## Two-by-Fours, Stacked Crib Fashion, Make Walls, Partitions in 5-Room House Built by B. B. Noyes in City

Using 12,000 feet of short two-by-fours and 600 pounds of nails, B. B. Noyes is ready to prove that the housing shortage can be licked—with plenty of hard work and a little imagination in the use of materials. For both the outside walls and the inside partitions at the five room residence being constructed by Mr. Noyes in the 400 block on Avenue C, are made of stacked two-by-fours, which were procured at no cost except the hauling fee, from the Pantex Ordnance Plant.

The two-by-fours are stacked, crib-fashion and lapped at the corners in a manner similar to that used in the construction of pioneer log cabins. The construction cost to date amounts to \$1,900, and total building costs are expected to amount to \$3,000, a building bargain for a five room residence in these days of inflated costs.

## Whitefaces to Meet Phillips Blackhawks Dec. 7 for Fifth Battle for Bi-District Title

The Whiteface gridsters, victorious in every conference game this year, will meet the Phillips Blackhawks on Friday, Dec. 7, in Phillips for the bi-district title. It will be the fifth year in which the Whitefaces and Blackhawks have tangled in the bi-district play-off and the Whitefaces will be out to improve a percentage which includes only one win in 1942—in the previous games.

Time for the game was decided on Monday when officials from Phillips and Hereford met in Amarillo. Both schools wanted to have the game earlier, but an interscholastic league ruling made it impossible to schedule the contest before December.

The league rule, according to Coach H. V. Stanton, states that no boy shall take part in more than ten games before the Saturday following the last Thursday in November. Phillips has already played ten games and Hereford would be in the same boat except for a cancellation of the White Deer game.

The Blackhawks, powerful as usual, have piled up a total of 350 points to their opponents' 66 in the games played this season. Their record includes a 33 to 0 win over Dumas, 51-0 over Dalhart, a loss to Pampa by a 7-27 score, 45-0 over Shamrock, 49-0, Spearman, 20-7 over Wellington, 52-7 victory over Panhandle, 37-6 over Perryton, 41-6 over White Deer and 18-13 over Canadian in the district title game last week.

In comparison, the Whitefaces have racked up 350 points to their opponents' 25 in nine games. They smashed Dumas 57 to 7, a better scoring edge than the 33 to 0 win chalked up by Phillips; but in the Panhandle game Hereford beat 19-0, while Phillips trounced the Panthers 52 to 7. Against Dalhart, the Whitefaces tallied 61 to 0, while Phillips made it 51 to 0.

## Truman Urges Support of T. B. Seal Campaign

WASHINGTON — President Truman Sunday urged the American people not to be complacent about a disease which "exact the tragic and needless toll of lives" that tuberculosis does.

It is particularly inexcusable today "to permit disease to undermine the strength of our people when all their energy is needed in the building of a better world," said the President in supporting the 39th annual Christmas Seal Sale of the National Tuberculosis Association and its 2,500 affiliated associations. The Seal Sale, to finance the tuberculosis control work of the associations, opened Monday and continues until Christmas.

The President's statement follows:

"The historic trend of an increase in tuberculosis after war can be reversed today if the American people cooperate with the medical profession and official and private health agencies in the nation-wide campaign against this disease. "Due to improved methods of case-finding and more wide-

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### Paetzold Sisters Home from Two Years Nurse Duty in Pacific

Alma and Margaret Paetzold, first lieutenants in the Army Nurse Corps, have arrived in Hereford for a visit with their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Paetzold, following two years of duty in the Pacific.

The Paetzold sisters, who served in evacuation hospitals near the front lines, were in the first group to get into Manila while the fight for the city was still going on. For their performance of duty under these hazardous conditions they were awarded the Bronze Star Medal—a medal which was given to the entire 63 women in the unit and to no other group of nurses in the Pacific.

Both girls have long-accumulated leaves and are spending them in enjoyment of the comforts which civilians take for granted but which are real luxury after life in the South Pacific.

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### Rotary President in Hereford, Eng., Sends Greetings

A new link between the cities of Hereford, England, and Hereford, Texas, was established recently with the receipt by Henry Sears, president of the Hereford Rotary Club, of a letter from E. J. Thurston, president of the Rotary Club in Hereford, England.

