## School Vote on Consolidation Is Delayed

The Deaf Smith County School Board met last Saturday and decided to delay the calling of consolidation elections for common school districts surrounding the Hereford Independent District until they could secure information from the state department.

The meeting Saturday resulted from a series of meetings which were called in various communities by the County Board. Hereford trustees were guests at these meetings to explain conditions existing in the Hereford district and the County Board had expressed their intention of following the community gatherings with separate consolidation elections in each of the common districts now attending Hereford schools. "Lack of legal knowledge" was cited by board members as reason for the delay, especially regarding the necessity of petitions from each of the districts before elections could be ordered. A question regarding legality of the proposed voting was also presented since plans were for all districts concerned to vote "Pon Consolidation" before any single district would be included in the consolidation program.

County Board members said that they had written to the Attorney General for rulings and procedure on legal questions involved.

## Local Doctors to Open Medical and Surgical Clinic

Plans for opening a Hereford Medical and Surgical Clinic have been announced by Dr. R. R. Willis and Dr. L. B. Barnett, who will be joined by Dr. Millard W. Nobles, formerly of Amarillo.

Dr. Barnett, who practiced in Amarillo, a short time before the war, is still in the U. S. Marine Corps, stationed at Camp Wallace near Galveston, but expects to be discharged by June 1 or sooner. Barnett served as a captain with the 4th Marine Division in the Pacific theater, and went into Japan as a member of the occupation force with the Fifth Amphibious Corps.

He was in Hereford this week completing his plans for organizing the clinic with Dr. Willis, and inspecting the new home which he is building on East 5th street.

Dr. Nobles has recently been discharged from the Army, where he served as a Captain with the 82nd Airborne Division, famous fighting outfit on the European front. With the 82nd, he took part in the initial invasion of Normandy, was a prisoner of war for ten days, and received the Silver Star for gallantry in action during the Gasconne battle.

He is a graduate of West Texas State College ('38) and of Baylor University School of Medicine ('42) and is now attending a two months course at the Southwestern Medical Foundation at Dallas. He plans to come to Hereford about May 1.

## Light Rain Sunday Night Slight Help to Crops; Wheat Looks Good

A light rain, accompanied by sleet and some hail, brought approximately a tenth of an inch of moisture over the entire county Sunday night and Monday morning.

There was not enough hail to damage crops, and not enough rain to help them appreciably, but the moisture brought some relief to farmers in the northwest corner of the county where no moisture had been received this year.

Crops in general over the county are doing well, and even in the drought-stricken northwest corner which missed the heavy January snow, wheat is green and appears to be in excellent shape.

J. R. Overstreet, who has wheat in that section, was in Hereford Wednesday morning and reported that the rainfall there was about the same as in Hereford, where the official reports placed the moisture at .10 of an inch.

Two children were killed at Dimmitt last week-end in two separate automobile accidents. Milton Ray Griffin, 4 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. M. T. Griffin, was run over and killed near his home on the D. N. Breunton farm near Dimmitt Saturday morning. Members of the family were unable to account for the accident, but believed that the child had climbed on to the running board of the Breunton car and fallen off as Mr. Breunton started to drive away. The driver was unaware that an accident had taken place until he had reached town and was notified there.

Last Thursday afternoon Charles Beavers, 3 and one-half year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Curtis Beavers of Dimmitt was killed instantly on the street in front of Higginbotham-Bartlett Lumber company when he was struck by a trailer belonging to Vern Lust.

There were no witnesses to the accident, but it was believed that the child had been playing in or near the trailer when the vehicle was started.

Funeral rites for the Griffin child were conducted Monday at the Primitive Baptist Church in Amarillo, and burial was in Llano cemetery in Amarillo under direction of E. B. Black Funeral Home of Hereford.

### Petition Presented to City Commission Monday Asks \$50,000 Bond Issue for Swimming Pool

A \$50,000 bond issue to provide funds for the construction of a municipal swimming pool and improvements at Lake Park was proposed to the city commissioners Monday.

A petition, signed by more than 150 citizens, was presented Monday afternoon to Mayor E. S. Ireland, requesting that the City Commission call an election to vote on the issuance of \$50,000 in municipal bonds to finance the project.

According to civil statutes, an election must be ordered within 30 days.

The following petition was presented:

"We, the undersigned citizens of Hereford, Texas, hereby respectfully petition the City Commission of the City of Hereford to call a bond election to construct a municipal swimming pool and bath houses on the property belonging to the city in the lake on City Park, in the sum of \$50,000 for such municipal pool and improvements in connection therewith.

