## Analysts expect slower price hikes

longest, sharpest consumer price plunge in almost four decades ended last month as rebounding gasoline prices pushed consumers' costs up 0.2 percent, the government said today.

Despite the May gain, the first in four months, most analysts still expect prices for all of 1986 to rise no more than 2 percent, virtually half of last year's 3.8 percent gain.

The largest food price gain was posted for fruit and vegetables, which saw a 1.9 percent increase. But that was down from a 3.6 percent hike in April.

Energy prices other than gasoline showed continued declines, with heating oil and coal prices falling 4.4 percent. Natural gas and electricity prices fell 0.6 percent.

As of May, the Consumer Price Index stood at 326.3, meaning that a market basket of goods that cost \$10 in the base year of 1967 cost \$32.63 in May - or 50 cents above what the same basket would have cost in May

The index itself is not adjusted by the government to remove the affect of seasonal factors, whereas other key figures in the report — including the monthly percentage change in all categories - do reflect such adjustments.

Both private and government analysts said price declines appear to have run their course.

The turnaround had been evident in last week's wholesale price report, which said that costs one stop short of the retail level had risen 0.6 percent in May, the first hike in that computation this year.

Many analysts suggest the rate of inflation at the consumer level will return to the range of 3.5 percent to 4.0 percent, where it was before the oil price dip.

Under existing law, Social Security cost-of-living increases are suspended if the CPI drops below 3 percent as measured by the change from September of one year to September of the next.

If this happens, Congress seems likely to vote to waive the 3 percent threshold.

## Borger bank opens under new charter

BORGER, Texas (AP) - The First National Bank has new ownership and is reopening after the previous company was declared insolvent and the institution's doors padlocked.

A midafternoon order to close the bank came down Thursday from the Comptroller of the Currency, prompting an extra edition of the local newspaper for the first time in 23 years.

The order closing the bank was posted at 2:30 p.m. and signed by deputy comptroller Robert J. Herrmann. The Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. was declared receiver.

Later Thursday, the FDIC announced the bank would reopen today under the name of First National Bank of Borger, a newly chartered national bank subsidiary of First Borger Bancshares Inc.,

The bank failure is the 58th nationwide this year and the ninth in Texas, federal officials said. Of the 58 failures, 26 have been among

banks with at least 25 percent of their assets in agricultural loans. The new bank will assume about \$68.1 million in 9,000 deposit accounts, has agreed to pay the FDIC a purchase premium of \$200,000 and will purchase certain loans and other assets for \$48.3 million, the

FDIC said. The FDIC will advance \$22.5 million to the asssuming bank and will retain assets of the failed bank with a book value of \$30.9 million, officials of the agency said.

The First National Bank, chartered in 1948, had approximately \$80 million in assets and \$7 million in primary capital as of May 30, Herrmann said.

The closing of the bank came three days after the bank reorganized its board of directors and announced the appointment of a new

At the time of the reorganization, bank vice president Tom Dragoo told the Borger News-Herald that the bank was having difficulty with agriculture loans and also with some oil and gas loans.

The local economy is heavily dependent on agriculture and oil and

The bank was one of four lending institutions in Borger.

The News-Herald responded to the closing with its first extra edition since President John F. Kennedy was assassinated in 1963, said the editor, Glenn McCasland.

"We used old war headline type," McCasland said, with the headline "FNB Shut Down."

"We printed 2,000 copies for street and rack sales," McCasland id. The entire staff took part in producing the edition, he said. It followed the normal press run of 9,000 copies at 1:30 p.m., Mc-

Casland said. He said the decision was made "because of the importance of the bank's relationship to the community and because we felt the citizens of Borger needed to know as many details we could produce as early as possible."

## Spy anticipates appeals court

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Richard W. Miller, the only FBI agent ever convicted of espionage, faces possible life in prison but cheerfully anticipated an appeal of the guilty verdict in his second trial.

