## Company to build grocery store here

Furr's, Inc., plans to open a 64,000 square foot Save-N-Gain grocery store in Hereford.

Mex-Tex Realty in Amarillo, general contractor, expects construction to be finished in just over six months. Razing of old buildings on the U.S. 385 frontage south of Fifteenth Street is to begin Monday and construction is scheduled to begin in about 20 days.

Page and Wirtz of Amarillo is the sub-contractor for the project. According to Oth Miller, attorney for Furr's, the new store will have a pharmacy, a bakery, and a produce department which in itself be as large as half of the entire Furr's store which recently closed in Sugarland Mall.

The store plans to carry about 40,000 items as compared to the traditional 14,000 to 16,000 carried in stores.

Employment prospects look good for Hereford. The store will need about 125 workers.

Furr's management in Lubbock was unable to be reached for comment.

## Communist bloc leaders meet

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Mikhail S. Gorbachev, on his first trip outside the Soviet Union since becoming the Kremlin leader, is meeting six other Communist bloc leaders today in a summit to renew the Warsaw Pact military alliance.

The seven-member pact, established 30 years ago in response to the creation of NATO, binds East European states to the Soviet Union militarily and serves as a foreign

policy coordinating body. The treaty expires May 14.

Gorbachev brought with him Soviet Premier Nikolai A. Tikhonov, Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko and Defense Minister Sergei L. Sokolov.

The commander of the Warsaw Pact forces, Soviet Marshal Viktor Kulikov, was on hand for his arrival at the airport.

## Tennessee picked for MRS

### To reduce nuke waste transport

Three sites in Tennessee have been identified by the Department of Energy's Office of Radioactive Waste Management for preferred and alternate sites for development of a monitored retrievable storage program in conjunction with the proposed nuclear waste repository required by the Nuclear Waste Policy Act.

The sites — the Clinch River Breeder Reactor, the DOE Oak Ridge Reservation, and the Ten-

nessee Valley Authority Hartsville Nuclear Plant — were announced at a news conference in Washington, D.C., on Thursday.

According to a release by the DOE, the site will "significantly reduce spent fuel shipment miles and related impact." The MRS program was originally planned as a backup

after being prepared in a large, steel lined canister, would then be delivered to the repository. Since the rail casks are larger, the DOE said that the repository would receive 20 to 80 shipments a year. It said the large cask system would cut fuel shipment mileage by 10 to 60 percent.

The casks will range from 17 to 22 feet tall and be 12 feet in diameter and weigh up to 220 tons when loaded. The cask itself will weigh 200 tons when empty, according to DOE.

## Austin IRS center being investigated

AUSTIN (AP) — A supervisor at the Internal Revenue Service regional center here ordered tax documents from as many as 6,000 businesses in six states destroyed because of what a union attorney called an "obscene emphasis on quantity and speed," the Austin American-Statesman reported today.

Bob Branson, public affairs officer for the center, said Thursday that an investigation of the destruction, which took place late last year, is under way.

"A first-line supervisory employee instructed another employee to destroy certain taxpayer-related correspondence," an IRS statement said. "Management confronted the supervisory employee with the charges, and the employee resigned."

Branson told the American-Statesman he didn't know how many documents were destroyed.

Employee union officials put the number between 5,000 and 6,000 separate case files — some with as

many as 20 pages of attachments such as receipts.

"It's this obscene emphasis on quantity and speed," said union attorney Ann Elzey. "They're actually generating extra work to get errors undone. (The supervisor) had too much to process so she threw the excess away. It may be she did it without authorization, but we wonder about that."

The incident came to light in the wake of reports earlier this month of the shredding of as many as 20,000 income tax returns and checks by overworked IRS employees in Philadelphia.

Roscoe Egger, commissioner of the IRS in Washington, angrily denounced the reports as "sheer, utter nonsense."

Thursday's statement identified neither the supervisor who ordered the destruction nor the employee who did it. Branson said he would have no further comment until an investigation is complete.

The Austin center is one of 10 regional IRS centers in the United States. It serves Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana and Kansas.