"We believe that such a swimming pool would be to the advantage of the City of Hereford, and to its citizens generally, and would be of great benefit to the youth of our City, and we will appreciate your immediate attention to this matter."

Proposed plans call for the construction of a modern swimming pool, bath house facilities, park improvements and addition of some playground facilities in the immediate vicinity of the pool site.

Date for the bond election had not been set by Mayor Ireland as The Brand goes to press. The petition is in the hands of the city officials, however, and names of the petitioners are being checked against the tax rolls preparatory to action by the commission.

Only 68 qualified petitioners are required to call a city election.

Claude Caison was acquitted of the charge of murdering Robert L. Grant when the jury returned a verdict of "Not Guilty" after an hour and a half of deliberation early this morning.

The case went to the jury after a night session of court at about 1:30 o'clock Thursday morning, and the verdict was returned at three o'clock.

Caison had been charged with the murder of Grant, who died on July 11 last year after a fight with Caison at the Hereford rodeo grounds on July 1.

Medical testimony in the case had thrown some doubt on the direct cause of death. Dr. Gayle Seigler of Amarillo had testified that Grant died of pneumonia, which, he said, could possibly have resulted from injuries received in the fight.

The trial opened Monday morning when witnesses were sworn and placed under the rule of silence, and examination of jurors began. The court went into night session Monday and a jury was finally completed at eight o'clock Monday night.

## Arch Foster is Victim of Heart Attack March 6

Funeral arrangements for A. A. Foster, 55, former Hereford publisher and printer, were still incomplete today pending arrival of his son, Lt. Chilton Foster, who is stationed at Topeka, Kansas. Mr. Foster died yesterday afternoon in West Texas hospital, Lubbock, the result of a heart attack.

Reports said that Mr. Foster, widely known in this area as "Arch", had been apparently in good health until Wednesday morning, when he became ill and was carried to the hospital. He died during the afternoon.

During the past month Mr. Foster and his son-in-law, Sherman Morgan, were said to have formed a partnership and purchased a commercial printing plant in Lubbock. During their long residence in Hereford, the Fosters were actively engaged as publishers and printers. Mr. Foster previously worked for The Brand and later established his own shop and published "The Whiteface News." In 1940 Mr. and Mrs. Arch Foster leased their printing shop in Hereford and moved to Lubbock where they have since made their home. He has been in the printing business there in connection with Hester Printing Company until recently.

During their residence in Hereford, Mr. Foster was active in community affairs and was a member of the First Christian Church.

He is survived by his wife, one son, Lt. C. M. Foster, Topeka, Kansas; two daughters, Mrs. Eric Brown and Mrs. Sherman Morgan, both of Lubbock; three brothers, L. H. Foster, Hereford, Lowrey Foster, Georgetown, and George Foster, Lamesa; one sister, Mrs. Leona Burleson, Hereford; also two grandchildren.

Indications today were that funeral services will be held in Lubbock, but the time was indefinite, pending arrival of his son.

### Advice Offered on Control of Termite Eating Tree Roots

A number of people have reported that tree roots are being eaten by termites, according to Miss Sadie Lee Oliver, County Home Demonstration agent, who appealed to the A & M College Extension service for advice.

Paul Gregg, assistant Extension Entomologist, replied that a 5 percent solution of water mixture with DDT might give some control and would not injure trees.

However, Gregg advised, a better control of soil termites around the plants would be use of Paris green in the soil, using about one pound of poison to every ten square feet and working the Paris green into the top two or three inches of soil. This would not injure the plants and would act as a stomach poison for the termites.

"It would not be safe to use DDT in an oil solution around the trees or near plants," Gregg said, "but it would be perfectly safe to use a water mixture of DDT and none would be absorbed by vegetables planted in the soil or near the treated areas. The ground around the trees should be thoroughly saturated with the solution."

