Have Permit

Owners of advertising signs within 660 feet of Highway 60 and other U.S. and major state highways must apply for permits required under the Texas Highway Beautification act by Dec. 31, according to Texas Highway Department officials. The act requires that anyone

erecting or maintaining signs along the routes must have a license to do so, and controls all signs, large and small, with the exception of those advertising on-premise activities or of fering the property for sale.

In addition to a license, sign owners must have permits for each sign now standing and those to be erected in the future. Sign owners must first obtain

a state license and post a bond. The license fee is \$25 and the license is valid for an indefinite period.

. The license application must be accompanied by a bond in the amount of \$2,500 for each county in which signs are located, or a maximum bond of \$10,000 for owners with signs in more than three counties.

Both license and bond applications may be obtsined by writing the Right of Way Division, Texas Highway as possible.

This marked the second year for him to be tabbed for 'Player of the Year' honors, winning the title as a junior when he guided the Herd to the state quarterfinals.

Marsh, 6-3, 200, who played both ways some of the time, was one of the key men in the Hereford offensive line - a group which helped the team wind up as the top offensive unit in the league.. He was one of three juniors named on the offensive squad.

Short, 5-9, 205, was the 'heart' of the Whitefaces defense and one of the team's co-captains. He missed two and one half games with a broken foot but still managed to rank among the top tacklers in the district. McNutt, 5-10, 145, was another veteran of the defensive unit for the Whitefaces and was the smallest player picked on the all-district teams. He also played both ways, catching 8 passes and scoring twice from his split-end position.

The offensive team selected by coaches had two centers, three tackles, three splitreceivers, and five backs. Joining Kitchens and High in the backfield were Yarbrough and Bobby Pipkin of Monterey, and Arthur Wooley of Plain-

There will be three propositions on the ballot, this giving voters the opportunity to vote for or against any of the three. The issue includes the same items voted down in June of this year, but the three propositions on this bond portunity to make a decision on several items instead of one over-all item

The ballots to be used in the Tuesday election mark the first time in a local election that items to be voted on will be spelled out next to the place for marking the ballot.

The three propositions are:

PROPOSITION NO. 1 'The issuance of \$559,000 bonds and the levying of the tax in-payment therefor (Additions and improvements to existing facilities. Science and P.E. rooms and total electric rewiring at Stanton Jr. High-Additional classrooms and media center at Shirley Elementary-Minor improvements-New high school library)" .

PROPOSITION NO. 2

"The issuance of \$760,000 bonds and the levying of the tax in payment therefor (New elementary school building.

cquistion) PROPOSITION NO. 3

'The issuance of \$71,000. bonds and the levying of the tax in payment therefor (All weather Physical Education drack)"

issue by a vote of 654 to 521. At that time, the issue was for \$1.35 million, but due to higher construction costs and the addition of several items, the

total bond issue has since gone to the \$1.39 million mark. However, the passage of the bond issue would amount to only a very small increase in taxes.

Officials say the increase would amount to only about 2.5 per cent taxes being paid. School officials pointed out that, if this bond issue is passed,

it and all other bonded indebtedness will be paid off by the 1983-84 school year.

Half of the children are from families who base their home in the Hereford area and move north seasonally, while the other half come from South Texas for the harvest season.

A normal school day for children in the Center begins with a bus ride in which the custodian-bus driver and a teacher start picking them up at :00 a.m. in order for the first

The second bus route arrives at 9:00 a.m., where again this next group of children are individually greeted at the door. For some of the children the day begans earlier, children on the first bus route begin to have some of their lessons shortly after their arrival. Following the arrival of the second bus route the children are provided with a hot breakfast free of

After breakfast, all the children join in a short morning group greeting which includes singing and other group interactions. They then are directed into individual play areas where there are blocks. books, manipulative toys, house playing equipment, and art

With each of the eight

begin early. Three separate lessons focus on ideas and concepts, visual, and motor or auditory topics. Rotating from one lesson to the next, each child participates in each of the areas. Three-year-olds are encouraged to learn English during class work and in independent play as preparatory step toward

elementary school. Teaching is based on a written curriculum from Southwest Educational Development Laboratory in Austin, especially prepared for the disadvantaged Spanishspeaking child.

