## Building Permits Total Over \$60,000 Predicted Postwar Boom Underway

Despite continued material shortages in some lines, the predicted post-war building boom is well underway in Hereford, with construction estimated at more than \$60,000 in value now in progress.

Building permits on file at the city office show six business buildings and six residences now under construction, and other building is in progress though no permits have been filed as yet.

Permits on file include the following:

A concrete garage and filling station is being built by Roy Wagner on Lots 7, 8 and 9, Block 25, Whitehead Addition. Estimated cost, \$12,000.

The entire country is lagging in support of the drive, but Texas, which has exceeded every quota in previous drives, ranks 48th in the list of states; and Deaf Smith County is 122nd of the 256 counties in Texas.

E Bond sales took a spurt this week with the impetus of a bond premiere and the approach of the deadline date, Dec. 8; but nevertheless the county is still far short of the \$150,000 E bond quota and only a last minute landslide of bond buying will bring the county over the \$250,000 total quota.

### McMath Named Band Director In Local School

Carroll McMath, formerly teacher of band in Denton High School, has been named teacher of band music in the Hereford Public Schools to succeed Ralph Smith, who submitted his resignation last week.

Mr. Smith, who has taught music for the past 20 years, most of that time in the Hereford schools, plans to enter another line of work. A veteran of the first World War, he may take special training for the position of veteran's advisor in Deaf Smith County.

The new band director graduated from Texas Tech with a degree of bachelor of music and took his master's degree in music at North Texas State Teachers College at Denton. He was band director at Denton High School prior to entering the Navy three years ago and has been a member of a Navy band during his military service.

In announcing the resignation of Ralph Smith, Chester Strickland, superintendent of the Hereford Schools, praised the fine record achieved by Smith in his work here. 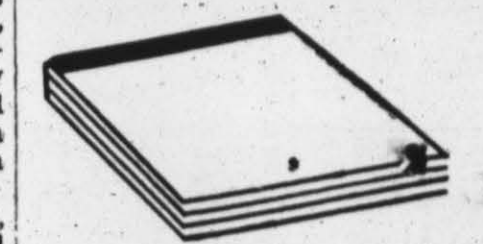

## IDEAS ON Seed Potatoes

Last year at this time any number of strains of the various varieties of Seed Potatoes were available. It's a matter of history now, how later in the season every Seed Growing District was able to sell everything that resembled a potato for seed, and probably some cull piles included.

To date this year, Seed Bookings are light, just as last year. Table stock from most seed growing districts are now selling at support prices and lower. Export contracts for France, Belgium and Canada as well as supplies for Alcohol Plants are being procured at support levels. At the present time a little better feeling for higher prices predominates in most storage sections. Their reasoning roughly is, that since volume movements are at support prices now, better prices are in prospect as supplies become lighter. Since seed prices fluctuate with table stock it could be that now is the time.

We know of no one who can accurately forecast seed potato markets ninety days in advance. Our only thought in connection with the above remarks is: while supplies are liberal and table stock prices at support levels, it may be good business to book your needs while you can choose from the "field."

Veterans Administration hospitalization for the rest of his life. He is not entitled to an artificial limb or vocational rehabilitation through the Veterans Administration because his disability did not occur as a result of service.

All states have developed vocational rehabilitation programs. Prior to the passage of Public Law No. 113 by the federal government, state funds were sometimes unavailable. This law provides, however, for federal supplementation of funds to the end that adequate programs can be developed on a state level to carry out physical and mental rehabilitation among handicapped residents of each state.

At the present time, almost all states have well-developed programs conforming to the federal statute. Counseling services, vocational guidance, aptitude tests, expenses for necessary schooling, costs of prosthetic appliances, and subsistence allotments are all provided on the basis of need. These services are available to veterans and civilians alike. Because this man's disability is not service-connected, he is not entitled to vocational rehabilitation under the veterans administration program.

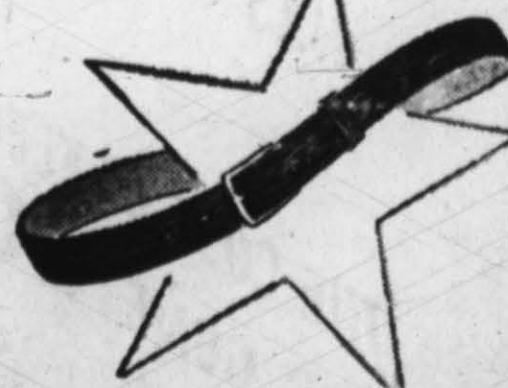

is under way

Telephone service for those waiting is first goal of \$53,000,000 project for Texas

The postwar telephone construction and improvement program already has started. It is a \$140,000,000 program—of which \$53,000,000 will be for Texas—designed, first, to catch up with the demand for service, and second, to provide telephone users with the most adequate and modern service possible in the years ahead.

