## Costs Higher Than Expected

# Board Delays Action On School Remodeling

The awarding of bids to remodel three Hereford school buildings was temporarily postponed Tuesday night by Hereford School Trustees after all bids opened were for more money than the school had to spend.

However, the school board was expected to accept a bid in a second called meeting at 8 p.m. today. Trustees decided to delay the bid acceptance so that architects could confer with low bidders and also allow board members to decide what phases of the remodeling must be cut from the project.

A TOTAL of about \$86,000 must be cut from the project by Trustees either in the form proposed classrooms or quality of work in some areas of the remodeling, in order to meet the bids.

A total of \$439,000 was set aside by the board for the remodeling of the high school library, Stanton Junior High and

Shirley Elementary. The funds are part of the recent bond issue approved by Hereford voters.

HOWEVER, the lowest bid submitted of the four Amarillo construction firms was by Wiley Hicks Jr., Construction with a base bid of \$474,202.

Trustees did ask bidders for alternative bids that would cut several planned classrooms from the remodeling plan and at the same time also cut the construction costs. At least one and probably two of the alternatives are expected to be taken by the school board in accepting the bid.

ARCHITECT Herb Brasher of Brasher, Goyette and Rapier of Lubbock, asked the board for the temporary postponement to allow him time to consult with bidders to see if any other expenses might be taken out.

Other bids submitted in addition to the Hicks company were by Page and Wirtz Construction Company, \$479,650; Ramey Construction Company, \$481,400; and Edward P. Taylor, contractor, \$483,200. Time allotted by all bidders was completion within 270-300 days.

Board members discussed several ways to cut costs of the remodeling and one member suggested calling another bond election to raise the added expenses.

AT THE questioning of trustees, Brasher said the high costs were due to inflation the past six months.

"If you try to call bids again or put it off much longer then the costs may go even higher," Brasher said. "Last fall this seemed like more than enough money to do the job you wanted and costs have just gone out of sight."

IN OTHER action at the called meeting Trustees:

## Assistant D.A. Discussed

# County Buys Vehicles

Deaf Smith County Commissioners Tuesday accepted low bids on two pickups, approved bids on another new vehicle for the sheriff's department, and okayed the paving of five miles of county road.

In an informal session with Criminal District Atty. Andy Shuval, commissioners verbally agreed to give the assistant D.A. program a "fair chance." It was apparent that some commissioners, as well as County Judge H.C. Williams, were not sure Shuval needed an aide.

Shuval told commissioners he had secured a man for the position, that his wife had a teaching job, and he wanted assurance that commissioners were going to continue with the program "at least the remaining 10½ months of the grant."

The DA reiterated his need for an assistant and pointed out that it would cost the county only \$850 the first year. He also pointed out the program was approved by the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission and the Criminal Justice Council which, he claimed, supported his argument for an assistant.

Commissioners Earl Holt and Marcus Latham said they thought the funded program should be given a fair chance to "see if it was worthwhile." Holt added that the court was interested in seeing if the backlog of cases were reduced with an assistant.

A recent controversy had involved the assistant D.A. post when objections were raised concerning the temporary service

of local attorney Don Lowder. In county court, Judge Williams dismissed a number of cases after upholding the objections.

In district court however, Judge Archie McDonald denied the motion to dismiss 12 cases. Lowder contended that he took the post only as a community service, and that the D.A. assured him there would be no conflict. Lowder resigned the post when objections were filed.

Commissioners received three bids from local auto agencies on new pickups for precincts 3 and 4 and accepted the low bid of Orval Watson Ford on both pickups. Trade-ins were included on both vehicles.

Watson bid \$2,053.05 and \$2,253.05 as the difference on the two pickups. John Orsborn Buick-Pontiac submitted bids of \$2,260 and \$2,500 on GMC pickups, and Dick Norwood Chevrolet bid \$2,367.49 and \$2,467.49.

After visiting with Sheriff Travis McPherson, the court also agreed to call for bids on a new car for the sheriff's department. The commissioners also questioned the sheriff about a recent wreck between a deputy's car and a city pickup. This car is to be repaired at a cost of some \$940, he reported.

Following a conference with Road Supt. Chuck Eppler, commissioners approved the paving of three miles of road near Deaf Smith Feed Yards in the northeast part of the county and two miles in Holt's Precinct 1. Caliche-base roads are ready for the asphalt topping in those areas, it was reported.

After these areas are paved, commissioners decided, the court will take another look at the paving program priorities and the funds available. Another two miles of paving in Bruce Coleman's Precinct 3 has already been funded, it was pointed out. This paving is to be accomplished on the north side of the Ponder farm, about 12 miles west and 3 miles north of town.

One commissioner said he had been asked about the policy of taking alcoholic beverages into parties at the Bull Barn. The court agreed that it was definitely against county policy to permit alcoholic beverages in the building.



## Coins Still Available

Only about half of the 192 matched sets of Hereford Diamond Jubilee coins have been ordered in advance sales, it was reported Wednesday morning by committee chairman Jeff Carille.

