# Fuston elected school board head, Wilson, Moore sworn into office

John Fuston was elected by acclamation as president of the Hereford Schools board of trustees Tuesday night following the installation of two new board members, Shirley Wilson and Kathy Moore, elected Saturday.

Acclamation also seated Bud Patterson as vice president and Steve Coneway as secretary.

Wilson and Moore take the seats of former board president Marilyn Culpepper and Cal Jones whose terms had expired. Jones had resigned due to an out of state move and Culpepper declined re-election.

Decision on the teacher career ladder procedure was tabled after the board decided to study the possibility of placing the district's nine media specialists on the career ladder program, although that move is not required by the state educational reform law, HB 72.

Rose Mary Shook, media specialist at Shirley Intermediate School, told the board that 15 other school districts in the state have agreed to place librarians on the career ladders and noted that there was some state money available for the salary increases on the ladder for

librarians. Shook said her contract with the district did have her designated as a "teacher" and reminded the board that higher pay is not a reason teachers enter the media field. State administrators had said the ladder program was designed to keep good teachers in the classroom and from pursuing more lucrative jobs in education.

Patterson, Wilson and Bill Townsend were named to a Career Ladder Committee to study the issue.

Superintendent Harrell Holder noted that the media specialists have been given "excellent" evaluations by their principals.

Concerning media facilities, the board voted to hold out for a \$5,000 cut on a contract from White-Prutzman on the construction of the Aikman media center. Holder and Coneway inspected the construction and found that some of the shelving was not adequately built. White-Prutzman offered to settle for \$2,000 less than the original contract of

Another settlement on a contract with BGR was tabled pending negotiations with White-Prutzman.

Marc Williamson, assistant superintendent, said recommendations on summer school for 1986 included tightening eligibility deadlines and reducing the size of the classes. Deadline for registration will be May 17 in order to better plan classes and arrange for teachers.

Secondary summer session will be June 9 through July 18 at the high school. Elementary classes will be July 7 through August 15 with venue to be decided upon enrollment figures.

Williamson anticipates 300 students in both sessions. Last year

Holder said he has asked the staff to meet with parents of children who need summer school and encourage participation.

Recommendation on elementary report cards are still being studied, but indicate a lighter load for teachers if approved. Suggestions have been to send the standard report card every six weeks, sending

progress reports only at the request of the parent, teachers meeting with each student's parent during the first week of school and continue parentteacher sessions as needed in through the year. Also being studied is a more workable mathematics report form.

Rick Hutson requested the district look into sending teachers to a training center in Lubbock for a session on correcting dyslexia, which his son has been diagnosed as having. Holder said several teachers have expressed interest in the program in Lubbock and another in Fort Worth. Holder said approximately 15 percent of the Hereford's students may have the learing disability in varying degrees. How teachers will be trained will be studied by a committee.

# Interest to boost output

WASHINGTON (AP) - Economic growth in industrialized as well as developing countries is expected to average a modest 3 percent in 1986, despite a boost from lower oil prices and interest rates, the International Monetary Fund said today.

Despite the benefits of lower oil prices, virtually all developing countries will continue to be plagued with huge debts in the coming years, the report said. Hardest hit will be those

developing countries like Mexico that are also oil producers.

The new IMF report said it sees production for the world's nations. excluding the Soviet Union and some of its East European allies, as growing by 3 percent in 1986 and 3.3 percent in 1987.

It estimated that the U.S. economy would grow by 3.8 percent in 1986 and 3.4 percent in 1987. The Reagan administration has predicted 4 percent growth in both years.

"There is likely to be a substantial shift of real incomes from oil exporting to oil importing countries," said

the report, released at a meeting of the 149-nation IMF and World Bank.

In a related development, a group of 10 major industrial nations in the IMF and World Bank vowed to strengthen the organizations' watch over economic performance in those countries receiving loans.

A joint communique issued by the 10 nations shortly before midnight Tuesday suggested the possibility of using economic indicators, including money exchange rates, to help forge future loan policy.