Thousands of businesses in the six states may have increased problems with the IRS because their requests for adjustments of their taxes were destroyed, the American-Statesman reported.

Darla Pittman, president of local No. 72 of the National Treasury Employees Union, which represents a third of the center's 5,500 employees, said union officials were told there is no way to find out to whom the destroyed documents (See IRS, Page 2)

It's almost that time of year again!



Turn 'em forward!

WASHINGTON (AP) — Most Americans will have to spring forward with an hour's less sleep on Sunday, as our clocks perform their annual rite of passage into daylight-saving time.

In all of part of 48 states on Sunday, time will skip from 2 a.m. to 3 a.m., an artificial device designed to delay the arrival of the morning sun, and add that light onto the evening to provide more time for barbecues, yard work and other outdoor activities.

The routine still sneaks up on some people. Often on Sunday mornings after the spring time change, church people who forgot to set the clock forward arrive an hour late. An easy little chant to recall which way to wind in, which season is: Spring forward, fall back.

First instituted in World War I, the shift regularly generates controversy and legislation is introduced in Congress, almost every year, to change the practice, generally with little success.

Under the current rules, daylight-saving time extends from the last Sunday in April to the last Sunday in October.

States have the right to ignore the system if their legislature votes to do so — and that has occurred in Hawaii and Arizona.

In addition, Indiana, which is split between the Eastern and Central time zones, observes the change in only the western part of the state, meaning that clocks in all of Indiana read the same for the warm weather months.

## Dole scouring Senate for budget votes

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate Republican leaders, unable to give the budget package endorsed by President Reagan the early send-off they had promised, are scouring their party's ranks for the votes needed to keep the plan alive.

"I'm not sure I have them yet," Senate Majority Leader Robert Dole, R-Kan., conceded late Thursday after he abruptly recessed the GOP-

controlled Senate rather than risk a crucial showdown vote he had spent most of the day arranging.

The inability of Dole to move the package over its first procedural hurdle, coming just 24 hours after the president's nationally broadcast appeal for the \$52 billion package of spending cuts, dealt the plan a potent, possibly disabling, blow.

While Democrats rejoiced in their initial victory, Dole vowed to toil overnight to find the needed additional support.

The proposed spending outline, painstakingly negotiated by GOP leaders and the White House, contains a raft of politically sensitive spending cuts, ranging from limits on Social Security benefit increases to termination of Amtrak rail passenger subsidies.

Dole's hasty retreat from Thursday's scheduled showdown — a vote needed to bring the administration's plan formally before the Senate as a package — came even as switchboards all over the Capitol were lighting up in response to Reagan's plea for a show of public support.

Patricia Daniels, assistant chief telephone operator, reported that more than 23,000 calls came into the Capitol on Thursday — more than three times the usual 7,000. The calls were running heavily in favor of the president's package, congressional offices reported.

## County officials concerned about state bills

Two of Deaf Smith County's elected officials have expressed concern about house and senate bills now being considered in the Texas legislature.

"The state has found a way to get through the legislative session in Austin without raising any state taxes," said County Judge Glen Nelson, "but the way they have decided to do it means that the property taxes will probably have to be raised at the county level or services cut."

If pending legislation is passed, Nelson explained, the cost of state programs such as the administration of justice, incarceration of state prisoners, and even the cost of driver education in the public schools may be financed out of county and district court fees.

"The way this works," Judge

Nelson said, "is that the state increases its share of fees that the county collects in order to raise revenue for state programs. This could decrease the future amount of money that the county gets to retain from the fees. The county could be forced to take up the slack by increasing property taxes just to stay even."

Texas counties only have four sources of revenue: property taxes, fines, fees and federal revenue sharing. According to Nelson, revenue sharing "has been going down for several years, and the administration proposes to eliminate it by Oct. 31, 1986."

"Revenue sharing averaged 16 percent of the county budgets statewide in 1977, but in 1982 it amounted to only 11 percent. It's dropped even more since 1982 and

will be gone entirely by late 1986," the judge said.

