Hereford Students Give Magazines for Shipment To Overseas Troops

Herman Ford, principal of Hereford High School received a letter this week thanking the students for their contribution of popular magazines to the Ordnance Department of the San Antonio Arsenal. The Hereford students sent one of the largest magazine donations received at the arsenal.

## Former Hereford Youth Crawls 75 Yards, Kills 11 Japs

Pfc. William F. Curtis, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Curtis of Cashmere, Wash., formerly of Hereford, has received the Silver Star for gallantry in action against the Japanese at Munoz, Luzon, P. I., on March 19.

Curtis crawled 75 yards under heavy small arms fire in front of his platoon and killed 11 Japs who were halting the advance of his comrades.

He is in a rifle company of the 20th Infantry Regiment of the 6th Division which holds the record for continuous combat in the Southwest Pacific.

Two brothers of Pvt. Curtis are also in service. They are Pfc. Sgt. Leverett B. Curtis with the Marines on Okinawa and Carl Curtis, GM 3-c, who is assistant navigator on a sea plane tender.

### LEGAL NOTICE SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7

PROPOSING an amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of Texas providing that any person in the armed forces of the United States, or the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part thereof, or the United States Maritime Service, or the United States Merchant Marine, or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified voter, shall not be required to pay, or to hold a receipt for the payment of, a poll tax in order to vote at any such election, if same is held while the United States is at war or within a certain stated time thereafter; providing that members of the regular Army, Navy, or Marine Corps of the United States shall not be permitted to vote; providing that other members of the armed forces shall be entitled to vote under certain conditions; providing the form of the ballot for voting on said proposed amendment; fixing the time for holding an election; directing the Governor to issue the necessary proclamations; and making an appropriation. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. There shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas the matter of amending Article VI of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new section which will modify the present restrictions concerning voting. This new section shall be inserted between Section 2 and Section 3 of said Article VI, and shall be known as Section 2a, and shall read as follows:

"SECTION 2A. Nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to require any person, who at the time of the holding of an election hereinafter referred to is, or who, within eighteen months immediately prior to the time of holding any such election was, a member of the armed forces of the United States or of the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part of such armed forces or Armed Force Reserve, or the United States Maritime Service or the United States Merchant Marine, and who is otherwise a qualified voter under the laws and Constitution of this state, to pay a poll tax or to hold a receipt for any poll tax assessed against him, as a condition precedent to his right to vote in any election held under the authority of the laws of this state, during the time the United States is engaged in fighting a war, or within one year after the close of the calendar year in which said war is terminated.

"PROVIDED, however, that the foregoing provisions of this section do not confer the right to vote upon any person who is a member of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, or Marine Corps; and provided further, that all persons in the armed forces of the United States, or the component branches thereof, not members of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, or Marine Corps, are hereby declared not to be disqualified from voting by rea-

son of any provision of subsection "Fifth" of Section 1, of this Article."

SEC. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state on August 25, 1945, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following:

"FOR the amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of Texas, providing that any person in the armed forces of the United States, or the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part thereof, or of the United States Maritime Service, or the United States Merchant Marine, or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified voter, shall not be required to pay, or to hold a receipt for the payment of, a poll tax in order to vote at any such election, if same is held while the United States is at war or within a certain stated time thereafter."

THOSE OPPOSED to such amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the following:

"AGAINST THE amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of Texas, providing that any person in the armed forces of the United States, or the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part thereof, or of the United States Maritime Service, or the United States Merchant Marine, or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified voter, shall not be required to pay, or to hold a receipt for the payment of, a poll tax in order to vote at any such election, if same is held while the United States is at war or within a certain stated time thereafter."

SEC. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamations relating to the publication of the foregoing Resolution, in the various counties of the state, and shall cause the same to be published as required by the statutes and the Constitution in connection with the submission of proposed amendments to the Constitution, to the people for their action at a statewide election. If it shall appear from the returns of the election at which the foregoing

amendment to the Constitution is voted upon that a majority of the qualified voters have voted for said amendment, same shall then become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

SEC. 4. There is hereby appropriated out of the General Fund of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay the expenses of advertis-

ing said Resolution in each county in the state and for such other purposes as may be necessary, or required by law, or by the Constitution.