Thurston enclosed two photographs—a picture of the Cathedral in his city and a picture of the bridge across the River Wye—a bridge built in 1540, according to Thurston's letter. Five years of paper shortage, the Englishman explained, have made it almost impossible to get supply of post cards, guide books or any type of souvenirs. He mentioned seeing a display of post cards and pictures from Hereford, Tex., at the city hall in his town.

Two U. S. soldiers to every luncheon meeting. "In many cases firm friendships were established," he writes.

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## FACTS... for the VETERANS

(Harvey D. was inducted into the Navy in December, 1942. He had a wife and three children. Within six months he was hospitalized for a throat condition. Nothing seriously wrong was found, so he returned to active duty. Within four months he was back in the hospital and, this time, was found to be suffering from a very serious ailment. Subsequently, he was given a medical discharge for a disability which "existed prior to enlistment" and was not incurred in line of duty. At the time of discharge he signed a statement that he did not wish to file a claim. He conscientiously believed his disability existed prior to his induction. He is now totally disabled and wishes to file claim for pension.)

When servicemen and women are discharged for disability, the service department is required to assist the dischargee in filing claim for pension. If the dischargee refuses, he is required to sign a statement that he has been advised of his right to file a claim but chooses not to file at this time. The statement is attached to his file

which later is transferred to the Veterans Administration.

The fact that the veteran signs such a statement does not preclude his right to file a claim at any future time. The statement has no effect what-

ever on the merits of a claim subsequently filed by the veteran. The Veterans Administration has the sole right to evaluate evidence, eligibility, and entitlement to a pension. The conclusions of the military as to whether a disability is "in line of duty" are not binding upon the Veterans Administration. Nor does the filing of a pension claim necessarily mean a pension will be paid.

In the present case, Harvey should immediately file a claim to have the Veterans Administration determine whether his disability was service-incurred or aggravated by military ser-

vice. He should give power of attorney to some veterans organization or to the American Red Cross. Federal statutes provide for the recognition by the Veterans Administration of certain agencies, including the Red Cross, qualified to process and develop claims.

Your local Red Cross chapter, Courthouse, Hereford, Texas is prepared to give you counsel and assistance with reference to benefits available to veterans and their dependents.