"Legislators are devising ways to have the county take on more and more responsibility that normally would be handled by the state," Nelson claimed. "The more responsibility they give us, the more property taxpayers have to pay."

What that means, the judge said, "is that the federal government is passing costs to the state, the state is passing costs to the counties and they are both telling everyone that they aren't raising taxes. They're not, local government has to do it for them."

Meanwhile, County Clerk David Ruland is keeping an eye on Senate Bill 371 and House Bill 185, the Marriage License Fee Bill.

If passed, the bill would increase the amount of money county clerks

collect as a marriage license fee, with the increase being forwarded to the state. A "Children's Trust Fund" would then be established, with one-half the money generated each year to be used for grants and the other half to be invested by the Treasurer of the State of Texas. The grants would be administered by a nine-member council appointed by the governor and appropriated for community-based programs whose focus is prevention of child abuse and neglect.

In a letter to State Representative John Smithee, Ruland referred to the bill as "one of the biggest misconceptions that has been forced upon...the public this session."

Ruland said he is not in favor of surcharges on any fees of office to fund statewide programs. "This is

not to say that child and spouse abuse are not worthwhile endeavors," he told Smithee, "but this is just another instance where the Governor is saving face with a back door tax."

Ruland claims that funds not sent directly to the treasury will be lost "in another gigantic paper shuffle when another great bureaucratic agency is created."

A fee bill introduced on behalf of the county clerks (HB-90) is one that Ruland endorses. The bill would allow additional money collected by county clerks to remain in the county, administered possibly by existing agencies, and according to Ruland "be handled by those who truly know where it is most needed."

Ruland claims it has "been proven over and over again that the most ef-

### Fund set for rare disease victim

A fund has been established at the First National Bank of Hereford to help with medical expenses of an 11-year-old Hereford girl stricken with a rare disease.

Rachel Cepeda, a fifth grader at Shirley Elementary School, is hospitalized at High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo with Guillian-Barre polyradiculoneuropathy. Her doctor, neurologist Joseph Batson of Amarillo, said the disease has resulted in a complete paralysis of her arms, legs, face and respiratory function.

Rachel has been on a respirator for the past week but is mentally alert, Batson said. He said that although recovery is likely, Rachel could remain in intensive care for several weeks and in the hospital for as long as several months.

Rachel is the daughter of Ray and Linda Martinez of Route 3.

District I is one of five single member districts created about a year ago as the result of a suit filed against the school board claiming the single member districts diluted the Hispanic vote. There are also two at-large voting districts rounding out the seven-member board.

**Appeals judge upholds Texas Blue Laws**

HOUSTON (AP) — A state appeals court has upheld the Texas Blue Law, rejecting arguments by Handy Dan hardware stores that the 24-year-old Sunday closings statute is unconstitutional and vague.

The 1st Texas Court of Appeals on Thursday reversed a lower court's ruling in finding the law does not violate the state and U.S. constitutions.

The statute bans the sale of 42 items on consecutive weekend days. Violators can be assessed up to a \$200 fine. The state Supreme Court has upheld the law as constitutional three times.

Last October, state District Judge Thomas Phillips of Houston ruled in a lawsuit filed by Handy Dan that the Blue Law was unconstitutional.

Phillips' decision was appealed by the state attorney general's office and Houston's Retail Merchants Association, a group of representatives from local businesses.

The merchants group sent shoppers to several Houston area businesses to collect evidence showing the shops violated the Blue Law.

The appeals rejected Handy Dan's arguments that the law is the due process and equal protection clauses of both constitutions, Assistant Attorney General John Miner said.

Miner said the three-judge appeals panel rejected Handy Dan's arguments that the merchants' group enforced the law selectively.

Around 40 parents and teachers attended an organizational meeting for a parent-teacher organization Thursday night at Northwest Primary School.

Principal Gary Billingsley said a steering committee was named to set dates and times for future meetings, and by-laws committee was chosen to write by-laws by the next meeting in two to three weeks.

