which is usually the most productive - always keep in mind exactly where all your hutning buddies are, especially the blockers ahead of you. No bird on the table is worth a human life or injury.

Don't shoot around livestock their owners don't appreciate it. And if you see a fence down and calves straying out, take the time to herd them back into the pasture and put the fence back up, or report it at the nearest farm house.

Be sure where you're hunting. A confrontation over hunting rights can spoil an outing, and you certainly don't want to get into an argument with a stranger who happens to be holding a gun.

Remember, if it cackles when it flies up, it's a cock. If it doesn't, take a quick second look for that long rooster tail. If it's a hen, yell "Hen!" so your partners will know. A hen saved today could mean several more cocks to hunt next year.

If the bird is in range, you'll usually connect if you track its angle of flight, put the bead on its head and don't stop your swing or flinch when you pull the trigger. Pheasants aren't all that fast on the wing, unless they catch the wind.

And finally, do you really need to be reminded to not mix gun powder with alcohol?

Arms dealers say North controlled Swiss accounts

WASHINGTON (AP) - Ousted White House aide Oliver North apparently controlled Swiss bank accounts through which up to \$35 million was deposited in the secret Iran arms deals he coordinated, say two key middlemen in the transac-

North, a Marine lieutenant colonel then on the National Security Council, seemed to be acting largely on his own, the pair said in a television interview detailing for the first time North's purported role in the affair.

The businessmen, Manucher Ghorbanifar and Adnan Khashoggi, said in an interview Thursday on the ABC-TV program "20-20" that Iran initiated the contacts in the summer

They said then-White House national security adviser Robert McFarlane responded by asking for Iranian help in releasing hostages in Lebanon and that the Tehran government then suggested Washington send arms to Iran to help it in its war with Iraq.

Ghorbanifar is an Iranian businessman whom Khashoggi described as head of European intelligence for the prime minister of

Iran, Mir Hossein Mousavi. Khashoggi is a wealthy Saudi arms dealer who said he acted on his own in the deals, and not on behalf of his government.

The pair said they did not know that up to \$30 million in proceeds from the sale had gone to help Nicaraguan Contra rebels. And they left unclear how much President Reagan and Iranian leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini may have known about the deal.

North was fired from his NSC job on Nov. 25, when Attorney General Edwin Meese III revealed the diversion of money to the Contras. Meese said then that North was "the only person in the United States government that knew precisely about" the arms deal and money transfer to the Contras. North himself has not commented on his role.

Khashoggi said he believed that Reagan approved the arrangement before the first shipment to Iran. which he said was in August 1985. An American hostage, the Rev. Benjamin Weir, was released on Sept. 14,

The pair, interviewed in Khashoggi's Monte Carlo apartment, said some money for the weapons was deposited in a Swiss bank account in the name of "Lake Resources," but they did not know where it went after that.

CIA Director Willam J. Casey, in congressional testimony this week, identified Lake Resources as one of the firms involved in the complicated transactions. Khashoggi and Ghorbanifar in-

dicated they were told to put the money in the account by North and by retired Maj. Gen. Richard V. Secord, their two contacts in the deals. Secord has been named by investigators as a key associate to North in the Iran arms sale and the diversion of funds to the Contras.

Asked who controlled the bank accounts, Khashoggi said, "We think it was controlled by North, because he is the coordinator.'

Ghorbanifar said the price asked for the weapons - about \$30 million to \$35 million for six shipments in all "was coming to us from the Americans," particularly North, who, the Iranian said, seemed to be acting largely on his own.

Trade tops Bentsen's agenda

HOUSTON (AP) - Legislation aimed at easing the nation's trade deficit will be the primary goal next year for the Senate Finance Committee, says U.S. Senate Lloyd Bentsen. who takes over as committee chairman in January.

"I'm not a protectionist but a pragmatist," Bentsen said Thursday in a speech to the Houston Rotary Club. "We have the most open market in the world. The real problem is protectionism overseas."

He complained of value-added taxes in Europe, of plans in Japan to impose such a tax and of steep tariffs on imported goods in Taiwan, South Korea and Brazil.

"They raise the tax on everything coming in and take the tax off everything going out," he said. "We must insure that the rules of trade do not operate to our disadvantage."