The commemorative coins are being offered in a sterling silver and bronze matched set at \$20. Only 200 coins are to be "struck" and will be numbered consecutively from 1 to 200.

COINS numbered 1 through 5, as well as 73 and 75, will be auctioned off during the celebration week. Coin number 6 will also be withheld for presentation to Gov. Dolph Briscoe.

ADVANCE orders are being taken, by mail only, for the other 192 sterling silver and bronze sets. One order per person, with a check or money order, should be sent to Jubilee Coins, Box 75, Hereford. Orders will be drawn to determine the number of the coin going to each purchaser.

# Two Arrested In Burglary Case

What began as officers stopping a car for a minor traffic violation Saturday night resulted in the arrest of two persons in connection with the burglary of two Hereford schools.

Daniel Castillo, 18, of Rt. 4, was charged with burglary in connection with the break-in of La Plata Junior High and Central Grade schools Saturday night. Change was taken in the break-ins

from the soft drink machines in the teacher's lounge of the schools.

A 16-year-old Hereford youth was also arrested with Castillo and was turned over to the authority of County Juvenile Officer Leon Gorrell.

The arrests resulted after Hereford Police officers stopped a car in the parking lot of Hereford High about 11:45 p.m. Saturday after the officers noticed

an apparent burned-out headlight on the car.

The officers then found in the car \$22.40 in change in a coin box similar to the ones taken from the soft drink machine.

Castillo was later released from Deaf Smith County jail after posting \$1,500 bond.



# Holiday Week End Keeps Police Busy

Hereford Police officers investigated five traffic accidents on Hereford streets over the holiday week end with one report of minor injuries.

About 6 p.m. Saturday a car-motorcycle accident was reported near the intersection of Irving Street and 14th Street. A 1973 Honda motorcycle driven by Roberto Aranda, 518 Brevard, was in collision with a 1972 Mercury driven by Albert Martinez, 832 Irving.

Officers reported the Martinez vehicle was going north on

Irving and attempting a right turn into a private driveway when the collision occurred. The Honda was apparently heading north on Irving also and collided with the rear of the Mercury.

A 1972 Ford Torino driven by Altus Dale Bently of Friona was in collision with a 1949 Oldsmobile owned by John Earl White of Houston about 10:45 p.m. Saturday at the intersection of Dairy Road and New York Avenue. Officers reported the Ford going north on Dairy Road and colliding with the Oldsmobile as the Oldsmobile was apparently backing up.

Minor injuries were reported about 1 a.m. Sunday in a collision with two parked cars at 304 East 16th Street.

According to police records, a 1969 Buick driven by Paul Sertuche Estrada, 433 Avenue E, collided with a 1965 Ford pickup, owned by P.E. Tarr, 304

16th Street. The Ford then apparently moved forward and collided with a 1965 Ford Galaxie parked in the driveway at the residence.

The Chevrolet was heading west on Park followed by the Dodge. Both vehicles made a right turn onto U.S. 385 but collided as one vehicle apparently attempted to change lanes.

The Pontiac was apparently parked facing south on the west side of Western Street in the 300-block. The Cadillac was backing from a private driveway when the accident occurred.

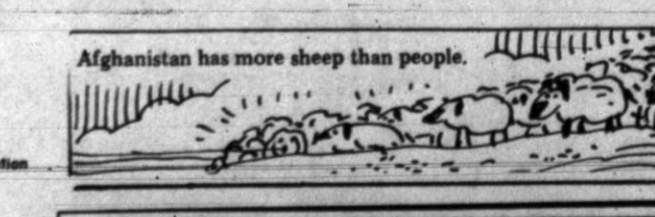
## Contest Planned For Special Field Day

## Buzz Off And Avoid The Sting

# Don't Bug The Bee

The buzzing of bees is just as much a part of the active summer scene as picnicking, swimming, hiking, golfing and gardening. But this pleasant sound is also a warning of the possibility of painful bee stings.

for drop — just as potent for certain susceptible persons as deadly rattlesnake venom. Some health authorities believe that stings by these insects kill more people in the United States than the feared rattler. One prominent specialist suggests that some of the sudden deaths attributed to

heart failure, or heat prostration, are in reality due to insect stings to susceptible individuals.

MANY OF the bee stings could be avoided with proper precautions. But most people do not seem able to cope with bees and other stinging insects. There are 822,000 nonfatal poisonings a year in the nation which result in one or more days of restricted activity or require medical attention, according to estimates of the National Center for Health Statistics.

Approximately one-half of the total are the result of a very common occurrence — bee stings — which happen to be classified as poisonous.

BEEES AND other stinging insects usually do not attack humans. But they are attracted by vigorous activity, such as a group of playful children at the beach. So, if a bee approaches, don't aggravate it into action by trying to swat him; keep calm and walk away slowly. Perfumes, suntan lotion, hair spray and other cosmetics, bright colors and flower prints attract them. Use an insect repellent to temporarily keep stinging insects at a distance.

PERSONS WHO disturb nests of stinging insects by accident, or on purpose, may have to run for it. If the man-of-the-house

decides to paint his home, spruce up his garden, or trim hedges and shrubs, he should look for hidden nests.