Parent involvement is stressed by the Center staff to help them realize "the importance of their own role as a teacher." Teachers visit with the parents in their homes once each month. Frequently, the students perform for their parents at Parent Meetings.

The school board is composed of 50 per cent of parents of the children at the Center, while the other 50 per cent are community leaders which together compose the Parent Advisory



Service Planned At Church Today

Under optimum irrigation, minimum tilled grain sorghum produced yields equal to conventionally tilled sorghum under a double-row system, according to results of a three-year study at the High Plains Research Foundation. However, it is a different story under reduced irrigation operations.

According to Jim Valliant, research director, available water becomes a limiting factor with reduced irrigation due to lack of water penetration in the minimum tilled area. "The minimum tilled area, which is extremely mellow in the top two to four inches, has a compacted area below this point which reduces lateral water penetration. Even though vertical penetration can be improved by deep chiseling, the effectiveness is reduced because of compaction caused by tillage operations after chiseling and irrigation," he said.

Over a three-year period in the grain sorghum minimum tillage study, Valliant said that under an optimum of three summer irrigations, the minimum tilled sorghum produced 6648 pounds of grain per acre with a return of \$93.98 per acre while the conventionally tilled area produced 6740 pounds with a return of \$92.95 per acre.

Under two summer irrigations, yields were 6899 pounds conventionally with a produced 6179 pounds per acre come sometime later. with a return of \$88.05, a reduction in adjusted gross return of \$11.16 per acre.

"These studies indicate that on grain sorghum irrigation. more frequent irrigation based on stage of growth and not necessarily total amount of irrigation produced higher grain yields, " Valliant said. Complete information and results of the Foundation's minimum tillage grain sorghum study will be part of the 1972 Annual Research Report.





Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

I will agree with your Thursday Brand, "Sound bodies do make for sound minds." I wonder if the Hereford

school voters are aware that our athletic program does not include all the students who wish to participate in athletics. Our present athletic program is run where only 10 per cent of the athletes receive 90 per cent of the benefits.

The top 10 per cent of the athletes get to play all the football games, all the basketball games and all the other sports activities. Many times only a half dozen top athletes get to play in all the sports events just because they are the top athletes. In the past, a boy who is in athletics but not in football has no coach at all. All the coach's time is spent on football. This boy is not even allowed to take calisthenics or use the dressing room of the football boys. It seems he might contaminate the football boys with some rare disease like human decency. The important thing is to win the game. This is the only way the coach can get his full glory.

Another thing that is policy at Hereford schools is the head coach, Mr. Dipple, can declare any student unworthy to participate in sports activities because he has heard some scandal about the student. He can decide by himself who is worthy or unworthy to participate. He can judge the student without ever listening to both sides of the story. He declares himself the right to judge because sports is a privilege that the school offers. This makes it sound like the school is giving the student something, if you call it a "privilege." It is no greater privilege to be in school sports God-given abilities. than it is to be in an English or math class. It is all paid for by the taxpayers.

Of course this rule is certainly unconstitutional. The Bill of guarantees every citizen of the program. United States the right to trial by jury, and rules against cruel


and unusual punishment. In the United States no school official or any individual has the right to judge another and take action against the person. Nowhere does the Constitution exempt these rights to students or teenagers. Even a judge does not have the right to decide the guilt of a person. However one can plead guilty before a judge and the judge can sentence the person. In Texas a boy 17 years or younger cannot even declare himself guilty before a judge without his parents or guardian to declare guilt for him.

The school only teaches human rights and feels it does not have to practice it. This rule or what ever you will call it is the most unconstitutional, unamerican, unchristian, senseless thing I have ever heard of, I wonder if anyone is stupid enough to think you can help a student by making an example out of him and driving him into the ground. This kind of dirty, senseless, radicalism has no place in our school or any other place.

