**Eastern Star to Sponsor Rainbow Assembly Here**

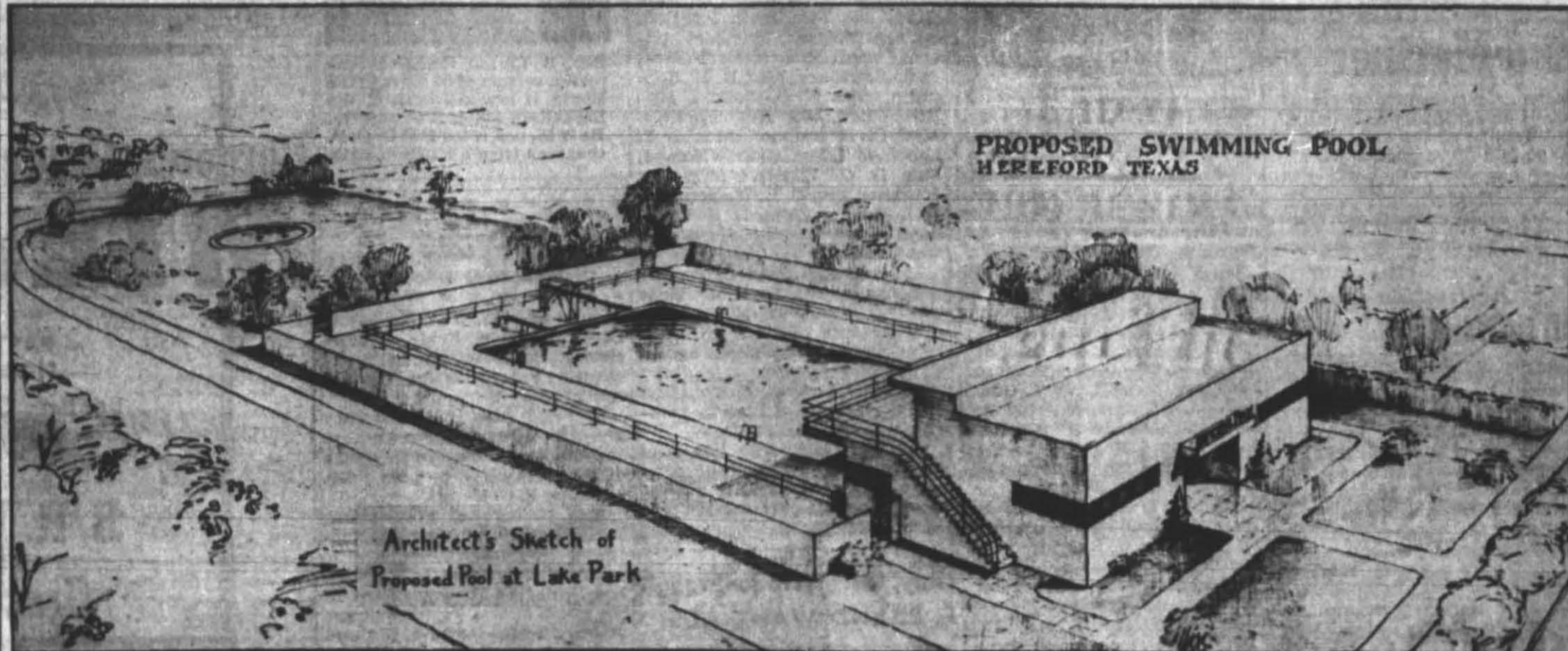

**City Fathers Ask \$50,000 Bond Issue**

A special city election to vote on the issuance of \$50,000 in bonds for construction of proposed improvements to the city parks in Hereford has been ordered by Mayor E. S. Ireland for Tuesday, April 30.

The specific purpose for which the bonds would be issued is the construction of a municipal swimming pool and bath houses at Lake Park.

A petition signed by more than 150 citizens asking that the election be called was presented to the City Commission on March 4.

Action on the petition has been delayed while the commission secured a ruling from the Attorney General of Texas regarding the legality of issuing bonds for the purpose of constructing a swimming pool.