The unwary painter, especially if he is on a ladder, may be badly stung by angry wasps or bees. If there are nests, dislodge them with a long pole, making sure your fast escape is possible. Insecticide will kill the insects in the nests you knock down.

And, the thoughtful parent won't let children go barefoot until he examines the yard for possible below-the-ground nests of yellow jackets. If nests are found, pour kerosene into the hole in the early evening, when the insects have all returned.

IF SOMEONE gets stung by a honeybee, use a needle, fingernail or knife blade to scrape the stinger out as soon as

possible. Avoid pulling it out with your finger; this squeezes more venom into the body. Honeybees can sting only once. Bumblebees, wasps, hornets and yellow jackets can sting repeatedly.

Ordinarily, the only effects of a sting are temporary inflammation, pain and itching. Ice packs or a cold cloth will ease the pain. Cold cream, baking soda or a compress moistened with ammonia spirits, will relieve the itching. Persons who suffer multiple stings or who are allergic to insect stings may develop serious reactions. They require medical attention at once.

SOME PERSONS become sensitive to insect stings if they have been stung one or more times in the past. Such persons should see a physician about

desensitization.

Treatment should begin in the fall or winter for protection the following spring or summer. Physicians can also prescribe an emergency kit for the sensitive person to carry in case of an immediate, generalized reaction to an insect sting.

DEATHS FROM insect stings are uncommon; the rate is less than one death per one million population per year.

Even so, bees, wasps, hornets and other members of the Hymenoptera group of insects caused 229 deaths in the United States over a period of 10 years. Bees alone accounted for 124 of the 460 deaths from the stings and bites of venomous animals and insects.

THE 10-YEAR study also showed that nearly two-thirds of

the victims were males, probably because of the greater exposure of men through outdoor occupational and recreation activities. Nearly 90 per cent of the deaths involved persons 30 years of age or older. Most of the victims were 40 to 60 years old.

### Firemen Answer Two Alarms

Hereford firemen answered two fires over the weekend with little reported damage and no injuries.

A box car fire was extinguished before firemen arrived about 2:45 p.m. Friday night and a half mile north of Hereford on the S.A. Fangman farm.

The other minor fire reported was about 4 p.m. Saturday at 4th Street and Sampson where construction workers called in a small fire at the site of the First National Bank Drive-In window facilities. No damage was reported.

### Funeral Held For Former Resident

Funeral services for Madalene Frances Potter, 51, whose death occurred at the Abilene State School where she was a resident, were conducted in Rose Chapel of Gilliland-Watson Funeral Home Tuesday morning.

The Rev. Eugene Brink, minister of First Christian Church, officiated. Burial was in West Park Cemetery.

Miss Potter was a former resident of Hereford, who came here in 1928 with her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. E.M. Potter. She was born in Panhandle Oct. 11, 1921.

Survivors include three sisters, Bettie Jo Carlton and Frankie Barrett of Hereford and Gladys Jenkins of Los Angeles, and three brothers, Kenneth Potter of Lubbock, Emmitt of Albuquerque and Bennie of Oklahoma City.



### Ski Suits

It happened on the novice slope at a busy ski resort. Alice, a beginner, was "snowplowing" cautiously downhill when a wayward sled struck her from behind.

Painfully injured, she decided to claim damages from the resort management. She blamed her accident on the fact that the ski run and the sled run were located right next to each other, with no physical separation between them.



At the court hearing, the management pointed out that it had put up signs warning skidders to stay away from the skiers. But the court granted Alice's claim, saying:

"Sleds are not easily controlled, while novice skiers are notoriously unable to direct their own movements. The location of these two runs made accidents not only possible but probable."

The growing popularity of skiing has focused new attention on the question of liability in case of injury. Generally speaking, as in the case above, the management is liable for accidents which it could have prevented by reasonable foresight.

Nonetheless, skiers — having chosen a relatively dangerous sport — must accept a fair share of the risk. In another case a skier was hurt when he struck a rock concealed under the snow. But the rock was small and the slope had been checked regularly.

Denying liability, the court said:

