Line Appointed Board Position

Approval of several items dotted the agenda of the county commissioners court in their regular session Monday, with the appointment of a hospital board member and the re-appointment of two others taking priority.

Ed Line, local attorney, was named to replace Wayne Thomas while Dr. John McCrary and Carl Perrin was re-elected for additional two-year terms.

Thomas entered his resignation as a board member when it was learned he had been appointed by Governor Preston Smith to the Texas State College Board of Coordinators. He had served on the hospital board for 16 years prior to his resignation, and had also served as president of the board during one year of his time.

The commissioners also approved three requests by county residents for installation of piping across county roads. The first request approved was submitted by Edward H. Paetzold, who was seeking permission to cross a county road with a water line at Block 89 M-7, east to Section 88, and another was by Eldred Brown for Mrs. N. A. Brown and Sons, seeking permission to cross a county road with a water line at Section 3.

Township 3N, Range 1E to Section 34, Township 4N Range 1E. The final approval was to H. D. Mrs. N. A. Brown and Sons at D. Fowler, Section 11, Township 3N, Range 1E to Section 3, Township 3N Range 1E.

Under provisions of the county, all water lines installed under county roads must be of steel. All ditches crossing county roads must be water packed to original compaction and run at right angles to the road and if and when the road is paved, the line must be replaced or cased at the owner's expense. They also must be buried to a depth of at least three feet below the barrow ditch.

Commissioners also agreed to pay the fire department of the city of Umberger \$100 for each fire they respond to in Deaf Smith County. This was decided on following a fire in the northeastern part of the county in which the Umberger Fire Department as summoned.

It was also agreed by the commissioners to pay the Chamber of Commerce \$800 for the Christmas decorations.

A fire report was also presented to the commissioners by city manager Dudley Bayne. The report indicated that there had been 26 fires in the county with 13 in the city limits and 13 being in the county, outside the city limits. Five of the 26 reported fires were car fires while two grass fires were also reported. There were 13 days during the month that fires were not reported while Nov. 21 and Nov. 19 had the most number of fires with three on each day.

A report was also presented to the commissioners by the tax office relative to taxing cattle in feed lots and individuals in the area counties and area communities.

For Deaf Smith County, taxing will be 33 cents for grade yearlings and 51 cents for grade cows. For the community's 14 feedlots, taxing is 44 cents for calves under 600 pounds and yearlings, 66 cents for an assessed value of 40 per cent at a \$2.26 rate.

Christmas holidays were also discussed by the county commissioners and it was decided that the county court house will close following business Dec. 24 and will resume business on Dec. 29. It was undecided on the holidays for New Year's Day, but plans will be worked out at the next meeting of the commissioners.

Approval was also given for up to \$2,000 for the purchase of an emergency vehicle to be used in the county to provide first aid in cases of emergency. The vehicle will be equipped with first aid materials, breathing apparatus and numerous other items for emergency purposes.

Program Is Granted 10-Year Extension

The 10-year extension and broadening of the Great Plains Conservation Program in legislation recently enacted by Congress can mean a doubling of the needed soil and water conservation work on Texas farm and ranch lands, District Conservationist J.C. Brown of the local USDA Soil Conservation Service said today.

The law extending the program, which was launched in 1957 to give landowners in the Great Plains help in building greater stability in farming and ranching enterprises, was signed by the President on Nov. 18, 1968. The program has been scheduled to end Dec. 31, 1971 but has now been extended to 1981. The legislation authorizes an additional \$150 million in Federal funds for the cost-sharing of conservation measures.

In addition to cost-sharing regular soil and water conservation work, the broadened program will provide for the enhancement of fish, wildlife and recreation resources on farms and ranches where it will improve the economic condition of landowners. It will also provide assistance on agriculture-related pollution problems in keeping with the program's overall objectives.

It also authorizes the Secretary of Agriculture to enter into contracts on land not generally considered to be agricultural but where erosion is so serious that conservation work is needed to protect farm or ranch holdings.

Brown pointed out that the law brings the responsibility of soil and water conservation districts more sharply into focus, stipulating that "approved conservation plans developed in cooperation with the soil and water conservation district in which their lands are situated shall form a basis for contracts."