## LEGAL NOTICE

S. J. R. No. 8  
A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members; prescribing their qualifications; and providing for their election, tenure of office and compensation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That Section 2 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"ARTICLE 5. SECTION 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a

case; provided, that when the business of the court may require, the court may sit in sections as designated by the court to hear argument of causes and to consider applications for writs of error or other preliminary matters. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this state, and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty-five years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer, or a lawyer and judge of a court of record together at least ten years. Said Justices shall be elected (three of them each two years) by the qualified voters of the state at a general election; shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified; and shall each receive such compensation as shall be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of any Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for state officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the state. The Justices of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The Judges of the Commission of Appeals who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall become Associate Justices of the Supreme Court and each shall continue in office as such Associate Justice of the Supreme Court until January 1st next preceding the expiration of the term to which he has been appointed and until his successor shall be elected and qualified."

SEC. 2. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, 1945, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members;"

same manner the following words printed on said ballot: - "AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

SEC. 3 The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this State.

world's mightiest strategic bombing force. Its personnel of 185,000 was the equivalent of 12 infantry divisions, and it could send 21,000 airmen in 2,000 four-engine bombers and 1,000 fighters over Germany at one time, a combat effort possible only through the support of tens of thousands of non-flying specialists.

Since August, 1942, when combat operations began, Liberators and Flying Fortresses of the Eighth dropped more than 70,000 tons of bombs on enemy targets. Fighter pilots shot down 8,250 Nazi planes and destroyed 4,250 others on the ground. Bomber gunners shot 6,000 German interceptors out of the air.

The Eighth dropped an average of a ton of bombs every minute of the last 12 months.

Airmen of the Eighth were the first Americans to attack Germany. The early crews flew a handful of unescorted bombers against the powerful Luftwaffe, and proved the feasibility of an American idea—precision daylight bombing over the Reich. After beating the Luftwaffe and decimating German aircraft production, the Eighth threw its growing weight against Germany's rail system and vital sources of oil. These campaigns, in conjunction with the British Royal Air Force and the U. S. 15th Air Force, disorganized all transport in Germany, restricted German military operations in the air and on the ground and paved the way for the march of allied armies across Germany.

Sgt. Close, radioman and gunner on a B-24 Liberator, and Sgt. Galley, member of a ground crew, were with the Eighth Air Force in England at the time of Germany's surrender. Many other Hereford boys have served with the Eighth and at least three local men have been killed in action while serving with Eighth Air Force; four others shot down over enemy territory, have later been released from imprisonment in Germany.

**LEGAL NOTICE**

**H. J. R. No. 13**  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION** proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Sections 51a, 51b, 51c and 51d of Article III so that the same shall consist of one section to be known as Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to actual bona fide citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy blind persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years, and needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such assistance; providing that the payments of such assistance shall never exceed either the payments from Federal funds or a total of more than Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) per year; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication, and making an appropriation to defray the necessary expenses of proclamation, publication, and holding the election.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Sections 51a, 51b, 51c, and 51d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended and the same are hereby amended so that the same shall hereafter consist of one section to be numbered 51a, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not be more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month.

"(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"(3) Needy children who are actual, bona fide citizens of

