Bronze Star Medal To Sgt. Harlin

WITH THE 12TH AAF IN ITALY—Tech. Sgt. Harold J. Harlin, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Harlin, Hereford, was awarded the Bronze Star Medal at a presentation ceremony held recently at headquarters of the Twelfth Air Force in Italy. Brig. Gen. Charles T. Myers, commanding general, made the award.

Acting first sergeant of headquarters and headquarters squadron, Sergeant Harlin's citation reads in part: "In the capacity of acting first sergeant, Sergeant Harlin, through his constant efforts, superior administrative ability and sound judgment, ably established and maintained an exceptionally high standard of training and administrative procedure, coincident with the activities of his organization."

A graduate of Hereford High School in 1937, Sergeant Harlin entered the Armed Forces in January, 1942, and landed in North Africa on D-Day with the invasion forces. He has earned five bronze battle participation stars, representing participation in campaigns in North Africa and Italy.

Formerly employed with the Phillips Petroleum Co. of Hereford, Sergeant Harlin, in addition to the Bronze Star Medal, is authorized to wear the Good Conduct Medal and the Meritorious Service Wreath which was awarded his entire squadron for the outstanding work it had done in the Italian campaign.

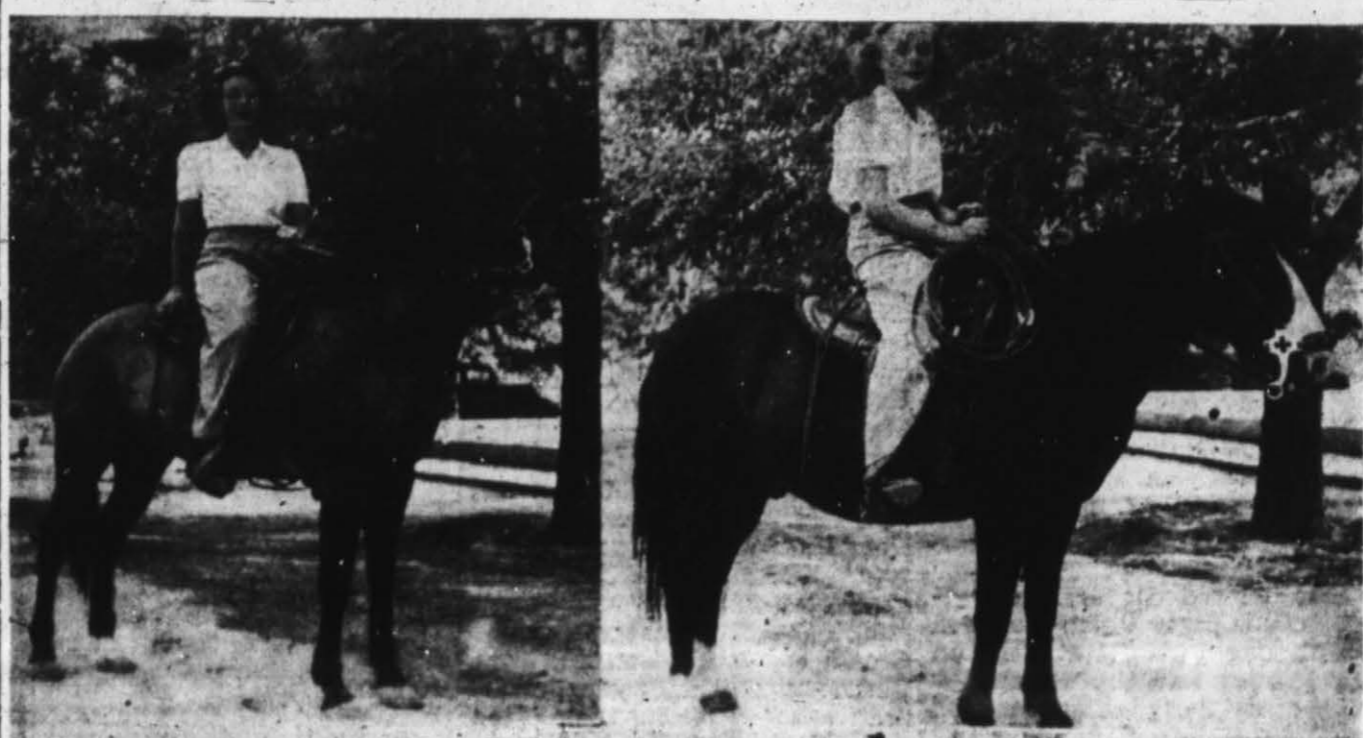
Outstanding Feature At Star August 22-23

