## Kickoff Set For 7:30 p.m., Herd Picked As Underdog

The Hereford Whitefaces and Amarillo Palo Duro Dons, each coming fresh off a season opening shut-out victory, clash at 7:30 p.m. Friday in Whiteface Stadium in the opening home game for the Herd.

Palo Duro, which defeated AAA Dumas last Friday 29-0, has been rated a five-point favorite in the game.

The Whitefaces, under the guidance of Head Coach Larry Dippel, shut down Pampa's Harvesters 12-0 Friday night and will be searching for their second non-conference win of the season.

The District 3-AAAA Dons, who were rated 123rd in the state before the season began, have been shoved up to Number 30 because of their victory over Dumas, while District 4-AAAA Hereford moved up from the Number 132 spot to Number 113 among AAAA teams.

HOWEVER, Dippel was not as worried about how his team stacked up in state rank as much as he is about how his offensive and defensive lines will stack against Palo Duro.

"The things Palo Duro does well are those we defended the poorest against Pampa," said Dippel. "That's what we have been working on this week."

"Palo Duro has a young ball club, but not too inexperienced. They've got good speed in their quarterback and two excellent running backs."

"Their defense has good overall quickness and they swarm you in a hurry."

ASST. COACH Joe Tubb, who previously coached at Palo Duro, scouted the Dons the past two weeks and commented Tuesday about the sound defense and running attack of Palo Duro.

"They looked real sharp in both their pre-season scrimmage and last week against Dumas. Their defense did an excellent job of stopping both Plainview and Dumas," Tubb told the Herd Booster Club Tuesday night.

"Palo Duro has good size in their line," said Dippel. "Their linemen average 195-205. That's not real big but it's

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## Deputies' Raise Denied Commissioners Reject Raise In Split Decision

Proposed pay hikes for the three top sheriff's deputies were rejected again Monday by Deaf Smith County Commissioner's Court on a split 3-2 decision.

It was the same motion which had failed, by a 2-2 tie, at the last county session, and it apparently closed a controversial discussion of several months.

The motion—made by Earl Holt and seconded by Bruce Coleman—was to raise Chief deputy Art Burton from \$664.50 a month to \$725, and deputies Johnny Moya and Dean Butcher from \$664.50 to \$700. Holt and Coleman voted for; Donald Hicks, Marcus Latham, and County Judge H.C. Williams voted against.

IN OTHER business, the commissioners approved a Food Stamp contract with the State Department of Public Welfare; officially set the tax rate for the new year; heard a report from County Clerk B.F. Cain on voting precincts; and approved payment of monthly bills and reports.

The Food Stamp program will start Nov. 1, when the Welfare Department assumes total responsibility for operation of the program. The county has been handling distribution of commodities under the old system.

The tax rate had been set but formal

approval was made Monday, since one of the commissioners was absent the previous meeting. The combined tax rate is \$1.72 per \$100 valuation, and assessment is set at 22 per cent. The tax breakdown: State .22, county .96, county special .25, water .05, hospital district .25.

CAIN reported the state has ruled that voting boxes must have at least 100 and not more than 2,000 registered voters in the last presidential election. This would eliminate five of the 11 voting boxes in Deaf Smith County. Those containing less than 100 registered voters include boxes 3, 4, 7, 9 and 10.

The ruling also states that no hardships will be imposed, so the court asked Cain to check on distances that would be involved if some of the boxes were eliminated.

Before starting discussion on the deputies' salaries Monday afternoon, Latham called for all present to approach the topic in a "gentlemanly" manner—a point which Holt had brought up at the last meeting during a controversial exchange.

McPHERSON told commissioners he thought they had agreed on a raise for deputies when he did not replace a deputy who left several months ago. "It's not a matter of going over my budget on payroll, and I think it is in line," he added.

Coleman then asked the sheriff if he would have been satisfied if the motion made on pay increases at the last meeting had passed. The answer was "yes". Coleman was absent at the meeting, and the vote was 2-2.

Latham asked the sheriff if the commissioners could receive a monthly activity report—a summary of the workload, so they might better understand whether the department had sufficient manpower. McPherson said this could easily be done, since the information was gathered for other reports.

Coleman also asked the sheriff: "Regardless of the action today, are you going to use the clothing allowance previously approved for the department?" The sheriff replied that he would. The court had voted a \$25 per month clothing allowance, starting with an initial payment of \$100 for "uniforms" in August.