First of all I think the school board should declare the rights of each student to participate in sports activities without being judged worthy or unworthy, and leave the judging to someone else whom the taxpayers have hired to do this job; and the school should stick with the job of education and education only. Second, I think the school board should adopt policies in athletics and other activities of the school which are of the best interest of the students and not which wins the most games or receives the most glory for the work of a few top athletes. Third, I think school board should set up the coaching and extracurricular programs so that all students who wish to participate in sports or other activities can be assured of a. fair part of the time of the coaches as well as play the games and compete in sports activity to each of the students'

Until the school board assures the taxpayer of some equality in our athletic program, I will vote against all Rights of the Constitution proposals to increase their

Hearing Scheduled Feb. 1 In Grain Suit

million dollar class-action suits Continental, defendants in the filed in U.S. District Court in Amarillo have been given a Feb. 1 deadline for appearance in court.

Defendants have 20 days under normal circumstances to file answers to civil suits in

federal court. The delay was granted by Judge Halbert O. Woodward at the requests of the defendants who cited the magnitude of the

suits and the distance involved. Joe Zinser, 36, a Deaf Smith County farmer, filed the first suit Nov. 16 on behalf of some 30,000 Texas wheat farmers who sold wheat between May 1 and Sept. 1 of this year. Zinser seeks \$150 million in damages.

The second suit, filed four days after Zinser's suit, seeks \$180 million for a class represented by seven

Panhandle farmers. Both suits allege violations of the Sherman Antitrust Act in that the U.S. Department of Agriculture was aware of the Russian wheat crop disaster and that advance information was given to the defendant grain corporations.

Defendants in the Zinser suit are Clarence Palmby of New York city, former Department of Agriculture official and a present vice-president of Continental Grain Co.

This time, when the tormented people downstairs went to court, the judge ordered the man to work on weekdays only, from nine to five, and to keep the noise and vibration to a

What role does the landlord play in these conflicts? Must he take action if the downstairs tenant asks for his help? In most cases, the answer is no

Take this example: A downstairs tenant, disturbed by relentless piano playing from the apartment upstairs, asked the landlord to enforce a house rule

against such conduct. But the landlord refused to mix in-and his refusal was upheld in a court hearing. The judge said the rules in a lease are put in primarily for the landlord's benefit, to be enforced or not accord-







Q. When does the federal government abandon prose-cution of a criminal violation

A. Title 26, Ch. 66, Sec. 6531 says: "No person shall be prosecuted, tried or punished

(for offenses) under the Internal Revenue laws unless the indictment is found or information instituted within three years next after the commission of the offense."

Exceptions, in which the period is six years, are: When the offense is fraud, willful evasion of a payment, willful preparation of a false return, willful failure to pay or make a return when required, making a false statement or pre-senting false documents, in-timidation of U.S. officials, offense committed by IRS officials, or conspiracy to de-

feat tax or payment.

Q. My father, 85, has misplaced his will and we can't find it. We have a copy from the lawyer's files, and the lawyer says it will be accepted for probate by an Arizona court. Is he right?

A. Yes. Arizona law says that an exact copy, when supported by oral testimony that it is an exact copy, is admis-



Q. Is an auto manufacturer liable for damages when defective equipment inside a car breaks during an accident and causes injuries to be more serious than need be?

A. In a South Carolina case. a 17-year-old girl was thrown against a gear shift knob in an accident. The knob shattered, and the shift lever penetrated to her spine, causing perma-nent paralysis. Her lawyer presented evidence in court that the knob material would not withstand impact.

When the court ruled for the auto manufacturer, the case was appealed. The Supreme Court of South Carolina ruled that a manufacturer must be expected to anticipate the environment which is normal in the use of his product, including possible collisions. He must protect the user against foreseeable risks of using his product in that environment Judgment was made in favor of the injured girl (Mickle v. Blackmon, 252 SC 202).

Q. My mother deeded her house to me four years before her death. It was agreed that she should live with us in the house for the rest of her life. Now, two years after her death, the estate still isn't settled. The federal tax office insists that the house must be included in her estate, and estate taxes paid on it. I say the house is mine. Must it be included in her estate?

A. In the Kerdolff case (57 Tax Court No. 66), the court ruled that the agreement between a daughter and her mother (that the mother was to live for the rest of her life in

complishment, a sense of being able to do at least some things well - factors like these will all help scuttle the need for pushing others around. So what can you help your


youngster learn to do well? In what kind of achievement can she take real pride? Don't expect changes to de-





Q. Everyone who is supposed to know maintains that a dog is not capable of original thought. If that is the case can you explain this act of my 13year-old beagle and terrier mixed breed of dog?

