Hereford's Low Temperature Of 3 Below Is Second Coldest Reported In State For 1939

Temperatures were above normal and precipitation below normal in all Divisions of Texas last year, according to a report from the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Weather Bureau at Houston. Hereford where the record has been kept for nine years, in regard to temperature, had its hottest day, 104 degrees, on June 13 last year, and the coldest day, 3 below zero, on December 27, when the mercury slipped to 8 degrees below zero. This reading was only one degree above the coldest in the state during 1939, and placed

Hereford as the second coldest spot in the state. Mulleshoe with a recording of -9 degrees on December 27, was the coldest. Hereford had 16.84 inches of rainfall during 1939. Wettest month was August with 4.05 inches and the driest was November with none. Snowfall was 12.3 inches for the year. Living up to its reputation for sunshine, Hereford had 236 clear days in 1939. There were 31 rainy days, 51 partly cloudy days and 58 cloudy days. Prevailing direction of the wind was west.

Decide Not To Hold Pioneer Day

Pointing to lack of sufficient interest and a general trend of opinion, a special committee Wednesday morning decided to skip Pioneer Day in 1940, and to resume the celebration again in 1941. In substitute for the celebration the committee suggested a Fair to be held for this trade territory next September.

"Committee members appointed to carry out various phases of the celebration reported a general lack of interest in the coming celebration," said D. H. Alexander, director of the 1940 celebration, "and since the movement necessitates county-wide cooperation, it was decided to delay the celebration until 1941, or such a time as interest of the public demands the celebration." Mrs. Dyalitha Brady, president of the Business and Professional Club, which sponsored the first Pioneer Day celebration in this county, reported that B. and P. W. Club members were unanimous in their vote against holding (Continued on Page 12)

Annual School Census To Begin March 1

County Council Of H-D Clubs Has Meeting At Courthouse

The meeting of the County Council of the Home Demonstration Clubs was held at the Court House, February 24.

Plans for home mattress making were discussed and this demonstration will be held in the work room of Miss Oliver's office.

The finance committee is sponsoring a "hope chest" to be filled by all the clubs, and the funds used for council expenses.

The chairman has asked that members report at each meeting on any outstanding work done by themselves or a club member.

The reports this month were quite varied and very interesting.

Mrs. W. B. Saxon, of Wyche, reported on the butchering and meat demonstration held at the N. G. Elliston home, January 22-23. Three hogs and a goat were killed. The men were interested in the method of killing, and the type of tools, used especially scrapers and knives.

Mrs. Saxon said the preparation of the meat for the table appealed to her, and mentioned that some of these were: Baked liver, Crackling bread, Stuffed heart and Broiled sweetbreads.

Mrs. Ira Ott, also of Wyche, explained how she had remodeled her kitchen. One point she stressed was the planning beforehand. She got all the pictures and information she could and then they planned and discussed their own particular needs for 3 weeks before they started the actual work. Four things her kitchen now has that every kitchen should have are: the space under cabinets, sink and working cabinets the correct height for the user, slots for knives to protect edge, and adequate room for storage.

Mrs. Lauren Luallin of Sims, told us about her turkey marketing experience last fall. She was offered only 8c for turkeys and thought that too little, so she had a local produce house dress them and shipped them to Chicago. There she received 17c for the hens and 16c for the toms. And after paying all expenses: dressing cost, shipping charges, commission, etc., she still cleared \$50.00 over the price offered on 104 turkeys.

Miss Oliver spoke on the value of perennials for this country and how to take care of cuttings, mentioning that many people were using their frame gardens for cutting beds, but if you lack a frame garden just bury your cuttings until time to put them out. And speaking of frame gardens: the Press Release, says there were 19241 in Texas in 1939 an increase of 7,000 over 1938.