# Libyan-trained terrorists arrested

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) - Security forces have arrested two Libyan-trained terrorists sent to South Africa to assassinate prominent black leaders, Deputy Information Minister Louis Nel said to-

Nel, at a news conference in Cape Town, said the men were members of the Pan African Congress, a black nationalist guerrilla group, and were arrested during the last weekend in

He said they had flown on a Libyan airliner to Tanzania, then traveled to

Botswana before entering South

He declined to say where they were apprehended or how large a group they were working with, but he did say a third person, as yet unidentified, was arrested with them.

Nel said the two arrested suspects were among a group of 150 Pan African Congress members who received political and military training in Libya starting in 1982.

He said they were sent to South Africa to mobilize black university (See TERRORISTS, Page 2)

The Patels were honored as Family of the Year recently. Patel believes the family as a whole is a very important part of his physican's

practice as well as his own being. "We have seen that there are a ood number of family members iting while a patient's in the pital. And in this part of the country, families seem to stay with the patient," Patel said.

### Families seem to stay with patients

"I stress this very much. I would like to see all the family members stay with the patients all the time," he admitted. He explained that often the city lifestyle makes it very dif-

Patel said he and his family came to the United States from their native India because of its advanced

"Technology in the U.S. concern-ing medicine is so advanced because of challenge," said Dr. Patel. He said practicing with this technology

makes his line of work more challenging and interesting, especially with the advancements of diagnostic equipment in the laboratory and the X-ray depart-

"The people here are more familiar and educated regarding the diseases that it is more appealing

Although requirements for being a doctor in India are similar to being a doctor here, Patel said med-school is very hard in India.

'To get into medical college is also extremely difficult because of very high percentage marks," said Patel. He explained that a student had to pass with an 85 percentage of all basic subjects just to get into college

"Medical seats are hard to get into worldwide as it is here, I'm sure," said Patel. Passing the Federal License Examination with a good percentage, Dr. Patel said he could practice almost anywhere.

# Alien apprehensions on rise

DALLAS (AP) - The United States must find ways to curtail a record number of illegal aliens entering the country and protect jobs for the unemployed, an Immigration and Naturalization Service of-

Acting INS southern region director David Vandersall, basing his projection on field reports compiled for the first half of fiscal year 1986, said more than 337,000 illegal aliens were apprehended over a six-month period.

The figure released Tuesday for the 13-state area, from New Mexico to Florida and along the Eastern seaboard to North Carolina. represents a 42 percent increase over the same period during fiscal

"Illegal aliens don't complain about lower wages, and he can be taken advantage of more than the U.S. citizen," Vandersall said. "It's not a good situation we have. The only way to control our borders is to eliminate the illegal alien's motivation to come to this

Vandersall attributed the increasing influx to economic problems in Mexico and Central America.

## Congressmen urge better relations

EL PASO, Texas (AP) - United States relations with Mexico must be made a top foreign policy priority if the border's economy is to be helped, a U.S. representative told the International Trade Commission.

"We tend to conduct trade and diplomatic relations with Mexico on a crisis basis, and each U.S. agency seems to have its own independent Mexico policy," U.S. Rep. Ronald Coleman, D-Texas, said

Coleman and U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, were among several witnesses testifying before the commission, which scheduled a hearing on border trade in San Diego, Calif., Thursday. Bentsen said he opposes a proposal by the Reagan Administration

to cut down on the number of U.S. Customs Service employees. "Customs produces more revenue than it spends," he said. "They

collect \$17 for every dollar appropriated to them." A cutdown on Customs personnel at border points would slow down

traffic at ports of entry and discourage tourism and commerce between the two countries, Bentsen said.

Trade between the United States and Mexico has increased in the three years since the peso devaluation in 1982 but the prospect of continued growth is not good, Bentsen said.