The Attorney General's Office has advised City Attorney James W. Witherspoon that: "We know of no statute authorizing the issuance of tax bonds by a city for the purpose of constructing or building a swimming pool. However, we call to your attention the fact that a city may issue bonds for the purpose of erecting and constructing improvements to the parks of said city, and use the proceeds of said bonds for the purpose of constructing a swimming pool in said park, which would be improving same."

The proposition will be stated on the election ballot, therefore, as "for the purpose of constructing and erecting improvements to the parks of the City of Hereford" with the understanding, Mayor Ireland pointed out, that the bonds would be used for the construction of a swimming pool. **Surprise Upset Features City School Board Election Here**

**Boyce House To Speak to High School Students**

Citizens of Hereford will have an opportunity to hear Texas' most successful author, Boyce House of Fort Worth, when he speaks to the students of the high school at 11:15 A. M. Wednesday, April 17. The public is invited. There is no admission charge.

House wrote "I Give You Texas" which broke all Lone Star State records by selling 115,000 copies, and "Tall Talk from Texas," 70,000 copies. Texans in the armed forces all over the world received copies of these books of Texas humor. One reviewer said: "He set in motion a wave of laughter that encircled the earth." His humor has been quoted in Life magazine, Coronet, Saturday Review of Literature, New York Herald-Tribune and other national publications.

Each Sunday at 5 p. m. House is heard over KGNC (Amarillo) and other stations, by an estimated 375,000 people. His "column" appears in 200 papers with over a million readers. The Hereford Independent School district board election took a surprise turn Saturday afternoon when three write-in candidates polled a heavy vote to unseat the three members of the board who were candidates for re-election.

Leo Forrest, Henry Sears, and Sylvester Slagle were elected to the board in a surprise write-in campaign which placed them on top in the balloting by a landslide margin.

Slagle led the balloting with 83 votes, and Forrest and Sears each polled 78.

D. H. Alexander, C. M. Hicks, and Louie LeGrand, candidates for re-election, whose names were the only ones to appear on the ballot, trailed far behind the three leaders. Alexander and LeGrand each polled 23 votes, and Hicks received 20. Homer Brumley received five write-in votes for the city board.

An interesting sidelight on the election is the fact that Alexander, Hicks and LeGrand were elected to the school board six years ago in almost exactly the same sort of write-in balloting which defeated them for re-election this year.

**Light Vote Is Cast in County Board Election**

A light vote was cast in most districts in the county school board elections Saturday, with little opposition developing in most contests.

The only close election was in Wycbe (District 4) where Ira Scott was elected district trustee with 23 votes, and W. P. Aze was a close runner-up with 18. Ira Ott received 1 vote. Dock Roberson, trustee from that district, was not a candidate for re-election.

E. H. Norton was re-elected county school trustee from the county at large with 125 votes. There was no opposition candidate.

G. W. Wilson was re-elected County School Trustee from Commissioner District No. 3 with 9 votes cast. There was no opposition.

Moody Stephan was elected trustee for District No. 4 (Summerfield) with 17 votes. He succeeds L. H. Lookingbill.

Fred T. Fain was named trustee from District No. 2 (Dawn) with 29 votes, succeeding Carl Wimberly, who received two votes despite his announcement that he would not accept re-election. One ballot was cast for Johnny Womble.

**Seventh Grade Boys Organize Boat Club at Central School; Build and Launch First Boat Tuesday**

A dozen Seventh Grade boys, under the direction of their teacher, Frank Jones, have organized a Boat Club at Central School and working at odd hours after school, have built themselves a quite acceptable boat.

The craft was displayed on the vacant lot across the street north of the Bank Tuesday, and was officially launched in Terra Blanca Creek Tuesday afternoon.

The boys will practice on the creek until they learn to handle a boat, Jones said. Later, the boat may be equipped with a small sail and turned into a small cat-boat.

When the project was started two months ago, the boys plan-

ned to build two boats and stage races on the creek. Difficulties in getting materials and tools, however, have held up construction on the companion craft.

Twelve boys, Rayburn Strange, Bedford Forrest, Wayne Stagner, Nell Witherspoon, Carroll Cross, Billy Don Engman, Jack McCracken, Kenneth Carroll, Don Hooper, Leo Hicks, Alton Brock, and Kenneth Brock, cooperated on the project. Each boy contributed \$1.50 toward the cost of materials.