The district conservationist described the Great Plains Conservation Program as a most useful tool for soil and water conservation districts in their effort to get greater resource and economic stability established in a region recognized for its agricultural risk.

"The success of this program can be assigned to the willingness of landowners to enter into formal contracts with the Secretary of Agriculture to move ahead faster toward completing the conservation job on their entire units," Brown said. "This often includes an agreement to shift cropland to grass where the cropland is incapable of sustained, safe production. The whole idea of the Great Plains Conservation Program is to enable the landowner to make needed changes in his cropping and grazing system, to change the use of his land as indicated by soil information, and to install needed soil and water conservation treatment measures."

"Nearly 500,000 acres of cropland have been planted to grass in Texas under the program," Brown said. He pointed out that an inventory of conservation needs show that 571,000 additional acres in the 99 Great Plains counties in Texas need to be returned to permanent vegetation. District Conservationist Brown said the latest checkup by SCS shows 34,862 farmers and ranchers in 434 counties in the 10 Great Plains states have entered the program with holdings covering over 2 million acres. More than one-third of the number have finished all needed conservation work. Federal money obligated for cost sharing in the program has amounted to nearly \$121 million with about \$2 million still to be paid as owners go ahead with their work.

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In Texas, 10,808 farmers and ranchers have signed contracts covering 13.7 million acres and obligating \$37 million in cost-share funds. Nearly 1,300 Texas farmers and ranchers have applications on file to take part in the program.

Local farmers and ranchers who have signed contracts to take part in the program include Bill Money, Mrs. Bobbie Metcalf, Bill Gudgeon, Leon Barnham and R. Q. Botkin, R. W. Elliston, J. H. Fish, Joe Story, Lowell Sharp and Joe Meyer.

The seeding of unsuitable cropland to grass, development of water resources, reduction of the soil erosion hazard through various conservation techniques, control of invading brush on rangeland, improvement of irrigation systems to use available water most efficiently, and better grassland management are among steps taken by landowners in the program to create resistance to drought and other emergencies.

This reduces suffering and financial stress once common in the Plains. Plains farmers and ranchers have returned nearly 2 million acres of hard-use cropland to grassland uses in the program.

Brown said that although the program in Texas has reduced dust storms on the Plains, the job is far from complete. He said a recent survey showed that only 15 per cent of all needed conservation work on the Plains has been done.

Auto Accident Claims Life Of G. R. Lunsford

G. R. (Speck) Lunsford, 57, a former resident of Hereford was killed in a car-truck collision Friday, Dec. 6 about 8:30 a.m. near Olney, Tex.

Mr. Lunsford's wife, Margaret, is a sister of Francis Hardwick, of Hereford.

Funeral services were held Sunday at Spur where he was in the theatre business. Burial was in an Olney cemetery.

Mr. Lunsford moved to Hereford in 1938 from Clovis and operated the theatres here until 1941 when he moved to Spur.

He was also editor of the Tri-County Shopper.

Beet Harvesting Is Consistant But Slow

A considerable change, especially from the aspect of the beet growing farmer, has occurred in the processing rate at Holly Sugar Corporation this year in comparison with previous manufacturing. The difference is more of a balance between harvesting and processing which is a necessity due to a lower quality in the sugar beets.

Hampered by rainy weather in earlier months, things have been going fairly well lately, according to Holly Agriculture manager Bob Ginn. "But we are behind compared to last year because we are not piling as many."

A vast number of beets appear to be piled on the yard but considering the tonnage processed per day the stock is small, Ginn said. "We have only a so called buffer out there now which is approximately a nine days supply. We are manufacturing around 6800 tons per day and as of Monday morning we had about 54,000 tons on hand."

"Right now we are trying to find out if we can keep the beets in piles. They seem to keep pretty good for nine days and we will most likely try for twelve or thirteen. If everything goes successfully we may get as high as twenty days supply." Ginn said that if they could successfully keep a twenty days supply without spoilage that they would finish with harvesting operations around the first of February.

Quality is still reported to be down on a higher basis this year due to weather conditions. Content has dropped to 10.8 from last year's 14.4 average.

