Summer, renovations bring 'hot' problem to county

Deaf Smith County Commissioners have a "hot" problem to solve. Until they do, courthouse employees are without air conditioning.

Commissioners learned Monday that jail construction has made it necessary to move the air conditioning condenser units that rest on the roof of the jail. County Judge Glen Nelson told the court that unless a solution is found, courthouse employees will probably spend most of the summer without air conditioning.

County Clerk David Ruland said opening the windows hasn't worked well in his office, because dust and

dirt blowing in has coated papers kept in this office.

Also during Monday's regular meeting, commissioners heard a report from the county's co-chairmen for the 1986 sesquicentennial celebration, Garth Thomas and Argen Draper.

Thomas said a representative from the state sesquicentennial commission will be in Hereford May 13 to make the county's committee an official organization.

"It's a program that is just natural for this county," Thomas said of the planned celebration. He said the events would be organized around a "Deaf Smith" theme because of the Texas military figure the county is

named for.

The court gave an Amarillo radio station permission to stage a free country and western concert on the courthouse steps. The event is planned for Saturday, May 4.

Commissioners voted to accept a lease-purchase agreement from AT&T for a new telephone system for the sheriff's department. Jail renovation makes the new equipment necessary.

At the request of Deaf Smith County Chief Tax Appraiser Fred Fox, the court voted to allow county tax rates to be frozen for persons over 65. The school district already has such a

Inflation rate up .5 percent

WASHINGTON (AP) — Soaring gasoline prices sent the inflation rate up 0.5 percent last month, the government reported today. Food costs held steady.

Analysts said the overall increase at the retail level, the sharpest since January 1984, stemmed mostly from actual higher gasoline costs plus an unusual seasonal adjustment factor that made the final figure look even worse.

Food prices, also seasonally adjusted, were flat for the first time since last May.

But motor fuel costs ended a three-month decline and rose 3.8 percent after falling 2.6 percent in the previous month.

Without the seasonal adjustments, a process intended to remove predictable, periodic forces from the calculation, overall March prices

rose 0.4 percent, the same as in February.

Coupled with the 0.3 percent seasonally adjusted gain in February and the 0.2 percent in January, the Labor Department's Consumer Price Index so far this year has risen a moderate 4.1 percent at an annual rate.

This compares with a 4 percent rise for all of last year. Analysts expect inflation will run at about the same pace in 1985, giving the United States its fourth straight year of moderate inflation.

As recently as 1980, prices soared 12.4 percent in a single year, and that followed a 13.3 percent jump in 1979. Both figures were attributed in large part to drastically higher fuel prices as revolution in Iran plunged oil markets into turmoil, causing gasoline lines in the United States

and shortages around the world.

Since then, crude oil prices have declined sharply and, until recently, have translated into lower prices at

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Foreign policy debates launched

WASHINGTON (AP) — In a foreign policy battle reminiscent of the Vietnam era, Congress launched showdown debates today on President Reagan's call for \$14 million in aid to Nicaraguan rebels. Republicans warned that defeat would permit a Soviet beachhead in Central America while Democrats decried U.S. support for terrorism.

Starting with unusual early morning sessions, the Senate and the House each scheduled 10 hours of debate to prepare for final votes on whether to release the aid sought by Reagan for the CIA-backed Contras.

As debate began, Sen. Paul Simon, D-Ill., warned that the United States could reap the whirlwind by resuming aid to the Contras.

While criticizing some of the Sandinista government's actions, Simon said: "Violence invites violence. ... If we use terrorism against other countries, other countries will feel justified in using terrorism against us."

Rep. Edward P. Boland, D-Mass.,

former House Intelligence Committee chairman, said the CIA's three years of support for the Contras have "brought down public scorn upon that agency" and that the plan for renewed aid "is a way into a morass."

But House Republican leader Robert Michel of Illinois charged that the Sandinista government will "aid the Soviet Union in establishing an enclave in this hemisphere. ... Because of that, I believe the United States ... has the moral, diplomatic and geopolitical right and duty to aid Nicaraguans who wish to have a ... democratic society in Nicaragua."

House Democrats were confident they had the votes to defeat both Reagan's initial plan and a milder GOP alternative. The situation in Senate was not so clear.

The House Republican proposal, sponsored by Michel, would ship \$14 million in non-lethal aid to the Contras through the U.S. Agency for International Development, instead of the CIA as Reagan asked.

A House Democratic plan would give \$10 million to Nicaraguan refugees through the Red Cross or United Nations and set aside \$4 million for implementing a possible peace settlement.

But on Monday, attention focused on the White House, where the demonstration against Reagan's Nicaragua policies led to about 300 arrests for disorderly conduct and demonstrating without a permit, and where Senate Democrats presented a compromise plan to Reagan and Senate Republicans.

"We believe that (peace) cannot occur unless there is dialogue between the parties in Nicaragua and ... it won't succeed — even if it begins — as long as there is a big arms buildup" on the Sandinista side, said a senior White House official.

Lawmen investigate thefts, dog bites,

Officers investigated five reports of assault, all resulting from domestic disputes, and talked to juveniles who were riding shopping carts at a local convenience store.

Juveniles were also witnessed destroying a pay telephone. The damage was reported to the telephone company but no value has been placed on the loss.

A Dimmitt man reported the theft of stereo equipment from his truck while it was parked at a local repair shop, and a convenience store clerk

reported that two men who wanted to buy beer past the legal hour laid money on the counter and walked out with a six-pack. The incident is considered a theft.