I do not carry my billfold around the house but do, of course, put it in my pocket before going to the store or using the car. Often I take Bugle, the beagle, with me.

A few days ago I pocketed my billfold before going out in the car. Bugle watched me and immediately ran to where his leash was hanging on a doorknob and hit the strap with his nose.

I thought, at that time, that his action had followed mine by coincidence.

Last evening my wife and I were preparing to go out in the car. Bugle was watching us. I told my wife of the dog's action of a few days previously and wondered if he would repeat it when I pocketed my billfold.

I put the billfold in my pocket and Bugle ran out and again hit his leash with his nose!

What's your opinion? Is this a thinking process? - J.T., Salem, Oregon.

A. Be thankful your dog isn't a pick-pocket; you'd be in big trouble then. The question of whether

animals actually can develop thought processes such as hu-mans are capable of devising is an interesting topic of con-jecture which could better be explained by animal and-or human psychiatrists. Most likely, however, your dog associates the physical action of your placing your billfold in your pocket with another often-repeated action on-your part of taking your pet out-side. Notice I used the word

association, meaning a form of mental conditioning whereby one act, if frequently followed by another act, will cause a specific response. Do you not often take your dog outside after placing your billfold in your pocket? This is

the basis of a noted scientist's experiment, whereby repetition of one act will elicit the same response by an animal every time the act is repeated. Pavlov proved this conditioned response behavior in dogs by ringing a bell and then immediately feeding the animal. This action was repeated many times until Pavlov once rang the bell but offered no food to the animal. Yet, the animal actually began salivating and "licking his chops," even though no

food was offered. This very incident that has developed with you is the basis of training of animals: repeated action to cause the same reaction by the animal every time.

Interpreting brings light to the blind

Albert B. Caldwell was born blind. Both of his eyes were covered with thick cataracts. The doctors knew of no way at that time to treat this condition. Al never saw a glimmer of light all the time he was growing up.

His parents made his life as rich as possible by all the love and faith that they could give him. He was so well protected that he didn't know he was dif-

When Al was 5 years old and playing with his visiting cousin, Rex. he was thrown a ball. Rex had forgotten that Al was blind. "Duck," Rex yelled. "It is going to hit you!"
The ball did hit Al. He was

not hurt, but he was totally dazzled. He asked his mother, "How could Rex know what is going to hit me before I know

The moment that she had put off, and dreaded, was there. She had to tell her son in words that he could understand that he was blind. She used a method that I have never forgotten. She took one of his hands in hers and started counting the fingers.

"These fingers are the same number as what we call our five senses," she said. "This finger is for hearing; this finger is for touching; this one is for smelling; this one is for taste.

And then she went on more slowly: "This little finger is for sight. Each of these senses like your finger sends a message to your brain. Then she closed the little finger which she had named sight and taped it so that it would be next to the palm of Al's hand

The most important recent development in the fiber glass industry is the development of "Beta Glass." It is an ultra-fine, continuous filament that is stronger than other glass yarns and is more flexible.

Glass has very good sunlight resistance. Drapes made of glass can be used on a west or south exposure with no weakening of the fibers. If the drapes are solution dyed rather than printed, the dye will also be fast to sunlight and washing.

Smog and other air impurities have an effect on many fibers, however, glass is unaffected. Glass furnishings will hold their shape almost indefinitely.

Fire resistance is an excellent property of glass. The only times that glass has been found to be flammable is when it has been treated with flammable resinous finishing

The only glass fibers that are resistant to abrasive wear are continuous filament fibers such as Beta Glass.

Glass articles need little care to keep them looking new. However, special handling is necessary. Glass should never be dry cleaned.

Machine washing glass is permitted provided a very gentle action is used and the tub rinsed out thoroughly before loading it with other clothes.

Glass should never be spin dried, twisted or wrung.

The best way to clean glass articles is to wash by hand. Use a mild detergent, mix thoroughly with warm-hot water. Squeeze gently after 15 minutes of soaking.