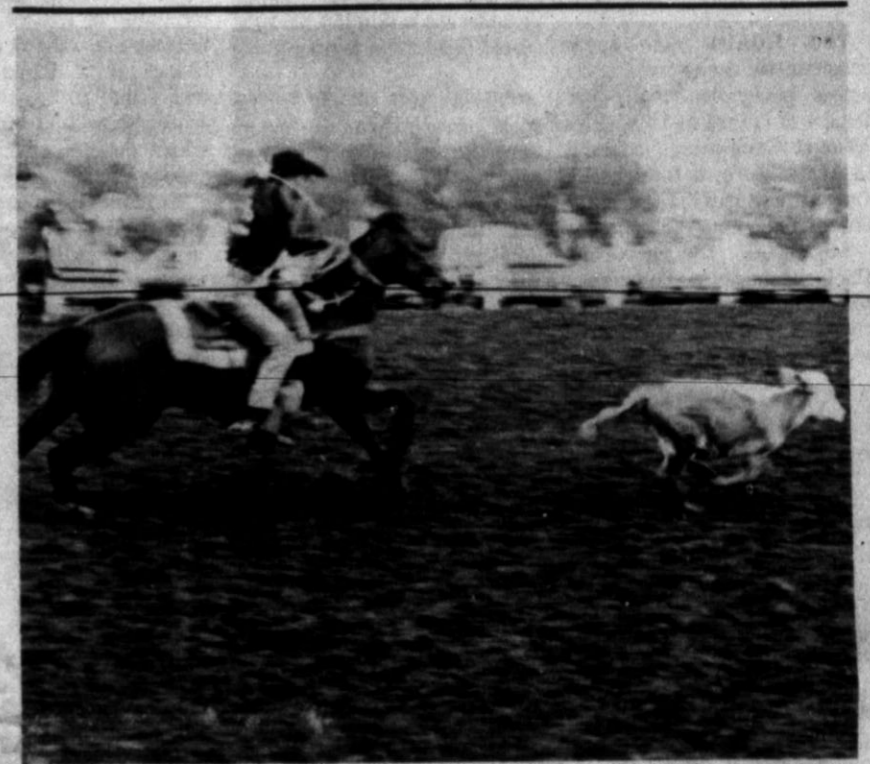
THE SHERIFF was asked to leave while commissioners considered action on the matter. Judge Williams expressed opposition, as he had done in previous meetings. He pointed out all the deputies had received pay raises the past year, and one only a couple of months previously.

He also pointed out that all county employees are scheduled to receive a 5 per cent pay increase in January. The judge objected to giving raises to any

departments "in the middle of the year." He also pointed out the county had just borrowed \$40,000.

After only a short discussion, Holt made the motion for the salary increases. He said he thought commissioners were "committed" to some kind of pay raise, and the money involved in the motion was not as much as the sixth deputy had been making.

The vote was taken, and the motion defeated by the 3-2 count. The key vote was apparently cast by Hicks, since he had voted for the motion at the last meeting.

## Mexican Fiesta Activities Planned Friday, Saturday

The annual Mexican Fiesta begins in Hereford Friday evening and is scheduled to continue through Saturday with the main festivities at the Deaf Smith County Bull Barn, including the crowning of a new queen, two grand marches, a parade throughout the downtown area and a lot of dancing.

The fiesta is in celebration of Mexican Independence Day. For those who may think it unusual for such a celebration to be held—that of celebrating the independence of another country—it is for those who have pride in their heritage.

THE COLORFUL celebration is expected to draw more than 1,000 Mexican-Americans into the city during these two days.

The fiesta will begin Friday with a dance in the Bull Barn, from 8 p.m. to 1 a.m. At 9:30 p.m. the queen and her court will be presented with the coronation set for 11 p.m. Mr. and Mrs. Carlis E. Tervino will lead the march.

This year's queen is Diana Torres, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Torres, and she is represented by Mr. and Mrs. Rene Ramirez.

The princess is Minerva Perales, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Eusebio Perales and her representative is E.P. Rodriguez. Mary Jane Camarillo, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Simon Camarillo, is the duchess and is represented by Delfino Romo.