Sheriff's deputies investigated reports of domestic disputes and dog bites over the weekend and made one arrest for public intoxication.

Deputies investigated the burglary of a habitation which resulted in a \$569 loss. Thomasa Muniz, 427 Mable, had a VCR and portable cassette player taken from his residence.

F.A. and David Marnell reported the theft of a loading chute valued at \$1,000 from their farm west of Hereford, and Bob Hester of Rt. 1 told deputies a \$775 saddle was taken from his pickup while parked at a local restaurant.

Hereford Volunteer Firemen responded to several rescue calls and one fire over the weekend.

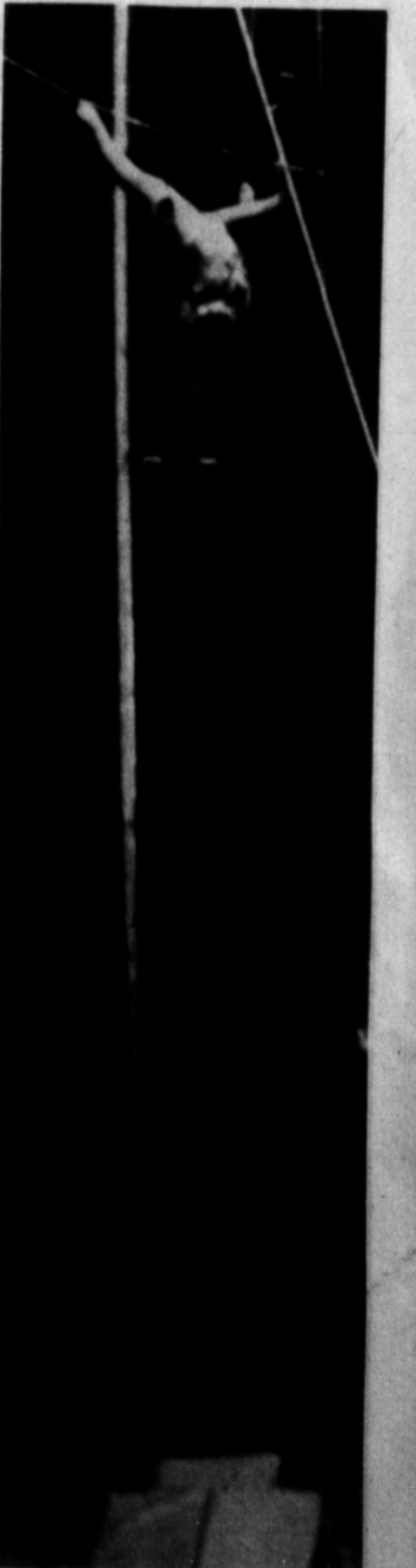
Bethany Townsend, 6, daughter of Mr. & Mrs. Bill Townsend, was treated and released at Deaf Smith General Hospital Friday evening

Labor regulation hearings this week

Public hearings to address migrant labor camp regulations proposed by the Texas Department of Health are planned for Wednesday at the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center.

The department is considering revising the regulations to upgrade the condition of migrant labor housing in the state. TDH says revision is necessary to protect the health and safety of the occupants.

Among those expected to testify at the hearings are public health, consumer and farm labor groups that strongly endorse the revision of the regulations.

Farm worker advocates charge that the health and safety of migrant farm workers is endangered by the poor quality of migrant labor camp facilities. They cite a 1980 study that found labor camps nationally and in Texas to be in "abysmal, unlivable disrepair."

The study by the IntraAmerican Research Associates found Texas camps to be overcrowded, with poor plumbing facilities, and exposing occupants to the rain, wind and cold. According to Troy Lowrey of the

Texas Department of Health in Austin, many of those facilities have been repaired since the 1980 study because of the standards imposed by the U.S. Department of Labor.

He said many of the growers who maintain migrant housing on their land are now in compliance, but much dilapidated housing is still being rented by "common property" landlords.

If a house is available for rent year round, Lowrey explained, and not reserved for migrant laborers, the TDH's migrant housing guidelines do not apply. "If it's common property," he said, "we can't get involved."

Lowrey said he is aware of a need for better housing in Hereford.

According to a press release from Texas Rural Legal Aid and two farm worker unions it represents, health problems such as upper and low respiratory problems, skin disease and tuberculosis are associated with crowded, substandard housing.

The hearings begin at 9 a.m. Wednesday.

State

House backs school amendment

AUSTIN (AP) — Rep. Bill Haley waited until after the weekend and got more than the nine more votes he needed to pass a proposed constitutional amendment telling lawmakers to keep their hands off school consolidations.

The measure, approved 108-31 by the House Monday, now goes to the Senate, where approval would put it on the November general election ballot.

Haley's proposal got 91 votes last Wednesday in a preliminary vote, but needed 100 or more for approval. The Center Democrat postponed the final vote last Thursday, fearful that the votes were not there.

State law now bans the Legislature from forcing school districts to consolidate without the approval of local officials and voters. But Haley said that might not be enough protection against lawmakers who see consolidations as a way to save state money.

Some urban lawmakers and school officials have complained that school districts in sparsely populated, rural areas are money-wasters that should be consolidated.

