Assistant D.A. Discussed

County Buys Vehicles

Deaf Smith County Commissioners Tuesday accepted low bids on two pickups, approved bids on another new vehicle for the sheriff's department, and okayed the paving of five miles of county

In an informal session with Criminal District Atty. Andy Shuval, commissioners verbally agreed to give the assistant D.A. program a "fair chance." It was apparent that some commissioners, as well as County Judge H.C. Williams, were not sure Shuval needed

Shuval told commissioners he had secured a man for the position, that his wife had a teaching job, and he wanted assurance that commissioners were going to continue with the program "at least the remaining 101/2 months of the

The DA reiterated his need for an assistant and pointed out that it would cost the county only \$850 the first year. He also pointed out the program was approved by the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission and the Criminal Justice Council which, he claimed, supported his argument for an assistant.

Commissioners Earl Holt and Marcus Latham said they thought the funded program should be given a fair chance to 'see if it was worthwhile." Holt added that the court was interested in seeing if the backlog of cases were reduced with an assistant'

A recent controversy had involved the assistant D.A. post when objections were raised concerning the temporary service of local attorney Don Lowder. In county court, Judge Williams dismissed a number of cases after upholding the

In district court however, Judge Archie McDonald denied the motion to dismiss 12 cases. Lowder contended that he took the post only as a community service, and that the D.A. assured him there would be no conflict. Lowder resigned the post when objections were filed.

Commissioners received three bids from local auto agencies on new pickups for precincts 3 and 4 and accepted the low bid of Orval Watson Ford on both pickups. Trade-ins were included on both

Watson bid \$2,053.05 and \$2,253.05 as the difference on the two pickups. John Orsborn Buick-Pontiac submitted bids of \$2,260 and \$2,500 on GMC pickups, and Dick Norwood Chevrolet bid \$2,367.49 and

After visiting with Sheriff Travis McPherson, the court also agreed to call for bids on a new car for the sheriff's department. The commissioners also questioned the sheriff about a recent wreck between a deputy's car and a city pickup. This car is to be repaired at a cost of some \$940, he reported.

Following a conference with Road Supt. Chuck Eppler, commissioners approved the paving of three miles of road near Deaf Smith Feed Yards in the northeast part of the county and two miles in Holt's Precinct 1. Caliche-base roads are ready for the asphalt topping in those areas, it was reported.

Only about half ot the 192 matched sets of Hereford Diamond Jubilee coins have been ordered in advance sales, it was reported Wednesday morning by committee chairman Jeff Carlile.

The commemorative coins are being offered in a sterling silver and bronze matched set at \$20. Only 200 coins are to be "struck" and will be numbered consecutively from 1 to 200.

COINS numbered 1 through 5, as well as 73 and 75, will be auctioned off during the celebration week. Coin number 6 will also be withheld for presentation to Gov. Dolph Briscoe.

The awarding of bids to remodel three Hereford school buildings was tem-Hereford School Trustees after all bids opened were for more money than the school had to spend.

However, the school board was expected to accept a bid in a second called meeting at 8 p.m. today. Trustees decided to delay the bid acceptance so that architects could confer with low bidders and also allow board members to decide what phases of the remodeling must be cut from the project.

A TOTAL of about \$86,000 must be cut from the project by Trustees either in the form proposed classrooms or quality of work in some areas of the remo order to meet the bids.

A total of \$439,000 was set aside by the board for the remodeling of the high school library, Stanton Junior High and

HOWEVER, the lowest bid submitted was by Wiley Hicks Jr., Construction with a base bid of \$474,202.

Trustees did ask bidders for alternative bids that would cut several planned classrooms from the remodeling plan and at the same time also cut the construction costs. At least one and probably two of the alternatives are expected to be taken by the school board in accepting thz bid.

ARCHITECT Herb Brasher of Brasher, Goyette and Rapier of Lubbock, asked the board for the temporary postponement to allow him time to consult with bidders to see if any other expenses might be taken out.

Other bids submitted in addition to the Hicks company were by Page and Wirtz Construction Company, \$479,650; Ramey Construction Company, \$481,400; and Edward P. Taylor, contractor, \$483,200. Time allotted by all bidders was completion within 270-300 days.

Board members discussed several ways to cut costs of the remodeling and one member suggested calling another bond election to raise the added ex-

AT THE questioning of trustees, Brasher said the high costs were due to inflation the past six months.

"If you try to call bids again or put it off much longer then the costs may go even higher," Brasher said. "Last fall this seemed like more than enough money to do the job you wanted and costs have just gone out of sight."