THE FESTIVE parade has been set for 3 p.m. Saturday and may be seen in the downtown area. There will be another dance held that night beginning at 7:30 p.m. in the Bull Barn. During the dance, the queen and her court will be introduced, there will be a pledge to the Mexican Flag, the Cry of Independence at midnight and singing of the Mexican National Anthem.

Mexico's independence—which was begun 159 years ago—was not fully achieved until some 50 years ago.

Scholars have said that the Toltec

Indians came into the Valley of Mexico some time before the year 900. Then the Spaniards discovered Mexico and Hernando Cortez was sent to conquer all the tribes in 1519.

IN 1808, Napoleon I conquered Spain and forced Ferdinand VII to abdicate. Napoleon then placed his brother Joseph on the Spanish throne. This left the Spanish colonies—including Mexico—without a recognized ruler.

On Sept. 15, 1810, Miguel Hidalgo y Costilla, a priest in the town of Dolores, called upon his Indian followers to revolt against their cruel Spanish overlords.

The priest organized 100,000 followers in a poorly equipped army and they began fighting.

The Grito de Dolores marked the beginning of the fight for Mexican Independence. Mexicans still celebrate Sept. 16 as Mexican Independence Day.

Each year on Sept. 15, the president rings a bell in Mexico City and repeats the Grito de Dolores. Next day, all Mexicans begin a colorful celebration.

## Grand Jury To Convene Friday

A 69th Judicial District grand jury is scheduled to convene at 9 a.m. here Friday to consider 16 felony cases against 21 persons.

The jury will gather in the jury room at Deaf Smith County Courthouse and is expected to take the entire day deliberating the charges in the cases.

Highlighting the session will be four felony charges of possession of marijuana against seven persons and a possession of narcotic paraphernalia against another man.

Criminal Dist. Atty. Andy Shuval has filed the cases as felonies apparently because the alleged drug law violations occurred before a new state law went into effect.

The new law, which went into effect the last of August, makes possession of small amounts of marijuana a misdemeanor instead of a felony.

However, persons who are indicted by a grand jury, tried and convicted under

the old law will have a choice of receiving sentencing under the new law, which requires lesser penalties.

Other cases to be considered as either true bills (indictments) or no bills (refusal to indict) include one for embezzlement, swindling with a worthless check (SWWC), five for theft over \$50, two for felony charges of driving while intoxicated (DWI), one for burglary by breaking, and one for fraud.

# 'Good News' Announced At Sugar Meeting

An increase in the price of sugar and several other "good news" announcements were revealed when officials of Holly Sugar Co. met with directors of the Texas-New Mexico Sugar Beet Growers Association here Monday night.

Glen Yeager, Holly vice president, announced an immediate \$1.55 per hundredweight increase in the price of sugar—which is expected to mean about \$2.25 per ton increase on sugar beets or

this year's crops.

YEAGER also announced a program whereby growers can participate in the sale of pulp from their own beets. Details of the plan were still being discussed here Wednesday.

The Shoup plant in Hereford is scheduled to open Sept. 24, and stockpiling is expected to start Nov. 1. After the latter date, there will be no harvest quotas, it was added.

THE COMPANY is also working on a plan to provide a protected stockpile of 25,000 to 30,000 tons. Yeager said the company "is doing its best to promote more beet acreage for next year." The supply of beets has declined the past few years, with weather being a big factor—along with recent high prices on competing crops.

Jay Boston, president of the growers association, said the price increase alone

could mean an increase of about \$50 an acre—figured on an average crop of 23 tons to the acre.

GROWER participation in the sale of the dried molasses beet pulp could add more to the per-acre return. Since Hereford is the cattle-feeding capital of the world, there is a ready demand for the pulp in area feedyards.

Bob Ginn, agricultural manager at Shoup, reported that beet crop prospects

are "very good." Recent samplings showed some fields with 15 per cent sugar and, with good harvest weather, it could bring in one of the best yields for the plant in years.

HOLLY officials anticipate this year's crop will come in at a \$11 net contract range. Adding the ASCS payment and figuring 15.5 per cent sugar on an average 23-ton per acre yield, the gross income would be about \$458 an acre.

The meeting here was held in the Witherspoon law offices. James Witherspoon is executive secretary of the association. Directors attending included Boston, Virgil Marsh, S.L. Garrison, Don Shipley, Ed Wieck, L.E. Davis and Bill Cleavinger.