Drip dry until most of the moisture is removed, then hang on rods to finish drying. If you purchase glass drapes, be sure they hang so that they don't touch the floor or window sill.

These cautions are very important because glass dust and particles will break off the fibers whenever abrasion is applied to the fabric. These particles are microscopic in size but can cause severe medical problems. If they come in contact with the eye, they can cause eye damage. If they are inhaled or swallowed, lung and stomach damage may occur. Extreme caution must be taken when

handling glass fabrics. I do not recommend glass drapes or curtains being used in a house where small children or pets are present.

The list of "new concepts" in condominium housing developments is becoming as long as the term condominium itself. The latest is a plan called "time-sharing owner-

A few years ago, the public was just beginning to understand what a condominium was all about. It was usually identified with a multi-story apartment building where residents totally owned the cube of air comprising their own apartment unit.

Then entered stage-center garden apartments and town houses. Later, came the development of several highly successful projects of single family detached homes packaged in a bright new condominium-type wrapping (all maintenance and landscaping totally and consistently handled by professionals).

Condominiums have also widened its spectrum of building types to include office buildings, commercial centers and vacation or "second"

breaking new ground it's the later type of housin - vacation homes - where we see the application of the new "time-sharing ownership" plan. One firm, the In-

nisfree Corporation, a Hyatt Corp. subsidiary, now offers such a plan at a new waterfront condominium development at Lake Tahoe, in Northern California. Each buyer retains a one-

eleventh ownership share in a furnished condominium unit. He will be authorized to use his "time-share" unit four weeks each year. For that period, he will be the deeded owner, with full rights to resell and transfer ownership. In addition to loan payments, each owner must pay a share of the management and operating expenses.

Tax advantages and the time-old "pride of ownership" (if only for a short period each year) are primary factors motivating buyers. The minimum one-month occupancy can be divided into two, twoweek periods each year.

Other similar "time-shar ng ownership" condominium developments are now planned in Flagstaff, Ariz.; Acapulco, Mexico; and Maui in Hawaii

The Board and school administration have carefully and thoroughly analyzed the present facility requirements of the district. The following is a description of the three propositions appearing on the ballot for your consideration. A brief statement on reasons for each issue is included.

A. The state now requires 7th and 8th grade science to be a laboratory course. Science facilities_at Stanton Junior High, which were constructed in 1925, are inadequate and substandard to current state requirements. Present science rooms will be used for regular classrooms helping to relieve crowded conditions at Stanton.

B. The capacity of present P.E. dressing rooms, shower, and storage facilities at Stanton Junior High School is less than one-half of what is needed to take care of present enrollment.

C. Electrical wiring in old portion of Stanton Building is obsolete and inadequate for operation of present teaching equipment, and is hazardous.

D. Media center and additional classroom space are vitally needed at Shirley Elementary. Present facilities

will not accommodate the enrollment on this campus. Three classes are currently meeting on the stage area, and three Special Education classes now meet in a schoolowned house and the First Christian Church. Being the second oldest elementary building, no facilities are available for testing, speech therapy, counseling, and

storage. E. Minor improvements are needed at all campuses such as replacing a number of window units at Stanton Junior High, re-roofing of outside walkways between buildings at Stanton, replacement of numerous plumbing fixtures at Hereford High School and other schools.

F: The High School Library does not meet the Southern Association standards for accreditation. The present library would be converted to needed classrooms. Six classes are now meeting in portable buildings constructed by high school building trades classes.

A. Site acquisition and construction of a new elementary building to replace Central School.

The original structure at Central has been in use for the past 62 years with minor renovations. The building, in many ways, is obsolete with inadequate restrooms and

other plumbing facilities, very limited playground area, substandard lighting and electrical system, and unavailability of space for other educational activities. Central School has outlived its usefulness and the present location isolates a minority ethnic population.

A. All-weather physical education instructional areas at elementary schools. This would provide for a more effective physical education program meeting state and national standards at each elementary campus. This type of area has been proven successful in allowing for a wide range of activities especially during bad weather.

Field House Addition:

Present fieldhouse is completely inadequate to accommodate the 120 plus athletes that now use these facilities. In addition, visiting teams in football and baseball must use La Plata Junior High dressing rooms, which interferes with the program in operation at that school.