"Let's say thank God for the court of appeals," the smiling 49-year-old defendant said Thursday as he was led out of court clutching folders of legal papers between his handcuffed wrists.

Miller, a 20-year veteran who worked in the counterintelligence section of the FBI's Los Angeles office, was convicted of spying for the Soviet Union. U.S. District Judge David Kenyon set sentencing for July 14.

Jurors said Miller's own admissions to FBI inquisitors before his arrest Oct. 2, 1984, had clinched the

case against him. They rejected his claim that his affair with a Soviet woman, Svetlana Ogorodnikov, was part of his plan to become a double agent and infiltrate the Soviet KGB for the FBI. Jurors discounted Mrs. Ogorod-

nikov's dramatic testimony on Miller's behalf as self-serving lies. "I think her motives were plain,"

said juror Cathy Lamprecht. "If we found Miller innocent, she would be innocent. She was lying to us a lot." Mrs. Ogorodnikov, 36, and her hus-

band, Nikolay, 53, are serving federal prison terms after pleading guilty during their spy trial last year.

The 10 women and two men on the jury deliberated 21 hours over four days before convicting Miller on six counts of espionage and bribery.

Shortly thereafter Thursday night, Dole and Senate Democratic Leader Robert C. Byrd of West Virginia struck a deal limiting the number of amendments that will be offered and locking in the time for the final vote. "I'm sure we'll pass this bill by an

overwhelming margin," Dole said. After the the Senate completes action, negotiators from the House and Senate will meet to work out the dif-

## Investigator of fires is suspended

CISCO, Texas (AP) - A policeman who was investigating a string of arson fires here last week has been suspended indefinitely, the police chief said.

Police Chief Billy Rains said R.D. "Rick" Kirkland, 27, was suspended without pay Wednesday pending completion an investigation that has been turned over to the Eastland County Sheriff's Department and Texas Rangers.

'We had recent information from the regional state fire marshal's office in Duncanville that he had been a suspect in some arson fires in Electra," Rains said Thursday.

"For safety reasons and due to the tensions in the city, we felt (the suspension) would be well-advised," the chief said. Kirkland, reached at his home in Cisco by telephone, said he had

no comment on the suspension. He referred all questions to Rains. Kirkland was part of the police force in Electra, about 120 miles north of here, until December 1984, said Ed Olehy, chief of police at

Three damaging downtown fires occurred in Electra in November and December 1984 and no one was charged in connection with those fires, Olehy said.

## Radiation exposure kills patient

TYLER, Texas (AP) - An East Texas Cancer Center patient died three weeks after excessive radiation exposure from a cncer treatment machine that malfunctioned, gfficials disvosed.

Another patient was also overexposed during radiation therapy the previous month and use of the Therac 25 linear equipment has been discontinued, said Dick Higginbotham, East Texas Cancer Center administrator.

"By duplicating the malfunction, the East Texas Cancer Center determined that the cause of the malfunction was in the computer software. It involves an unusual occurrence that can only be replicated by a certain timing and sequence of entries," Higginbotham said Thursday.

The 33-year-old patient who died "was suffering from several lifethreatening diseases," according to a news release from the East Texas Hospital Foundation, parent organization of the cancer

"The man's reaction led us to believe that he had been electrically shocked (in March), so we began investigating the machine to determine how it could have delivered an electrical shock," Higgin-

The second incident occurred in April when a 66-year-old man was treated in the ear area and had a similar experience with the radiation therapy. The patient was later treated at a Dallas hospital, the

and Drug Administration has been completed and forwarded to Washington, D.C., Theodore Rotto of the Dallas FDA said.

## Broke farmers tell their stories

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) -Necie Gresham said she paid \$290 per acre for her 640-acre Lubbock farm when she bought it 12 years ago. When it was foreclosed, a lien holder sold it for \$52 an acre.