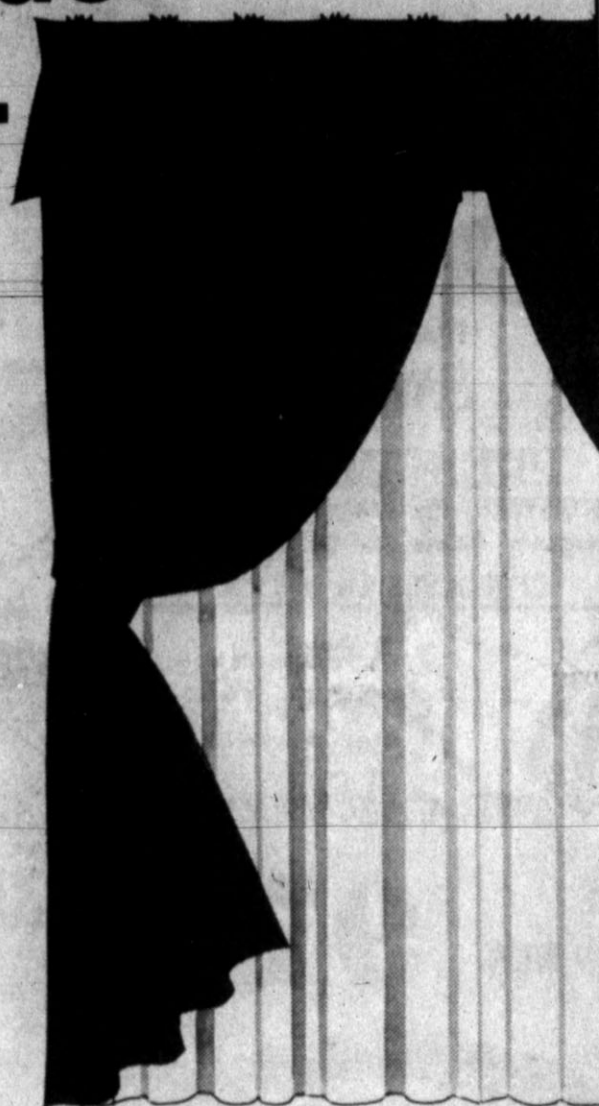
"Skiing conditions may change quickly. To hold that the ski trail down a mighty mountain should be kept free from (all hazards) would be to demand the impossible."

Several cases have involved accidents on ski lifts. By and large, the management bears a heavier responsibility for a chair-type lift than for a rope tow, on which the skier has more control over his own destiny.

Thus, the management was held liable when a skier's sleeve caught on a protruding wooden stud as he was trying to dismount from a moving chair. This was a hidden danger, said the court, which he could not be expected to notice.

### Weekly Market Report

Memorial Day officially opened outdoor-cooking-and-picnic season, Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt noted this week. The consumer marketing information specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, said

markets 'have a lot to offer in picnic supplies—and many of the best food buys are excellent picnic fare.

"FRYER chicken prices dipped below those of the past three weeks, but heavy demand

may drive them up again. Turkey supplies and prices are steady.

"Many markets feature beef chuck roasts, with other good values on ground beef, rib and round steaks, stew meat and liver."

SEE-SAWING pork prices lean toward the high side with scattered features on Boston butt roast, shoulder steaks,

quarter loin sliced, smoked picnics and ham portions, the specialist said.

"Strawberries and grapefruit are generally the best fresh fruit buys. It's near the season end for controlled atmosphere apples, with prices on the high side.

"TOMATOES are reasonably priced—the long range

prediction forecasts relatively low prices throughout the spring and summer season.

"Watermelon prices show some trending downward with more plentiful supplies, as do cabbage prices. Lettuce quality, however, is irregular with variable prices.

"ONION supplies show improvement, but prices continue

a bit high and likely will remain there until the summer crop is harvested.

"Potatoes, celery, carrots, corn, green onions and radishes are good choices price-wise. Eggplant, broccoli, asparagus, snap beans and cauliflower—mostly at moderate price levels—offer menu variety," Mrs. Clyatt added.