Billingsley said it was not decided if a PTO (Parent Teacher Organization) or PTA (Parent Teacher Association) will be formed. The PTA differs in that it has state and national affiliation.

He said he expects officers to be elected and that decision made at the next meeting.

Last week, a group of parents met at Shirley Intermediate School and selected May 16 as the date for an organizational meeting. The schools are considering the organizations at the suggestion of HISD Superintendent Dr. Harrell Holder.

**First Lady says parents still strongest weapons**

ATLANTA (AP) — A tearful Nancy Reagan ended a first ladies summit on drug abuse by urging students to be "clear-eyed and clear-minded" and telling parents that they are the most effective weapon in the fight against drugs.

Mrs. Reagan, addressing 1,500 students and the wives of 15 foreign leaders, was moved to tears Thursday when a Kansas teen-ager put his arm around her and sang her a song to thank her for her interest in fighting illegal drugs.

Mrs. Reagan's appearance at the Parents Resource Institute for Drug Education conference marked the

final day of her "first ladies summit" on drug abuse, which began Wednesday in Washington.

She invited the first ladies to the United States to discuss common problems and solutions regarding drugs in the different nations. Fifteen of the first ladies traveled to Atlanta on Thursday; 17 attended the first day of the conference in Washington.

Steve Courtney, 17, of Overland Park, Kan., provided the highlight of a 30-minute student song and dance performance when he put his arm around Mrs. Reagan as he sang the line, "We can move mountains together, you and I."

Mrs. Reagan and Courtney embraced at the end of the song, and he escorted her from the stage after she regained her composure and spoke briefly to the crowd.

"You are our future," Mrs. Reagan told the students. "We need you and we need you clear-eyed and clear-minded and I know that's how you'll be."

Clutching a single rose which she and the other first ladies were given at the conclusion of the conference, Mrs. Reagan said, "I can't thank you enough."

Speaking at the Georgia World Congress Center, Mrs. Reagan said she "wanted the first ladies with me today to see what I saw on my first trip here, because conferences like this are possible in their homelands, too."

She said she first became acquainted with PRIDE, a private, non-profit anti-drug group, three years ago.

**Indigent bill supporters hold rally**

AUSTIN (AP) — Although a crowd of demonstrators said they support any method of funding for health care for the poor, Gov. Mark White said he wants it financed without an increase in taxes.

A crowd of mostly Hispanic and black demonstrators rallied on the front steps of the Capitol Thursday afternoon to support four indigent health care bills being considered by Senate and House committees.

One of the bills would levy a 1 percent tax on net revenue of both private and public hospitals to pay for indigent care. Some lawmakers have proposed as an alternative a 4-cent cigarette tax increase.

White, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, House Speaker Gib Lewis and several representatives and senators have endorsed spending \$125 million in state funds to provide medical care for the state's poor.

But White said he hopes the package can be funded without an increase in taxes.

However, Hobby told the demonstrators he supports the tax. "If this session of the Legislature does nothing else, but for the first time provides a system of health care for the poor people of this state it will go down in history as a great session," Hobby said.

**Prostitutes to aid prosecutors**

CONROE, Texas (AP) — Two women accused of working as prostitutes for an alleged prison inmate-run brothel have agreed to help investigators in exchange for their freedom, a prosecutor says.

Montgomery County District Attorney James Keeshan approved a "pre-trial diversion" agreement for Patsy Inez Perkins, 17, of Liberty and Mary Catherine Hammons, 24, of Houston in exchange for information about the Hot Tub Club's operation.

Ms. Perez and Ms. Hammons were charged with engaging in organized criminal activities. Both are now free, but they must report to a probation officer for one year or the charges could be reinstated, Keeshan said.

Ms. Perkins was arrested at the club March 28. Ms. Hammons was arrested in Houston last week after she was stopped for a traffic violation.

Investigators said the club, 10 miles north of Conroe, was a front for prostitution and was run by inmate Raymond Carl Freda Sr. Freda was moved to Texas from New Jersey under the federal witness protection program after testifying about his ties to the late crime boss Carlo Gambino.