Singers want state commission

AUSTIN (AP) — If the Senate approves a proposal to establish the Texas Music Commission as a state agency, the music industry in Texas could have the same success as the film industry, country and western singer Rudy Gatlin said.

Gatlin and other members of the music industry including country singer Jerry Jeff Walker attended a hearing of the Senate Affairs Committee Monday to support a bill establishing the commission.

"I look at my field of country and western and how many singers are from Texas, the list goes on and on of the vast amount of talent here," said Gatlin whose is from Odessa.

Sen. Bob Glasgow, D-Stephenville, who sponsored the bill, said the state is missing out on a big industry. Because the music industry in Texas isn't coordinated, singers and songwriters are going elsewhere to sell their music, he said.

William Beuck, a partner in the Fort Worth Billy Bob's Texas night club said the music industry is an "economically viable program and one that needs investment."

By establishing the commission as a state agency, Texas Music Association President Tom Molleson said the Texas music industry will be legitimized and identified.

House looks at fee hike bill

AUSTIN (AP) — House members return to the Capitol today for a final vote on a fee bill they hope will help balance the state budget and send them home without raising taxes.

The proposal, a package that would bring the state \$106 million over two years, was tentatively approved 97-44 Monday. The final vote is set for today.

"I don't think you'll find anybody who will responsibly call this a tax bill," said Speaker Gib Lewis.

"The members realize this is a step we had to take. It takes a lot of courage to vote on an issue like this. It can easily be taken and used in a demagoguery-type way," he added.

The fee bill is part of the no-new-taxes game plan backed by Lewis, most lawmakers and Gov. Mark White. No fees would be higher than the actual cost of the service to the state.

The no-new-taxes plan also includes a college tuition increase and a package of smaller revenue bills.

Included in the fee bill is a \$2 hike in the cost of a four-year drivers' license, now \$10. Consumers also might see a small — one-twelfth of a cent — increase in the cost of a gallon of milk as a result of a proposed hike in milk inspection fees.

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Oil and gas producers are feuding in the Texas Panhandle over "black gold" that is as clear as water and flows as cold as ice in the middle of the summer.

The independent operators who drill for it call the stuff "vaporized crude oil" or "casinghead gas," a natural by-product of oil drilling.

Lawyers for the major energy companies, who want to shut off the taps, refer to the independents as "refrigerator operators" and their product as "frozen gas," "albino oil" or "Panhandle light."

To the towns and school districts in the area, the issue is money, pure and simple. If the majors win their case, the money stops.

It comes down to this: If you call it gas, you can drill one well on 640 acres. If you call it oil, you can drill every 10 acres — or 64 wells in the same space as one gas well.

The controversy has wound its way to Washington where the federal government will be in the unlikely position of telling Texans what oil is.

An administrative law judge ruled that independent producers were violating natural gas price regulations, but the full Energy Commission must rule on the case.

There's an estimated \$27 billion worth of oil and gas beneath the Panhandle Oil and Gas Field, an

area larger than Delaware. For Panhandle communities that rely on the revenue, it's vital that "white oil" be classified as oil and not as gas.

"Business is dead in Pampa, Texas," said Pampa lawyer David Martindale, who represents the 300-member Consolidated Royalty Owners Association.

"One-half the economy is based on oil and gas, and 90 percent of that is independent operators. These people are afraid to spend — they're not buying cars, they're not doing anything. They're going to wait and see what happens," he said.

If the independents lose, Pampa Mayor Calvin Whately said, "the economic impact would be quite severe from all appearances."

"Things like that snowball," the mayor said. "One merchant is hurt, then another and so on."

Tom Harkey, superintendent of the 500-student White Deer school district, said 48 percent of his tax base comes from independent oil producers caught up in the controversy.

The district has estimated it would have to lay off four or five of its 49 teachers — "and possibly more" — if the independents lose, Harkey said.

If they lose, the value of their property drops, and school property tax revenues drop too.

"It would have a tremendous impact on our district," he said. "You betcha, it sure would."

The Panhandle field is the only place in Texas where oil and gas rights are still sold separately. The Texas Railroad Commission, which controls the state's oil industry, issues drilling permits after deciding what is an oil well and what is a gas well.

Major energy companies control the natural gas wells in the area; they left the slow-producing oil wells to independents. The independents, however, found a way to turn a vapor from the wells into a liquefied natural gas.

They call it "white oil."

The majors have gone to the Railroad Commission and to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission complaining that the independents are not producing oil at all, but are taking natural gas that belongs to the majors under the old long-term contracts.

In 1977, the commission's chief counsel ruled that "white oil" could count as oil if mixed with a small amount of crude.

In 1978, the Natural Gas Policy Act raised the price of gas produced from newly drilled oil wells.

The white oil boom was on. Independents installed refrigeration units to liquefy portions of the

gas stream produced by the well.

In some cases, the vapor is cooled as low as 20 degrees below zero. A witness told the Railroad Commission of seeing a thick coating of ice on the equipment even on hot summer days.

Some independents call their product "casinghead gas," a natural by-product of oil drilling. Operators are allowed to produce up to 500,000 cubic feet of casinghead gas a day from an oil well.

In 1981, the Phillips Petroleum Co. and other majors asked the Railroad Commission to shut down the white oil boom. Three hearing examiners denied that request but recommended that anything counted as crude oil must be liquid.

The white oil boom has made Panhandle landowners richer by vastly increasing the value of their oil leases.