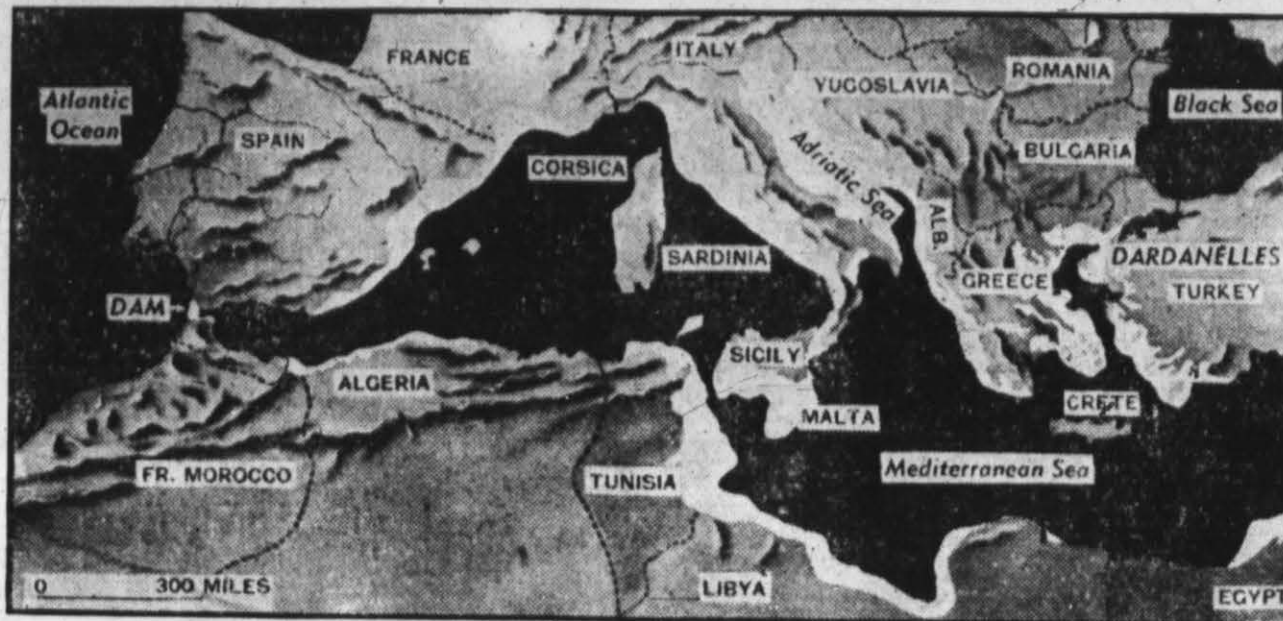

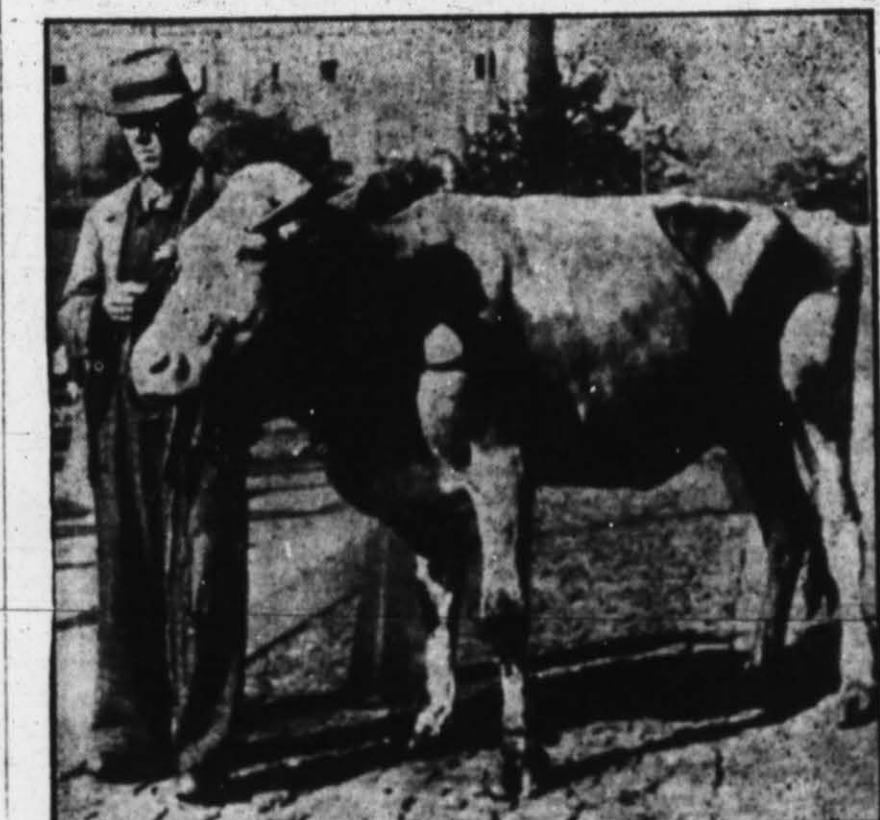

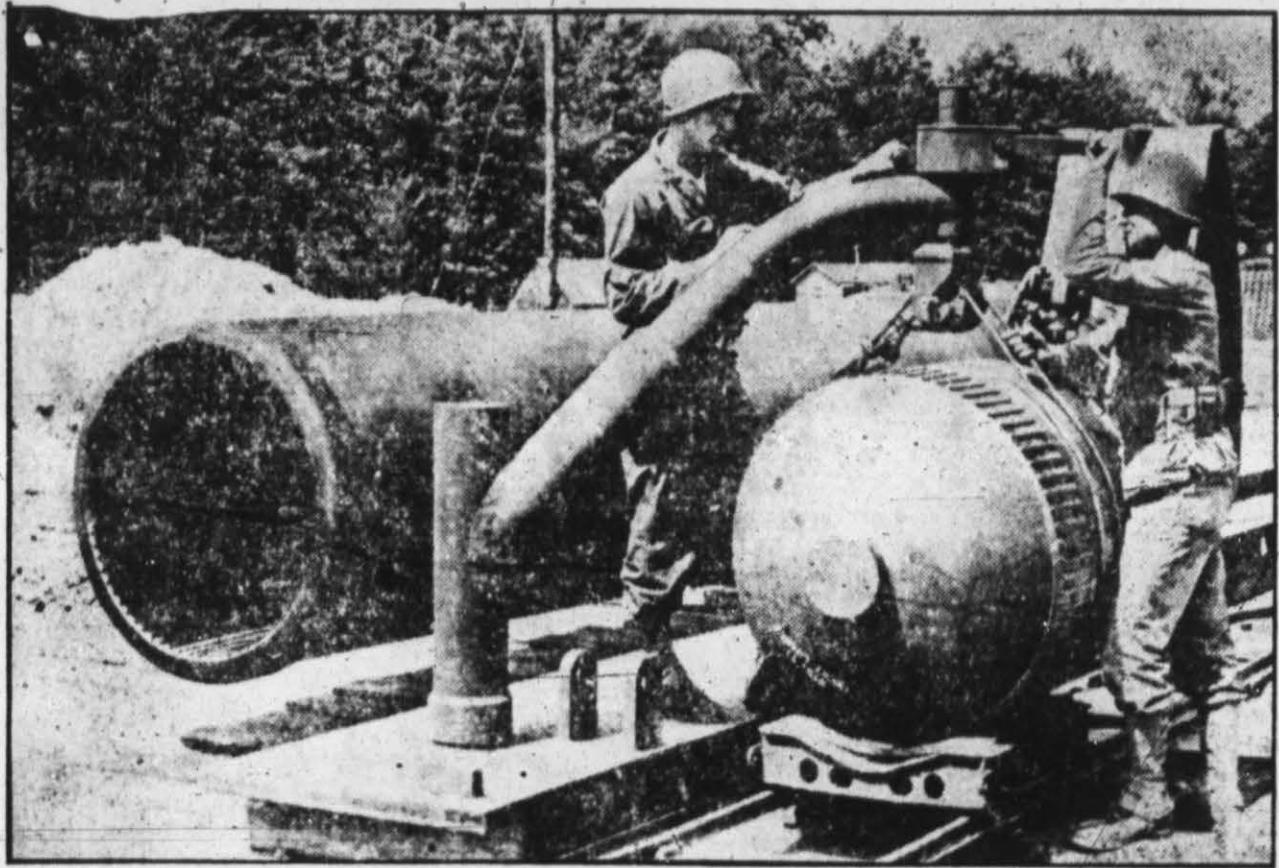

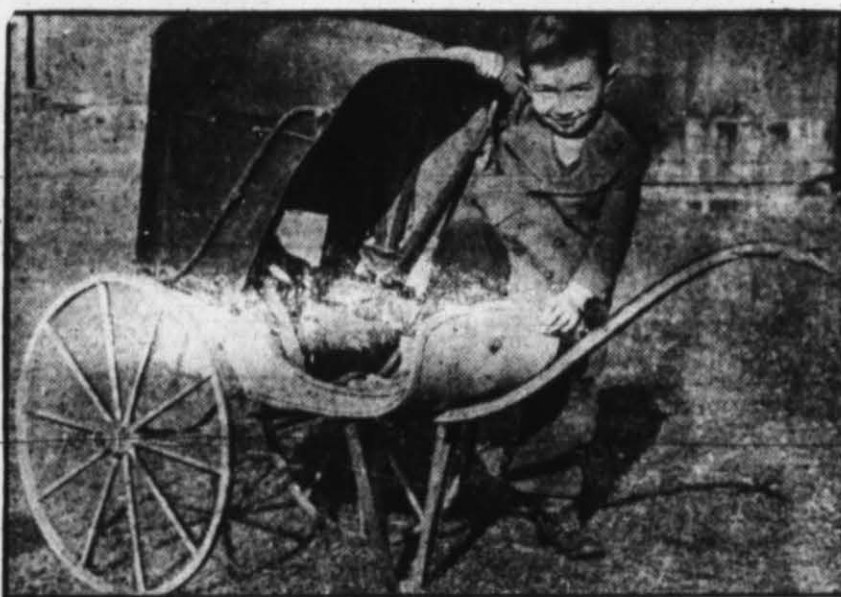

## Pearl Harbor to Tientsin Flight Described in Diary of Elwood Skypala

A 5,828 mile flight with total flight time of 37 hours and 45 minutes is described graphically in the flight log kept by Elwood V. Skypala, Ph M3-c of the first Marine Air Wing. Skypala, with 15 other Navy men, made the flight from Pearl Harbor to Tientsin, China, stopping at six air fields on the way. The flight began on Friday, Oct. 26 and ended on Oct. 31, though the crossing of the International Date Line and the entry into different time zones makes it difficult to keep an exact chronological record of the journey.

Excerpts from Skypala's diary give the following highlights: "Oct. 26 (Friday)—Boarded Curtis Commando (C-46) at one o'clock this afternoon and immediately took off for Johnston Island, 650 miles south, where landed at 5 o'clock and took off at 6:30, heading for Kwajalein in the Marshalls group. Landed at Kwajalein at 3:20 a. m., Hawaii time, Oct. 27; however, during the night we crossed the International Date Line, making it Sunday morning at 2:20 a. m.

"Oct. 28—It's four o'clock in the morning and we are heading for Guam. Landed there at 12:45 p. m. (10:45 Guam time). A 1,370 mile flight which took eight hours and four minutes.