Freda, 51, received a life prison sentence in 1981 for an attempted arson conviction.

**EPA threatened with lawsuit**

BROWNSVILLE, Texas (AP) — Amid a bombardment of speeches, skits and songs opposing toxic-waste burning in the Gulf of Mexico, federal officials were also warned they would be sued if the Gulf isn't eliminated as a proposed site for at-sea incinerations.

Gov. Mark White and Attorney General Jim Mattox, stressing the Gulf's importance to Texas, said Thursday they would sue the federal government if the Environmental Protection Agency approves plans to burn toxic wastes there.

The EPA has designated two sites for the burning of liquid toxic wastes. One is 200 miles off the Texas-Louisiana coast and the other off the New Jersey-Delaware coast.

But Mattox and White, testifying before EPA hearing examiner Edwin Johnson Thursday, said companies wanting to do off-shore burning are not held fully liable for any accidents.

"The only reason these people want to do it offshore is that they have limited liability in federal statutes and that they won't be having to respond when an accident occurs," White said.

About 3,000 other people attended the hearing, including area congressmen, state legislators, farm workers, students and officials of companies wanting to burn the toxic wastes.

**Pickens highest-paid last year**

NEW YORK (AP) — A business publication has reported that Texas oilman T. Boone Pickens Jr. was the highest paid corporate executive in 1984, when he earned \$22.8 million in salary, bonus and long-term compensation.

Pickens, chairman and president of Mesa Petroleum Co., got \$4.2 million in salary and bonus for leading takeover fights for Gulf Corp. and Phillips Petroleum Co. that made his company about \$580 million in pre-tax profits, Business Week said Thursday.

Mesa's board also awarded Pickens \$18.6 million in long-term compensation, which includes stock options and other benefits.

Business Week said in its May 6 issue that David Jones, chairman of Humana Inc., the hospital chain, was the second highest paid executive at \$18.12 million. Edson D. de Castro, chairman and president of Data General Corp., the computer concern, was third with \$7.96 million in compensation.

**Mexican president wants changes**

MEXICO CITY (AP) — President Miguel de la Madrid has asked for changes in the country's police forces, aimed at trimming bureaucracy and controlling corruption.

The proposed changes — which must be approved by Congress — include doing away with some police agencies associated with government departments, such as the Treasury Police and the Forestry Police, and making others more independent.

Agreement on the changes was reached Wednesday at a meeting between de la Madrid, top police officials and several Cabinet secretaries, but full details were not immediately made public.

A revision of police salaries was also proposed. Low wages have been blamed for widespread police corruption, a problem that has received much attention lately as alleged links between police officers and drug traffickers in Guadalajara have come to light.

Three of that city's policemen are charged with kidnapping and murdering U.S. drug agent Enrique Camarena Salazar and a Mexican pilot, Alfredo ZavalaJUE, Jr. Camarena and Zavala were kidnapped separately on Feb. 7 and their bodies were found March 5.

Other police officers face lesser charges connected with the case. The most prominent one is the former head of the federal judicial police in Guadalajara, Armando Pavon Reyes, who is charged with accepting a \$260,000 bribe to allow a prime suspect in the Camarena case to escape.

**Hundreds feared dead in Nigeria**

LONDON (AP) — Hundreds of people were feared dead in Nigeria today after a shootout between police and members of an outlawed Moslem sect, the News Agency of Nigeria reported.

The semi-official agency, monitored in London, said troops were rushed to Gombe, in Bauchi state, after the clashes began when police officers tried to arrest Yusufu Adamu, a leader of the Maitatsine sect.

"No official death toll was immediately available, but hundreds of the people including civilians, the police and members of the sect ... (are) feared dead in the shootouts while most inhabitants of the town are deserting their homes," the agency reported.

The agency said troops ringed the town — 150 miles from the Nigerian border with Cameroon — and would allow no one in. Trucks packed with families and their belongings were seen leaving, the agency reported.