Because of a drop in harvesting rate fewer people are on the job at Holly, Ginn commented. "We just didn't hire as many this year. We are working about fifty fewer people and just one shift. Last year we were working two shifts but this year's one is working twice as long."

The line of trucks waiting to dump has been reduced also. Last week before the snowy weather about twelve thousand tons were dumped, a large cut down from the twenty three thousand per week in 1968.

Although a more ideal situation this year for the plant, the farmers aren't quite as satisfied. "They would rather get dug," Ginn said. "They are geared to harvest a lot more beets than they are at the present. They only put in about a half a day's digging."

"They are harvesting in pools that is where growers in a number from four to ten pool together in using one harvester. Presently we have one hundred and forty harvesters in operation. This covers our growing area which involves the regions of Clovis, Wildorado Dumas, Etter, and Hereford."

Occasional snowing has slowed digging a bit but not to a great extent. Ginn reported that it was a little slower Saturday and Monday morning. "Some people's fields are naturally wetter than others and those that are wait a while to deliver."

"If it snows three feet tomorrow we will be in big trouble because of our small nine day supply but that isn't likely to happen. Snow on the ground doesn't affect our digging as much as the temperature. If it is freezing we can probably go ahead and dig but if it is warmer the snow will start to melt and we can't dig in the mud."

Ginn estimated harvesting operations were 32 percent complete but at the present it is hard to tell. They don't know how many acres will be fed to cattle and for this reason and unknown weather factors it is hard to pick a particular finishing date. Last year at this time farmers were almost through digging.

Hereford's division of Holly Sugar is considered the only plant with much harvesting yet to do. "The other plants are thorough as far as harvesting. They can't dig all winter like we can," Ginn said.

Wellington Rites Held Tuesday For J. B. Castleberry

Funeral services for John Benjamin Castleberry, 88, of Wellington, father of Mrs. James M. Gillentine, were conducted at 3 p. m. Tuesday in the First Baptist Church of Wellington where he was a member.

The Rev. Leroy Gaston, pastor, officiated. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery at Wellington. Local arrangements were by Gilliland Funeral Home.

Mr. Castleberry died Sunday night in Deaf Smith County Hospital following a long illness.

He was born May 14, 1882 in Cleveland, Ga. and married Bennie Bobo in 1911. She preceded him in death in 1952.

He opened the first bank in Dodsonville, now Dodson, and moved to Wellington in 1913 where he was in the banking and grocery business.

In 1917 he established one of the early automobile dealerships there. He served as mayor of Wellington from 1954 to 1956 and was a member of the school board for 20 years.

Active in civic work, Mr. Castleberry was a 50-year member of the Masonic Lodge. Survivors in addition to his daughter, include a son, Bobo of Wellington; one sister, Mrs. Bertha Custer of Los Angeles, Calif.; one brother, Gus of Bethesda, Md.; five grandchildren, Sara Durham of Amarillo, J. M. (Buz) Gillentine Jr. of Dallas, and Betsy, Susan and Kim Castleberry of Wellington; two great-grandchildren, J. M. Gillentine III and Judith Ann Durham.

At Board Meeting Programs, UIL Discussed

The acceptance of two resignations and a report by Walter Bryan on the vocational programs and organization of District 4-AAAA University Interscholastic League were the main topics and items handled by the Hereford Independent School District Board of Trustees in their regular meeting Tuesday night.

Resignations by Carol Armor, Stanton Junior High librarian, and Harvey Penner, high school industrial arts instructor, were approved by the board. Both will continue their present positions until mid-term.

Bryan, in discussing the various departments of the high school's vocational program, told the board, that since the inception of the program in 1965 when the program had only three teachers and seven classes, it has grown to its present eleven teachers and 16 classes. Average membership at the outset of the program in 1965 was 323.15 students and as of the reporting period this year, the total average membership has grown to 656.67.

In discussing the graphic arts department, Bryan said that while most schools have different opinions concerning the program, "now-a-days, circuitum education must go hand-in-hand with vocational education to prepare the student for the life ahead of them."

A house, which was begun last year by the building trades department of the high school, is very near completion, according to Bryan and a recent evaluation was taken on the building and plans have been made to sell the structure very soon.