# National Voters make Eastwood's day

CARMEL-BY-THE-SEA, Calif. (AP) - Clint Eastwood, hero of detective films and spaghetti westerns, proved to be as big a draw at the polling place as the box office as voters turned out in record numbers to make him mayor.

Smiling broadly, Eastwood said the triumph "ranks solidly" with his successes as a director and star. "It's a hit movie at the moment," he said.

"It's surprising and yet it's not surprising," the star of 40 movies and one election said in his victory speech Tuesday night. "I knew there was a lot of dissatisfaction.

"I think the great turnout of th which we won are very important."

According to complete but unofficial results, Eastwood had 2,166 votes, or 72.2 percent, to 799 votes, or 26.6 percent, for two-time incumbent-Charlotte Townsend. Two other candidates had a total of 37 votes, or 1.2 percent.

Business was brisk at all four polling places in the 1-square-mile village, with 72.5 percent of the 4,142 registered voters turning out. City clerk Jeanne Brehmer said that in five years in office, turnout hasn't topped 30 percent.

"It was a fantastic, enthusiastic turnout," said official poll watcher Louis LaBarbera. "A lot of young people voted and a lot of the retired people. Some had trouble getting here, in wheelchairs and all, but they came."

# Challenger debris to be displayed

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) - Members of the National Transportation Safety Board were set to give the first public viewing of the space shuttle Challenger wreckage recovered from the ocean and laid out in two hangars.

NTSB expert Terry Armentrout, who is aiding NASA in an investigation of the Challenger accident, was to brief reporters today on the progress of attempts to assemble and study the winged spacecraft's wreckage.

Reporters were then to be allowed to walk through the hangars for a look at the space shuttle parts that have been laid out on a grid.

Between 12 percent and 14 percent of Challenger's wreckage has been recovered, J.R. Thompson, vice chairman of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration investigation task force, said in a briefing Tuesday.

The recovered debris includes parts of the crew cabin, the wings, external fuel tank and chunks of the solid rocket booster hulls.

A search of the ocean floor for more debris will continue through April, Thompson said. Nine ships and three small submarines are taking part.

Officials hope to recover key parts of the right solid rocket booster. Thompson said a faulty joint in that booster definitely caused the Jan. 28 explosion that destroyed Challenger and killed its crew of

Challenger blew up just 73 seconds after being laucnhed from the Kennedy Space Center. Debris was scattered over a wide area of the Atlantic Ocean just offshore from the space center.

Also brought from their homeland is the Patel's religion, Hinduism. But we also have different religions in India. We have Baptists, the majority is of Hindus, but there are also Christians," said Patel.

"Our basic beliefs are God is everywhere, he has created everything, living or dead. That is the reason we pray as a family every morning and evening," said Patel.

"My prayers include asking 'God help me to live my day to day life in such a way where I don't hurt anybody's feelings, help myself in healing, major operations- critical operations, the elderly that you help me to not lose any patients. I appreciate You Good Lord, that has not happened, yet," smiled Patel.

Patel prays for the elderly because he has a soft place in his heart for them. He formerly worked in a nursing home with elderly patients and said he became more particular in his pronunciation to make sure they could understand.

"I have no problem in making even 95-year-old patients in understanding. I explain their disease and the operating procedure in real detail and they are understanding it very well. The outcome is great," said the doctor. He added that it was also important to him to be able to explain to the family and include postoperative treatment too.

"Once you explain to the family they are very much willing to work with the patient and I encourage this," said Dr. Patel.

He explained that people from India are very pro-family, this includes the first generation from which they

As a family they pray together, play together, and help each other. "We try to stay together and believe in family bonding, not necessarily between husband, wife and children, but also in parents and grandparents," said Patel.

Both Dirajh and Indu's mothers live with them.

"I believe the parents and the grandparents should stay with their children as it used to be," Patel says. "All of our brothers and sisters live here in the states. So our parents visit all of us for a month or two months at a time."

"My wife and I think they should stay all of the time with us," he grinned. "I can go one step further, that I wished P cont have brothers and sisters, so I don't have to share."

