## BURLESQUE PLAY

The feature of the shower for the Hereford Sanitarium held at the Court-house Thursday night was a Playlet in one act, without name, put on by pupils of Miss Bruce Bradley's class in expression. "Ah," remarked Dr. Price, "I must come out right now. Wheel the patient into the operating room!"

## Wheat by Irrigation Proven Good By J. L. Johnson

J. L. (Jake) Johnson, enterprising farmer who lives about three miles north on 25-Mile Avenue, has demonstrated this year that spring wheat can be raised successfully and for a profit by irrigation.

About April 20 Mr. Johnson drilled in wheat on land that had not been plowed for two years and moisture was supplied as needed by irrigation. He made splendid wheat on all of the ground except those high patches not touched by the water, where he realized only from three to five bushels per acre.

Mr. Johnson believes that by proper preparation of the soil and by the use of irrigation when water is really needed he can raise forty bushels of wheat to the acre. He thinks the Macaroni variety the best for this purpose, owing to its solid stalk.

## 92 CARS OF GRAIN SHIPPED IN 60 DAYS

CAR SHORTAGE CRIPPLES  
OUTPUT FROM

Inquiries among grain men and others indicate that during the months of July and August to date about 92 cars of wheat have been shipped from Hereford, Dawn, Joel and Summerfield stations. About twenty-five of these have been sent out from the smaller stations and the remainder from Hereford.

There has been a severe shortage of cars available for shipping so far this summer and the shipments are really just beginning. The heavy shipments are yet to come as soon as cars are available.

## Bryson Loses Big Grass Acreage in Hot Prairie Fire

One of the worst prairie fires that has swept West Texas in years occurred last Monday near Brady, Texas, when more than 6,000 acres of grass was snuffed out long the east line of Concho county.

The heaviest loser was Bryan Bryson of Coleman, Texas, husband of the former Miss Grace Smith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Smith of Hereford. Mrs. Bryson only recently visited from her daughter this week stating that she and her husband were just leaving for the scene of the fire to check up the damage. The Dallas News carried the following item concerning this conflagration:

"One of the biggest prairie fires that has swept this section of the country in years burned out more than 6,000 acres of land along the east line of Concho County late Monday."

The fire broke out when a Mexican hauling water for a tanking crew in the mountain pasture of T. F. Bengo, dropped a match in the dry grass.

The burned range included about 400 acres in Bengo's pasture, nearly 6,000 acres of the Bryan Bryson land and small parcels of land on the Will Bryson and Gerald Bryson ranches."

## PLATFORM LIGHTS TO BE ERECTED IN THE NEAR FUTURE

Nearly all the material and equipment for the installation of the platform lights at the Santa Fe passenger station, and the work is expected to start here by the railroad. The work was offered to the local electric company, but declined, owing to the exacting conditions of a railroad contract. The curtailed passenger train service is restored. It is hoped by both the residents of Hereford and the local officials of the Santa Fe that these trains will be put back as soon as conditions will enable the railroad to do so.

## A STRAW VOTE?

City Commission Wants Citizens' Views on Which Policy to Adopt

What do the majority of the automobile owners of Hereford and vicinity desire to do: Leave the parking ordinance as it is at present, change to side parking, or keep the three business blocks carrying the most traffic entirely and hitch their jitneys on the side streets?

That's the question that is uppermost in the minds of the three city commissioners right now.

The question was precipitated by the suggestion made by the construction foreman now at work repairing the streets that the life of the pavement would be doubled if the ordinance was changed to throw traffic into the middle for awhile. Advocates of both the present and the proposed parking ordinance have been discussing the matter for some time. The third suggestion, to keep the three main blocks clear entirely, was an original suggestion from J. R. Jones.

The Commissioners would like to have the opinion of everybody on this subject. Mayor Knight wrote the Elrod Engineering Co. for their opinion and they replied that many cities changed their parking ordinances annually or at regular intervals, in order to prolong the life of their paving and that such a change here would probably prove to be a wise move for the tax payers. On the other hand there are many advocates of the present parking system who believe it to be the best and most convenient all around.

The Mayor is talking about getting the views of the people through a "plebiscite," or petition, carrying all three propositions, so that signatures could be obtained on each form of ordinance desired by each individual. In that way a straw vote would result and the commission would have some guide in deciding the matter.