# Meeting Called For Bond Election

## School Trustees Plan To Consider Calling Election For Track Surface

Hereford School Trustees Monday night set a 7 a.m. meeting this next Tuesday morning as the date which they will consider calling a \$36,000 bond election to re-surface the Hereford athletic running track.

The board took the action in its regular meeting after Dr. Joe Whitley presented trustees with a petition bearing the names of 1,031 local voters requesting the election.

In other major action during the six-hour meeting, the board learned that the building trades class of Hereford High will construct as their project during the year a 30x72-foot addition to the west side of the Whiteface Stadium Field House.

THE BOARD also spent considerable time studying the school policy concerning forfeiture of honors and activities when students bring "discredit to themselves or to the school." One visitor appeared before the board concerning the policy.

School tax collector Orpha Click announced to the trustees that the school would have "\$70,000 to \$90,000" additional monies in the local maintenance

fund because of a rise in valuation of about \$12 million in property in the school district. He credited the sharp rise due mainly to the additional feed cattle during the past year.

WHITLEY had appeared before the board during the last regular meeting to ask what action would be required in order to hold the bond election concerning the new surface for the track. Board members stipulated then that they wouldn't call the election unless some means of public support were shown.

Individual trustees said this issue (new track surface) had been voted down twice by local voters and that they wouldn't call another election until the public showed signs of approval. Whitley then suggested a 1,000-name petition and trustees agreed they would consider the action if 1,000 local voters signed the petition.

THE PLANS to add to the Field House were announced by Supt. Roy Hartman. Hartman said the building trades class took a different project each year and had built several additions to various schools in the system.

"They are supervised by Rex Manly and should do an excellent job," Hartman said.

"One of the major costs in building these days is the labor and therefore the expense won't be near as high as it would be otherwise."

The addition will provide dressing rooms for visiting football teams, showers, rest rooms, and separate dressing rooms for the baseball and track teams.

Visiting teams presently dress in facilities at La Plata Junior High, across the street north of the Stadium.

THE BOARD tabled the issue concerning change of the school policy concerning forfeiture of honors after almost an hour's discussion. Charles Schlabb appeared before the board and suggested the policy be dropped and let "the courts correct the youth and not punish them double."

The policy concerns the forfeiture of honors and participation in athletics and activities if a student brings "discredit" to himself or the school because of violations of school policies or because of actions outside the school.

Board member Danny Martin suggested perhaps the "discredit" wording was too vague and proposed rewording the policy to make it more specific. All board members agreed, however, that some

type of related policy must be retained by the school.

TRUSTEES also approved a new sick leave for teachers and officially approved outside employment for teachers as long as the outside employment doesn't interfere with school. Previously teachers were required by school policy to receive permission from the superintendent before seeking outside employment.

Hartman said the policy had not been enforced for several years, but wanted the board's approval whether to retain it or not.

Richard Robinson told trustees several community education classes would be offered through the school and that registration would be held Sept. 18.

TWO special education teachers made a presentation to trustees concerning the two-year-old LLD program.

The program, language learning disability, was presented by Patti Hill and Willie Osborn, and concern the special teaching of students who have difficulties reading, speaking, remembering and other areas of regular learning process.

There are five teachers included in the program and an estimated seven per cent of students are affected.

Hartman announced the architects are meeting with teachers in plans for the inside of the new elementary and that bids could possibly be let by late November. The new elementary is to be located on West Park Avenue east of Park Avenue Cemetery and south of the new T.G.&Y. store being built.

Dr. A.T. Mims, who is on vacation, was the only trustee absent from the meeting.

## Bayne Outlines City Developments

City Manager Dudley Bayne was guest speaker when the Hereford Board of Realtors held its regular monthly luncheon meeting Tuesday at Dickie's Restaurant.

Bayne outlined improvements in parks and paving in the city recently, with federal revenue sharing funds being

used for some of the work. The city received more than \$300,000 the past year in revenue sharing funds.

Bayne pointed out that paving work has finally been done on Ave. A, and he is hopeful this might relieve traffic on US 385. The city also paved Heibach street — a one block extension

east from Moreman across Hwy. 385.

The city recently purchased 118 acres in Veterans Park for city parks improvements. More work will be accomplished there as more revenue sharing and general operating funds are available, Bayne stated.