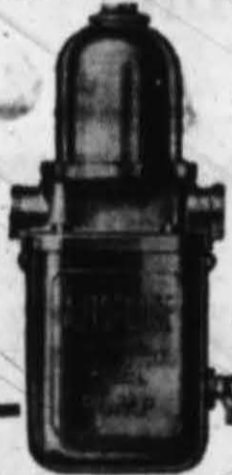

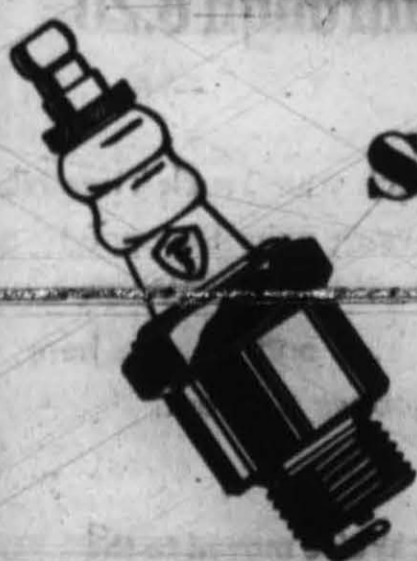

### Fourteen Months Overseas Described By Cpl. Wilson Gyles of 90th Division

Cpl. Wilson Gyles has taken advantage of the lifting of censorship restrictions by writing a complete account of his travels since he left the States in March, 1944; and in a letter to his mother, Mrs. J. E. Gyles he gives a capsule history of the War as it concerned his unit of the 90th Division.

Arriving in Liverpool on Apr. 6, 1944, Cpl. Gyles was first stationed at Bridgenorth, a small town not far from Birmingham and Hereford, and after maneuvers in Wales, he made the channel crossing with a rear echelon of the 90th to arrive in Normandy on June 18, 1944—D plus 12—to find the beachhead much different from what had greeted the first waves of combat troops.

**Describes German Bombing**  
The 3,000-plane raid which opened the way for the breakthrough in Normandy, Cpl. Gyles describes as "one of the prettiest sights" he has ever witnessed—and he goes on to say that he received his own worst fright of the war during a German raid one night when his unit was moving into LeMans. The German planes dropped parachute flares to make the scene almost as light as day, and then came in with their bombs before the men had time to dig foxholes. "All we could do was lay against a high bank and pray to God we wouldn't be hit," Gyles writes. "Actually the bomb explosions were a relief after the noise of diving planes and the bombs whistling through the air."

**Stalled at Metz**  
After the dash across France, one armored division succeeded in entering Metz, but had to give up their position when other divisions ran out of gas and the advance was stalled. Gyles believes that if the Yanks could have held Metz at this time, the war might have been over last winter; but goes on to describe fierce fighting when the heavily entrenched Germans held off the 95th Division, later enforced by the 90th, at the famous fortress city, which fell only after a hard siege.

Gyles was at Habay La Neuve, Belgium, during the Battle of the Bulge, then later moved to Luxembourg, where he was stationed for a time in an old monastery. At that place, on Jan. 28th, he reports seeing two buzz bombs go over, which he says were the last to fall on England.

**Describes German Atrocity**  
Since March 1, he has been in Germany; and his present location is at Schwarzenfeld, a few miles from the Czech border. "I am a block from a cemetery where S. S. troops killed about 200 Jews a few days before an Armored Division came in," Gyles states. "The bodies were only half buried and they made the citizens put them in coffins and give them a decent burial."

The caretaker at the cemetery told Gyles that it took the S. S. men an entire day to carry out their wholesale slaughter and concludes that there are "no doubts as to the facts of this case."

**Policing Difficult**  
Gyles' battalion has the job of policing an area within the ten mile radius from the town of Neunburg; and he says that the job is made doubly difficult by the necessity of keeping Germans, Poles and Czechs segregated. The war just hasn't ended as far as the fight between these nationalities is concerned, he reports, going on to describe the system of control being set up, whereby as much responsibility as possible is delegated to local burgo-masters. "Some of them are Nazis," he says, "but if they have the brains to do the job, they are being used for the time being to help keep order."

Cpl. Gyles does not know exactly when his own voyage home will start, but is sure of one thing—that the going will not be as tough as it was in the trek across France and Germany.

### LEGAL NOTICE

H. J. R. No. 11  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**  
PROPOSING an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office.  
**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

SECTION 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"SECTION 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a per diem of Ten Dollars (\$10) per day during their tenure of office. In addition to the per diem the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for each twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by land, regardless of railroads or water routes; and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established; and by such table the mileage of each member shall be paid; but no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of any regular or called session."

SEC. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an

election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, A. D. 1945, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office."

EACH voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

SEC. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SEC. 4. The provisions of this Constitutional Amendment shall be self-enacting, and if a majority of votes at said election shall be cast for same the Governor shall, within thirty (30) days after said election, issue a proclamation declaring this Amendment to be a part of the Constitution of Texas.