Bentsen said the problems with the national deficit and trade imbalance transcend party politics, and his goal will be to forge a bipartisan effort.

"When we have a national debt that has doubled in six years, when we have a nearly \$170 billion trade deficit and a \$210 billion budget deficit, when our energy producers and our farmers are in serious trouble, I think you will agree that partisan politics is a luxury America can no longer afford," he said.

Bentsen said a key to getting "our own house in order" was reducing the federal deficit, then increasing productivity in America.

"Management must have a more long-term outlook, and not just be looking at quarterly profits," he said. He also complained that managers these days must be wary of other people trying to buy them

"That is something we need to correct," he said. "I'm not here to savage American management. I've been part of it."

Bentsen also complained that part of the trade problem in this country is that American companies are forced to compete against foreign governments. "Time and time again, we have companies owned by governments," he said.

He added that the Reagan administration's problems with the Iran arms deal and the Congressional investigations of the deal would not reduce the emphasis on his

TV employee makes porno error

AUSTIN (AP) - Romance went overboard on the "Love Boat" when an employee of a television station erroneously aired a brief portion of a pornographic movie during the show.

Record bass fighting for its life

TYLER, Texas (AP) - Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists at a fishery here are continuing to check a 17-pound, 10%-ounce largemouth bass in hopes that it will survive.

The state-record bass was plucked from Lake Fork with a wellplaced lure two weeks ago by Mark Stevenson of Plano.

The fish is kept in a tank of water specially treated for it, but has been moving sluggishly and has not eaten. The bass also has

developed a fungus around its mouth. David Campbell, hatchery manager, who monitors the tank for temperature and chemical makeup, said Thursday things may be looking up for the fish.

"I've got a lot more hope for the fish today than I did yesterday,"

he said. "There's still a lot of uncertainty." Campbell said the fungus has started to flake off, much like a scab

on a mammal, indicating it might be healing. "(The fish is) up and moving around and swimming," he said.

The bass still hadn't eaten but Campbell said that wasn't unusual

for an animal that has been under a lot of stress. Its tail fins are gray and pink from being held up for photos. And

people are lining up to promote the fish, dead or alive, and its captor. Stevenson has been offered \$15,000 for the right to kill the fish, mount it and display it at boat shows. A Florida man offered \$5,000 for the rights to cook the fish. A Missouri fish farmer wants to lease the bass and use the eggs in his operation.

The starting date for a program in which anglers donate trophy bass to agency hatcheries so officials can study the fish has been moved up to accomodate Stevenson's catch.

"I go fishing these days just to hide from the phone," Stevenson, a fishing guide on Lake Fork, told the Dallas Times Herald.

Stevenson said he wants to see his fish recover, spawn in captivity and be released back into the lake.

"I know there are bigger fish in that lake," he said. "I've seen them. Why mount this one?"

"I hope the fish lives for a lot of reasons, but mainly to promote the lake where I guide. Think what it will do for the reputation of the lake, for bass fishing in the whole state.

"Wouldn't it be great to have a transmitter planted in the fish so we could track her?"

National Christmas tree is lighted

WASHINGTON (AP) - The nation's Christmas tree is alive with color and light, marking the official start of the holiday season, after President Reagan and an 8-year-old boy pressed the same switch us ed by Calvin Coolidge in the first such ceremony in 1923. gan and Byron White, a member of the National Capital Area of Big Brothers and Big Sisters, were warm and dry Thursday evening in the White House diplomatic reception rooms.

At least a quarter mile away, an estimated crowd of 6,500, many of them children, waited in a chilly rain.

"Beyond the White House south lawn, across the street on the Ellipse, in the darkness, there stands a tall, shaggy shape, our national Christmas tree," the president said.

"Let's see if we can't turn this cold, dark evening into one of light and warmth."

Then the boy, guided by the president, hit the switch; the tree

came aglow, and the crowd clapped and cheered loudly. Three-thousand blue lights and 100 starburst ornaments outlined

with red lamps sparkled on the 32-foot tree, a living Colorado blue spruce that has served as the national Christmas tree since 1978.