Tax Suits for Hereford Schools To Be Filed

Tax suits against all remaining delinquents on the tax rolls of the Hereford Independent School District will be filed on Dec. 3, 1945, it was announced this week by Horace Walker, tax attorney for the Hereford Schools.

Announcement of the impending suits is being made now, Walker said, in order that all persons owing back taxes may pay them before the deadline date and thus save court costs. No further extensions on the final date for payment of taxes will be given, according to Walker's announcement.

Tax Refunds Stepped Up Sec'y. Vinson Announces

Secretary Vinson announced today that the refund of income taxes in connection with excess withholding made during 1944 is being stepped up with a view to completing the work between Sept. 1 and 15. This is a month earlier than the original goal of Oct. 15.

Of an estimated 22 million individual refunds to be made, 10,968,000 refund checks were issued up to July 27, amounting to \$481,980,000. Refund checks are now being issued at the rate of 1,600,000 a week. This is being accomplished by working day and night shifts and overtime, and utilizing equipment to maximum capacity.

Refund checks range from a few cents to several thousand dollars, the average being about \$45. In order to facilitate payments, refunds are based on tax returns as filed by taxpayers and are subject to later audit by the Bureau of Internal Revenue.

Friday Rains Add to Total For Week

Rainfall in Hereford Friday afternoon amounted to .10 of an inch to bring the total for last week to 1.82 inches at Hereford, with considerably harder rains to the southeast of town.

Farming operations over much of the territory were expected to get under way on a large scale as soon as the ground dries up enough for plows to operate and in the meantime farm prospects are brighter than at any time for the past several months.

Of general current interest are discussions of post-war occupational opportunities and new books in this field are CAREERS IN BUSINESS by Smedley and Robinson; 20 CAREERS OF TOMORROW by Huff and FASHION IS OUR BUSINESS by Williams. A series of four books on religion in the post-war world are edited by Dean Willard Sperry of the Harvard Divinity School.

New Novels are SO WELL REMEMBERED by James Hilton, THE WAYFARERS by Dan Wickenden, BLACK MOON by Clark McMeekin, IT'S A FREE COUNTRY by Ben Ames Williams and LET US CONSIDER ONE ANOTHER by Scaphigne Lawrence.

AUGUST 18, 1905

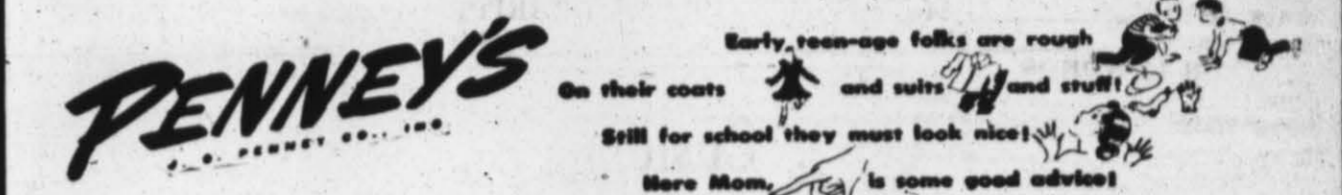

 music and long dresses.