"He stole it, and the FmHA sat idly by and let him do that. It left us nothing to pay our debt. It's cruelty," said Gresham, one of about 200 people attending the National Farm Crisis Workers Conference Thursday at the University of Texas at Arl-

The event, sponsored jointly by the Texas Department of Agriculture and FarmAid, brought together farm crisis hotline workers and members of farm advocacy groups from various states who have tried to help farmers during agriculture's tough

"In Texas, this is the only thing farmers can do in their defense against the bureacratic terrorism. Fight back," Gresham said.

Most attending complained that farmers are being put out of business

by an unsympathetic federal government an unmerciful Farmers Home Administration, and a useless 1985

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"Agriculture overall is in a disaster situation," state Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower told the conference.

Hightower took pokes at the Reagan administration, saying 125 years ago the national government took interest in farmers with legislation such as the Homestead Act.

"Today our government is doing

all that it can to take back the land," Hightower said. "It's not just a matter of losing a number of farmers, but we're losing our best farmers. These are people who are efficient, productive, innovative and broke."

Hightower said holding the conference in Texas "reveals the reality that the farm crisis is not an isolated phenomena in the Midwest, but something that has spread clear across the country."

Nancille Gallimore, Texas Farm Crisis Hotline administator, said she has received more than 2,650 calls since January 6 from Texas framers

"These calls ranged from simply what to do on this form, to major problems," Gallimore said.

She said the hotline, funded by a FarmAid grant, the Texas Conference of Churches, legal services and a private Austin firm, is attempting to set up "minor hotlines" in the rural areas. The state's hotline, based in Austin, also refers farmers to lists of attorneys willing to provide free legal help.

Rick Phillips, the assistant to the Idaho director of agriculture, said his state has been much like Texas, "slow to realize this is happening."

But after a 1985 study, "we found out Idaho is in an awful lot of stress" because of the farm tragedy, Phillips said.

Phillips, a former banker, also assists with one of the state's two hotlines. After spending a couple of years repossesing farmers' equipment and property as a banker, Phillips said he began to sympathize with the plight of the farmer.

"I had repossesed sacks of potatoes from some people. I'm a farmboy. I just got tired of it," he

Hightower urged he farmers to become politically involved and vote during 1988 for people sympathetic to the farmers needs.

"We are engaged in a moral, historic struggle. We're not just fighting to save our farms, but to fight for justice."

## Study released on wives' earnings

WASHINGTON (AP) — The wives of men with little or no income tend to bring home more money than women whose husbands earn somewhat more - but the women with the best paying jobs are those married to the most affluent spouses, according to a new Census study.

Overall, 42 percent of American families have two wage earners. with the wives of men in the highest and lowest income brackets earning more than those married to husbands in between.

According to the study of 1984 income, the traditional one-earner family now accounts for only 29 percent of families, followed by 15 percent with no one working; 10 percent with three wage-earners. and 4 percent with four or more people bringing home money.

Census officials have suggested that higher educational levels of both spouses could help account for the higher incomes of women married to higher income men. At the other end of the scale, the wives of lower-income husbands

may be responding to economic necessity in bringing home more money than wives of middle-income men, Bureau statisticians said. Nationally, the report said, median family income increased faster than inflation for the second year in a row in 1984. It climbed 7.1 percent to \$26,430, while the Consumer Price Index went up 4.3

percent from 1983 to 1984. The study found that working wives had median incomes of \$9,437 in 1984. Median income means half made less than that amount and half earned more.

The highest-income group of women, with a median of \$10,727, were wives of men earning between \$35,000 and \$50,000. Wives with the lowest median income - \$5,785 - had husbands in

the \$5,000 to \$6,000 income bracket. But women with husbands who had no earnings at all had median incomes of \$8,859, and wives of husbands in the levels of under \$5,000 recorded median incomes in the \$6,000 to \$7,000 range.

Only in the range of husbands earning more than \$10,000 do wives' incomes climb back above \$8,000, the report shows. Economic pressure to maintain a standard of living was cited as a likely reason for wives earning more than their low-income

husbands by Edward J. Welniak of the Census Bureau, author of the study. To maintain a decent standard of living someone needs to bring in income, and for families with low-income husbands there may be a

GENOA, Italy (AP) — The defendant accused of shooting American passenger Leon Klinghoffer aboard the Achille Lauro cruise ship retracted his confession and denied in court testimony that Klinghoffer was even aboard the ship.