THE CITY manager said the additional nine holes of the municipal golf course will open on a trial basis soon, with formal opening set for next summer. Funds to build the new nine holes came out of the city's general operating budget.

The city had taken bids to remodel the old rock club house off the Main St. bridge, but bids were too high, Bayne said. Records show the clubhouse was built in 1936 as a "boat and bathhouse", Bayne reported.

The structure was built by state and federal funds for what was formerly a state park.

THE MANAGER remarked that government controls sometime hinder new construction, making the building costs much higher. Building regulations on public structures now push the costs up about 25 per cent, he noted.

Bayne said plans were underway to extend the paved runway at Hereford Municipal Airport by an additional 1,000 feet. The runway is now 4,400 feet in length, but the addition would make it possible for some jet aircraft to use the airport. A new beacon and homing device is also planned for the airport.

THE MANAGER reported that federal funds provide for 75 per cent of the airport improvements, and the state pays 12.5 per cent. Because of new Environmental Protection Agency rules, Bayne reported, it was necessary to have an archaeologist inspect the additional 1,000 feet of land to make sure no historical artifacts are disturbed by the new paving.

Bayne reported that the aerial spray service contracted by the city has done an efficient job in controlling mosquitoes. The city is hopeful that an aerial spray will be developed to control flies, he added.

Gene Campbell presided at the Realtors luncheon. The board meets the second Tuesday of each month.

Interested persons are asked to bring photographs in albums or already mounted for viewing. Slides should be edited and ready for showing.

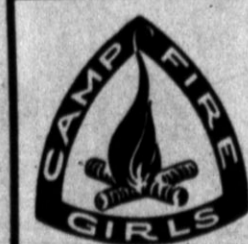
An old fashioned basket dinner will begin at 12 p.m. immediately following the Sunday worship service. A nursery will be provided for three year olds and under at both Sunday services.

Scheduled from 2 p.m. until 3 p.m. will be a sing-a-long, recognitions and greetings from former pastors followed by a short inspirational message.

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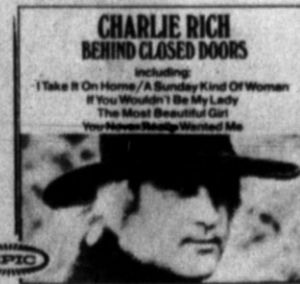
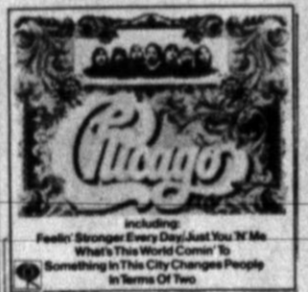

# Officers Stay Busy

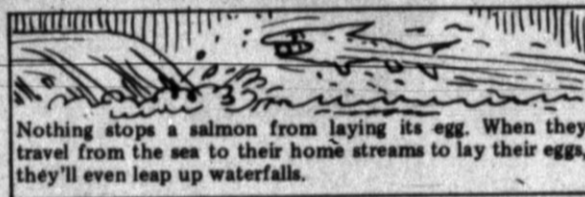

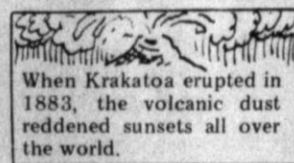

### Former Hereford Resident Completes Church Study

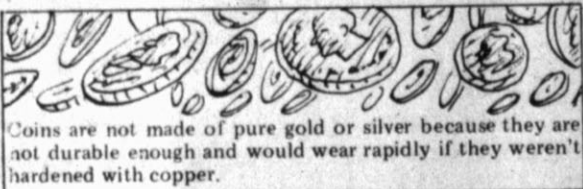

## Food Stamp Program Explained To Grocers

A meeting to discuss the Food Stamp Program to grocers and wholesalers in Oldham and Deaf Smith Counties will be conducted by the U.S. Department of Agriculture Tuesday. The program will open in these counties on November 1, 1973.

The meeting is set for 7:30 p.m. in the Community Center, 100 Ave. C, Hereford, according to James Sattler, officer-in-charge with the Lubbock Field Office of USDA's Food and Nutrition Service.

Purpose of the meeting is to acquaint grocers and wholesalers with Food Stamp

Program operations and responsibilities. "Store owners and employees must understand Food Stamp Program operating procedures before a store can be certified," James Sattler pointed out, "so it is most important that county grocers attend the meeting."