Also undertaken by the building trades department was the building of a three-room addition in which classes will be held at the high school. Due to the extreme over-crowded conditions that have been felt at the high school the past couple of years, it was decided while teaching students a certain skill, they would also do something to change the crowded condition and thus the new three-room structure was begun.

The new "wing," which will be located on the north of the present high school building, has 2,500 square feet for the three rooms. Bryan pointed out that the present class rooms have an average of about 700 feet and the new rooms will be slightly larger. Each room, if present plans go right, will have central

heat and air-conditioning and will house three commercial subject classes for seven periods each day, thus relieving the present crowded condition. The new section will not be plumbred, Bryan pointed out, because its location makes it extremely accessible to four rest rooms in the main building. The section will also be a fiber board on the outside, well insulated, inside paneling and each room will be approximately 30 feet wide and 42 feet long.

Bryan estimated the completion date for mid-April of next year.

The electrical trades department of the high school vocational program was also discussed by Bryan as he pointed out that a Texas Education teacher has been in Hereford the past

(Continued from Page 1) few days, looking over the present program, pointing out the pros and cons of the Hereford system. "We do not want a program, whether it be auto mechanics, vocational office education or whatever, to be inferior to any of the others we have going here," Bryan said. "It was because of this that we invited the state teacher here to observe the program and give us aid as to what can be done to improve on it."

In this type of vocational program, Bryan said, we have always been faced with the problem that people think this is only a program for people with a low IQ, or who are not going to college, or we have no other place to put them. "We are going to remove this stigma," Bryan added, "and the only way we can is to get the top-notch students interested and involved in the program in the future."

In discussing the District 4-AAAA University Interscholastic League rules which will befall the local school system next year when they enter AAAA athletic and literary events, school superintendent Roy Hartman told the board of a meeting held recently in Plainview in which officials from Lubbock schools, Plainview and Hereford attended.

At the meeting, the new district, which will include three Lubbock schools, Plainview Hi-

gh School and Hereford, had drawn up a complete set of by-law and regulations governing activities of the schools.

Hartman pointed out that the new rules will govern all activities including literary events, one-act plays and athletics. The main topic of the meeting was the raise in reserve seat tickets for football games which was hiked to \$2 per game with students to pay their regular \$9 cents for advance tickets and \$1 tickets at the gate. Basketball prices were not effected by the district change and will remain at \$9 or students and \$1 for adults.

Spring football drills, which are legal for AAAA teams were also discussed, but no official word was received as to whether

Salvation Army's County Activities

The Hereford service unit of the Salvation Army aided a total of 250 persons during the last year. Service unit chairman Lowell Sharp said the local unit expended \$1,004.38 during the past year, in aid to local residents, and transients stranded while traveling thru in the county.

According to Mr. Sharp, the aid was in the form of groceries, shoes and clothing, medical aid, transportation and other services.

Of monies granted to the Salvation Army by the United Fund of Deaf Smith County, a third stays in the county to be utilized for local welfare. Mrs. Jewel Smith serves as welfare secretary, and screens applicants for aid in conjunction with the other seven members of the Hereford service unit. Chairman Sharp had high praise for the local service unit and the manner in which it handled welfare cases during the past year.

er Hereford would be able to hold them this year or not since they will not be AAAA until next fall officially.

In summing it up, Hartman said, "We have a lot of things to learn by going into a larger classification, and we have just begun to do so."

A report was also given on the football game receipts for the past season and they indicated that from the 35 games played, there was a net of \$12,597.57. The summary indicated that the Plainview Canyon, Dumas and Pampa games netted the most for the school system as far as total sales.

Enrollment totals were also released by school officials and they indicated that the present total of students enrolled in grades 1-12 is 134 more at this point than they were at this point last year while in grades K-12, they are 161 more than at the same time last year. This total, though, is 111 down from the last reporting period this year.

Officials stated that this is normal at this time of year, and they are hoping, with the opening of the Wilson & Company meat packing plant early next year, that the total will not decline as


it has done in the past about this time of year.

A membership summary for the first two six weeks of school showed a grand total of 5789 students enrolled for the first time in a Texas school in Hereford with a 95.3 percentage of attendance for all eight schools.