Since Central School has no workshop, Mr. Jones helped the boys to install an old work bench from the highschool in an unused store room, and with tools borrowed from the Janitor and their teacher and brought

by the boys themselves, the work was done.

"The boys worked after school about every other afternoon for nearly two months," Jones said. "They did the work themselves . . . I just stood by and watched."

When the problem of oarlocks arose, Jones said, one of the youngsters, Carroll Cross, offered to do the job and, working in his uncle's blacksmith shop, turned out a professional welding job on the four oar locks and sockets.

### Fertilizers for Irish Potatoes Recommended

COLLEGE STATION, — The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station recommends that commercial fertilizers for Irish potatoes in the High Plains area of Texas be applied at the rate of 600 pounds of 8-12-4 or 800 pounds of 6-8-4 fertilizer per acre.

A tremendous increase in the number of irrigation wells dug recently, and the newness of pump irrigation are taken by D. L. Jones, superintendent of the Lubbock substation, to indicate an eventual increase in High Plains acreage devoted to some intensive crop with potentially high returns.

Irish potato production is a comparatively new crop in the High Plains, and an active demand and high prices received during the war period preclude any forecast as to the future economic importance of its production in that area.

Some of the factors met in Irish potato production in that part of the State are analyzed in a report just released by the Station entitled, "Fertilizers for White Potatoes in the High Plains of Texas." Data shown are based on a three-year study ending in 1945.

"RESOLUTION" BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HEREFORD, TEXAS, CALLING AN ELECTION ON THE QUESTION OF THE ISSUANCE OF \$50,000.00 BONDS FOR THE ERECTION AND CONSTRUCTION OF IMPROVEMENTS TO THE PARKS OF THE CITY OF HEREFORD.

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Hereford deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City of Hereford for the purposes hereinafter mentioned;

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HEREFORD, TEXAS:

1. That an election be held in the said City of Hereford, Texas, on the 30th day of April, 1946, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

PROPOSITION 'SHALL THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF HEREFORD, TEXAS, be authorized to issue the bonds of said City of Hereford in the amount of \$50,000.00, maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the City Commission, the maximum maturity date being not more than forty (40) years from their date, and bearing interest at the rate of not to exceed two per cent (2%) per annum, payable semi-annually and to levy a tax sufficient to pay interest as it accrues, and principal as it matures, on said issue of bonds, for the purpose of erecting and constructing improvements to the parks of the city of

Hereford, as authorized by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas; the same to be known as Park Improvement Bonds.

2. The said election shall be held in the City Hall within said City, and the following named persons are hereby appointed Directors of said election, to-wit: Alvin C. Thompson Presiding Judge;

Paul Mathers Judge; Mrs. Nona Jowell Clerk; Mrs. Vern Witherspoon Clerk.

3. The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 23 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas of 1925, as amended, including the provisions of Article 704, as amended by Chapter 382, passed at the First Call Session of the Forty-fourth Legislature, and only legally qualified electors, who own taxable property in the City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be qualified to vote.

4. The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

PROPOSITION 'FOR THE ISSUANCE OF PARK IMPROVEMENT BONDS,' 'AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF PARK IMPROVEMENT BONDS.'

Concerning said proposition each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on such proposition.

5. A substantial copy of this Resolution signed by the Mayor of said City of Hereford, and attested by the City Clerk, shall serve as proper notice of said election. Notice shall be given in accordance with Article 704, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended by Chapter 382 passed at the First Call Session of the Forty-fourth Legislature, supra. The Mayor is authorized and directed to have a copy of said notice posted at the City Hall and at two other public places

within the Corporate Limits of said City not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the date fixed for holding said election. He is also directed to cause said notice to be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper within said City, the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the date set for said election. Except as otherwise provided in

said Article 704, as amended, said election shall be governed by the laws governing general elections. PASSED, ADOPTED and APPROVED this 8 day of April, 1946.