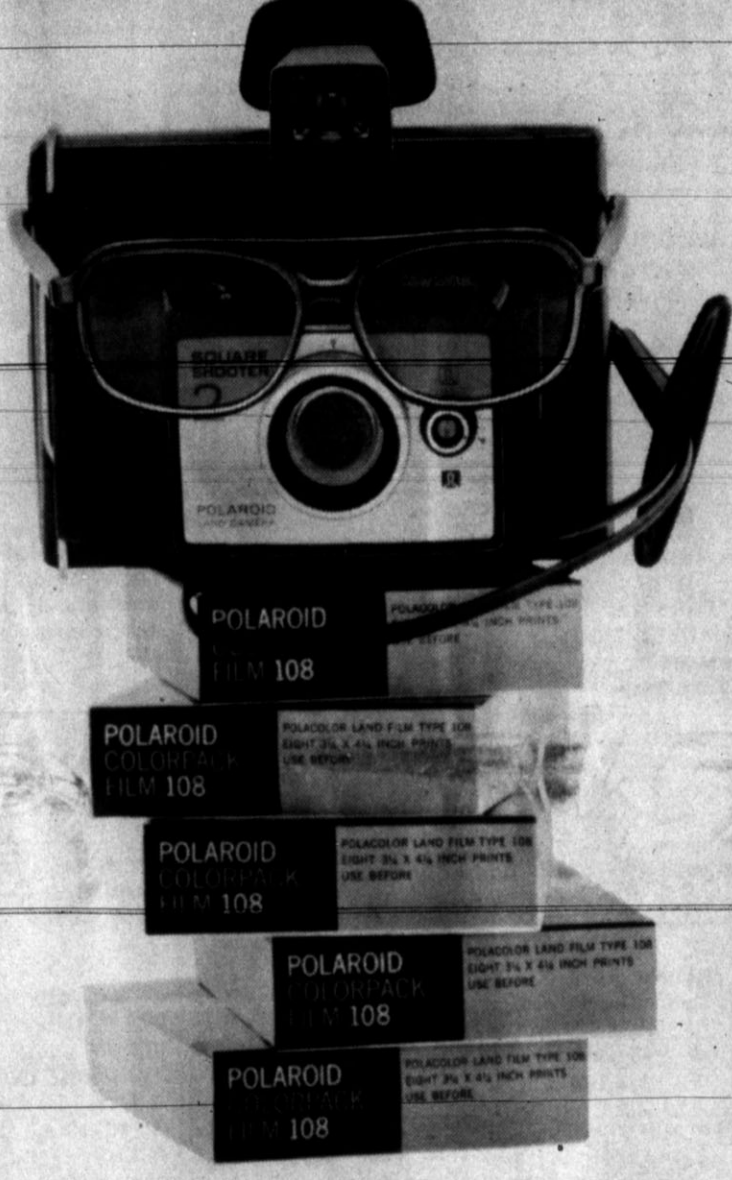

# Army Green

Danny Renner couldn't believe it could be so different. A First Lieutenant in Today's Army and a community relations officer at Army headquarters in Heidelberg, Germany, Danny recently decided to accept an invitation by the Belgian army to try for jump wings. To win them, he was required to jump from a 90-foot long hydrogen balloon

dangling some 1,000 feet above the ground. Danny has already won jump wings from the American and West German Armies, jumping from a plane. "The Belgian army doesn't have a jump tower," he explained. "So I had no choice."

The difference between jumping from a moving plane and a stationary balloon is unbelievable. Jumping from a plane is like jumping from a fast-moving room. You really don't have time to think how high you are.

But a balloon, wow—that's something else. First of all, you are watching the ground all the way up, which you don't do on a plane. And secondly, all you can hear once you get up there is the wind whistling through the suspension cables of the balloon.

"The jump master tells you to jump whenever you feel like it. You stand there staring at the ground 1,000 feet below, the balloon drifting back and forth and you start thinking, What am I doing up here?"

Then you force yourself toward the door, squeeze the emergency chute and just... step off."

"Your chute opens five seconds later and you can bet that's the longest five seconds of your life. The 300-foot fall before the chute opens is really strange. It's something like stepping off a 90-story building."

For Danny Renner, 1,000 feet above Schaffen, Belgium was a long way from home.

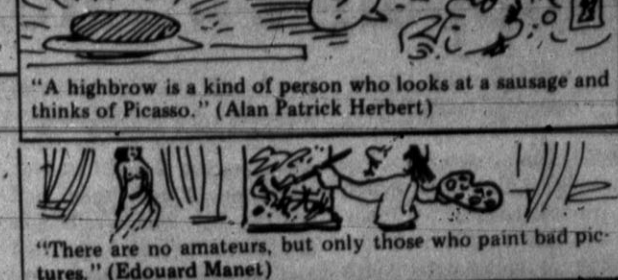

# Shopping For Mobile Home Can Cause Frustrations Warning Issued For Stolen Car Titles

Mobile homes have served as a possible solution to the search for low-cost housing for many Texans. But judging from the number of complaints which reach my Consumer Protection Division, the consumer should

be very careful when he starts shopping for a mobile home. As in the case of any other purchase, you should first look for an established dealer, and talk to people who have bought and lived in the units he has sold and set up, to get their comments. Otherwise, it would appear,

you may take the chance of running into frustrations. Complaints we receive concern mobile home roofs which leak; plumbing that "doesn't fit;" floors that "aren't level;" windows that don't close properly; air conditioners or furnaces that don't function.

And, we have had complaints about misrepresentations of the make or model and/or year of a model, as well as charges that the purchaser had been given a counterfeit title, a bad title—or no title at all.

A mobile home is a "motor vehicle" under purposes of Texas law, so the State Motor Vehicle Registration Act applies to mobile home titles, as well as mechanized vehicle titles.

If you do decide to buy a mobile home, it would be a good idea to check its serial number against the number shown on the dealer's title application, because there have been cases in which a dealer unwittingly bought and then sold a mobile home which did not have a proper title. So, your double check would not only prevent possible trouble for you, but would also help the dealer.

The Texas laws which apply to mobile home sales include the Deceptive Practices Act, the Business and Commerce Code, and the Mobile Home Standards Act, which is administered by the Texas Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Under the latter law, Bureau of Labor Statistics inspectors examine mobile homes at the factory—if it is located in Texas, and on the dealers' lots. If a unit meets the construction standards of the act, a State seal of compliance is to be displayed on the mobile home.

My office takes the position that it is a deceptive practice to sell a home which has been "red-tagged," because that would be one form of misrepresentation. But one consumer who complained to us said she did not know her mobile home had been "red-tagged" until after it had been set up, because the red card had been hidden in a kitchen drawer.

The set up of a mobile home is one of the most important factors to be considered. Actually, "mobile home" is a misnomer. This type of modular home is not suited to frequent moves, and your mobile home is only as good as the mover who moves it. Mishandling will result in deterioration, just as it would in the case of any other prefabricated housing unit.