**DEAR ANN LANDERS:** My husband and I have raised three fine young men. A column we clipped quite a while ago was extremely helpful. If possible will you please reprint it? I want to have it framed and give it to our eldest when his child is born next month.—JLC

**DEAR JLC:** Congratulations and thanks for asking.

**DEAR ANN LANDERS:** Rev. C. Galea was assigned to the Guelph Correctional Centre for his summer work. While there he developed excellent rapport with many young lawbreakers.

He asked the boys for clues as to why they had ended up in that institution. He then asked them to draw up a code for parents, zeroing in on specific areas where they had failed. Here it is:

1. Keep cool. Don't fly off the handle. Keep the lid on when things go wrong. Kids need to see how much better things turn out when people keep their tempers under control.

2. Don't get strung out from too much booze or too many pills. When we see our parents reaching for those crutches we get the idea that nobody goes out there alone and that it's perfectly OK to reach for a bottle or a capsule when things get heavy. Remember, children are great im-

itators. We lose respect for parents who tell us to behave one way while they behave another.

3. Bug us a little. Be strict. Show us who's boss. We need to know we've got some strong supports under us. When you cave in we get scared.

4. Don't blow your class. Stay on that pedestal. Don't try to dress, dance or talk like your kids. You embarrass us and you look ridiculous.

5. Light a candle. Show us the way. Tell us God is not dead, or sleeping, or on vacation. We need to believe in something bigger and stronger than ourselves.

6. Scare the hell out of us. If you catch us lying, stealing or being cruel, get tough. Let us know WHY what we did was wrong. Impress on us the importance of not repeating such behavior.

7. When we need punishment, dish it out. But let us know you still love us, even though we have let you down. It will make us think twice before we make that same move again.

8. Call our bluff. Make it clear you mean what you say. Don't compromise. And don't be intimidated by our threats to drop out of school or leave home. Stand up to us and we'll respect you. Kids don't want everything they ask for.

9. Be honest. Tell us the truth no matter what. And be straight-arrow about everything. We can take it. Lukewarm answers make us uneasy. We can smell uncertainty a mile

away.

10. Praise us when we deserve it. If you give us kids a few compliments once in a while we will be able to accept criticism a lot easier. The bottom line is, we want you to tell it like it is.—A Reader Who Loves Kids

### Tigers fall out of first place

The American League East couldn't say this at any time during 1984 but they're sure to like the sound — the ... second ... place ... Detroit ... Tigers.

It wasn't easy, but the Tigers, who owned at least a share of first place every day en route to the 1984 world championship and so far this year, as well, managed to blow a 7-1 lead in the last two innings Thursday night and lose to the Milwaukee Brewers 11-7.

That dropped Detroit into a second-place tie with Milwaukee, one-half game behind the Baltimore Orioles, who trounced the Cleveland Indians 7-1.

Milwaukee hammered starter Milt Wilcox and relief ace Willie Hernandez for five runs in the eighth inning and jumped on Bill Scherrer with two out in the ninth on Paul Molitor's game-tying solo homer and Ted Simmons' first AL grand slam.

The setback was Detroit's sixth in the last eight games after a 6-0 start. Last year, the Tigers didn't lose for the sixth time until their 41st game.

#### Orioles 7, Indians 1

Rookie Ken Dixon pitched a three-hitter for his first major-league victory. The 24-year-old right-hander allowed one hit over the first eight innings and lost his shutout bid in the ninth. The Orioles scored an unearned run without a hit in the fourth inning and erupted for six runs against

Jose Roman and Mike Jefferson in the sixth as Eddie Murray, Fred Lynn and Rick Dempsey all homered. Murray and Dempsey hit two-run shots.

#### Yankees 5, Red Sox 1

Phil Niekro, New York's 46-year-old knuckleballer, scattered five singles and struck out nine in 7 2-3 innings as the Yankees defeated Boston for the first time in six meetings this season.

The Yankees scored twice to take a 2-1 lead in the bottom of the third on three consecutive doubles against Bruce Hurst, adding two runs in the seventh when Boston left fielder Jim Rice dropped Griffey's long fly ball with two runners aboard for a three-base error.