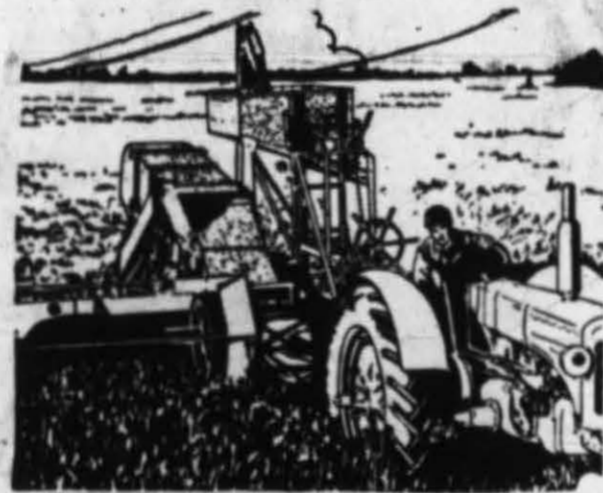

and under existing penal laws, it being distinctly understood that this notice does not apply to farmers who, at the request of the county or the State of Texas, turn irrigation water to bar ditches for the purposes of irrigating trees. away from food. While the exact means of spread of the disease is not known, contamination of water and milk is always dangerous and flies have been repeatedly shown to carry the infantile paralysis virus.

Do not swim in polluted water.

Maintain community sanitation at a high level at all times.

Avoid all unnecessary contact with persons with any illness suspicious of infantile paralysis.

Continuing, the Foundation advises: Don't become hysterical if cases do occur in your neighborhood. Remember that though this is a frightful disease, needless fear and panic only cause more trouble.

Attempts to stop the spread of the disease by closing all places where people congregate have been uniformly unsuccessful. The resulting disturbance to community life is a disadvantage.

There is no known cure for infantile paralysis. Good medical care will prevent or correct some deformities. But in about every fourth or fifth case there will be a permanent paralysis that cannot be overcome. County chapters of the Na-

tional Foundation are prepared to work with health officers, nurses, doctors and patients. Know your Chapter, ask its help if needed and volunteer to help your chapter so that it will be able to render the necessary services.

ing. "At about five that afternoon, Maj. Gen. De Guingand (Chief of Staff, 21st Army Group) arrived in a plane and he brought the German Chief of Staff, Col. Gen. Jodl, with him. The

sergeant who was to drive them in from the field asked me 'Shall I uncover the star plates on the car if Gen. DeGuingand rides with him? I don't want anybody saluting the German bastard otherwise.'

Jodl was a typical iron-neck Prussian, arrogant and cocky. He reminded me of a Kraut paratrooper we captured in Normandy (my company commander smacked him in the teeth for being so smart.) He had a light field-gray uniform on, black boots and pants with a big red stripe down the side—really had a lot of color for a German.

"The next meeting was held during the night and at about 0240 on the morning of the 7th the document was signed. Later in the day, General Eisenhower called in the Germans and made sure they knew what it meant—then sent them back to Germany. It was all over but the fighting then—they are still going hammer and tongs in Czechoslovakia. But in the main the thing is over and all we have to do is enjoy the peace."

Lieutenant Estes concludes his letter on a thoughtful note which is indicative of the determination of GI's to build a lasting peace. Estes wrote: "I kept thinking about Pinky and Ederd and all the rest that paid the highest price. Anything that might possibly be gained from war can't be worth even one life unless the things we think we are fighting for are maintained after the thing ends. If we let it ever happen again, the fellows that died in this war are betrayed. It's a tremendous responsibility on the ones that got through."

Army authorities. Letters have been received from labor contractors and crew foreman, indicating that the fair treatment given Mexican laborers here last year will bring some of the same crews back this summer.

der was May 31, and the order will result in a raise from three and one-half or four cents a bushel to five and one-half cents in the maximum charge which sellers subject to the order may charge for handling wheat. The order is also expected to end the dissension over the variation in service charges for handling wheat in local elevators and for shipping wheat out to terminal points. The order defines the service of handling wheat as the receiving, sampling, grading, weighing, dumping, loading, shipping and billing of wheat and to other services usually supplied by country grain elevators.