Soviets deny promising not to shoot

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Soviet Union, disputing the State Department's account, has denied it promised never to shoot intruders on espionage missions against Soviet troops in East Germany.

In a statement issued here, the Soviets called the death of Maj. Arthur D. Nicholson "regrettable" but said they had not "renounced the right to take legitimate steps" to prevent a recurrence. They also denied ever agreeing to consider compensation for the slaying.

The State Department immediately dismissed as "unacceptable" the Soviet version of a meeting of U.S. and Soviet military commanders and stood by its account.

Nicholson was shot while on a reconnaissance mission. After a meeting of the top U.S. and Soviet military officers in Potsdam, East

Germany, the State Department announced last Tuesday the Soviets had agreed not to permit "use of force or weapons" against American military liaison personnel.

The statement Monday, signed by Boris Malakhov, a second secretary in the Soviet Embassy, said "one cannot help but be puzzled" by the State Department account.

It went on to accuse the department of presenting the results of the meeting of the military officers "in a distorted light" and said U.S. authorities were entirely responsible for Nicholson's death.

First, the embassy said, the Soviets had not agreed to consider some sort of compensation for Nicholson's death. According to U.S. officials last week, the Soviets had referred the question to "higher authorities" along with a U.S. de-

mand for an apology.

Second, the statement said, the Soviets had not renounced the right to take "legitimate steps" against unknown intruders on intelligence missions. Insisting again that Nicholson and a staff sergeant who accompanied him were on such a mission, the statement said the sentry's actions were "completely lawful."

"They were not taken against a member of the U.S. military mission as such," the statement added, "but against an unknown intruder who was carrying out an intelligence mission and did not comply with the war-

nings of the sentry."

The State Department stood by its account of the April 12 meeting between Gen. Glenn K. Otis, commander of all U.S. forces in Europe, and Gen. Mikhail S. Zaitsev, the commander of Soviet forces in East Germany.

"We have seen the press reports on the Nicholson case coming from the Soviet Embassy," said Charles Sylvester, a State Department spokesman. "We have informed the Soviets that their interpretation of the issue is unacceptable. We stand by our version of the ... meeting."

Survivalist head describes siege

MOUNTAIN HOME, Ark. (AP) — A leader of a survivalist camp besieged by law enforcement officers searching for five white supremacists says his group didn't shoot it out because God said it was "not time for violence."

Kerry Noble said the Covenant, the Sword and the Arm of the Lord held worship services and listened to religious music during the four days the FBI blockaded the group's 224-acre camp before arresting the five men Monday.

The arrest of James Ellison, the 48-year-old founder and spiritual leader of the survivalist group doesn't mean its demise, Noble said. "CSA is in good shape. I think maybe in the long run, this will be good for us."

During the siege, 300 law enforcement officers closed in on the main CSA compound in the rugged hills near the Missouri border. "We couldn't afford to fire a shot," Noble said. "If it had come down to a battle, without the intervention of God, the CSA wouldn't have had a chance."

'Woman of Year' arrested

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP) — A woman once honored as American Business Woman of the Year has been charged with embezzling \$1.8 million dollars from escrow accounts she managed for a title company, officials say.

Rebecca Ann Doyle, 35, surrendered Monday at the Pinellas County jail and was freed after posting a \$10,000 bond.

She was charged with grand theft Monday, said Pinellas County Sheriff's Detective Richard Poe. He said Mrs. Doyle has acknowledged diverting \$1.83 million dollars from escrow accounts she managed in Pinellas County for Commonwealth Land Title Insurance Co., a Philadelphia-based firm.

At age 22, Mrs. Doyle founded Tri-City Title Co., a title insurance business, and built it from a two-desk operation to a five-branch firm in six years.

Anti-Apartheid leader detained

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Security police detained a leading anti-apartheid campaigner today as he got off a commercial flight in Port Elizabeth in the riot-torn eastern Cape Province, a source close to the campaigner said.

The source told The Associated Press he was with Patrick Lekota when police moved in, escorted Lekota to a car and drove off. The source said he asked for an explanation, and was told only that Lekota was being detained.

Lekota, a black, is the national publicity secretary for the United Democratic Front, the nation's largest multi-racial organization opposed to South Africa's legal system of racial segregation called apartheid.

The Front claims to represent 600 organizations, which include some 2 million people.

Libyan leader invited to Russia


TRIPOLI, Libya (AP) — Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev has invited Col. Moammar Khadafy, the Libyan leader, to visit the Soviet Union, Libya's official JANA news agency reported today.

The invitation was conveyed by the Soviet ambassador to Libya during a meeting with Khadafy on Monday, JANA said.

Libya, officially non-aligned, receives much of its military equipment from the Soviet Union and maintains cordial relations with Moscow.

Argues domino theory



Dominoes don't all fall. Again Americans are being told that if we allow Cuba and Moscow to export communism, Latin American nations will "fall like dominoes."

But experience demonstrates that dominoes don't all fall. Many, indeed, are standing tall — and without our help!

Springtime 30 years ago Communists were moving north to South Vietnam. To justify American intervention, President Eisenhower enunciated "the domino theory." He warned that unless we stopped the Communist takeover of Vietnam, all next-door Southeast Asian nations would topple like so many dominoes: Indochina, Burma, Thailand, the Malay states, Indonesia — all the way to the Philippines.

Following our pulled-punches near, South Vietnam fell — and adjacent Laos and Cambodia.