#### Twins 5, Athletics 4

Kirby Puckett greeted newly acquired Oakland reliever Tom Teufelmann with a game-winning single with one out in the bottom of the ninth inning. Greg Gagne drew a leadoff walk from Keith Adherton and was forced at second on Tim Teufel's attempted sacrifice. Randy Bush batted for Tim Laudner and Tim Conroy relieved Adherton, bringing on Dave Engle to bat for Bush.

Conroy threw a wild pitch, sending Teufel to second, and then walked Engle intentionally. Teufelmann, just recalled from the minors, came on and Puckett drilled his first pitch up the alley in left-center to give the Twins their fifth straight victory after a nine-game losing streak.

#### Angels 1, Mariners 0

Mike Witt, who pitched a perfect game on the final day of the 1984 season, pitched a three-hitter for his first 1985 victory and Bobby Grich homered as California handed Seattle its fifth consecutive setback and ninth in the last 10 games after a 6-0 start.

## Advance in NBA playoffs

### Celtics, Blazers win series

What do Boston's Larry Bird and Portland's Audie Norris have in common?

Well, at least for one night they shared the spotlight, leading their teams to the National Basketball Association conference semifinals.

Playing despite a painful right elbow, Bird returned to the Celtics lineup to score 34 points Thursday, including two free throws with 23 seconds to play to snap a 115-115 tie, and led Boston to a 117-115 victory over the Cleveland Cavaliers in Game Four.

Norris, a seldom-used forward, was an unlikely hero as Portland eliminated the Dallas Mavericks, 115-113, in four games.

"I wasn't really hampered by the elbow at all," said Bird, who didn't play in the Celtics' loss to the Cavaliers on Tuesday because of persistent bursitis and bone chips in the elbow. "Once I got in the game, I think the excitement drove me over the limit."

Bird also paced the Celtics with 14 rebounds and seven assists as Boston captured the best-of-five-games.

The Cavs, in the playoffs for the first time since 1979, were surprisingly tough in the series, losing the first two games in Boston 126-123 and 108-106 respectively, before winning Game Three 105-98.

Forced into action when both Portland centers, Sam Bowie and Mychal Thompson, fouled out, Norris scored on a layup with 22 seconds to play to give the Trail Blazers a 113-111 lead. And when Brad Davis of Dallas sank two free throws to knot the score again, Norris sank a 10-foot baseline jumper to win the game.

"I never know how many minutes I'm going to play," Norris said, "so I try to make the most of them."

Norris finished with nine points — seven in the final period. Kiki Vandeweghe paced the Blazers with 27 points, while Mark Aguirre led Dallas with 29 points.

"I would like to think Portland won this series, we didn't lose it," Mavericks' Coach Dick Motta said. "We played about as well as we can play and they answered every challenge."

"It was a magnificent series," said Portland Coach Jack Ramsay. "I give huge credit to Dick Motta and the Mavericks. They played great basketball."

In games tonight, Milwaukee travels to Chicago, Philadelphia is at Washington, Houston is at Utah and Denver is at San Antonio for the fourth game in each of those series. Earlier this week, Detroit ousted New Jersey and the Los Angeles Lakers eliminated Phoenix to advance to the conference semifinals.

"Bird came through from the time he came out on the court," said Boston Coach K.C. Jones. "I think the elbow was bothering him a little, but he's a gutsy person."

The forward pass was legalized in football in 1905.

"Things have been going very good for us despite the problems," said Tom Lasorda said after Thursday night's 6-3 victory over the San Diego Padres put the Dodgers into first place in the National League West over the defending league champions.

For the first time this season, the Dodgers scored as many as six runs. And for a change, they didn't make as many errors as they usually do. Along with the offensive and defensive deficiencies, the Dodgers have also been hit with a rash of injuries.

Rick Honeycutt earned his first victory of the season, scattering four hits in eight innings, and Mike Marshall and Mike Scioscia drove in two runs apiece to key the Dodger win.