No district track meet can be scheduled for Hereford with present track facilities. An all-weather track will enable Hereford athletes to improve skills while performing in track events that carry over into all other

The track will be utilized by not only high school athletes, but by both junior high schools and the six elementary schools, as well as numerous outside in-

dividuals. Additions and improvements will, of necessity, cost additional tax dollars; however, the increase will be of minimal proportions for the value received for our children and the community.

Don't Cut Corners

Patrons of the Hereford Independent School District face an important decision in the Dec. 12 bond election. It is not a "do-or-die" matter, but one that vitally effects adequate facilities for our children.


Although you may have heard statements to the contrary, we beleive there are basically just two questions before us. Do we think these capital improvements are needed, and are we willing to pay for them?

Keep in mind that the men we elected to the school board don't like higher taxes, either. They have determined what they think are real needs of our schools and are asking us

to approve them at a slight increase in taxes. They have grouped these needs into three areas, giving voters an opportunity to pick and choose-but we find no "frills" in any of the issues.

What will it cost? If all three issues are approved, it has been determined that no more than 2.5 percent hike would be needed. For example, if your tax bill was \$200 last year, it would be raised only \$5.

The ever-rising tax burden is a problem for all, but we don't beleive our local education system is the place to start cutting corners. We urge your support of all three issues in the school bond election!



for whatever reason, is a pitiless and inhuman act. Bred from fanatic fear and blinded by hatred, it reveals man in his most evil nature.

It is a tribute to man and fortunate for society that terrorism has not attracted more advocates throughout history. That it exists at all, however, is an ugly reminder of man's imperfections. Expressing the outrage shared in many capitals throughout the world, the Congress of the United States 'swiftly adopted a resolution sternly condemning "...any people or any nation giving sanctuary, support, sympathy, aid, or comfort to acts of murder and barbarism such as those at. Munich."

The President responded to the challenge of these events by creating a Cabinet-level committee within the executive branch to combat terrorism. As a member of that committee, I have

most carefully examined the FBI's responsibilities to insure that every precaution is taken in our investigations in order to expose terrorists and their plans.

Our first line of defense against lawlessness of all degrees is - as it always has been - the alertness and decisiveness of the thousands of dedicated local and State law enforcement agencies across our land. The energy and devotion they display in fulfilling their manifold duties are the best means of detecting anddeterring terrorists in our midst. You may be sure that in matters outside FBI jurisdiction we will extend to our brother law enforcement agencies at all levels every assistance within our authority in the intensified effort to bring prompt apprehension and certain punishment to any engaging in June brought to a head a terroristic acts.

Terrorism is by no means a solely foreign menace. Sadly, our country has had its share of those who practice this loathsome_art. The nationwide awareness must concern itself with terrorists of every persuasion and from every quarter. We cannot afford to do less, for they challenge the very heart of law enforcement duty protection of the community.

When terrorism succeeds, society loses more than lives or ransoms - it loses respect for itself and confidence in its law enforcement sentinels.

Public TV Strayed Down Wrong Path

Washington, D.C. - Public television, formerly known as Educational TV, is a needed service that had done a lot of good in its short life until it strayed down a leftward path and forced a Presidential veto of a measure for a substantial increase in Federal funding.

President Nixon's veto last festering situation. Holdover Democrats appointed by Lyndon Johnson, who had Broadcasting, had been running the show until then. Now a new team is in charge and a restructuring is under way.

New Chairman of the Corporation board is Thomas Curtis, former Republican Congressman from Missouri, an avowed conservative. New

President of CPB is Henry Loomis, a wealthy man who has been in and out of government since 1950, and was moved up from Deputy Director of the U.S. Information Agency and Director of its Voice of

CPB brought together what had been a loose-knit Educational TV network. Two years ago, CPB established the Public Broadcasting Service, which linked together a chain of pushed through Congress 227 public TV outlets, plus legislation to establish the hundreds more public radio Corporation for Public stations. The expansion was hit. fostered by Federal funds for equipment and programming.