Following the approval of both the city and the county commissioners, the school board also approved a hike in the salary of J. W. McMorris, tax consultant for the county, from \$4500 to \$5500. Under the present condition, the city pays 15.55 per cent of his salary, the county 47.53 and the school district, 36.92. The increase will amount of \$1000.20 per year for the school.

Washington Report

From Congressman

The House of Representatives last week overwhelmingly approved a resolution backing President Nixon in his efforts to reach a just peace in Vietnam. I was happy to be a co-sponsor of this simple, straightforward and direct document which expresses the earnest hope of the American people for an honorable negotiated settlement to the war.

During debate on the floor of the House there was much discussion about the supposed policy implications in the resolution. As I pointed out in my remarks, however, the purpose of the resolution was not to state Congressional policy with respect to the war but merely to indicate to the North Vietnamese that the duly elected representatives of the American people support the President in his efforts to negotiate a just peace in Vietnam.

I hope and pray that the Communist overlords of North Vietnam realize that the 333 Congressmen who voted for this resolution represent threefourths of the people of the United States and this is a clear indication that this nation is not as bitterly divided as some people believe.

The Communists must realize that the rumblings of discontent they hear and demonstrations they see by no means represent the majority of the American people. Some of the protesters are dedicated anarchists, others are admitted hard-core Communists, and others are misguided social reformers.

I disagree with the protesters. I believe they are betraying the bloody sacrifices that our American soldiers have made to bring freedom to the people of South Vietnam. In addition, their actions are creating an illusion that a majority of Americans are ready to "cut and run."

As far as I am concerned the United States has no intention of deserting the valiant people of South Vietnam and leaving them to the bloody hands of the Communists.

Department Of Health Warns Of Unsafe Holiday Lighting

Martin Luther generally is credited with first using candles to decorate Christmas trees, and since his time people have been burning down their houses with unsafe Christmas tree practices.

There are right and wrong ways to go about decorating a tree, warns the Texas State Department of Health. The right way is the safe way.

Only freshly cut trees should be used. Saw off the trunk at an angle about an inch or more above the original cut and erect the tree so it stands in water.

Locate the tree away from sources of heat to prevent more rapid drying. Keep it away from exits and remove it as soon as possible after the holiday.

Wax candles should never be used on or near the tree. Use only lighting sets that bear the Underwriters' Laboratories (UL) label-not just the cords - and use them only for their intended purpose. Discard any lamp wiring that is frayed or badly worn.

Unplug the lights when not in the house or when going to bed. Avoid overloading circuits. A 15 amp fuse should be the maximum used.

Metallic trees should not be decorated with electric lights. Instead, use off-the-tree spot or flood lighting.

Keep trains, road racing sets and other electrical toys away from the tree. Sparks or short circuits could start a fire.

Use flame retardant flock in order to reduce the fire hazard. Sprayed-on, flame-retardant treatments by homeowners generally are not practical since effective application is difficult.

If you buy a plastic or metallized plastic tree, make certain that the materials burn slowly. If decorated with lights, determine that the branches do not conduct electricity before you make purchase. Again, select only those that have the UL label.

Trees are the focal point for holiday decorating, but safety should come before - or go along with-beauty.

LET'S COOK SOMETHING

Here's Dinner For Four

It's a great dish, this one of elegant lobster tails and hearty tomato sauce. Just right for a supper party for four. Serve it with spaghetti, salad and crusty bread and you'll have your main course made. Dessert can be a simple one of fruit or a sumptuous one of rum cake.

The sauce accompanying the lobster tails will have just the right consistency if you use the kind of tomatoes specified and cook according to directions. We have tried lots of Marinara Sauces and this is one of the very

best. Old-style Italian cooks strain their Marinara Sauce but today's young generation often serves it as given here.

LOBSTER TAILS

MARINARA

- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 small onion, finely chopped (1/4 cup)
- 1 very small carrot, finely chopped (about 1/4 cup)
- 1 large clove garlic, peeled and minced
- 1 can (1 pound, 12 ounces) pear-shaped Italian-style peeled tomatoes
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon dried crumbled basil
- 1/2 teaspoon dried crumbled oregano
- 2 packages (each 9 ounces) frozen South African lobster tails
- Sliced whole-milk mozzarella cheese (from a 1/2-pound package)
- 1/2 pound spaghetti

In a medium saucepan (about 3 quarts) simmer the olive oil, onion, carrot and garlic, stirring often, for about 5 minutes.