If you feel that a mobile home is the answer to regular or recreational housing need, exercise as much caution as you would in purchasing a traditional form of residence: Check with your city hall to find out about special ordinances which may apply to locating or setting up a mobile home. Ask to see the manufacturer's statement of origin.

Check the dealer's reputation for sales and service. Make sure the written warranty extends to the set up. Avoid any gimmick advertising of "no down payment." (Any established dealer will want at least 10 per cent down.) And contact local lending institutions to shop for the best rates of interest and insurance.

A band of adventurers, brought together by chance and bound together in difficulty when they find themselves pursued by both police and bandits in revolution-torn Mexico, supply the subject for a rousing story that is new on the shelves of Deaf Smith County Library.

Escape From Sonora is the sort of novel that makes perfect summer reading — exciting, funny, and not devoted to promotion of any cause.

This and other novels as well as a wide selection of non-fiction are all available to readers who wish to use the library during the summer.

There is no cost; adults and children alike are invited to choose books from the many at hand in the library rooms on the ground floor of the county courthouse.

## ESCAPE FROM SONORA

By Will Bryant

There were seven of them. Wanted for murder in Arizona, hounded across the Mexican border, captured by a renegade band of Pancho Villa's soldiers—their only way to freedom lay across the vast Sierra Madre in an ancient and gloriously derelict automobile.

A marvelously warm and colorful, yet tough-fibered novel of chase and suspense set in 1916, Escape From Sonora begins on a lonely California beach with the chance meeting of two drifters, a hot-headed but sensitive labor radical, John Perrell, and a scarred convict known as Clint.

Riding the freights, they meet a young tanktown fighter, Buell, and Bobby Joe, a youngster from an Oregon homestead.

Then, in an Arizona desert town, they are accosted by a sadistic railroad bull, the legendary Walapal Sam. When the train pulls out, Sam lies dead beside the tracks.

On the run, pursued by an army of deputies and a relentless Pinkerton detective named Costello, who has been on the time-dimmed trail of the ex-convict and \$60,000 stolen years before in a mail-car robbery, they elude the police only to be shipped off into revolution-torn Mexico in a locked boxcar.

Days later they find a haven at a mine near a remote Sierra Madre village with an eccentric

American engineer and the lovely, neglected Amanda Sibley.

When the town is captured by a band of renegades, outcasts from Pancho Villa's armies, the Americans are imprisoned in the shop building at the mine.

A huge old automobile—a 1907 Thomas Flyer—sits ruined and decrepit in the shop. Perrell starts desperately to work on the car.

If they can somehow im-

provise repairs—even tires, fuel and explosives—there is a chance they can blast their way out. And somewhere across the Sierra Madre are troops of the American Punitive Expedition under General 'Black Jack' Pershing.

Escape From Sonora is compelling adventure, funny, tough and lyrical by turns, rich with color and the authentic dusty aura of revolutionary Mexico.

## Deaf Smith Residents Spend \$281 Per House

Homeowners in Deaf Smith County spend a tidy sum each year on the maintenance and improvement of their property.

During the past year alone, their outlays for alterations, additions, repairs and replacements came to approximately \$1,798,000, it is estimated.

The figure is based upon sample surveys of such expenditures in regional areas across the country, conducted by the Department of Commerce, and upon data from other sources.

The finding is that the average amount spent for residential upkeep and improvement in Deaf Smith County's general area in 1972 was \$281 per dwelling unit. Not included were the normal, everyday household and housekeeping expenses.

That was the average. It varied widely from that figure in individual cases, both up and down. The explanation is that most homeowners will undertake major improvements one year and then do nothing of an expensive nature for several years thereafter.

In general, throughout the United States, homeowners spent an average of \$341 for such purposes in the past year. It added up to a record total of \$17.5 billion, well above the \$16.3 billion in 1971.

How did Deaf Smith County residents spend their \$1,798,000 share of it?

A breakdown, based upon the overall figures, indicates that about 62 per cent of their outlay was for additions, alterations and replacements.

Of the other 38 per cent, which went for maintenance and repairs, almost half was for painting and decorating. The rest was spent for plumbing,

roofing, heating equipment, air conditioning and miscellaneous purposes.

Partly because of the shortage of carpenters, painters, plumbers and other craftsmen and partly because of the cost of their services, a swelling legion of homeowners have taken to doing their own hammering, sawing, plumbing, plastering and painting.

An additional explanation of this trend lies in the simple pleasure and satisfaction that people get from doing things themselves.

Making it easier for them is the great variety of "easy-to-install" products now on the market.