IN OTHER action at the called meeting Trustees:

-Heard a report from Supt. Roy Hartman concerning a bill on Gov. Dolph Briscoe's desk that would set up a kindergarten program for the next school has 200 children in kindergarten programs and the legislation, if signed by the governor, could put as many as 400 in the program.

-ACCEPTED resignations from seven school employees: Alex Glass, who resigned for a superintendent's job in Greenfield, Okla., and to be near farm land owned by him; Carol Sims; Amanita Holman, who resigned to accept a teaching position in another school district; Carolyn Stephenson, who is planning work in a missionary in West Germany; Joyce Bryant, who is moving to Missouri; Jane Fanning; Dr. James Pike, who is accepting an assistant professorship at the Corpus Christ Campus of Texas A & I; Phil Barefield, who is entering school of counseling; and Linda Blaydes, whose husband is entering graduate school at the University of Texas-Arlington.

-HIRED Elva Devers as an early childhood special education teacher for mentally retarded children; Catherine Tubb for Central School; Linda Cranmer for Central School; and Sandra Saul for Bluebonnet School

-Approved a recommendation from Hartman that Pat Hughes be promoted from assistant principal to principal at La Plata and for Roger Huber, assistant principal at Tierra Blanca, to assume the assistant principal job at La Plata. The La Plate job was vacated by the resignation of Alex Glass.

-HEARD A preliminary report from Larry Wartes, administrative assistant, that a contract has been made with Gulf Corporation to provide gasoline for the school at 23 cents a gallon.

In other action trustees discussed at length plans for the new elementary school to replace Central School and gave architects the go ahead to design preliminary plans for the building. Members tentatively agreed that combination open space-conventional

Under the latter law, Bureau of Labor Statistics inspectors examine mobile homes at the factory—if it is located in Texas, and on the dealers' lots.

If a unit meets the con-

struction standards of the act, a State seal of compliance is to be displayed on the mobile home. If the Bureau's inspectors find that a unit does not meet the standards, they will "red tag" it with a large red cardboard "Prohibited Sale Notice" of ways in which the unit construction failed to meet the

My office takes the position that it is a deceptive practice to sell a home which has been "red-tagged," because that would be one form of misrepresentation. But one consumer who complained to us said she did not know her mobile home had been "redtagged" until after it had been drawer.

The set up of a mobile home is one of the most important factors to be considered. Actually, "mobile home" is a misnomer. This type of modular home is not suited to frequent moves, and your mobile home is only as good as the mover who moves it. Mishandling will result in deterioration, just as it would in the case of any other prefabricated housing unit.

If you feel that a mobile home is the answer to regular or recreational housing need, exercise as much caution as you would in purchasing a traditional form of residence:

-Check with your city hall to find out about special ordinances which may apply to locating or setting up a mobile

-Ask to see the manufac-

-Check the dealer's reputation or sales and service. -Make sure the written

warranty extends to the set up. Avoid any gimmick advertising of "no down payment." (Any established dealer will want at least 10 per cent down.) And contact local nding institutions to shop for the best rates of interest and

And after all that, if you do have a complaint, contact the Texas Bureau of Labor Statistics, the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division, or your local district or county attorney.

Deaf Smith Residents Spend \$281 Per House

Homeowners in Deaf Smith County spend a tidy sum each year on the maintenance and improvement of their property.

During the past year alone, their outlays for alterations, additions, repairs replacements came to approximately \$1,798,000, it is estimated.

The figure is based upon sample surveys of such expenditures in regional areas across the country, conducted by the Department of Commerce, and upon data from other sources.

The finding is that the average amount spent for residential upkeep and improvement in Deaf Smith County's general area in 1972 was \$281 per dwelling unit. Not included were the normal, everyday household and housekeeping expenses.

That was the average. It varied widely from that figure in individual cases, both up and down. The explanation is that most homeowners will undertake major improvements one year and then do nothing of an expensive nature for several years thereafter.

In general, throughout the roofing, heating equipment, air United States, homeowners conditioning and miscellaneous spent an average of \$341 for such purposes in the past year. It added up to a record total of \$17.5 billion, well above the \$16.3 billion in 1971.

How did Deaf Smith County residents spend their \$1,798,000 share of it?

A breakdown, based upon the overall figures, indicates that about 62 per cent of their outlay was for additions, alterations and replacements.

Of the other 38 per cent, which went for maintenance and repairs, almost half was for painting and decorating. The rest was spent for plumbing,

Partly because of the shortage of carpenters, painters, plumbers and other craftsmen and partly because of the cost of their services, a swelling legion of homeowners have taken to doing their own hammering, sawing, plumbing, plastering

and painting. An additional explanation of this trend lies in the simple pleasure and satisfaction that people get from doing things