But the rest of the dominoes are still standing; most are thriving.

The Wall Street Journal's economic scorekeepers discover that the economies of those non-Communist dominoes have been growing 7 percent every year — while, at the same time, their universities, agricultural extension services, public facilities are maturing with the new generation of educated young people.

United States trade representative Bill Brock says it would be hard to

find an area of greater opportunity anywhere in the world than Southeast Asia.

These thriving nations have shifted the hub of world trade from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

East Asia has replaced West Europe as the world trade center, exceeding transatlantic trade last year by \$30 billion.

The ASEAN states are our own biggest trading partner.

While the three Red dominoes which fell remain without indoor plumbing, suffering deplorable poverty.

In other words, where capitalism has flourished, communism has flopped.

The "domino theory" premise was that communism is a disease which must be quarantined or it will infect everybody in all directions.

The fact is that many nations have threatened to "go Communist" in a deliberate effort to blackmail you for more money.

the gasoline pump as well.

Despite the end of that trend at the retail level, analysts do not foresee the kind of runaway rise in fuel prices experienced earlier in the decade because there remains a relative glut of crude oil available for refining.

Oil industry analyst Dan Lundberg predicts pump prices will continue to rise for at least the next few weeks because of upward pressure on wholesale prices and high demand for unleaded gas.

The price for unleaded could be up 10 cents a gallon by mid-May — to an

average of \$1.26 for regular unleaded at self-service stations — because of a supply imbalance, he said earlier this month.

Lundberg said there is roughly a 40-day supply of leaded gas in the country as the summer vacation season nears, compared to a 15-day pool of unleaded, although 60 percent of the demand is for unleaded.

Despite the relative glut of leaded gasoline, Lundberg said those prices may rise along with unleaded because the different grades traditionally move in tandem.

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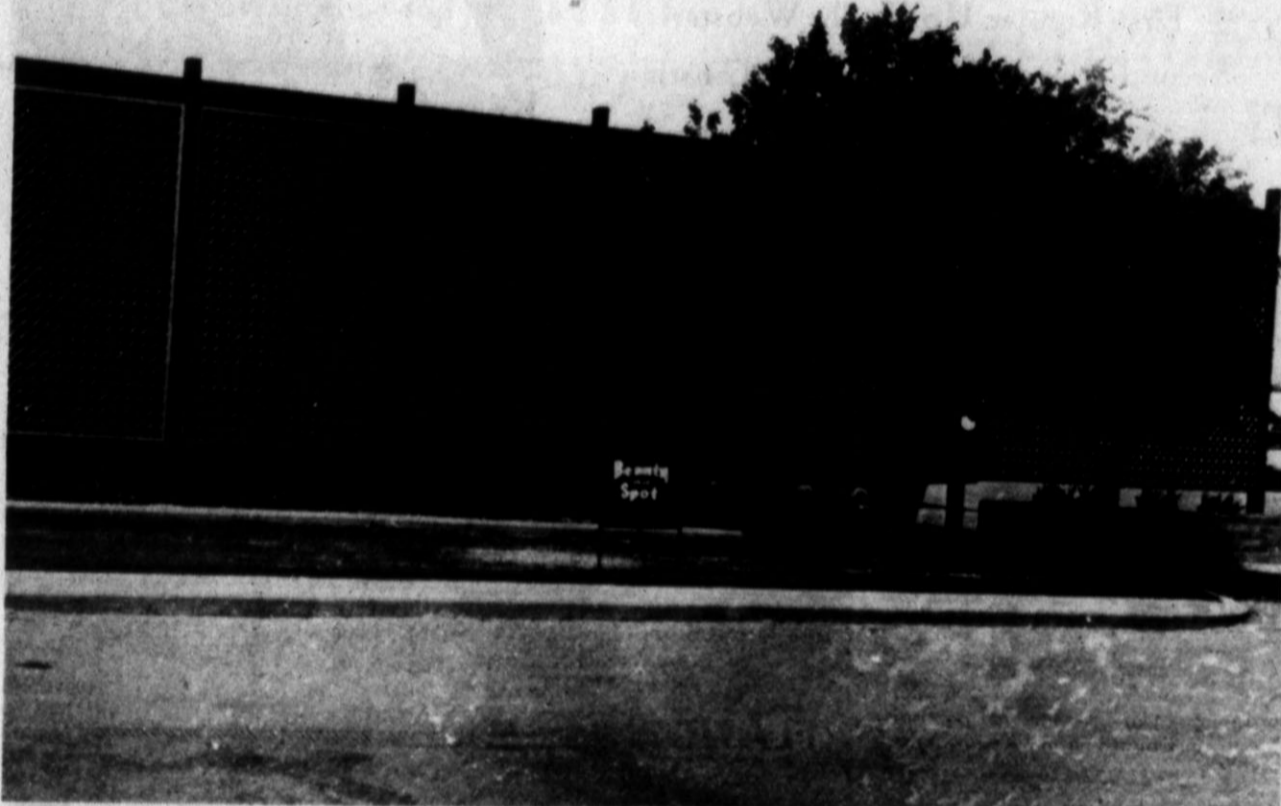

4-H Around the County

4-H volunteer leaders help boys and girls plan and conduct 4-H projects, meetings and activities.

Organization, project and activity leaders plan and work together as a team to support boys and girls in planning and conducting to total 4-H program.

