## Veterans Office Opens at Lubbock Serving Plains

A new Veterans Administration regional office opened officially on Monday, June 3, at Lubbock, with Robert W. Sisson as regional manager.

The 26 counties comprising the Texas Panhandle which for four years have been under jurisdiction of the Oklahoma office of the Veterans Administration, have been transferred to the new Lubbock headquarters.

The change was announced last week by P. T. Lunquest, manager of the V. A. center at Muskogee.

Lunquest stated that it was the policy of General Omar Bradley, Administrator of Veterans Affairs, to bring the services of the V.A. as closely to the homes of the veterans as possible, and pointed out that much more prompt and efficient service will be available to the veterans of the panhandle through the Lubbock office.

Effort is being made to have the regional office in full operation within a few days. Sisson has announced. The Lubbock region includes 81 West Texas

counties. Forty-nine of these were transferred from jurisdiction of the Waco office, and six in the El Paso area have been under administration of the Albuquerque headquarters.

## Veterans Planning to Enter College Should Get Eligibility Certificates

Veterans in this area who plan to enroll in college for the first time this fall should apply immediately for their certificates of eligibility, if they wish to take advantage of free schooling and subsistence benefits offered by the government. Veterans Administration offices expect a flood of certificate applications during late summer and early fall, and the veteran who applies now will be sure of getting his certificate without undue delay.

A veteran may apply for his certificate of eligibility at any Veterans Administration regional office or at a VA contact office in a small town.

Any veteran who served at least 90 days (or less if discharged because of service-incurred disability), part of it on or after Sept. 16, 1940, and was discharged under conditions

other than dishonorable, is entitled to one year's schooling. In addition, he is entitled to a period of schooling equal to the length of time he spent on active duty in the armed forces. Accordingly, a veteran of 2 1-2 years' service is eligible for 3 1-2 years' schooling.

No period of eligibility can extend beyond four years, and the veteran must begin his schooling within four years after his discharge or the official end of the war, whichever is later (the official end of the war has not yet been declared by Congress). Schooling must be completed within nine years after the end of the war.

The Veterans Administration will pay tuition and other normal charges up to \$500 a school

North Texas onion growers may receive the onion report by writing to M. C. Gregory, Fruit and Vegetable Office, 511-513 U. S. Courthouse, Fort Worth, Texas. The onion market report has been issued daily since May 27.

Reports on the tomato deal may be obtained by asking for it from R. E. Winfrey, Fruit and Vegetable Office, Post Office Building, Jacksonville. This office began sending out the daily report on June 3.

## Southwestern Public Service Buys \$2,000,000 Utilities Properties

Purchase of electric, water, and ice plants in a number of Panhandle cities has been announced by the Southwestern Public Service Company in a deal with West Texas Utilities Company involving more than two million dollars.

Announcement of the purchase of West Texas Utilities holdings in the northwestern portion of the Panhandle was made last week by Jack Cunningham, president of the Southwestern Public Service Company, through the local manager, C. D. Hardesty.

Final consummation of the transfer waits approval by government regulatory bodies.

Southwestern Public Service Company operates an interconnected electric system covering the North Panhandle and South Plains portion of Texas and the Pecos Valley in southeastern New Mexico. Properties being acquired from West Texas Utilities are already connected to the Public Service Company system. Electric power for the operation of 33,000 volts transmission lines serving the area has been purchased from SWPS by the West Texas Utilities company for many years.

The properties involved in the purchase cover electric systems at Dalhart, Chamberlain, Conlen, Dumas, Ector, Hartley, Stratford, Sunray, and Texline; water systems at Dalhart, Dumas, Stratford, Sunray and Texline; and a large ice plant at Dalhart, supplying the general public and the Rock Island railroad.

"The northwestern portion of the Texas panhandle," stated Cunningham, "has fine agricultural and industrial possibilities. An REA system having prominent and progressive local citizens as officers and directors has already been formed to bring electric power to farmers and ranchers in this section. The REA will have our wholehearted cooperation in the agricultural development through electrification in this territory. It will also be our policy and program to assist in the development of all communities and cities."

## City and County To Cooperate on Health Measures

The Deaf Smith County Commissioners Court agreed Monday to cooperate with the city of Hereford and the city sanitary department in extending sanitary control measures to residential areas outside the city limits.

C. A. Purcell, meeting with the commissioners, proposed that the county cooperate with the city to the extent of providing DDT and paying the wages of a trained man to do the spraying for the time he is working under the county's jurisdiction.

Spraying of garbage cans and other sources of fly breeding in this area outside the city limits will be carried out under the supervision of the city sanitarian as a part of the same program which has been inaugurated in the city.

Purcell pointed out to the commissioners that these areas which are not within the city limits, but are still adjacent to and part of the town, must be serviced as well as those within the city limits if the campaign against flies and other disease bearing insects is to be successful.