PBS became controversial in hurry. An early move was to plunge into public affairs programs and to hire Sander Vanocur, a liberal commentator formerly with the National Broadcasting System.

When it was revealed that Vanocur was receiving \$85,000 a year in tax dollars, even Democrats in Congress screamed in protest.

Even Stations Protest

Theoretically, public TV is supposed to supply cultural and educational programs which are not feasible on the commercial networks. Several notable successes, such as the hit show for children, "Sesame Street," demonstrated a possibilities of public TV. "The Advocates," a debate series, was another widely acclaimed

But PBS soon went overboard with liberally-oriented programs from Washington. and as early as October, 1971, a Nixon spokesman registered a protest. Public TV had become a political issue, and so it remains today. Liberals in Congress pushed through a \$65 million PBS authorization bill, annually for two years. Nixon wielded his veto pen and succeeded in cutting the authorization to \$45 million, for one year.

Even some local station managers became disenchanted with PBS. executive of a Minneapolis outlet called the Nixon veto "not only justified but necessary." He complained of unbalanced public affairs programs and charged Washington officials with interpreting their mission "as one of providing to an important segment of the American public an extreme lift-wing view of both domestic politics and our international dealings."

Another criticism of PBS is that it is trying to compete with NBC, CBS, and ABC for a mass audience, instead of fulfilling its intended role as a sup--plementary service stressing cultural programs aimed at the minority who find commercial shows too bland, as well as overcommercialized.

Public Pays the Bill

That \$45 million Uncle Sam is devoting to support of public TV gives John Q. Citizen the right to have his say about public TV. Those dollars are not plucked from a money tree but come from the pockets of taxpayers. It is scandalous when even a part of that money goes to promote one idealogical view. whether that view be liberal or conservative.

It is to be hoped that the restructuring of public TV now being undertaken by the Administration will get this national experiment back on the right track. Federal funds should go for innovative but non-political programs. The Nixon appointees now in command should resist the temptation to swing the penduleum to the other side.

Talk Of Texas

THE INDIANS ARE COMING - If a 1967 decision by the U.S. Court of Claims is allowed to stand, the Federal government may give Texas back to the Indians.

Not literally, of course. But unless the decision is reversed, it will mean that Indian tribes who can prove aboriginal title to Texas: soil eventually will have to be compensated for their ancestral

According to W.W. Newcomb, Jr., the University of Texas resident expert on Indians, the red men were done out of their claims to any real estate when Texas entered the Union. The resolution that made Texas a state instead of an independent republic specifically gave the new commonwealth ownership and control of all of its putilic lands.

When Texas became a state in 1845, about 20,000 Indians (all wards of Uncle Sam) were living on these lands. The statehood resolution rendered them legally homeless, except for the Alabama-Coushattas. Texas provided this tribe with a reservation in 1854 in Polk County. They still oc-

In 1967, another Texas tribe, the Lipan Apaches, took their problems to court. The Court of Claims ruled that Indians did have title to Texas land and had the right to seek legal redress. Since then, several tribes have put their lawyers to work. The 1967 decision is on appeal.

If the Indians win, they probably won't be handed title to a lot of valuable real estate. Instead each tribe probably will get a cash settlement.

policewoman loiters in a neighborhood frequented by prostitutes and arrests anyone who makes a pass at her. The union thinks the very presence of a policewoman is "entrapment," and offers to defend those arrested.

Now, the police department's plan probably is a moderately silly activity for it to spend much time at. But it will be a lot more effective thanks to the unwitting help from the CLU, which has insured a lot of newspaper stories by involving itself. This certainly will advance the police objective of scaring away the prostitutes' customers, though wether it's in the best interest of those arrested is another matter

entirely. What intrigues us, though, is the remark by Ira Glasser, executive director of the NYCLU, that the group is interested not only because of its entrapment theory but because it doesn't like laws providing criminal penalties for prostitution and other victimless crimes. In other words, their court campaign is only incidentally interested in insuring that civil liberties are not infringed by police tactics. What the CLU really wants to do is change the law, or second best, come up with legal theories that make it impossible to

enforce. Changing the prostifution law may or may not be a good idea, but it seems to us that trying to change it by guerrilla war waged in the courts can only debase the judicial system, which after all is the ultimate protection of all civil liberties. What the CLU really ought to do is pack up its lobbying and take it up to the legislature where it belongs.