Organization leaders help officers involve all members in planning and conducting community club meetings. They also keep a record of boys and girls in the club. One of the big responsibilities of the organization leader is to recruit project leaders to work with boys and girls in projects they choose.

Project leaders guide and help boys and girls plan and carry out their projects through group meetings and personal visits. They often work with 4-H'ers on group projects.

Activity leaders guide and help boys and girls plan and conduct specific activities and events; such as projects shows and method demonstrations.

Junior and teen leaders are boys and girls who assist organization or project leaders in working with other

4-H members in planning and conducting club or project group meetings. They frequently will take complete responsibility for project group meetings or activities with some support from adult leaders.

Other leaders might be resource leaders, project chairmen, leader recruiters or assistant leaders.

"There is a place for you in 4-H as a volunteer leader in Deaf Smith County," says Raney. During the summer, the Extension Office conducts leader trainings in different project areas as well as organiza-

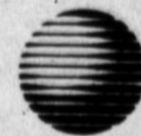

DEAR N.L.M.: Nothing. They are breaking no law. Try offering to help. It might work.



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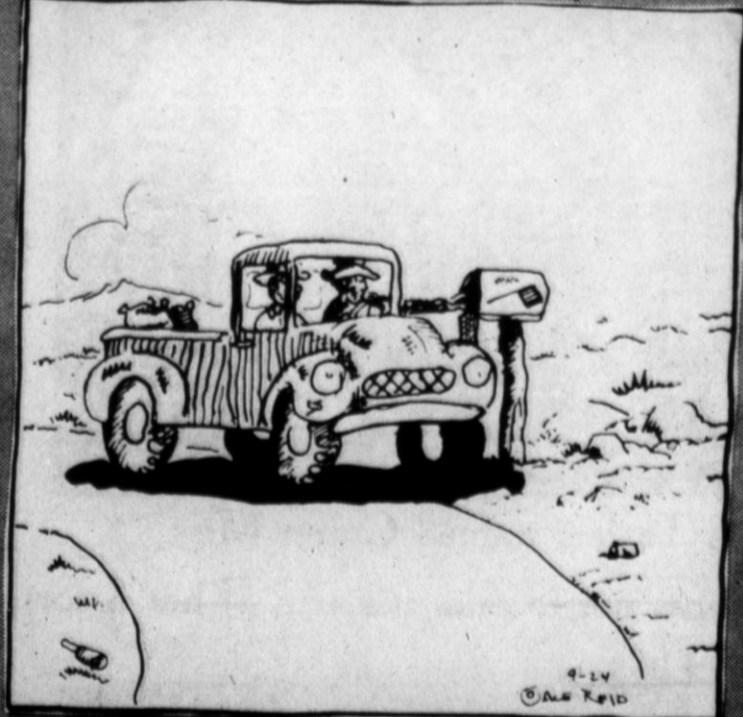

Medication

DEAR DR. LAMB — I have osteoarthritis in the knee. The doctor prescribed four 400-milligram Rufen pills a day. He said it was so the osteoarthritis won't spread. Do I have to take them every day? I have no pain and very slight swelling in only one ankle. I have to chop the tablets up because I can't swallow a whole one. I read that these pills treat swelling and pain.

Can my problem get worse if I don't take the pills? Would taking them every other day be OK, or would two a day be better? It's a chore for me to take four a day.

I was taking them with water, but the druggist said I should take them with milk so I don't harm my stomach.

I'm 70 and I still like to walk.

DEAR READER — Perhaps you have misunderstood your doctor. Rufen is a trade name for ibuprofen, which is now being advertised under different trade name in 200 milligram sizes. It is one of many newer medicines that help control pain and inflammation, somewhat like aspirin. Most can irritate the stomach, just as aspirin can.

These preparations do not prevent the spread or treat underlying osteoarthritis. All they do is relieve pain and inflammation. Your arthritis would not get any worse if you didn't take any medicine at all.

If you do not have pain or inflammation, you don't need medicine to control pain and inflammation.

On the negative side, persistent use of these medicines in large amounts may erode the stomach lining and cause stomach irritation. Some may even cause bleeding. It has been suggested that large doses taken regularly for a long time may damage the kidneys in some patients.

Osteoarthritis is helped by not overusing the joints involved. It is also important to have a stretching program to maintain flexibility and to do enough exercise to maintain muscle strength.

DEAR DR. LAMB — I have been taking diuretics for some years, as have many of my friends. I am 72. A couple of my friends are also taking Dyazide. Isn't one of these medications sufficient to do the job?

DEAR READER — All diuretics are not the same. The only thing many have in common is the fact that they eliminate water through the kidneys. This is usually done by causing the kidneys to eliminate sodium. As the sodium is eliminated, it takes water with it.

The amount of sodium salt in the body controls the body water under normal circumstances. The concentration of sodium chloride in the fluid outside the body cells, as in the blood-

stream, is approximately the same as the concentration of salt in sea water. To preserve that exact concentration, the body will retain water if one retains sodium and will eliminate water if one eliminates sodium.

However, some diuretics also cause the body to lose potassium through the kidneys. Other diuretics, such as Dyazide, conserve potassium or even cause the kidneys to retain it. By giving both diuretics when needed, a proper balance of potassium can be maintained.