"You turned it on," the president told Byron. First lady Nancy Reagan patted the boy on the shoulder and wished him a merry

Car air bags to be more common

WASHINGTON (AP) - Car makers are expected to produce more than 2 million cars with air bags by 1990, auto safety advocates predict after two U.S. manufacturers said they will put the devices in many of their cars that year.

Officials of Ford Motor Co. and Chrysler Corp. told a hearing of the Senate Commerce Committee Thursday that they plan to install driver-side air bags in a substantial number of their 1990 model cars, instead of so-called passive belts that automatically wrap around a car occupant.

The commitment is contingent on the Transportation Department extending the deadline for its overall passive passenger restraint requirement, something the department already has said it plans to

The bags, which are stored in the steering column and automatically inflate to protect a driver in a crash, are favored by many auto safety advocates over passive belts because belts, if obtrusive or cumbersome, can be detached.

With the commitments indicated by Ford and Chrysler, there likely will be a minimum of 2 million new cars sold during the 1990 model year with air bags protecting the driver, predicted Brian O'Neil, president of the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety.

Government debt still soaring

WASHINGTON (AP) - Exactly a year after President Reagan signed the landmark Gramm-Rudman budget-balancing law, the federal government is deeper in debt than ever.

But even though the Supreme Court knocked out its key enforcement mechanism and the deficit for 1986 soared to a record \$220.7 billion, the jury is still out on whether the ambitious legislation has forever changed the course of federal spending habits - or was only an elaborate gesture of futility.

When Reagan signed the measure a year ago today, the national debt - the accumulation of decades of deficit spending - stood at \$1.9 trillion. Today, it is hovering at \$2.2 trillion and expected to rise to \$2.3 trillion by next spring.

The law was designed to produce a zero annual budget deficit by 1991, through a series of increasingly stringent yearly deficit reduc-

As first written, across-the-board automatic cuts were to be triggered when Congress failed to meet the annual targets. It was this section that was thrown out by the Supreme Court last summer.

The fiscal 1986 target of \$172 billion was missed by nearly \$50 billion. And the 1987 target of \$144 billion now appears likely to be missed by at least \$20 billion.

A fast-moving snowstorm moved northeastward out of Texas early today, leaving in its wake slick highways, streets and roads and snarled traffic in the Dallas-Fort Worth area.

Fog added to the traffic problems across North Texas at dawn today. Only a few scattered snow showers

were reported in isolated areas of extreme Northeast Texas as dawn approached, the National Weather Service said.

As much as six inches of snow fell at Stephenville, west of Fort Worth. Other snowfall amounts reported included one inch at Lubbock, three at Midland, one-to-three inches in the Dallas-Fort Worth area, two inches at Sulphur Springs and Daingerfield.

DOE expected to shut down nuclear reactor

RICHLAND, Wash. (AP) - The only U.S. reactor with a design similar to that used by the Soviets at the Chernobyl plant will be shut down for safety modifications recommended by an expert panel, a federal official said.

In addition to the six-month shutdown Jan. 1, the panel's 88 recommendations included the permanent shutdown of the N Reactor at the government's Hanford reservation within five years, a newspaper reported today.

The Department of Energy was scheduled to announce the six-month shutdown today, a department source who spoke on condition of anonymity said Thursday from Washington, D.C.

The N Reactor is the only one of its kind in the United States to be graphite-moderated and watercooled, features also used at Chernobyl, site of the world's worst nuclear plant accident. A second reactor in Colorado uses graphite but is not water-cooled.

Neither the N Reactor, which produces uranium that is converted elsewhere on the reservation for plutonium for weapons, nor Chernobyl has the thick concrete and steel containment dome used on

most U.S. commercial reactors. A six-member panel was assembled in May by Energy Secretary John Herrington to review safety at Hanford a month after the fire and explosion at Chernobyl.

One of several reactors at the Chernobyl plant near Kiev exploded and burned April 26, sending a radioactive cloud around the world. More than 30 people have died from radiation exposure in the Chernobyl

The expert panel urged the permanent shutdown of the N Reactor within five years, the Seattle Post-Intelligencer reported in today's edi-

The permanent shutdown should be carried out unless the nation's need for nuclear weapons materials is so urgent as to warrant "public hazards exceeding those of commercial reactors," Louis H. Roddis Jr., chairman of the special Energy Department commission, was quoted as saying.

the Post-Intelligencer said. The Seattle Times reported Thursday that the N Reactor modifications include an upgraded emergency cooling system, equipment to control the buildup of explosive hydrogen and installation of a remote control

The recommendations also call for a test of the confinement system, which is designed to slow the release of radioactive steam during an accident, the newspaper said.