Indu said her husband has two live honest, decent lives. Also to brothers and three sisters and she has two brothers and a sister. "So that's a big family to share," she laughed.

Being Hindus, religion is a vital link handed down through their family, but this family is more modern in its beliefs than past generations, but they still have customs that will never pass.

"Even in India educated and all people (the majority) eat meat," said Patel. He and his family enjoy eating out and eat all kinds of foods.

Patel particularly believes in eating meat because of essential amino acids and protein found in it. "But I believe in eating vegetables also a few times week. Because you've got to eat meat, but not necessarily three times a day due to heart disease and some form of malignancy," he explained.

Patel and his family, and most Indians, reserve a room at home for worshipping. "We have a prayer room at home, most all Indians here do," said Patel. "Some of the bigger cities, like New York, Chicago, Los Angeles, have Hindu temple because they have a lot of Indians there. The

majority of them are professionals." In India women wear saris, long gowns made of sheer material wrap-

ped around a cropped blouse on top. 'In India we wear saris at home and everywhere- in fact it is our

custom," said Indu. "But here we wear all type of clothing and we wear saris to our Indian functions such as our Indian Christmas, Indian New Year, and all of our Indian holidays," she said.

"When we go to prayers, gathering in different homes every Saturday or Sunday, we wear our custom dress." Indu said Indian women don't make saris, but they buy them from sari palaces in big cities. The closest stores are in Dallas, Houston and Oklahoma City.

The family also travels extensively to visit family, attend medical conferences, and to participate in tennis tournaments.

"Even in medical conferences we go together," said Patel. "I try to attend the conferences when they have a vacation break from school."

The doctor and his wife do not leave their boys at home when travelling. One medical conference the boys particularly remember is a trip to Hawaii. When they flew in, the boys got to see Mount Mauna Loa erupting.

"Really, I stress vacationing together to such an extent that if there is any budget problem-that we don't go," said Patel.

The couple emphasizes marriage being a main ingredient in keeping their family together. "All Indians are very non-violent and family oriented because that is how we are raised and we hope that will continue at any cost," said Indu.

"Also the marriage life is very different," added Patel, who has been married to Indu for 17 years.





The only hits Lubbock Coronado could get off Anderson were two singles in the first inning and a triple



captured each of the alligators at the farm, determined their sex and then tagged them.

"This is the only project in crocodilian behavior in which each animal has been marked," said Vliet, who did his undergraduate work on reptiles at the University of Oklahoma.

Athough Vliet has been studying alligators for five years, he continues to be amazed by the reptiles, which he said are the closest living link to the dinosaurs.

"One of the things that continues to strike me is their incredible range of habitats and their ability to eat an incredible range of things," he said. "They have real small brains and are not intelligent in the ways we are intelligent. But they are much sharper than people are aware."

The alligators he works with now recognize him. His research also has shown that they are aware of their environment and potential food

# Concerning homosexual donors

DEAR ANN LANDERS: If a person suspects he may have been exposed to the AIDS virus, does he have the right to join the Living Bank?

I am a middle-aged male, homosexual (selective and discreet) who wants to donate as much of my body as might be of use.

Now with the AIDS crisis, I wonder if any part of my body (I am thinking specifically of my eyes) might possibly infect someone after my death. Also if my body is rejected because tests showed I had been exposed to AIDS, would my family be told? (I have never been able to admit the truth about my lifestyle to any relative).

Please don't suggest I check with my doctor. He believes the current tests are too inaccurate to predict whether I have the disease or even if I have been exposed to it. He also believes that any homosexual who has had sex with another man in the past five years has probably been exposed to the virus even though he may never come down with symp-

Should I resign from the Living Bank?-STILL IN THE CLOSET

DEAR STILL: I asked Anthony S. Fauci, M.D., to respond to your question. Dr. Fauci is Director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases at the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, Md.