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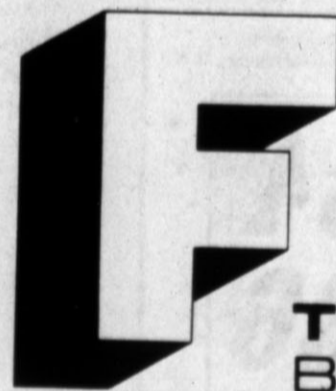

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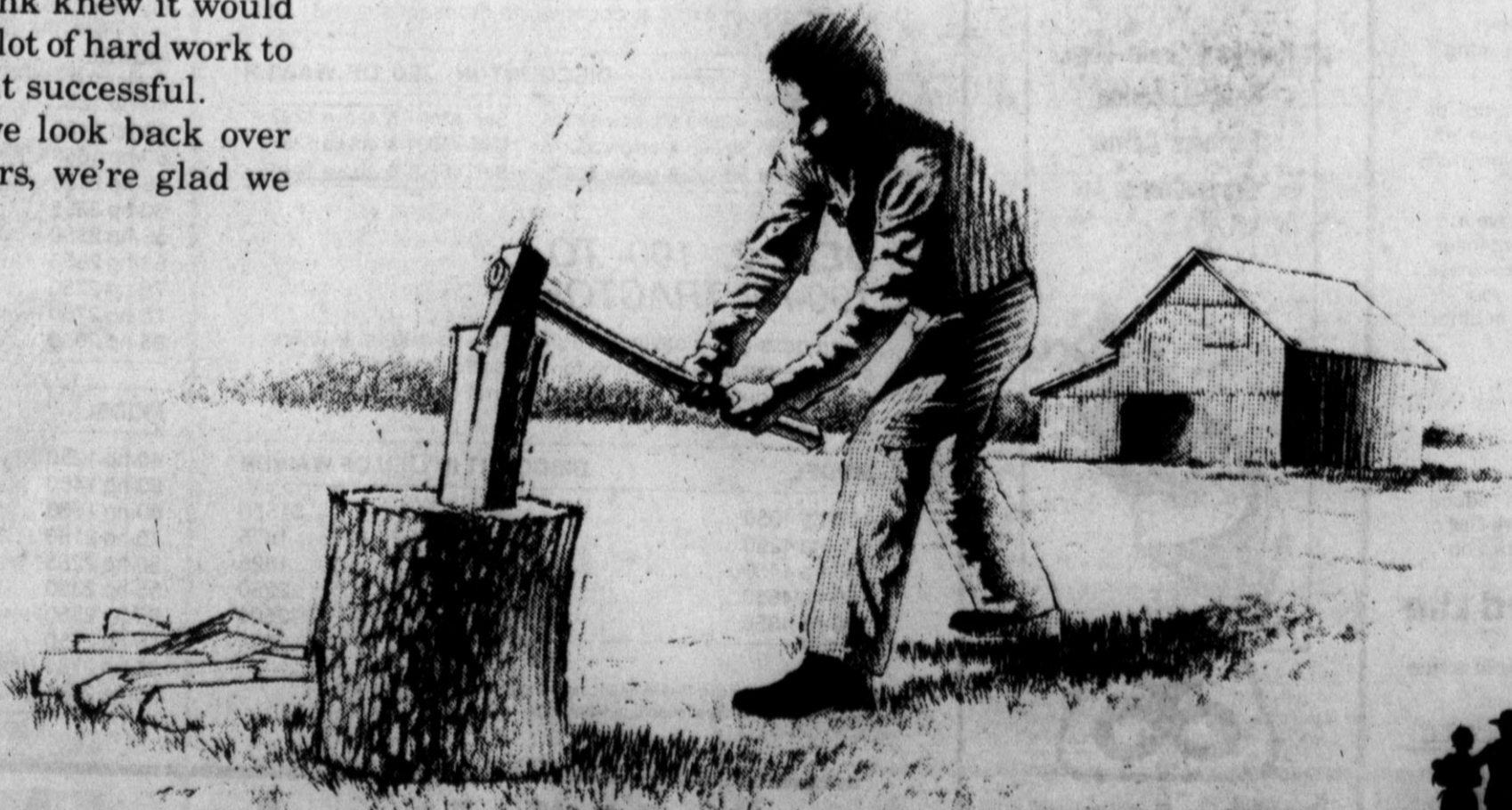

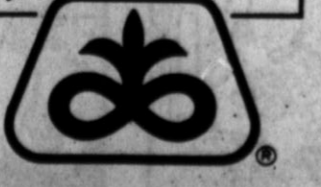

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Event will not be "Crosby" tournament

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The Bing Crosby National Pro-Am, which has paired Hollywood stars with professional golfers over the years to raise millions for charity, will no longer carry the Crosby name after a decision by the family to sever all ties to the tournament.

In her announcement Monday, Kathryn Crosby, Bing's widow, cited corporate "exploitation" of the event

as the main reason for the family's move.

Deane Beman, commissioner of the PGA Tour, said he regretted the Crosby family's decision, but said the tournament will continue, under a different name with a different sponsor.

The "Old Clambake," as the tourney was called since its inception in 1937, has been one of golf's premier events.

"For 40 years, Bing resisted all attempts to commercialize his yearly gathering of friends," Mrs. Crosby said in a statement released by fami-

ly friend Ben Langella.

"Now the wrong elements have seized control of what was Bing's tournament and they are determined to transform the Old Clambake into

just another corporate sideshow for the PGA.

"Bing would never have permitted such exploitation of his name," she said.