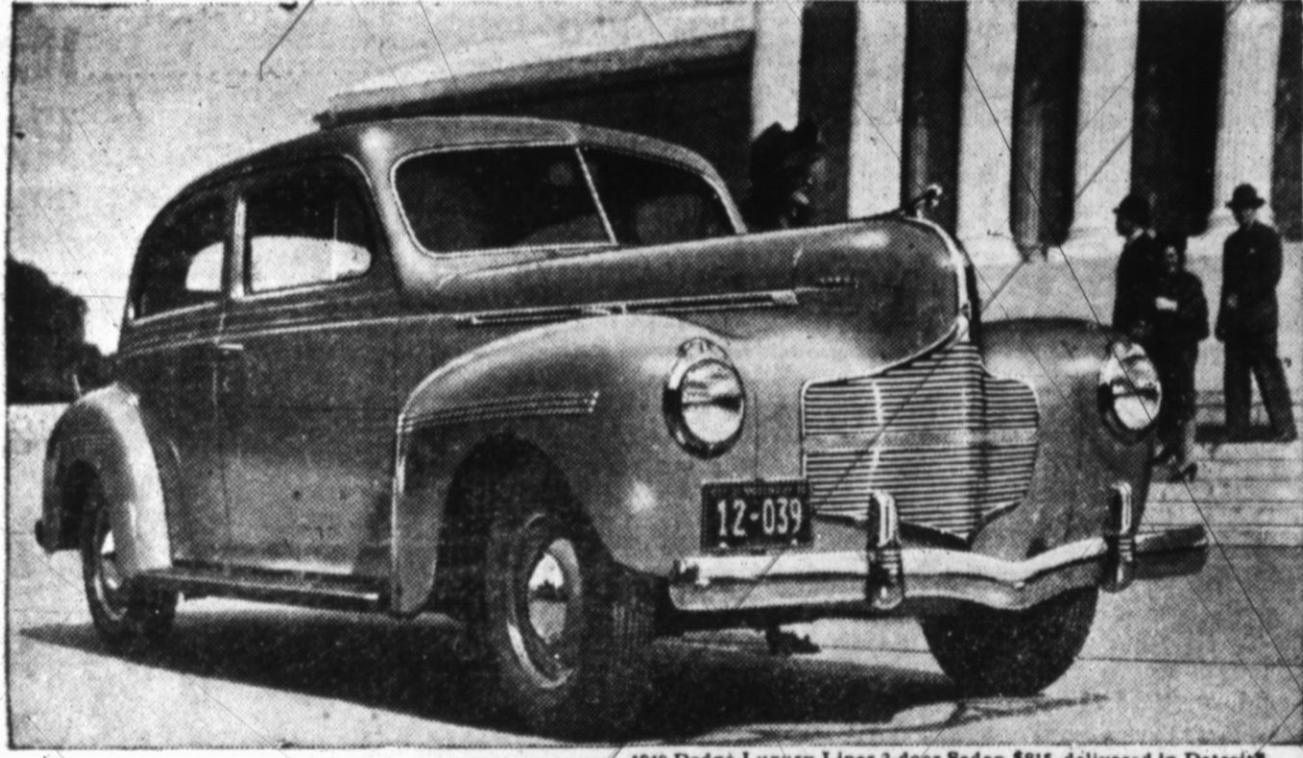

Dear Jimmie:
Ever since the afternoon a turtle bit off half of one of my brightly pedicured toe-nails while I was swimming in the creek down at the old "Dairy", I have been gunning for a modern swimming pool in Hereford for the use of the town and surrounding community.
It is bad enough to have to swim in dirty creeks infested with

germs, filth, snakes, spiders, moss, submerged tumbleweeds, barbed wire, tin cans, rubbish, and rocks, but when the turtles get bold enough to prey on the digits of would-be mermaids, that's the limit! Or at least, a matter important enough for county officials and citizens to act upon.

After two years in Lubbock with its three splendid swimming pools, Hereford's inadequacy in the line of clean, health-promoting amusements for young and old impresses me as vividly as I know it does others. As a native born, life-long citizen of Hereford who will, in the not distant future, cast her first vote (although I'm getting sensitive about my age), I think I have a right to raise a howl on this swimming pool issue.

In dead earnestness, I ask, as have countless other young'uns in Hereford, what does the community offer its youth in the way of clean entertainment? What means of amusement have we for our youth when the local schools close for the summer vacation, and colleges turn out? Here's the sum and substance of Hereford's amusement facilities: one tennis court kept in fair repair during the summer solely by contributions of a small group of local men; one soft ball field owned and cared for by the Lion's club; one picture show; two down-at-the-heels, unkempt parks which are overgrown with weeds, and whose equipment is old, too dangerous for children to play on. In addition, we have two places for dances.

Is it necessary to mention the pity of Hereford youth having to go out of town for innocent amusement which ought to be provided here?

I don't intend for this to be, by any chance, a "bitter denunciation by a person in dead earnest." I only wish to permeate, if possible, the remarkable shell of indifference and inertia of the city "pops" and "moms." I'm not "bitter," and I'm not "denouncing." I'm just saying that we need this swimming pool, and we need it badly. It won't be a "cure-all," but I think it will help. We college students have blushed and chafed long enough under the sarcasm of these city-slickers whose home-towns have a swimming pool on every corner!

In the first place, I believe every thinking person in town will agree that swimming is one of the finest, cleanest body-building sports known. Page President Roosevelt, and countless others, I'll bet the local doctors could orate by the hour on its benefits to humanity. Well, why don't we get some of them? In the second place, how many times have we all heard the trite and true old saw that "healthy bodies lead to healthy minds?" I fancy I can see the teachers nod their heads in agreement here.

In the third place, haven't we all, at one time or another, toyed with the idea that someday we might need to know how to swim, desperately, to save our lives, or perhaps that of another. Haven't we all bitterly regretted the deaths by drowning in the treacherous creek of unknown children such as the Putt, Ware, and Thompson boys? Haven't we who know how to swim earnestly wished that we might have been present to rescue these victims of a community which has not the money to spend to provide a swimming pool with adequate facilities and instruction for children in swimming, but which has evidently, the lives to spare to a creek which never was meant in its present state, for swimming or play?