The Food Stamp Program is a cooperative effort involving the State Department of Public Welfare and USDA's Food and Nutrition Service.

Under this program, families certified as eligible by the welfare office can buy USDA food coupons which are used like cash at retail stores authorized by USDA to redeem the coupons.

In addition to the coupons they buy, needy families are given "bonus" coupons to enable them to obtain better diets.

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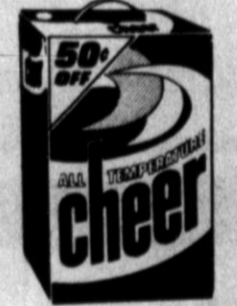

On August 27, the 1973 Texas legislature passed the 18-year-old rights bill, which legally recognized all 18-year-olds as adults.

As adults the 18 year-olds will have the responsibility to become notaries, be named election judges, be elected as precinct judges, buy property and finance it, getting married without parents consent, and be able to buy liquor.

With this in mind the Whiteface staff asked what would be the reaction of Hereford High School students toward the following questions:

Steve Jones, Soph.—"I'm for it, there'll be a few who will take advantage of it, but now they will be persecuted just as adults are so I'm looking forward to using it."

Russell Odam, Soph.—"Because if they're old enough to fight for their country they should have full privileges."

Irma Aguilar, Senior.—"It's OK. I guess as long as some people enjoy it, well I think they're old enough."

Rebecca Garza, Senior.—"I think it is all right; Why, because the bootleggers can stop getting caught."

Diana Valdez, Soph.—"It's OK, why I think if they're old enough to buy it they're old enough to drink it."

Kiska Hodges, Junior.—"I think that it's okay, if they won't take advantage of it and if they'll use it like they should, and hold up to it."

Renee Pearch, Soph.—"I don't think it's good because by the time they're 19 or 20 they'll be alcoholics."

Dee Ann Allen, Senior.—"If you're 18 you can buy it and then it will cut down on the bootleggers."

Jana Ray, Soph.—"Yes, because by the time they're 18 they're old enough to make their own decisions and do what they think is right."

Sandie Collier, Soph.—"Yes, I do think it was right to change the law for 18 year-olds. Take for instance before the law changed — an 18 year-old commits a felony and is caught, he will be tried like an adult, and sentenced like an adult."

They have it where an 18 year-old can vote and be drafted so why not be termed as a legal adult? Usually when your 18 you're old enough to take responsibility and know what's right and wrong."

Johnnie Brannon, Jr.—"Yes, we can die for our country, vote and have part of the privileges of adults, why can't we have all of the privileges and rights of them?"

Allen Ward, Soph.—"Yes, I think the 18 year old law should have been passed. If they are old enough to fight for our country and do jobs that older men do, he should have included drinking."

Lynda Dones, Soph.—"I think it's good; because they have to go fight wars, so they should be able to do what the people who are too old to fight get to do."

Janet McWhorter, Soph.—"I think it's good because then instead of 18 year olds going in trying to get liquor illegally which they would do, now they can do it honestly."

Joan Josseland, Soph.—"I think it good; but only if they don't take advantage of it and don't get carried away."