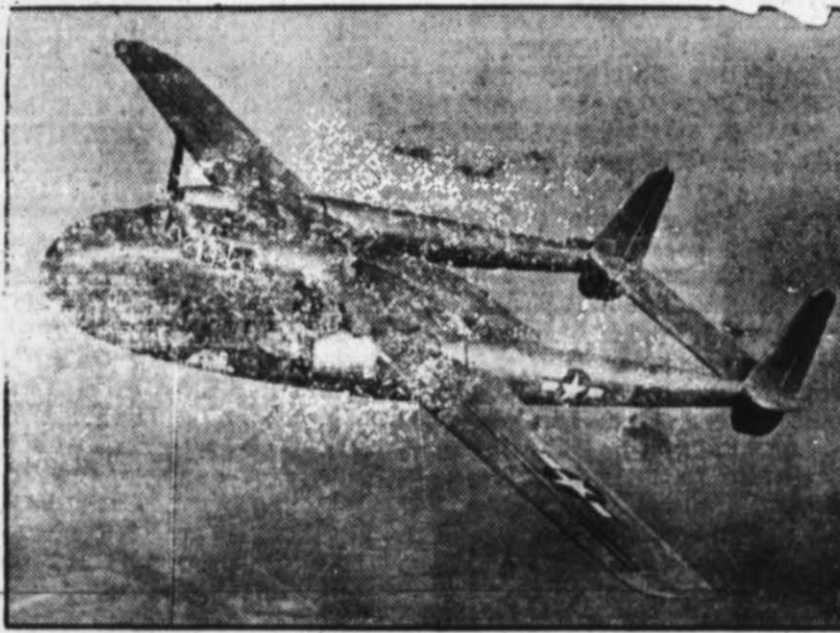
We were sorry to lose Captain

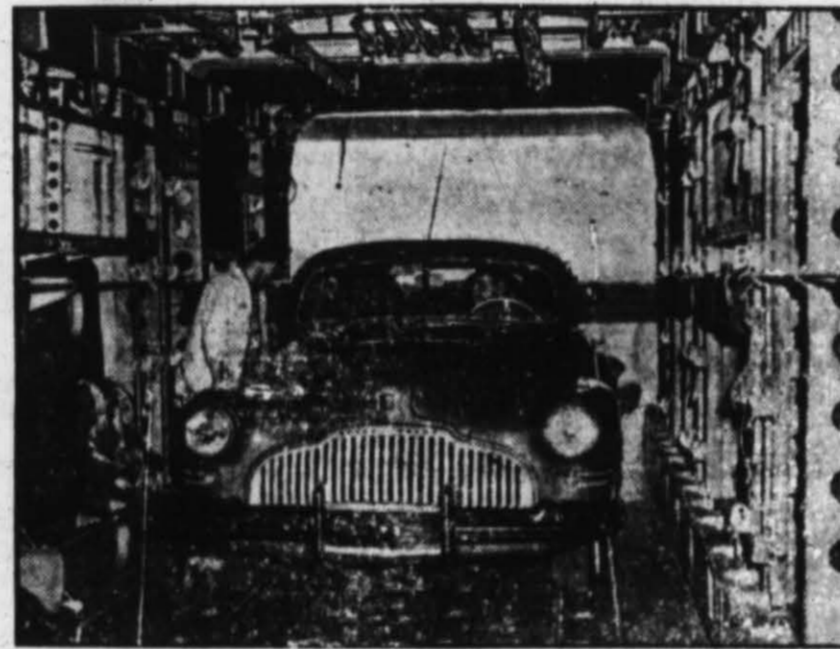


The story of a captain of a parachute company is told

Families Benefit Under Social Security System

Sometimes young widows,
 aged parents, and orphans do
 not know they are eligible for
 benefits and lose money through
 delay in filing their claims for
 social security payments.

In addition to the monthly
 old-age benefits payable to the
 insured worker himself at the
 age of 65 or after, the Feder-
 al Old-Age and Survivors In-
 surance system provides for
 monthly benefits to members of
 his family. Benefits are also
 payable to his family at his
 death, whatever his age.

A safe rule is this: When in
 doubt about your right to old-
 age and survivors insurance
 benefits, visit the local office
 of the Social Security Board. No
 matter where you work or live,
 you're probably not very far
 from a Social Security Board

State Dept. Warns Against Undulant Fev.

AUSTIN, TEXAS—As a safe-
 guard against the serious and
 disabling disease known as un-
 dulant fever or Malta fever, Dr.
 Geo. W. Cox, State Health Of-
 ficer, advises Texans to drink
 milk only from approved sour-
 ces. Undulant fever is usually
 acquired by human beings as a
 result of consuming raw milk
 or raw-milk products from cows
 infected with Bang's disease.