Add undrained tomatoes; with a wooden spoon, mashing against side of pan, thoroughly break up tomatoes.

Add salt, sugar, pepper, basil

and oregano. Let bubble gently, stirring often and continuing to break up tomatoes, until quite thick - about 30 minutes; keep hot.

Cook the lobster tails according to package directions using the amount of water and salt called for; remove shells leaving tails whole.

Pour the hot tomato sauce into a 1 1/2-quart oblong glass baking dish (10 by 8 by 1 1/2 inches) or similar utensil. Arrange the lobster tails over the sauce. Place a slice of mozzarella over each lobster tail.

Broil, close to high heat, until cheese is melted - this will take only a minute or so.

Meanwhile cook the spaghetti according to package directions and drain. Accompany the lobster tails and sauce with the spaghetti. If you like, pass grated Parmesan cheese.

Makes 4 servings.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES — A Texas law requiring publication twice in a newspaper of political subdivision land up for sale does not repeal the statute requiring commissioners courts to appoint a commissioner to dispose of county real estate at auction, says Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin.

"Hospital administrators may refuse to furnish to a widow medical records of a former patient who died shortly after discharge from the hospital."

"Local school fund assignment credit for federal-owned military posts must be proportionately computed on the basis of total territory in the district, including that resulting from annexation of another school district."

"Garden clubs which are institutions of 'purely public charity' can be exempt from property tax."

"Salary supplements to get doctors and dentists for state hospitals are legal."

"Former legislators seeking state retirement benefits must under a new provision, make application by January 1 and pay prior-year contributions."

"Persons who are employees of a participating sub-division on the effective date of its joining Texas County District Retirement System automatically become members on the effective date of the agreement."

COURTS SPEAK — Texas Supreme Court refused to change its rule that the Sunday closing law is constitutional. However, it granted a motion by challengers to stay its mandate pending appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court.

Federal district court here threw out atheist Madalyn Murray O'Hair's suit to prevent broadcasting of prayer and Bible readings by astronauts from outer space. She said she will appeal.

State Supreme Court agreed to send back for retrial a medical malpractice suit brought by a farmworker against an Ennis doctor.

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Better Business Bureau Warns Of Dubious Plans

Promoters of dubious plan for losing weight with little or no effort are going far afield for fresh material, Deal Smith County Chamber of Commerce noted today.

Bill Thompson, manager of the chamber, affiliated through membership with the National Better Business Bureau, cited a recent plan that was touting a "Japanese system" — until the Post Office Department put a stop to the mail order promotion.

This diet plan first was announced in mailings from Japan and then, after a fraud order was issued, from Hong Kong until a false representation order was issued.

NBBB said the literature, written in the form of a testimonial said:

"The Japanese system to lose weight is easy but different. . . I discovered the secret of how the Japanese keep thin. The Japanese eat the same food we do. They seem to eat all the time. This proven system is different because it lets you eat all you want — not starve yourself. . . This Japanese system is not a diet. . . There are no exercises, no hunger pains, you follow the simple system, eat all you want, and the weight comes off."

Persons who responded to the offer received a 46-page report on through balance. One card that told about dietary regulations: "You eat nothing that has been precooked, dried and packaged before it gets to you."

This rule, according to NBBB, eliminates all sugar and flour. However, the rule goes on to include canned food but not dried,

processed food.

NBBB has consistently questioned advertising claims for alleged weight reduction products, plans, methods and systems that imply or promise rapid or specific weight loss in a short period of time, permanent weight reduction through a single or final regimen, and lack of effort, restraint or dietary modification.

"Significant weight loss should be sought under medical supervision," NBBB states, "since the reasons for excessive fat, which may or may not be due to dietary excess, require professional diagnosis and care. Nutritional needs of each individual must be considered in any dietary modification."

When confronted with an effortless diet plan, says NBBB, dieters should consider whether the promotion will relieve them of weight or cash.