MEMPHIS—He might not have been throwing a beer party, but this party was throwing beer; The Memphis Democrat reports. C. L. 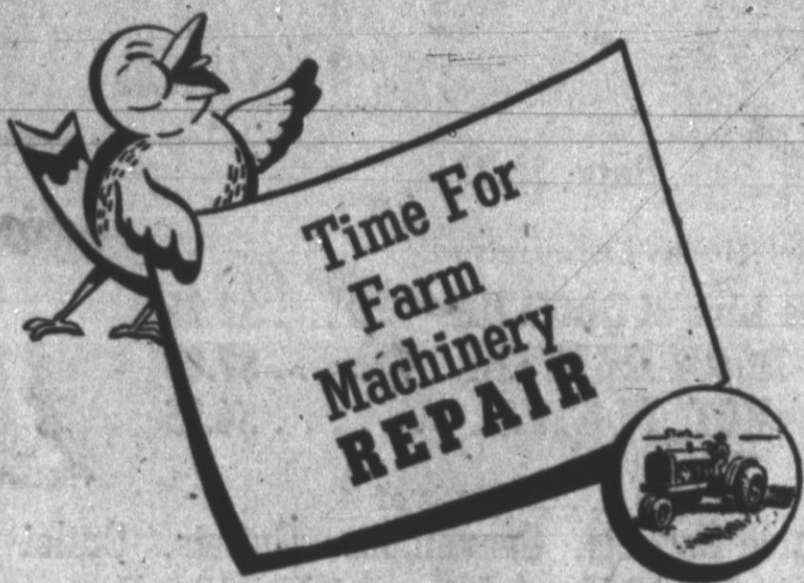
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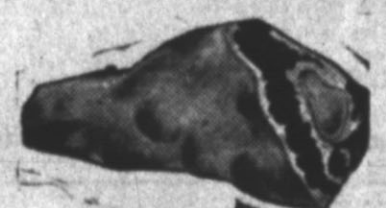

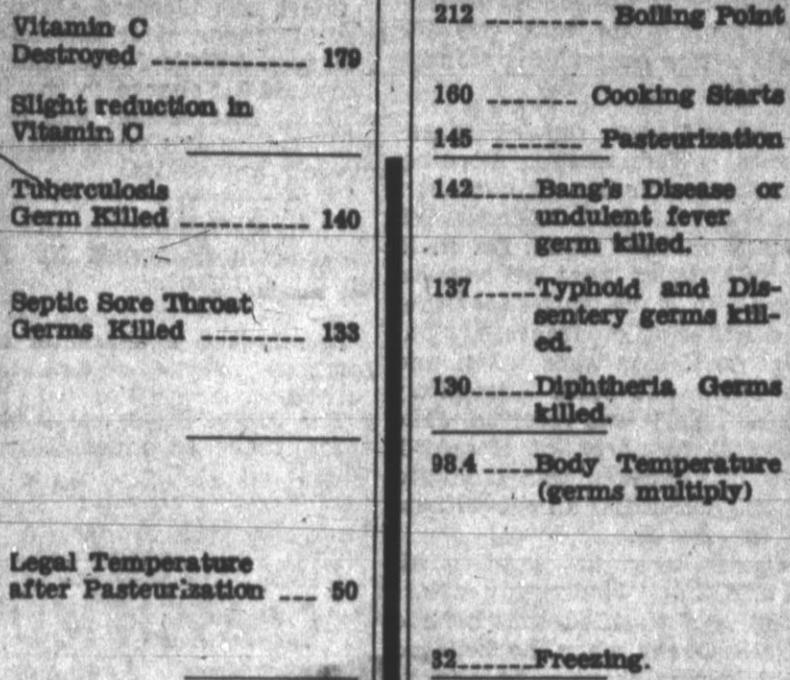
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## Tri-State Secretary of Camp Fire Girls Holds Meeting in Hereford

and kicked Grant following an exchange of words at the Rodeo

grounds on July 1, 1945.

Dr. Gayle Seligson of Amarillo, last prosecution witness called to the stand, testified that Grant had died of hyperstetic pneumonia, which "could have resulted from the injuries he received in the fight."

After the State had rested its case, Defense Attorney James Witherspoon immediately entered a motion for an instructed verdict of not guilty, on the grounds that the State had failed to prove its case, but the motion was overruled by Judge Aldridge.

The defense opened arguments Wednesday morning, placing a number of character witnesses from Collingsworth county on the stand. Dr. R. R. Wills testified that he believed Grant to have suffered either a concussion or fracture, but that no X-rays were taken and he could not state definitely which injury was received. Jake Bowers, formerly of Hereford, now of Colorado, was produced by the defense as an eye-witness to the fracas.

Caison took the stand in his own defense Wednesday afternoon, and testified that he had struck Grant when he believed that he was about to be attacked by Grant and his three companions, but did not recall kicking him.

Caison told the court that he had been summoned to the spot

where Grant and his companions were standing by a small boy (unidentified) and had turned away when he was told that they did not call him. He turned and struck Grant, he said, when he heard one of the group say "I believe I'll whip the big—anyway." He testified that he believed that the other three men in the party were about to attack him, but said he did not remember kicking Grant after he had knocked him down.

Court was recessed Wednesday afternoon after the defense had rested while Judge Aldridge prepared his charge to the jury, and a night session was called while attorney's presented their closing arguments.