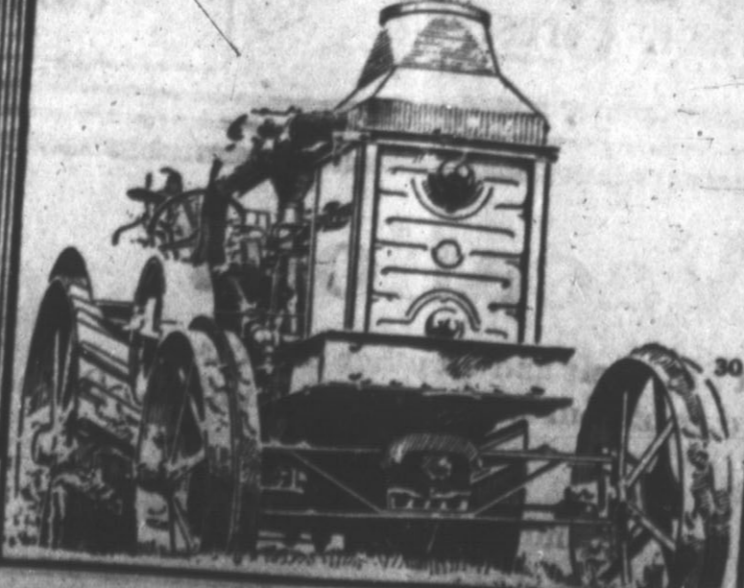

## BREEDERS OF BOLSHIEVISM

The New York papers print the fol-  
lowing news dispatch with much satis-  
faction, on their front pages:

Washington—Referring to Henry  
Ford as "an over-zealous entrepreneur"  
(enterpriser) who should not be per-  
mitted "for purposes of his own to  
break down freight rates upon which a  
number of railroads principally depend  
for their livelihood," the Northwestern  
Virginia Coal Association protested to-  
day to the Interstate Commerce Com-  
mission against coal rate reductions  
proposed by Mr. Ford's road, the De-  
troit, Toledo & Ironton.

Birds of a feather WILL stick to-  
gether, although we do not refer to the rail-  
roads as thieves. The Northwestern  
Virginia Coal Association consists of  
big coal operators. And at that, some  
coal operators are honest.

We all remember that during the war  
large numbers of the big coal operators  
in the United States pocketed, ruthlessly  
and without shame, hundreds and  
even thousands of per cent profit on  
their investment in a single year. Now  
that the war and inflation are over and  
the rest of us who have anything to sell  
are compelled to swallow our losses and

we can get for our  
of the coal operators are  
uphold the old profiteering  
of coal that was \$4 before  
now anywhere from \$10 to

And don't let them fool you  
story that the heavy increas-  
ers' wages is the cause. That  
could be sold from \$6 to \$7 a  
reasonable profit, despite the  
average scale and high railroad rates.  
The operators are doing everything  
their power to keep up the wholesale  
price of coal and boost Bolshevism in  
this country. They know that if Ford  
reduces the railroad rate on fuel 20 per  
cent, coal will be cheaper in some places,  
and that the tendency therefore will  
be to force down prices everywhere at  
the mines.

The protest to Washington is only a  
part of the same game which kept coal  
prices up this summer—kept them so  
high that people wouldn't buy. That  
mountain closed down mines and no wage  
expenses for the operators. When win-  
ter comes, people will simply have to  
buy. Then the operators will open up  
the mines and the excessive demand  
will send prices kiting higher than ever.  
And, as usual, they'll make the innocent  
retail coal dealer stand the brunt of it.

Let Henry Ford sell his goods for  
what he pleases, or give them away if  
he wants. But if there is to be an in-  
vestigation, let's investigate those  
breeders of Bolshevism—the coal oper-  
ators.

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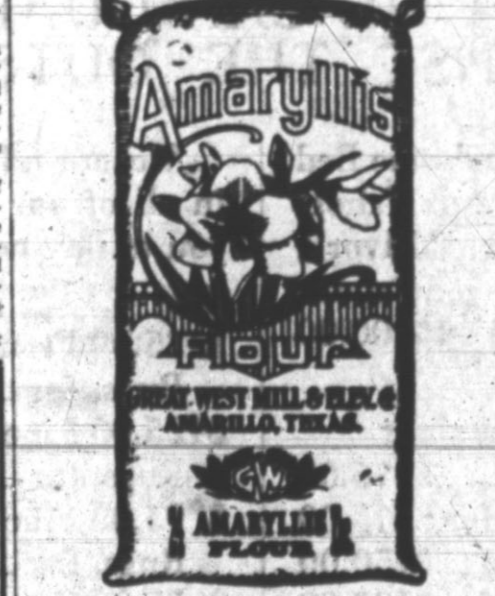