"Oct. 29—Took off at 6:35 a. m. and heading for Iwo Jima in Volcano group. It's good flying weather, had a good sleep and feel swell. Landed at Iwo at 11 a. m. At a glimpse, I don't like this island, and I'm sure that several thousands Marines didn't like the looks of it when they fought for it. The wind is blowing and the island is very dusty. From Guam to Iwo, 710 miles. It took four hours and 30 minutes.

"It's one o'clock now and are once again taking off. Next stop, Okinawa. Landed at Okinawa, 4:45 p. m., their time. This island really is a mess as the result of the hurricane about three weeks ago. We stayed all night at the Second Marine Air Wing and saw some of my buddies whom I was with the first time I was overseas. Iwo Jima to Okinawa, 750 miles, four hours and 45 minutes.

"Oct. 30—Had further survey of the island after chow. The most interesting things we saw were Japanese tombs and upon entering one saw many vases filled with burned ashes, skulls and bones. It's 9:35 a. m. and we are on our way again. I am not sure of our next stop but think it is Shanghai, China.

"Landed at Krongwan Air Field on the outskirts of Shanghai at 12:40 p. m. (11:40 a. m.

Joseph Winfred Merrill received his discharge from the U. S. Marine Corps at Bremerton, Wash., on Oct. 26. He enlisted on May 26, 1943, and held the rank of corporal at the time of his discharge.

Merrill served in the Southwest Pacific from January, 1944 to May, 1945, and took part in battle engagements at Roi, Namur and Kwajalein in the Marshalls, Saipan in the Marianas, and Iwo Jima in the Volcano Islands and was wounded in action on Saipan and Iwo Jima.

His awards include the Purple Heart and Presidential Unit Citation.

Charles B. Spradley, who enlisted in the Marine Corps Reserve on June 15, 1940, was relieved from active duty this month in California.

He holds the rank of captain and took part in campaigns at Guadalcanal and at Tarawa, where he was wounded in action.

Gerald Woodrow Wilson, BM 2-c, received his discharge from the United States Coast Guard on Nov. 10 at New Orleans. Wilson enlisted in June, 1942.

O. J. Beene, chief pharmacist's mate in the U. S. Coast Guard, was discharged from service on Nov. 3 at New Orleans, where he had been serving for several months since his return from duty in Alaska.

Charles Orville Houser, Yeoman 3-c, was discharged from the Navy on Nov. 8 at San Pedro, Calif.

Lt. (j. g.) William E. Miller was granted his terminal leave from the U. S. Naval Reserve on Nov. 13 at the Navy's personnel separation center at Memphis, Tenn. Miller's terminal leave will end on Nov. 28.