Raw milk or milk products
 can be consumed with safety on-
 ly when they are known to be
 produced by cows tested and
 found to be free of Bang's dis-
 ease. Pasteurization, of course,
 will kill the germs if present.

To lower the incidence of un-
 dulant fever all dairymen are
 asked to cooperate with the
 State Department of Health by
 removing cattle infected with
 Bang's disease from their herds
 as soon as the disease is dis-
 covered. Even if the milk is
 made safe for human consump-
 tion by pasteurization, infected
 cows are still a menace to
 health since they can transmit
 the disease to healthy animals
 and to their owner and other
 persons who handle them.

"Undulant fever," Dr. Cox
 said, "is one health menace we
 can eradicate in our State
 through absolutely safe milk
 supplies from dairy herds free
 from Bang's disease."

"Unless a herd is known to be
 free from this infection, only
 pasteurized milk should be used
 so that the disease cannot be
 passed on to the consumer of
 milk and dairy products."

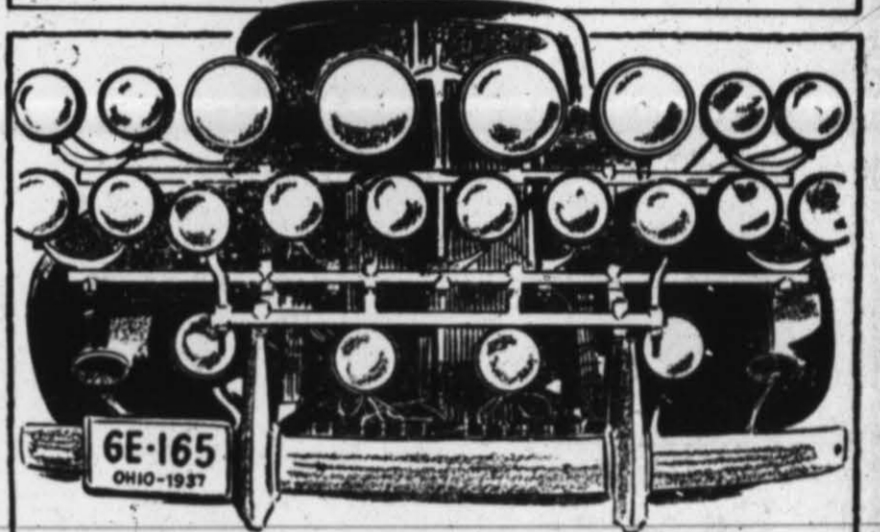

"Old Hickory" Veteran Enroute From Germany

WITH THE 30TH INFANTRY DIVISION IN ASSEMBLY AREA COMMAND, FRANCE—S-Sgt. John Leinen of Hereford, Texas, enroute home from Europe with the "Old Hickory" Division, which broke up Germany's supreme counter-offensive in Normandy, is now being processed at Camp Oklahoma City, an infantry redeployment center operated by the Assembly Area Command.

Landing on the French coast on D plus four, the 30th, commanded by Major General L. S. Hobbs, spearheaded the St. Lo breakthrough, poured across Northern France, Belgium and Holland, and then crashed through the Siegfried Line to complete the encirclement of Aachen.

On Dec. 17, 1944 the division wheeled south to help stop Rundstedt's lightning attack in the Ardennes. After some bitter fighting in the Stavelot-Malmédy sector they sent the Germans reeling back frustrating Nazi plans to seize Belgium's northern ports. Stunned SS Panzer troops taken prisoner and gasping Nazi radio commentators spoke of having yielded to "Roosevelt's SS" in this battle.

Out for the kill, the 30th led

the 9th Army's assault crossing of the Rhine on March 24th and fought its way more than 200 miles to the Elbe at Magdeburg where Russians and Americans clasped hands in an historic union.

S-Sgt. Leinen is the son of Mrs. Laura Whitson of Hereford. He holds the following decorations: D. S. C., Purple Heart-Cluster and Presidential Citation.

Tackett is the Superintendent in charge representing the Federal Warehouse Corporation, contractor with the RFC Dallas agency.