Youssef Magid al-Molqi, 23, declared in testimony Thursday that the charge "was a frame-up between the Americans and the Syrians." U.S. officials identified Klinghoffer's body after it washed ashore in Syria. Prosecutors say the Palestinian pirates, who seized the luxury







#### Alleged use of cocained reported about Len Bias

## Athlete's death still investigated

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) -While a stunned sports world awaited the result of an autopsy on Len Bias, reports indicated the University of Maryland basketball All-American may have used co-caine before he died of an apparent heart attack.

Bias, 22, collapsed in his dormitory room Thursday morning, less than two days after the NBA champion Boston Celtics made him the No. 2 overall pick in the annual league

Both the Baltimore Sun and the Boston Globe, in today's editions, quoted sources as saying Bias may have used cocaine or another drug in

the hours preceding his death.
The 6-foot-8 forward was pronounced dead at 8:50 a.m., EDT, at Leland Memorial Hospital in nearby Riverdale, after two hours of unsuccessful attempts to revive him. His body was taken to the Maryland medical examiner's office in Baltimore for an

Dr. John Smialek, the chief state medical examiner, estimated a complete report would take several days and said his office would not release a preliminary finding. But Dr. Yale Kaplan, a toxicologist with the office, said: "we may know something" by noon today.

Kaplan told the Associated Press that "cocaine has multiple mechanisms that can cause death, either cardiac (heart) or pulmonary (lung) events, but it would not cause heart tissue damage."

Dr. Edward Wilson, chief of emergency services at Leland, said there was "major damage" to Bias' heart but "we don't know what caused the damage."

The Sun quoted Arthur A. Marshall Jr., the Prince George's County State's Attorney, and Dr. John Rogers, the deputy medical examiner for Prince George's and Montgomery counties, as saying that drugs, possibly cocaine, may have been found in Bias' system during the emergency rescue efforts at the

Marshall said a drug screen conducted on the body "indicates there may have been drugs," while Rogers

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was quoted as saying urine tests showed "a trace" of a by-product of a drug that could have been cocaine.

Bob Law, a spokesman for Prince George's County police, said authorities were awaiting the autopsy results to determine the cause of death and whether drugs were involved. He said it could take as long as a week to determine the exact cause of death.

The Globe quoted Celtics President Red Auerbach as saying he was told by Maryland Coach Lefty Driesell that Bias probably used cocaine, perhaps for the first time, at a Thursday morning party.

Auerbach said Driesell called him Thursday afternoon to say authorities told him there were traces of cocaine in Bias' urine.

"He (Driesell) understood that Bias was out someplace, had a couple of beers with his friends and came back to the dormitory," Auerbach was quoted as saying. "Some guy, another student, joined the party and allegedly said, 'Come on, let's have a real celebration."

Driesell answered no questions during an emotional news conference, but Athletic Director Dick Dull, when asked about the reports of cocaine use by Bias, said: "I don't believe in unnamed sources. It would be premature to speculate."

Oil Change Brake Repair routine drug tests on Bias and other members of the team and "we've never had absolutely any kind of indication that there was excess of alcohol or any kind of drug involvement by Lenny Bias."

Frank Grimaldi, head trainer at the University of Maryland, noting Bias was in top physical shape, said, "I'd be willing to bet he had 30 to 50 physicals in the last month. The NBA is very careful about the players they're drafting."

Celtics General Manager Jan Volk declined to say if Bias was tested for drugs during his physical examination, but Volk added, "If it (the report of cocaine usage) is true, I would be shocked."

Close friends and recent acquaintances, team members and longtime college opponents were expressing shock and sadness when describing the death of Len Bias.