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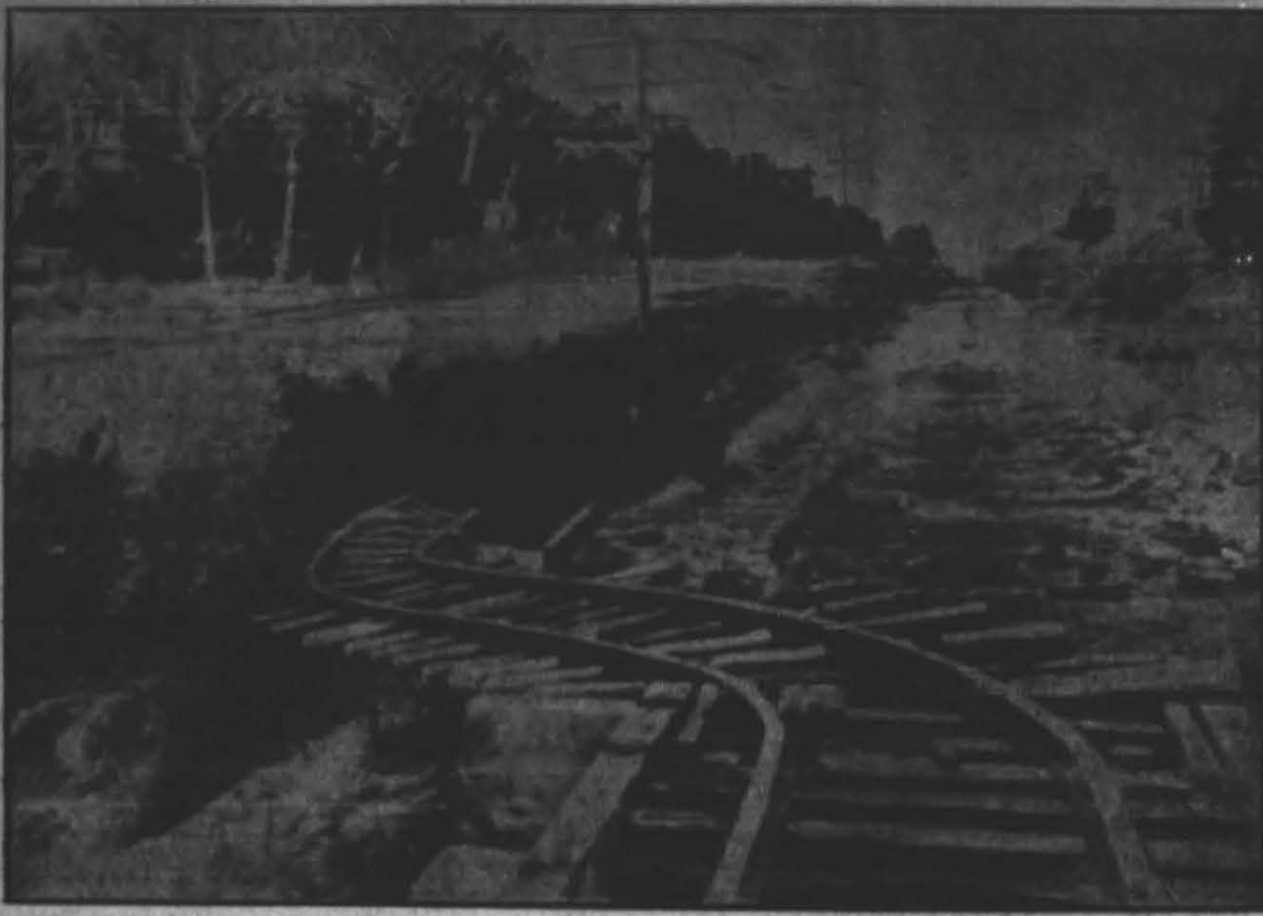

The porcelain hoods on these lights cost about \$12 apiece, he pointed out, and the expense to the city of replacement amounts to a considerable sum.

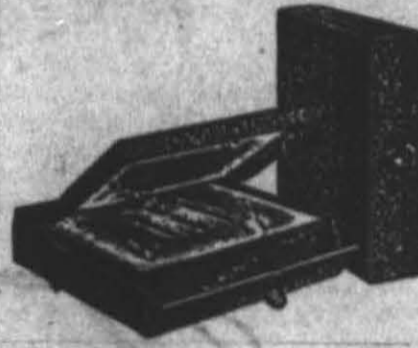