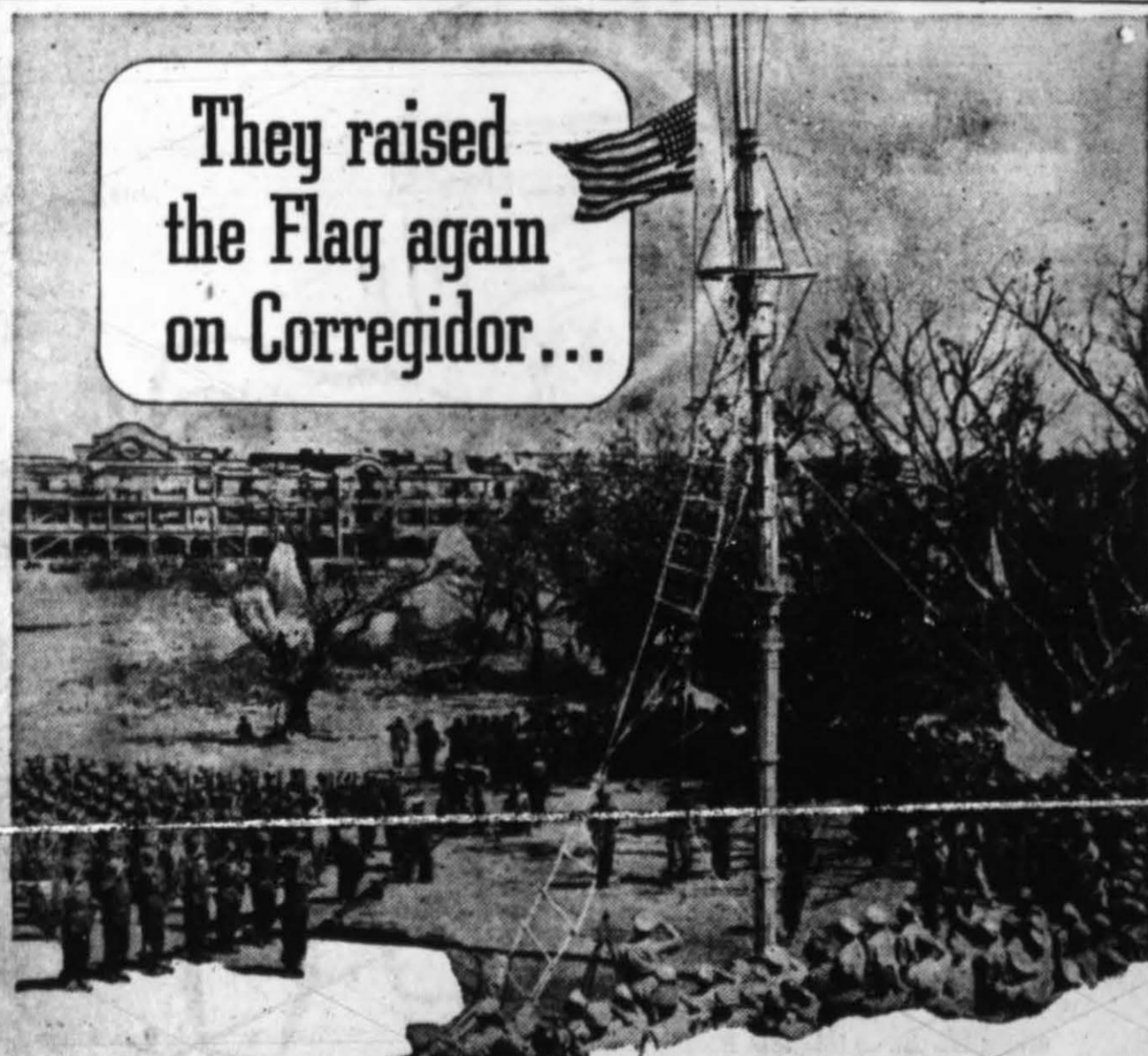