Two panel members recommended that the reactor be operated only to meet requirements of national security, the Times said.

A shutdown of the reactor would halt all weapons production at Hanford. Two facilities on the reservation that process plutonium from the N Reactor have been closed for safety reasons since Oct. 8.

Rep. Les AuCoin, co-author of an unsuccessful proposal in Congress last summer to shut down the N Reactor pending safety studies, said the temporary shutdown was too little, too late.

"This confirms what I and other critics have been saying all along, and it's another sorry chapter in DOE's whole attitude toward Hanford," the Oregon Democrat said in a statement late Thursday.

"The shutdown should be permanent and DOE should take a hard look at all aspects of the issue.'

The N reactor is operated for the department by UNC Nuclear Industries to produce plutonium. Steam generated by the heat of the atomic chain-reaction is used by the Washington Public Power Supply System to produce electricity.

The Energy Department and a separate General Accounting Office report concluded earlier that the 23-year-old N Reactor was being operated properly and that an immediate shutdown was unnecessary.

The DOE contended an accident like that at Chernobyl could not happen at the N Reactor because it had numerous safety features that the Soviet reactor lacked. NORTH |



"I'm really not happy with the way we played," he said. "We should have eliminated that lead. We were down by 17 and we came back.

"It was just too late," he said. Rolando Blackman, who finished with 15 while Perkins had 14 and Harper 12, looked favorably at his team's play.

"There's no reason for us to be discouraged with our performance," Blackman said. "We came back from 17 against a real good team.

"We put forth the effort (but) we just weren't consistent enough," said Blackman.

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

Sonics rally to beat Spurs

SuperSonics, tired and reeling from a tough road loss, struggled through a sloppy game and lost a 13-point lead, but rallied in the fourth quarter to beat the San Antonio Spurs.

"This was a gutty win tonight. Last year we lost this type of game," said Sonics Coach Bernie Bickerstaff after his team, with the season-high 33 points of Xavier McDaniel, earned a 113-107 win over the Spurs Thursday night.

"Against the Clippers, instead of parlaying it into a win, we lacked concentration and lost," Bickerstaff said of Wednesday's loss in Los Angeles.

"To travel last night and get home late while San Antonio was waiting for us in town makes it difficult. We

were down emotionally. McDaniel and Dale Ellis led the fourth quarter surge past the Spurs.

After eight lead changes early in the period, McDaniel, who scored 13 points in the fourth, took a feed from Nate McMillan and hit a jumper from the top of the key to put the Sonics ahead to stay. The score was 97-96 with 6:05 remaining.

"A lot of times they were trapping and leaving me open," McDaniel said of the double-teaming defense the Spurs employed in the fourth quarter. "So a couple of times I had one-on-one moves and pulled up for the jumper."

After a Spurs turnover, Ellis took a pass from McMillan, who ended with nine assists, and scored on a jump

shot to extend the lead to 99-96. Ellis finished with 29 points, including 9 in the decisive final period.

"Dale and 'X' won the game," said Tom Chambers, who with Ellis and McDaniel were the only Sonics to score in the fourth quarter. "I wanted to get Dale and 'X' the ball as they had the hot hands.

The Spurs drew close when Artis Gilmore hit one of two free throws to make it 106-104 with 3:18 remaining. but Ellis took another McMillan pass and hit an 18-foot jump shot to begin a 7-3 spurt to end the game.

The Sonics' defense limited the Spurs to 5-18 shooting in the fourth period and forced eight turnovers. Behind rookie Johnny Dawkins,

who led the Spurs with 19 points, San Antonio rallied from a 67-59 halftime deficit to move ahead by one, 85-84. at the end of the third.

Dawkins scored the final eight points for the Spurs in the period, and hit two free throws with 36 seconds remaining to give the Spurs their