In service for 36 months, Miller had ten months of sea duty in the South Pacific and took part in the Battle of the Philippine Sea.

He is a son of Mrs. John B. Miller of Hereford and his wife is the former Miss Matilda Williams.

(A tall wheel on the C-46 blew out, and the crew remained overnight in Shanghai for what Skypala describes as "one of the most memorable nights of our lives".)

"There are so many people in Shanghai that every street looks like Broadway in Los Angeles. The money situation here is a horrible thing, inflation has caused money to be almost worthless. One American dollar was worth \$1,400 Chinese dollars yesterday. I cash in \$5.00 and received \$8,500. I spent 500 Chinese dollars for a bottle of beer in a Chinese Night Club. (There are more night

clubs here than in any other city in the world, and doing a profitable business with American, British, Dutch and French servicemen). The people here are all nationalities. The White Russian girls are beautiful. Wish I could speak Russian.

"It is 9:20 a. m. and we are once again in the air, only this time our last hop. Below us the Chinese countryside with its rice fields and irrigation ditches, makes a beautiful pattern.

"Landed at the Tientsin Air Field at one p. m. They have only a one-way strip here and a very short one for a C-46 to land on. When we attempted to land the first time we hit a cross wind and came very near crashing, but our pilot being very cool and knowing his business was able to take off again. It gave us quite a scare. Our second landing was successful.

"We are situated in a small village, consisting of old brick buildings. There are a few Chinese here who clean up our rooms and I hear they do laundry too. As for digging latrines and other dirty work, a contingent of Jap soldiers (still in uniform) do all this work under Marine supervision. They really jump when ordered to do something and the harder they work, the better I like it.

"There are many rumors going around; all this part of China is occupied by the Chinese communists and if a civil war should start the Marines will be moved into neutral territory.

"One such rumor is that we will be out of China by the first of the year, and I am hoping we don't, because while I am here I would certainly like to see some more of China. The few days I spent in China have been more interesting than my entire 18 months in the South Pacific—but nothing can compare with the good old U. S. A."

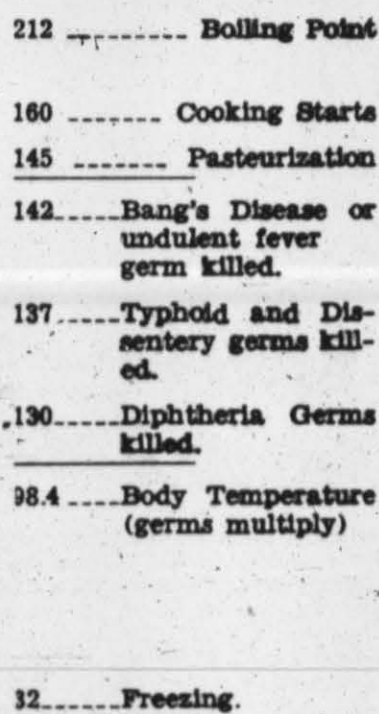

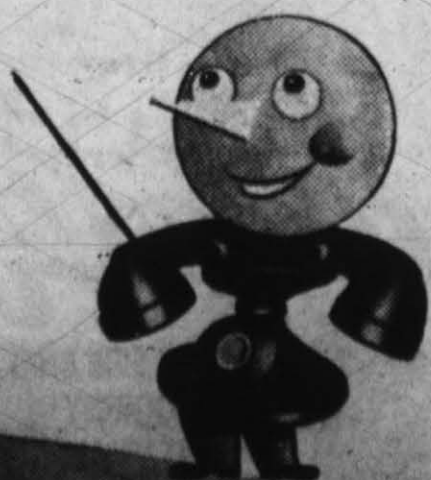

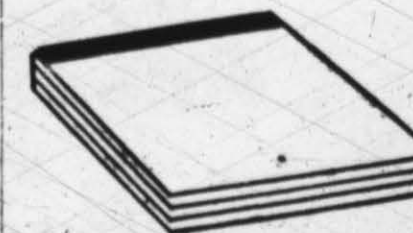