He said, "The official guidelines for donating blood (as well as organs) state that a male who has had a homosexual relationship with another male since 1977 should refrain from donating blood. Since the guidelines for donating organs are essentially the same as those for donating blood, your correspondent should not be donating organs and should resign from the Living Bank. "Even if he took the test for antibodies and they were negative and he continued to expose himself to the virus by homosexual activity, there is a chance that he would be infected during his next sexual encounter. All practicing homosexuals should resign from the Living Bank."

DEAR DR. FAUCI: Thanks for an answer that should clear the air for many readers who have been unclear about this issue.

For the sixth straight year, tuitions at many colleges will increase faster than the nation's inflation rate.

The reasons schools offer for the rising costs have grown so familiar you can almost hum along. Professors' salaries

haven't made up ground lost in the inflationary 1970s. Classroom buildings and dorms are crumbling.

Books and lab supplies cost a bundle. Federal student aid is

shrinking. Next fall's tuition increases won't be as steep as four or five years ago when inflation was just beginning to cool and colleges were announcing stunning increases of 15 percent or more. But they are

At Swarthmore College in Pennsylvania, tuition, fees, room and board will rise 11 percent, to \$15,650. Harvard's will cost \$16,145, up 6.9 percent, Yale will go up 6.8 percent to \$16,040.

Syracuse University will go up 7.5 percent; St. Lawrence

University in New York state 9.4 percent; Vanderbilt University 9.4 percent; Rollins College in Winter Park, Fla., 9.1 percent; Massachusetts Institute of Technology 6 percent; University of Miami 8.7 percent, Grinnell College in Iowa

8.6 percent. Many colleges are still deciding next fall's rates. But it appears average increases may come close to last year's 7 percent, about 3 percent above the national inflation rate in 1985. That follows increases averaging 7 percent in 1984-85, 11 percent in both 1963-84 and 1982-83, and 13 percent in 1981-82, increases that exceeded the nation's inflation rate.

Is this justified, as higher education officials insist? Or was U.S. Assistant Secretary of Education Chester E. Finn Jr. right when he recently criticized higher education's "tweedy inefficiencies" like faculty tenure that keep costs perennially high?

There's truth on both sides. A recent analysis by the

Paul, standing before the people at the Mars Hill forum, addressed them as follows: "Men of Athens. I notice that you are very religious, for as I was out walking I saw your many alters, and one of them had this incription on it -- 'To the Unknown God.' You have been worshiping Him without knowing who He is, and now I wish to tell you about Him.

"He made the world and everything in it, and since He is Lord of heaven and earth, He doesn't live in man - made temples; and human hands can't minister to His needs -- for He has no needs! American Association of University Professors found that average professors' salaries have begun to rebound. Full professors now are paid an average \$42,500. But their salaries still buy less than they did in the late 1960s and early 1970s.

Many colleges postponed building maintenance in the 1970s, and now students have to pay the bill.

Campus energy costs are dropping, but the savings have been offset by rising insurance rates at some schools, like Mills College in Oakland, Calif. Spokeswoman Susan Shea

said the school was about to increase its tuition by about 9 percent, but a sudden big jump in insurance costs has forced the school to recalculate.

Others point out that tuition typically covers only a fraction of the cost of college. Federal student aid in fiscal 1986 was about \$4.8 billion, roughly the same as the previous year, but was worth less due to inflation. The Gramm-Rudman budget balancing law may require deeper cuts, and schools are having to devote more of their resources to provide grants and loans.

Yale spokesman Walter Littell said tuition covered only about half the cost of an education at his school. But critics say there are

less justifiable reasons for the rise of tuitions. "The trouble is that there are happy customs of the academic profession that get in the way, like being on tenure," said Harold Howe II, a Harvatt Alecturer and former Uncommissioner of educatio Winder President Lyndon o nson.

"In higher education the public is asked to just sit back and take it. I don't think it's reasonable to assume, frankly, that every time a college fixes its roof that the federal taxpayers should provide more student aid," said Finn.

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
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
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
