## **More Combines Needed Says** County Agent

Wheat harvest was in full swing over the county this week, and harvest crews were delayed only briefly in most localities

by the showers Tuesday night.

While it is still too early for accurate estimates on the yield in this county, most growers and grain men are optimistic and predict that the yield will be considerably higher than esti-mates placed it a month ago.

Consensus among grain men is that between two and two and a half million bushels will be produced in Deaf Smith county. despite the drought and hall which have made heavy inroads in the crop. Last year's short crop brought in little more than a million bushels. These figures compare unfavorably with the normal yield of between three and a half and four million bushels in this county, and with 1941's record crop of nearly eight million.

Harvest this year is a to ten days earlier than normal and grain men predict that all wheat will be harvested by the

middle of July.

Wheat brought in so fan has shown good test. Over 50 perce 4 of the crop delivered to the elevators to date has tested I grade, and much of the rest is testing 58 and better.

Dry land wheat, generally of betten quality than irrigated grain, is yielding from 6 to 15 bushels to the acre, early reports indicate, and is averaging 8 to 10 bushels. Irrigated wheat is running as high as 35 to 40 bushels to the acre in isolated cases, but the average will be considerably lower.



### Potato Yields Being Cut from 25 to 50 Percent By Leafhopper, Flea Beetle

About seventy-five percent of our potato crop is being badly maged by the Potato Leafhopper and Flea Beetie. These two sects are hurting most fields under the ground as well as most p foliage. Serious losses will be shown at harvest time unless

p foliage. Serious losses will be shown at harvest time three in proper controls are applied.

FLEA BEETLE are small and also very active. They do not the much food in one spot, their injury consists of very small sunded or irregular holes eaten through or into the leaf. These hall holes give an opportunity for the entrance of destructive lant diseases. Besides the injury by the adult, the larvae of lant diseases. Besides the injury by the adult, the larvae of lant diseases. les beetles commonly feed on th roots of potato plants, riddling ith tunnels on eating off small rootlets, the life cycle is about 10 days. The larvae also will puncture the tuber which

exposes the tuber to diseases such as scab, etc. CONTROL MEASURES - FLEA BEETLE are hard to control and best results have been obtained with arsenates in combina-

tion with copper dusts, on a 20 percent of cryolite dust mixture.

POTATO LEAFHOPPER is the most injurious pest of potatoes.

They feed on the underside of the leaves, sucking the sap from the veins and in some manner not fully explained, cause the trouble known as TIPBURN or HOPPERBURN. The first symptoms of this trouble is the appearace of a triangular brown spot at the tip of the leaf. Similar triangles may appear at the end of each lateral veinlet, or the entire margin may roll upward and turn brown at one time, as though scorched from fire or drought. Infestation of leafhopper causes loss by greatly cutting the yield by producing, mostly tubers so small that they are often

CONTROL MEASURES — Dust mixtures containing copper with a metalic copper content of not less than 4% has proven

most effective, using from one week to ten day intervals.

I have looked at about 1500 acres of potatoes during the past I have looked at about 1500 acres of potatoes during the past week and find that the same condition exists in 85% of all fields, some bad and most close to being bad. Many growers have made several applications of sulphur alone, which has not been of any value this year other than the first application, as sulphur is best only for Psyallid, and we have not had much of Psyallid this year. Psyallid only operates in cool weather and when the temperature becomes 90 degrees for as long as two hours during the day this insect stops, so for the last thirty days growers should have not had to worry about the Psyallid, also the Colorado beetle come early if at all. A serious reduction in our average yields will be seen unless most growers make some effort to check this will be seen unless most growers make some effort to check this infestation. Regardless whether we supply your insecticides or not, I feel more interested in seeing the Hereford area raising more potatoes and obtaining the proper yield average and this can not be done unless growers give more attention to their insect control.