### Service for waiting applicants

We are making thousands of new telephones, hundreds of miles of cable and wire, and equipment to expand scores of central offices. As facilities become available, we are putting in telephones in proper turn for those waiting.

New telephone instruments are being installed as rapidly as they are delivered, and by the first of the year—or shortly thereafter—we shall be able to furnish service for those waiting in neighborhoods where there already is enough central office equipment and cable to connect their telephones.

The slower, more complicated job of building and installing central office equipment, in the many towns where it is needed, is being pushed. A lot of progress will be made by the middle of 1946, and most of this job should be completed by the end of the year.

### Service will be even better

When waiting customers have been served, the job of expanding the telephone system to provide the kind and amount of service people want will get into full swing. These include individual lines and residence extensions. More equipment and the most modern devices also will be added.

Hundreds of miles of long distance lines will be placed in underground cable, and steps will be taken to introduce in some places a system by which operators can dial telephones in distant cities.

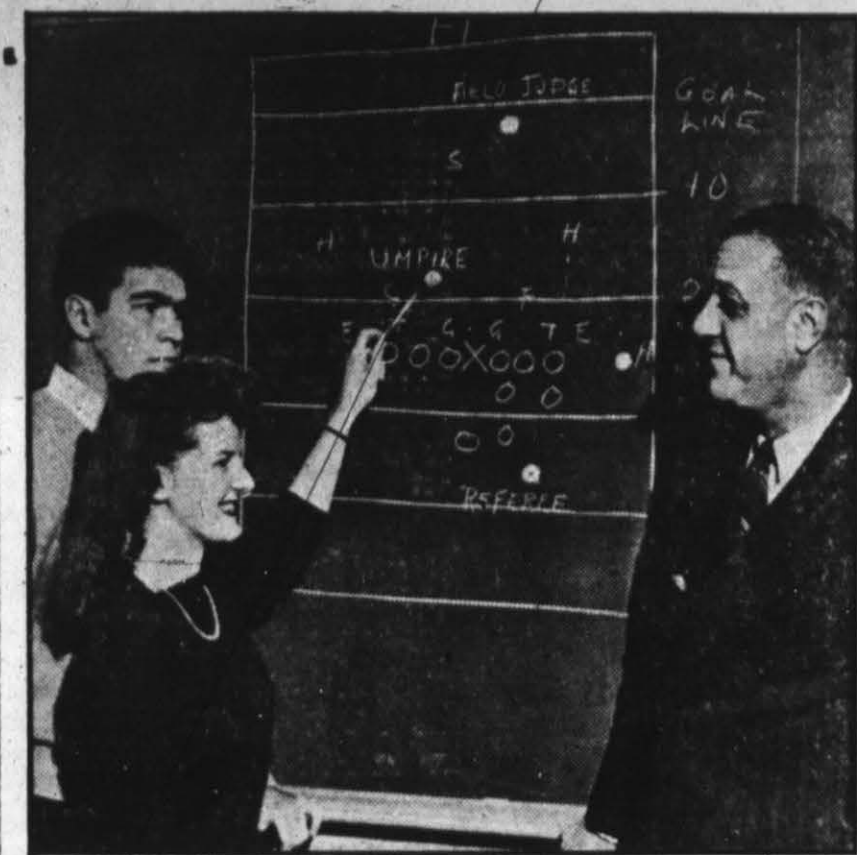

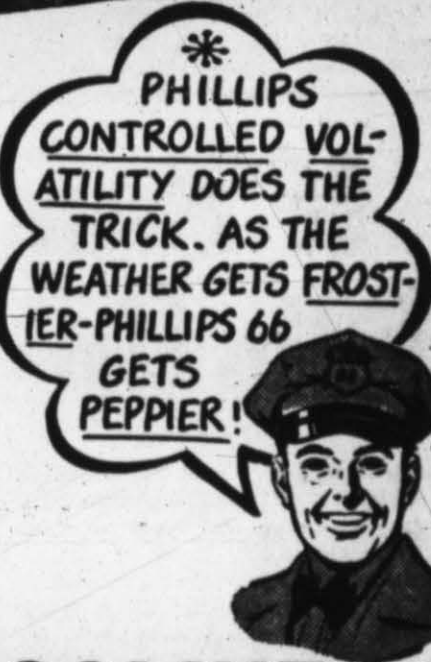
