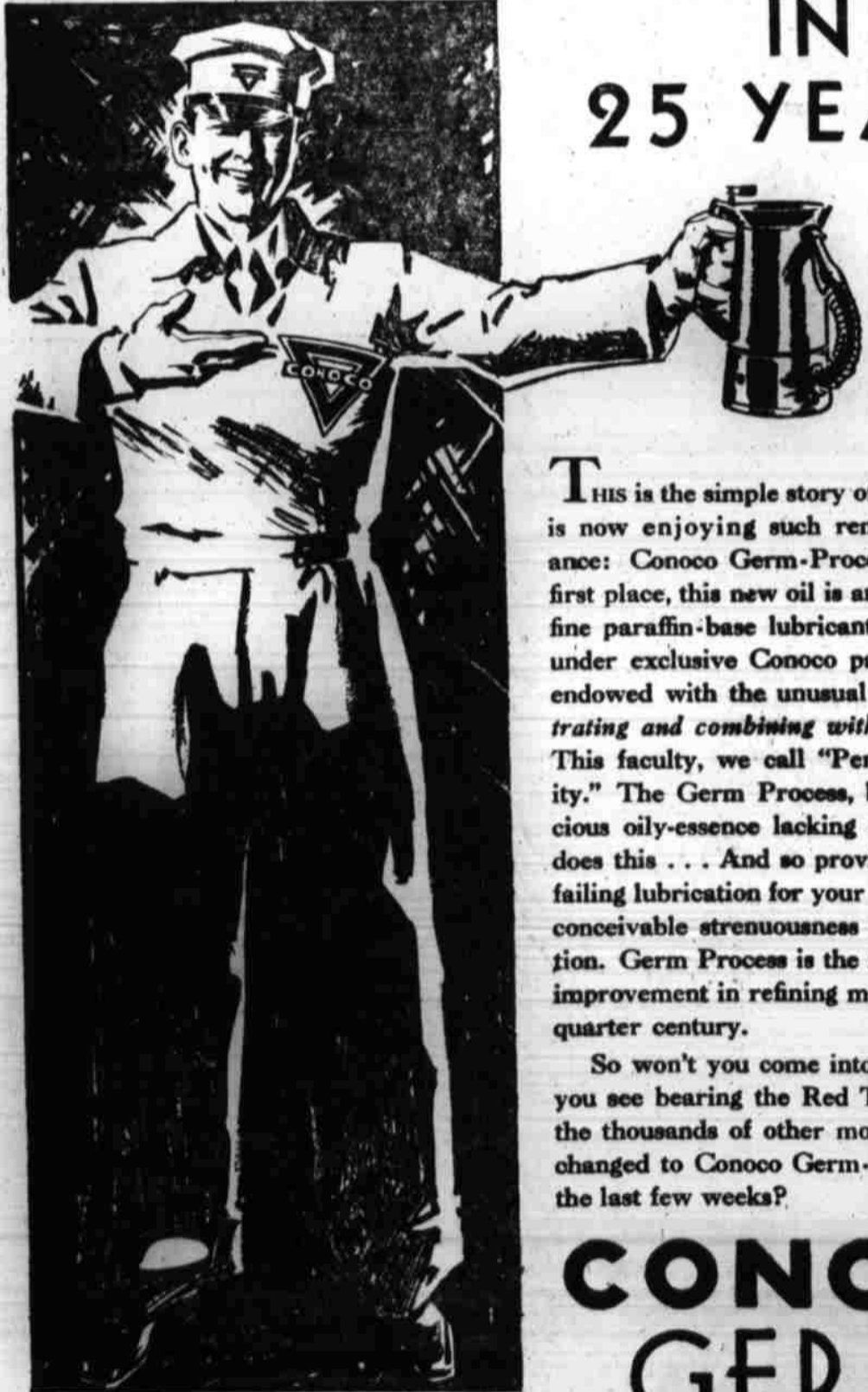