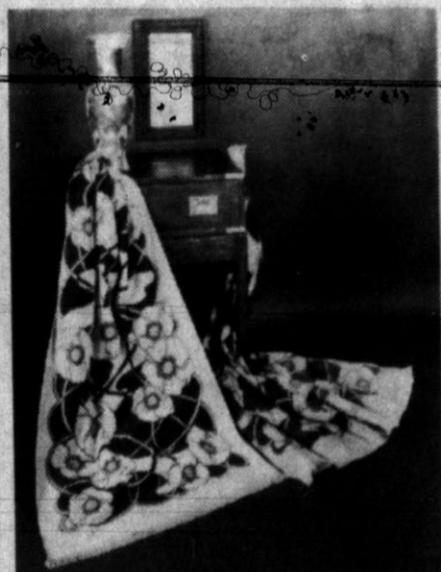

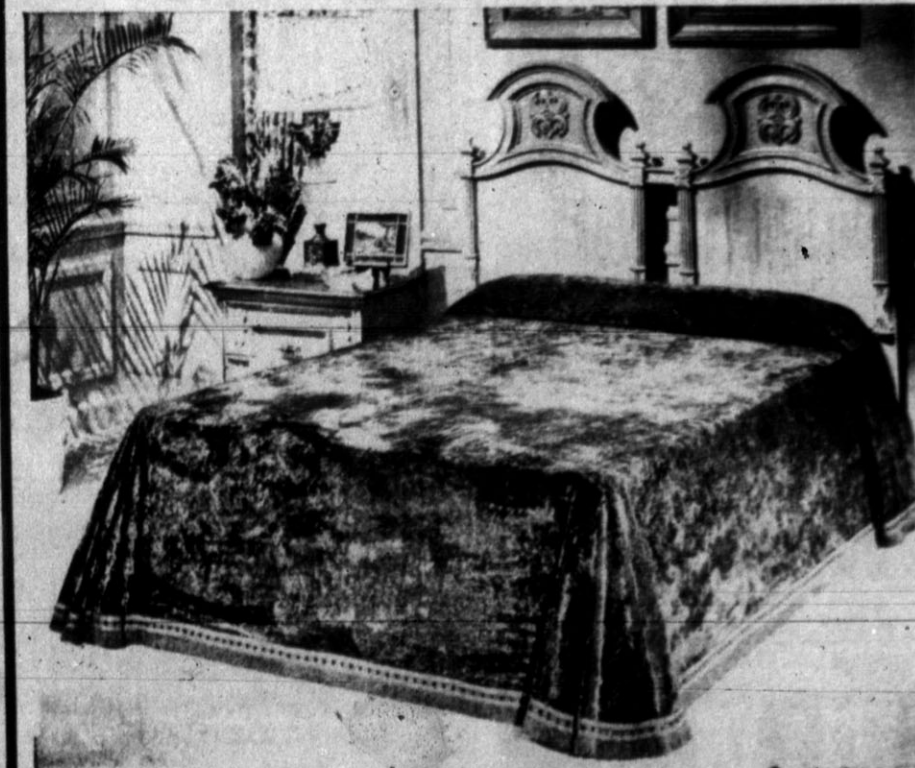

# Clayton Lists Needed Changes



**Year-End Discussion**

State Rep. Bill Clayton of Springlake and House Speaker Price Daniel, Jr., reviewed the successes and failures of the just-ended session in a conversation last week. The legislature wound up its work late Monday night.

State Rep. Bill Clayton of Springlake introduced and passed through the House a record number of 35 bills in the legislative session which ended late Monday night.

In a session which left unfinished many important pieces of legislation, many legislators stated that Clayton's ability to push through 35 bills was a notable achievement.

Approximately 3,000 bills were introduced by the House and Senate, and many problems in the areas of public school

finance, redistricting, election code revision, and judicial reform were left unanswered, Clayton noted.

Clayton stated that the 140-day constitutional limit on sessions makes it impossible to consider all the legislation introduced.

"State government business, which amounts to about four billion a year, is in need of reorganization," Clayton said.

Although he considers the session successful in many areas, especially in regard to water bills and other legislation important to this area, Clayton said he believes many changes are needed.

He named the committee system as one area which many felt failed this session. Committees were reduced from 46 to

21 this year, but most of the 21 committees had three standing sub-committees. This ended up with most of the members serving on six committees, which resulted in committees meeting at the same time, and members running frantically from one group to another. Too often there were no available meeting rooms, and often committee quorums could not be reached because of the conflicts, Clayton said.

Although the session has ended in Austin, Rep. Clayton's duties will extend through the summer as he works with interim committees. However, he said he would be back in his district often, and would be meeting with local citizens and groups to learn of their needs and wishes.

# Major Legislation Approved As 63rd Term Ends

The 63rd Legislature wound down at midnight Monday with opinions sharply divided as to how much or how little it accomplished.

While new reform rules slowed down consideration of bills, much major legislation was passed, some of which had failed previously.

Both houses completed work on a record \$9.7 billion, tax-free budget four days before adjournment, then with money left over, began to fashion an

emergency aid bill for "poor" school districts.

The big job of revising school finance formulas, as anticipated, was left for a future session following additional studies and careful weighing of property values.

Legislative redistricting was another job left for the future—possibly under court direction. Lawmakers did manage to agree on a competitive auto insurance rate bill—something they couldn't do in a special session devoted to that purpose alone last September-October.

They also came to terms on far-reaching revision of the penal code—first in 117 years—although the House bogged

down on a court reform constitutional amendment.