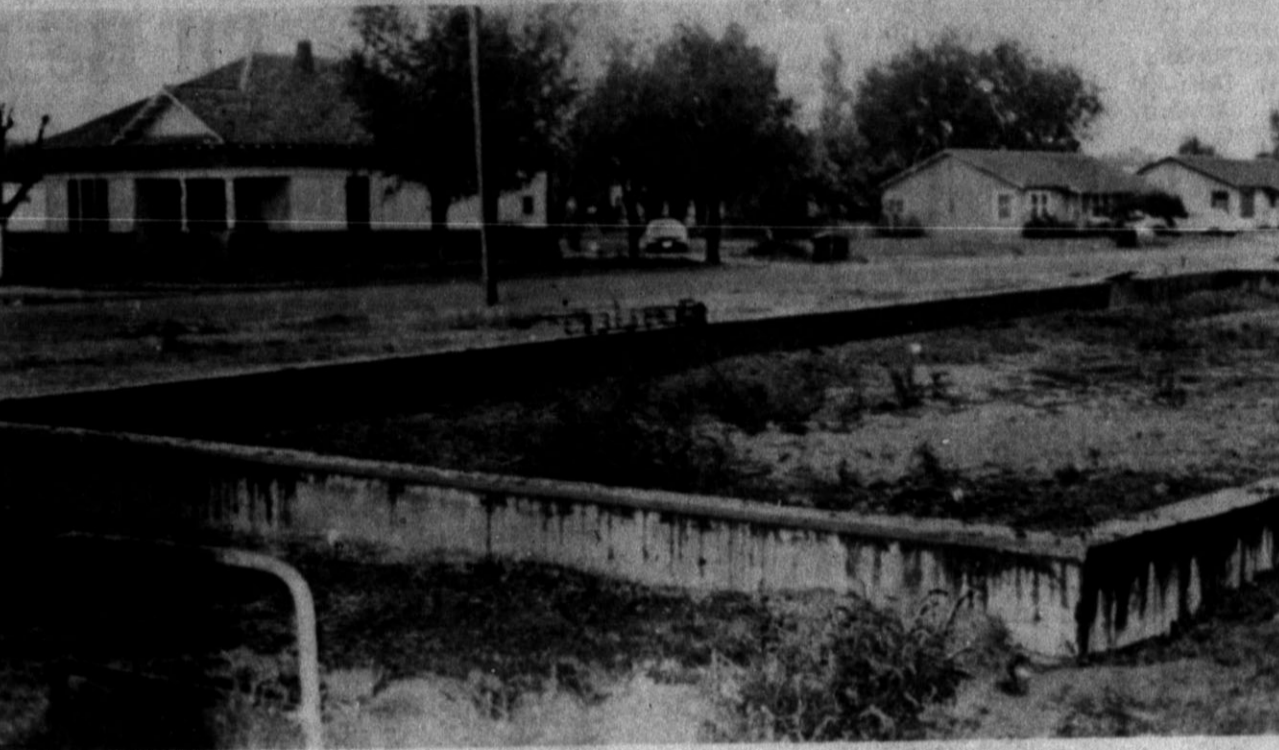

# PD Dons Picked Over Herd

## Harris Poll Picks 'Faces As Five-Point Underdog

Amarillo Palo Duro Dons have been picked as a five-point favorite over the Hereford Whitefaces in the grid contest Friday night, according to the Harris Texas Football Rating System.

The Herd, who last week were rated the Number 132 AAAA-team in the state, moved up to 113 after its 12-0 romp over Pampa. The herd's power rating last week was 126.6, but was raised to 128.6 after the win.

However, for unmentioned reason, Harris Poll gave the Herd a special rating for the Palo Duro game at 132.6 — four points up.

With Palo Duro rated at 30th in the state with a power rating of 137.6, that left the Dons as five-point favorites for this week's game.

Palo Duro had been rated Number 133 in the state last week and took a huge jump in rating after the team's 29-0 victory over the Dumas Demons. The Dons power rating was jumped from 127.6 last week to 137.6 this week.

Other teams in 4-AAAA District with Hereford also received changes in rating. Monterey dropped from

Number 25 in the state to 37th and dropped in power rating from 139.1 to 136.9. Lubbock High moved down from 51st in the state last week to 58th in the state and Snyder moved from 85th last week up to 69th this week.

Lubbock Coronado retained its 134th in the state rating and raised its power rating by .1 from 126.6 to 126.7.

Plainview dropped from 162nd in the state to 166th and lost a full point in power rating from 122.7 to 121.7.

## Punt, Pass & Kick Contest Starts Soon

Local youngsters, will be "dusting off" their footballs and loosening up their throwing arms soon for the 1973 Punt, Pass & Kick competition.

This year the local level of PP&K will be sponsored by Orval Watson Ford.

Nationally PP&K, now in its 13th year, is co-sponsored by the National Football League and the Ford Dealers of America. Since it was started in 1961, the program has attracted more

than 9,350,000 youngsters — and participation this year is expected to top the 1,200,000 mark.

Local contest for the PP&K will be held Sept. 29 at 2 p.m. at La Plata Junior High Football field.

Trophies to be given in the contest will be first, second, and third place in all age divisions.

Participants in the Punt, Pass & Kick program compete only against their own age. Any youngster eight through 13

## Policy Set For Naming

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has approved guidelines presented by the department's executive director Clayton T. Garrison which should help in naming new-fledged state parks.