Bias' friend Madelyn Woods told

WDVM-TV in Washington that peer pressure could have been a factor if drugs were involved.

"Len Bias would have never done this by himself, not once, ever," she said, adding that if he had used cocaine. "the reaction was so severe because he had no tolerance for it. He had never had it in his system before and that's why this happened."

"When I heard about it, I couldn't believe it was true," Boston Celtics guard Danny Ainge said Wednesday. "Here was a guy I was just with the night before, laughing and smiling and sipping on Seven-Up. He was just on top of the world."

"We'll always consider him a member of the Celtics family," said Celtics President Red Auerbach. "He's a kid ... who just had his main goal in life, which was to be drafted by the Celtics and high by the Celtics

## Rangers defeat A's, 3-2

One of the oldest adages in baseball says that good pitching will always stop good hitting.

And on Thursday night, the youngest player in the major leagues proved it to be true as 20-year-old Edwin Correa pitched the Texas Rangers to a 3-2 victory over the Oakland A's.

The rookie right-hander improved his record to 5-4 by limiting the A's to four hits while walking one and striking out seven, snapping a five-game Rangers losing streak.

"I knew we were struggling to score runs," Correa said, "and I knew the guys were tired from that trip from California. So I told them to just get me a run and I'd try to make it hold up."

The Rangers got him more than one, thanks to seventh-inning solo home runs by Steve Buechele and Oddibe McDowell.

The three runs were more than the Rangers had scored in a game dating back to June 11.

"When you're in a bit of a funk like we've been in," said Rangers manager Bobby Valentine, "you look for a good pitching performance. And that's exactly what we got from Edwin Correa."

The A's also got a good effort from rookie starter Eric Plunk, who went 6 1-3 innings, allowed three runs on five hits and struck out eight. His record, however, fell to 1-3.

"Eric pitched very well tonight,"

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said A's manager Jackie Moore, whose club set a team record by losing for the 11th straight time on the road. "It seems like we go from one extreme to another.

"We have good pitching one night and good hitting the next. We need to have a game when we get it all

The A's were trailing 3-0 before they broke through against Correa in the eighth on Dusty Baker's leadoff double, a groundout and Alfredo Griffin's squeeze bunt.

Jose Canseco hit his 17th homer of the season with two out in the ninth to account for the other Oakland run.

Dave Kingman then followed with

a drive that left fielder Bobby Jones hauled down at the base of the wall in deep left center.

"It was a bad pitch," said Correa. "I knew he hit it well, but not that well. I just didn't want to go extra innings."

The victory, Texas' eighth straight at Arlington Stadium, increased the Rangers' lead over California to one full game in the American League

Elsewhere in the American League, Cleveland defeated Seattle 8-1, Toronto outlasted New York 10-9 in 10 innings, Detroit downed Baltimore 7-5 and Chicago outslugged Minnesota 9-8.

## CARPENTER WORK, Medical examiner suspects suicide

AUSTIN (AP) - The discovery that cyanide found in Anacin-3 capsules had come from a university laboratory has led the Travis County medical examiner to believe an ex-chemistry student committed suicide.

"The evidence is very strong he committed suicide," Medical Examiner Robert Bayardo said Wednes-

The latest evidence was a conclusion by a U.S. Food and Drug Administraton lab in Cincinnati that the poison found in a capsule found in the apartment of Kenneth Wayne Faries, 24, came from a University of Texas laboratory to which he had access.

"One of the samples that was gathered from a chemistry lab that the victim had access to as a student was identified as matching the cyanide recovered from the Anacin capsule," said Sgt. David Parkinson of the Austin police department. Faries was a chemistry stu-

When we found the right sample, the FDA elemental chemistry lab matched it with the sample of poison which had been in the victim's apartment," said Robert Henna, director of the health department's Food and Drug Division.

They begged him to bring Paul to Jerusalem at once. (Their plan was to waylay and kill him.) But Festus replied that since Paul was at Caesarea and he himself was returning there soon. those with authority in this affair should return with him for the trial.