House Speaker Price Daniel Jr. managed to get some of his reform measures, including open meetings law strengthening and better access to public records, finally passed. Agreement on a tough code of ethics was difficult. While they were at it, legislators asked again for a pay raise—to \$15,000 a year—and a constitutional amendment permitting them to meet in annual sessions to better handle an ever-increasing workload.

Whether or not they are called into special session this year, they will be back next January—to have a try at revising the state constitution.

**NEWSMEN'S MEASURE DIES IN CONFERENCE**

The "free flow of information" measure—called the newsmen's privilege bill—died in a conference committee. Compromise language that might have been acceptable to both the House and Senate would have made it a "qualified" privilege for newsmen—and it looked for a time that the conference committee was going to vote it out.

Publishers, editors and broadcasters told their legislators that they preferred "no privilege at all" if it could not be "unqualified"—and the conference committee members let it "R.I.P." Representatives of the Texas

Joint Media Committee—members of professional press groups—expressed disappointment that the Senate would not accept the original House bill which included no qualification except in cases of "libel or right of privacy" law suits.

Some felt the Watergate case had taken the "heat off the press" and fewer subpoenas would be issued in the future to obtain information from newsmen.

Unless Texas newsmen have problems with grand juries and the courts in future years, it will be difficult to get press support for a "newsmen's privilege" measure in this state, said Don Coppedge, president of the Texas Press Association.

**GAS RATE SUIT FILED**

Atty. Gen. John Hill filed the first big test case—against Exxon Corporation—to recover full market value of royalty gas produced on state lands for the school fund and University of Texas.

The suit alleges the state's price is not limited to amounts agreed to in contracts, nor to the low ceiling price set by Federal Power Commission. Hill has estimated many millions of dollars rest on outcome of the litigation. Current FPC ceiling price is in some cases less than 20 cents per 1,000 cubic feet of gas, while actual market value is estimated at 45 cents per 1,000 cubic feet in recent sales. The suit seeks to compel

Exxon to pay the current market value or, alternatively, to allow the state to take its royalty gas "in kind" for use or resale. The state claims it is due not less than \$500,000 from Exxon, and many other producers are expected to be made defendants soon.

term loans for veterans to buy land.

About 43,000 veterans have acquired more than three million acres of land under the program since 1946 when it was launched.

**COURTS SPEAK**

A state law providing damage penalties for corporations that make illegal campaign contributions is constitutional, the State Supreme Court held.

The High Court agreed to rehear a controversy between the City of Austin and the local Humane Society over division of an estate over land left for a park.

Two Mineral Wells men were granted new trials in drug cases by the Court of Criminal Appeals because they were not permitted to testify on beatings by narcotics agents.

**AG OPINIONS**

Attorney General held a compulsory oil and gas unitization bill was constitutional, but the measure (HB 311) was killed in the Senate.

Hill found some questionable provisions in the senate's version of ethics legislation, but urged leaders to correct them and pass a constitutional bill.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:—Legislation to restrict distribution and sale of a brand of beer to exclusive territories and distributors is unconstitutional.

—Drug control legislation does not unconstitutionally delegate legislative authority to the commissioner of health to designate additional controlled substances.

—The assistant executive director of a state agency may also serve as a river authority member.

—The Taylor County constable's salary minimum is set at the figure of Jan. 1, 1972, and county commissioners can't cut it below that.

**REDFISH DECLINING**

Park and Wildlife Department marine biologists fear the redfish population may be declining along the Texas coast.

First sign is said to be reduction in the number of large redfish.

PWD officials say that if further evidence gathered by staff biologists confirms a decline, remedial measures may be ordered that could affect activities of both sport and commercial fishermen.

**SHORT SNORTS**

Thirteen new district courts were created by the Legislature to be located in Fort Worth, Dallas, El Paso, Houston, Galveston, Denton, Corpus Christi, Hidalgo County and Comal, Hays and Caldwell counties (combined).

Compulsory oil and gas unitization legislation failed in the Senate, although proponents predicted it will pass in a future session due to the energy crisis.

Bilingual education and state-supported adult education programs were finally approved and funded by the Legislature.

Governor Briscoe has urged all state offices to cooperate with local officials to curtail use of electric power.

A \$43,708 regional planning assistance grant has been approved for the South Plains Association of Governments.

**Investigator Approved For Local 69th Judicial District**

Gov. Dolph Briscoe today approved a \$17,186 grant to Hartley County to support a criminal investigator for the 69th Judicial District. The money will come from the Criminal Justice Council, which administers the state's block grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration under the Omnibus Crime Control Act. The 69th Judicial District

comprises Dallam, Deaf Smith, Hartley, Moore, Oldham and Sherman counties.

A previous grant provided the investigator, who has helped to reduce the case backlog from 123 to 75 in less than a year, according to the grant application.

The project's goal is to provide more effective prosecution by relieving the district attorney of nonlegal

administrative tasks. It also seeks to improve case preparation.

One investigator and a secretary-assistant were employed with the initial award. The investigator was assigned to work with local law enforcement officers and make on-scene investigations, interview witnesses, organize cases and subpoena witnesses for the trial.

The Hartley County application was among 41, for funding of \$2,114,016, considered by the CJ Executive Committee May 11.
