### How Nazis Planned to Alter Mediterranean



How the Nazis planned to alter the Mediterranean area by building a dam at Gibraltar and sealing off the Dardanelles is illustrated here. A vast system of hydroelectric power projects was the long-range aim. The dam was to be 20 miles long, 1600 feet thick at bottom. Such a barrier would stop flow of about 270 million cubic feet of water a day into the Mediterranean and make its level fall 65 inches a year.