When it comes to the solid waste problem in Texas - and there is a big one - recycling comes to the fore as being the way of conserving once-used products by making them into new products.

In this way, it's possible that your old car could come back as your new refrigerator. Aside from providing an economic value to your refuse, recycling can cut down on the one-way flow of materials from the assembly line to the consumer to the junk heap.

It could also help alleviate the collection and disposal problem for governments and citizens of our country, and health hazards produced by the very nature of

In Texas alone, ap-, and composting plants. proximately five pounds of solid waste are produced daily by each person. More than \$55 million are spent annually by communities for the collection and disposal of domestic solid waste, not including industrial and agricultural wastes.

Look at the solid waste problem this way: In Texas there are approximately 900 organized land disposal sites for municipal refuse which occupy 40 square miles of land, In addition, it is estimated that there are more than 1,000 promiscuous dump grounds.

Some of these disposal sites meet State Health Department operational requirements, -but many are deficient in meeting

minimal health standards Here's another view of solid waste: As many as 20 million abandoned and iunk automobiles are estimated to be lying around the United States and some seven million cross the line from transportation to junk each year. It is estimated that more than 200 million tires

Had a soft drink recently? More than forty-eight billion cans and 26 billion bottles are produced annually in this country - most of them

throwaways. Yet, in all of these discarded items there are reusable materials. Most constituents of solid waste - steel, aluminum, glass, rubber, paper - if separated and cleaned could be used almost as easily as virgin materials...and at great savings to our natural resources.

At present, some of the most successful recycling is in the areas of paper and metal, lessening the annual consumption of raw materials.

Basically, there are three commonly accepted methods of waste disposal: sanitary landfilling, incineration and composting. In Texas, there are fewer than 20 incinerators

The most practical form of solid waste disposal in Texas has been the sanitary landfill. In a properly operated sanitary landfill, refuse is disposed of by burial, often on land which can be filled and reclaimed for some use such as a park or golf course. The wastes are systematically dumped, compacted and then covered daily by a thin layer of dirt. In this manner, the landfill is kept free of health hazards.

But proponents of recycling argue that we are spending literally millions of dollars to bury treasure, treasure that lies dormant underground or

Dear School Patrons,

December 12th is a very important and decisive day for Hereford and it's future. December 12th is the date for the School Bond Elections and whether it passes or not is going to depend on citizens like yourself.

The future of Hereford's continued growth depends on providing facilities for quality education; and this, Hereford schools have done and will continue to do. Now there is a need for a new school building to replace Central School. The increase in taxes is a very small price to pay for what we will get in return — better facilities for quality education.

1. Who is eligible to vote?

Any person who is registered and owns property in the County of Deaf Smith — such as owning a car, a boat or trailer house. You do not necessarily have to own a house to be considered eligible to bote. There will be a ballot box for nonproperty owners.

2. What if I have lost my voter registration receipt, can I still vote?

Yes, you can by signing an affidavit.

3. What if I am eligible to vote but cannot read English?



drafts. This plant is easy to care for, and does add a bit of cheery color to most any room. The small peppers may be used for seasoning after they ripen. I have grown them for years, and in the garden they make a very colorful border. If you should receive a Christmas pepper save some of the matured peppers and plant in the new growing season.

AZALEA: With good light and no hot afternoon sun, this lovely plant will bloom several weeks. Add approximately 1/4 cup of water to the plant daily. Should be tepid water.

Do not keep in a room where the heat is higher than 65 degrees. Feed every two weeks with liquid houseplant fertilizer. The colors of the azaleas are beautiful and varied enough that they will fit into most any

NORFOLK ISLAND PINE: Here's a hardy choice for that someone on your list who has trouble growing things. This easy-care plant resembles a full-sized tree in miniature. Indoors it reaches two to five feet, requiring moderate light and reasonable watering.

At Christmas time it can be decorated with tiny clever decorations, adding a bit of Christmas cheer and beauty. It requires some full sun and if soil is covered with dried moss the moisture will be more even and will aid in creating humidity.