Her son, golfer Nathaniel Crosby, who has been the official host of the tournament since his father's death on a golf course in Spain in 1977, agreed with the decision, according to a family representative.

The tournament, which raised about \$1 million annually for charity, will continue, chairman William Borland said Monday night after a closed-door meeting of the Monterey Peninsula Golf Foundation, which runs the event.

"The tournament ... will hopefully generate even more money for the charities," he said, adding that discussions continue with an undisclosed company, reportedly AT&T, to sponsor the event.

A source close to the tournament and Mrs. Crosby said she decided to break off from the tournament because of "behind the scenes" activity involving the PGA, the foundation's executive committee and AT&T, a potential sponsor.

"There are some people on the board down there (at Pebble Beach) that want to grab for the money," the source said. He said Mrs. Crosby believed that a member of the foun-

ation was getting a \$50,000 to \$150,000 finder's fee from a potential corporate sponsor.

Beman said Kathryn Crosby's characterization of events involving the tournament was "erroneous. I am convinced that is not the case."

Lou Russo, chairman of the executive committee of the Crosby tournament in Monterey, said he would not respond to the accusation

about a finder's fee. "It's just ridiculous ... I'm sure you'll hear a lot of everything," Russo said.

Dick Searle, a member of the executive committee of the tourney, said that a month ago a representative from the Monterey Peninsula Golf Foundation met with Beman and CBS to discuss the event. At that time, AT&T offered to co-sponsor the tournament for \$750,000, he said.

Link between cancer, drinking water to be studied

HOUSTON (AP) — Radioactivity in drinking water along the Texas coast — where the incidence of lung cancer is high — may be a more serious health threat than state officials believe, a researcher says.

Whenever the level of radioactivity level in a public water supply exceeds federally set limits, state law requires the supplier to notify customers and take steps towards a solution.

Six utilities in north and northwest Harris County, serving 20,000 to 25,000 customers, are now in that position, health officials say.

Dr. Irina Cech, an associate professor at the University of Texas School of Public Health, said the utilities should move quickly to reduce their radioactivity levels.

The presence of the radioactive substances radium and radon in Houston-area water is a health hazard, but scientists don't know how much of a health hazard the radioactivity presents, she said.

The Texas Gulf Coast, home to numerous petrochemical plants, has long been identified as an area where lung cancer among white men is extremely high.

Charles F. Contant, a research associate at the University of Texas School of Public Health, found that while the national incidence is about 43 deaths per 100,000 population, the incidence for the counties of Orange,

Jefferson, Chambers, Galveston and Brazoria is 47.8 per 100,000.

The incidence in Harris County is 79.9 per 100,000, according to that study.

Possible causes other than the water, including occupations in industries with a high cancer risk, do not account entirely for the finding, Dr. Cech said.

Federal standards for radioactivity in water involve radium, a substance linked to bone cancer. But Ms. Cech said radon gas — a substance believed to cause lung cancer and for which no standard exists and which no agency monitors —

may actually be the bigger hazard.

John Brock, water supply program manager for the state Health Department region, said he does not view the subject with as much urgency.

"We don't feel like there's enough health risk there," he said.

The department is monitoring those utilities whose water supplies are above the federal safety standard but does not now require action according to a mandatory timetable, he said.

Brock said the federal standards are interim regulations that may be changed before they become final.

Changes at beach burn sunbathers

AUSTIN (AP) — The natural beauty of Hippie Hollow, a Lake Travis area long favored by those who prefer to enjoy their beaches on a natural, is being spoiled by construction work, sunbathers complain.

"We come out here to get away from the asphalt," said a sunbather who asked to be identified only as Marvin. "But now you come here and see the same thing," he said while standing in the middle of a

new, paved parking lot at near the nude beach area.

A grant from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission and nearly \$400,000 in Travis County bond funds are being used to pave a parking lot, put in two restroom buildings with decks, build a ticket booth and grade a 4,700-foot lakeside trail. The county leases Hippie Hollow from the Lower Colorado River Authority.

It was the trail that sunbathers grumbled about most over the weekend.

"It's a highway," a man identified as Gary told the Austin American-Statesman. "It just looks like overkill. The trail is within 10 feet of the waterline at some parts."

"You used to could look up and see green trees. Now you see more rocks," Marvin complained.

The work isn't finished, said Travis County Commissioner Bob Honts, coordinator of the project. "It's going to be put back in a very natural form," he said.

The changes are designed to make Hippie Hollow cleaner and safer, Honts said. In recent years, more beer cans and bottles than sunbathers have lined the rocky banks of the hollow, officials said.

Trash has been thrown down the hill and, when it rains, it washes into the lake, said Sueann Brady, Honts' assistant.

Before the new trail was cut through Hippie Hollow, the trash had to be packed out of the park, she said. One weekend last summer, workers hauled two tons of trash out of the beach area, she added.

"You literally couldn't keep it from being a trash receptacle. We're still digging bottles out of there that have probably been there 10 years," Honts said.

The trail also will make Hippie Hollow more accessible to emergency vehicles when a swimmer is injured, Ms. Brady said.

"I think in the long run, Hippie Hollow had to be upgraded, not in the sense of changing the type of swimming that goes on there or changing the type of sunbathing that goes on there," Honts said.

"It had to be upgraded where there weren't broken bottles or where people weren't threatened by a few very unruly people there," he said.