As soon as the word "bombs away" was given the mad rush would begin.

Lt. Higgins will report to San Antonio the latter part of August for further assignment.

Surplus Military Gliders, Convertible To Light Planes, on Sale by RFC

DALLAS, TEXAS—Surplus military gliders which can be converted into light airplanes will be offered for sale at the Reconstruction Finance Corporation sales center at Hicks Field, Fort Worth, Texas, commencing August 15. L. B. Glidden, manager of the Dallas RFC Agency, announced today. The RFC is the agency designated by the Surplus Property Board to handle aircraft disposal.

The RFC has altogether 149 Taylorcraft TG6 gliders, of which 9 will be placed on sale at Hicks Field. These gliders can be converted to powered planes by replacing the nose with an engine mount, adding an engine, and making other alterations required by the Civil Aeronautics Administration. These gliders were adapted from light aircraft designs at the beginning of the war and have much the same general structural features.

The RFC also is placing on sale at Hicks Field a limited number of 65 horsepower Lycoming and Franklin engines for use in converting the gliders to power.

The Civil Aeronautics Administration will approve the conversion of these gliders to powered airplanes where the adoption conforms to specifications and other prescribed requirements. Drawings and lists of materials for guidance in the conversion can be obtained from the manufacturer.

Prices for the gliders have been set at \$350, and the engines range in price from \$183 to \$458, depending upon make and condition. In some cases trailers are available for sale with the gliders and these have been priced at \$75 additional.

The RFC pointed out that light liaison type aircraft are in heavy demand for training and personal use, but the supply of these in RFC surplus has been virtually exhausted. Until others become surplus or until new planes are manufactured the conversion of the gliders will offer an opportunity to obtain planes of this type.

When distribution can be completed, the RFC plans to place the gliders on sale at additional sales centers at the following points:

Army Air Field, Albuquerque, New Mexico; Thunderbird II Field, Phoenix, Arizona; Cimarron Field, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; Olympia Army Field, Olympia, Wash.; Cal-Aero Airport, Ontario, California; and Bush Field, Augusta, Ga.

Sales dates at these points will be announced through RFC Regional Offices.

And "Harold better get back here, I'm not going to be able to work if this keeps up much longer," was the comment of Virginia Cornell at Close Drug.

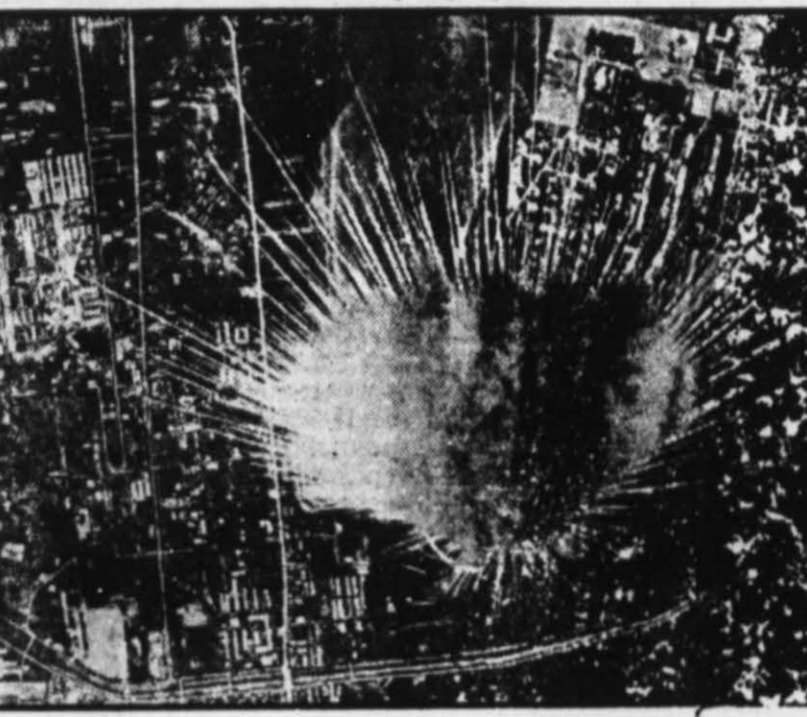