To a certain extent, I believe we citizens can blame ourselves for these and other untimely deaths.

Deaths due to unnatural causes are rather rare in Hereford, thanks to traffic regulations and consideration, fire measures and protection, medical aid and hospital facilities. Although I lack statistics, I believe a noticeable per cent of unnatural deaths in our town history may be attributed to inadequate instruction, knowledge, and facilities for swimming. This per cent may not be great, but I doubt if there is one of us who will not agree that it should be eliminated from our record of vital statistics by the building and proper installment of a swimming pool. What if it? "Lay the ax to the root of the evil?"

Continuing (again I'm no authority), I understand from studying sciences related to the human race, that an infant in its first hours of life instinctively knows how to swim. With the consciousness of fear, this knowledge fades. However awkward my approach, I'm trying to say that swimming is a natural, innate thing with humanity, which should be developed. You might

be surprised—even shocked to go before a group of local Campfire girls and ask how many know how to swim. In my work with this organization two years ago, I found out that very few of these girls know how. Why? Because Hereford had no decent place in which to learn, and very few parents or leaders could afford to take them to Amarillo or near-by towns with well kept pools, often enough for them to learn. If this seems a bit raw, I suggest that you consult Mrs. Urlin Streu, or Miss Mary Elizabeth Stanford. They can give you an earful on this subject. The same goes for the Boy Scouts. To attain a certain rank in the Boy Scout organization, a boy must be able to fulfill certain requirements in swimming. Where are these boys going to become proficient enough in this sport to fulfill this swimming requirement? You don't know? Neither do Walter Dunlap, or Harold Close, in Hereford or near-by, I imagine.

Yet, I wonder how many Hereford people I could point out who've said to me and others: "Everyone certainly needs to know how to swim!"

In the fourth place, don't I remember somewhere in numerous Sunday school lessons and sermons the story of the biblical characters who were each endowed with a certain number of talents? Some of these (I've forgotten how many!) had several talents, but utterly wasted all of them, and one character who had only one talent, developed his to the utmost, thereby gaining the full fruits of his endeavors. Perhaps I'm distorting this story, but it seems to me it might be applied to our situation in Hereford in its original meaning.

Hereford has many talents, and several of them closely related to the installation of a swimming pool. We haven't lived here all our lives, heard, informed people talk, and read optimistic articles in the Brand about Hereford's wonderful natural possibilities for dams, parks, and swimming pools, not to realize that Hereford does have talents in this direction.

Well, I've ranted and raved so hard and so long that I haven't yet tendered a plan for the payment of the pool, which would pay for itself and for the management of the pool. But that doesn't mean I haven't got a plan for running the pool, because I have. As for the pool management, it hasn't been two months since I interviewed a woman for a Lubbock paper who is a specialist in this field, and looking for some nice, fat pool to manage. As a matter of fact, this woman was in the same Chicago club with Johnny Weismuller, and almost made the same Olympic team he did, at the same time he did.

So give us a pool and we will be able to furnish a streamlined manager.

Jimmie, this probably gives you a headache, but you asked for it, and here it is, a Herefordite's response to the swimming pool question. And I mean every word of it.

Conservation Of Texas Lands Off To Good Start

College Station.—Almost 3 million acres of Texas farm and ranch land went under the soil and water conservation banner for the first time in 1939.

That brings the figures for the 24-year-old campaign to 16 million acres of crop land protected against loss of soil and rainfall while some 14½ million acres are still in need of protective measures.

Thus Texas is off to a good start in 1940, a year slated to record breaking advances in conservation as all agencies of the U. S. Department of Agriculture unite with state and local organizations in a joint drive to protect soil and hold the rain where it falls.

Detailed 1939 figures, as announced by M. R. Bentley, agricultural engineer, and C. (Dutch) Hohn, soil and water conservation specialist, both of the Texas A. and M. Extension Service, include 766,211 acres, and 1,254,699 acres pit cultivated. Around 1,500,000 acres of crop land were farmed on the contour for the first time.

County-owned tractor-grader outfits in 172 counties accounted for 440,891 acres of the terracing total. On range and pas-

ture land, 56,689 acres were terraced, 97,800 ridged, 195,736 contour-furrowed, and 30,904 subsoiled or chiseled. Spreader dams constructed during 1939 will divert run-off water and spread it over 108,855 acres of grass land. Much of the work on range land was done in cooperation with the AAA's range conservation program.

County agricultural agents held 1,094 meetings to explain details of the Texas Soil Conservation District Law. The meetings drew an attendance of 66,362.

Veteran game observers remember a large flock of turkeys which drifted out of Kerr County in the Hill Country into Sterling County, a distance of nearly 150 miles. The birds remained nearly two years before starting back to their native range.