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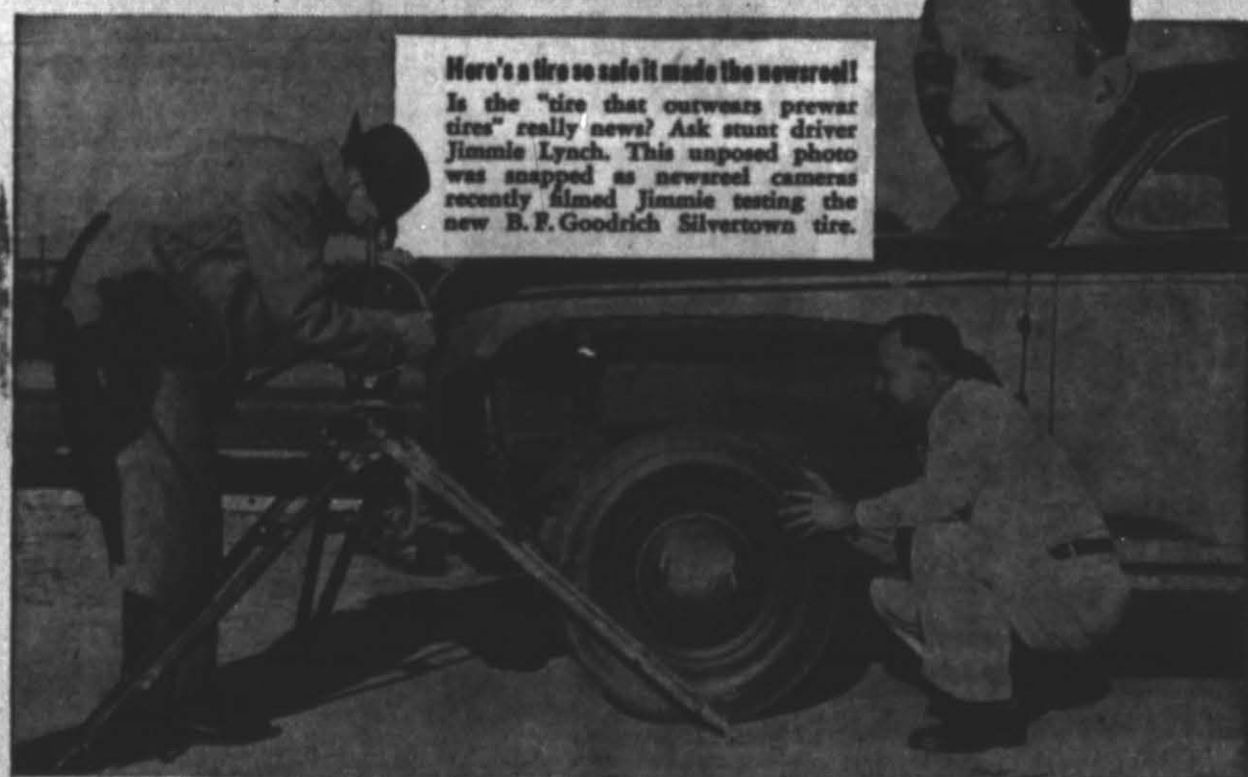

## New Books of Western Lore Are Now On Shelves at the County Library

The West and Southwest are well represented in a group of new books now on the shelves at the County Library. A wide range of interest is covered in these selections, both contemporary and historical.

Gene Fowler's newest best-seller, "Solo in Tom Toms," has just arrived. For those who enjoyed "Timberline" a few years ago, this is "must" reading. It's rich in story and personalities of the Rocky Mountain country, centered around Denver of the old days, and is loaded with personal anecdotes of famous Westerners, from Col. William F. (Buffalo Bill) Cody to Jack Dempsey and Paul Whiteman. John Reed, Upton Sinclair, and the storied writers and editors of Denver's golden era are all a part of the story.

Just off the University of New Mexico presses is a beautifully illustrated historical volume, "River of the Sun," a story of the Gila country of New Mexico, written by Ross Calvin, who is rector of St. John's Episcopal Church of Clovis. Around the Gila River centers some of the richest and rowdiest history of the old west. It was there that Coronado first fought the red men. It has been a land of Indian wars, cattle barons, land grabs and mining camps, and Calvin gets it all down in fascinating prose.

"Train Dust and Saddle Leather" is described as one of the best books on the cowboy ever to come off the press. It's by Joe Mora, writer, sculptor and painter of western lore. Born in Uruguay, he came to the United States in early childhood, and has become well-known in his chosen field.

Not new, but good reading for seekers of Western lore, is a book of "Great Horse Stories," edited by Page Cooper. Favorites like "Florian" and David Grey's "The Ride of His Life," dot its pages.

"No Time For Tears," by Lora Hughes is an autobiography of the experiences of a frontier woman on the Great Plains of the West, and as a nurse in the Spanish American War.

"Southern California Country" by Carey McWilliams is a fascinating survey of fantastic southern California—the "land of the Sundown sea." It's a history of ballyhoo... from Almee Sempie McPherson to Hatfield, the rain-maker, but the author delves into the problems and wonders, secrets and climate, and the sociological background of this fabulous land.

"On This Star" by Virginia Sorenson is a novel of the Mormon country. Sketches of general practices and customs of the Mormons and a portrayal of Mormon family life adorn a rather time-worn plot of two

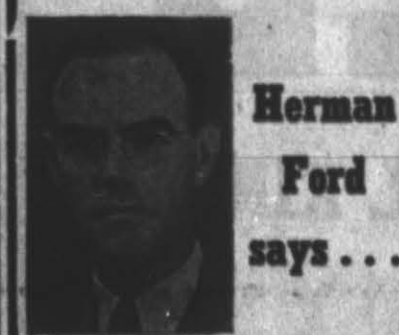