- Outstanding natural resources, such as Palmetto.
- Significant historic events or persons, as the San Jacinto Battleground.

-Predominant man-made features, such as lakes or impoundments as Lake Whitney.

-Names of features which have been established by local customs, as at McKinney Falls or Dinosaur Valley.

-Nationally prominent, contemporary Texans who have made significant contributions.

# Peanut-Butter Penuche Is Bound To Please

When the kids around your house beg you to make candy and you would like to try a new recipe that will beguile them, consider running up a batch of Peanut-Butter Penuche.  
This fudge is bound to please because it's a combination of two favorite flavors — peanut butter and brown sugar. We made it for our 10-year-old nephew and five-year-old niece, but the grownups ate as much of it as the youngsters did.  
A friend of ours who is an old hand at candymaking developed this recipe. We think

you'll like her directions about turning the candy mixture into a pan; this is a crucial point — if you want goodlooking fudge that has a smooth top — but unfortunately most recipes for penuche omit it.

**PEANUT-BUTTER PENUCHE**  
2 cups firmly packed light brown sugar  
2 cups granulated sugar  
1 cup milk  
1 tablespoon light corn syrup  
¼ teaspoon salt  
½ cup creamy peanut butter  
2 teaspoons vanilla  
Butter the bottom and sides of a square cake pan (8 by 8 by 2 inches).

In a heavy straight-sided 4-quart saucepan, stir together the sugars, milk, corn syrup and salt. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until sugars dissolve and mixture boils.

Continue cooking, stirring occasionally, until temperature reaches 236 degrees on a candy thermometer, or until a small amount of mixture, dropped into ice-cold water, forms a soft ball that flattens on removal from water. Remove from heat. Add peanut butter, but do not stir it in. Cool mixture until temperature on candy thermometer drops to 115 degrees. (This may take as long as an hour.) Add vanilla.

Beat mixture until it thickens and turns lighter in color—2 to 3 minutes. While it can still flow from saucepan and before it loses its gloss, pour it into the prepared pan. (It is better to turn it into the pan too soon than too late. If too soon, continue stirring the mixture in the pan. If too late, it won't flow from saucepan.)

Cool penuche. With a small metal spatula loosen edges; turn out onto a cutting board; turn right side up. Cut into squares.

Makes 64 (1-inch) squares—2 pounds.

# PUBLIC NOTICE SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1973

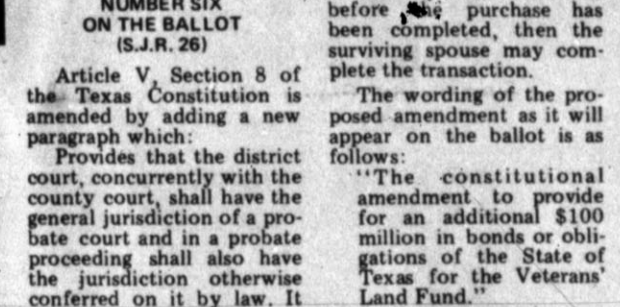
**NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 8)**  
Article III, Sections 5, 24 and 49a and Article VIII, Section 6 of the Texas Constitution are amended to: Provide for regular annual sessions of the Legislature. The regular session in each odd-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 180 days. The regular session in each even numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 60 days and would be limited to consideration of fiscal matters and any emergency matters submitted by the Governor. The 60 day session could be extended by the Governor for a period not to exceed 30 days.

**NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 7)**  
Article XVI, Sections 50 and 51 of the Texas Constitution are amended to: Include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses. Presently a single adult person is not entitled to claim a homestead exemption and a married man can abandon a family homestead without the consent of his wife. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the members of the legislature, effective in January, 1975."

**NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)**  
Article VIII, Sections 1-a and 1-b of the Texas Constitution are amended to: Extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the residents' homesteads of unmarried adults. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment to extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults."

**NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 11)**  
Article XVI, Section 59, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Subsection (e) which: Provides that no law creating conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless a copy of the proposed law is delivered to the commissioners court of each county and to the governing body of each incorporated city or town in whose jurisdiction said district or any part thereof is or will be located. Each such commissioner court and governing body may file its written consent or opposition to the proposed law with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives. Each special law creating such a district must comply with general laws then in effect relating to consent by political subdivisions to the creation of such districts. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws creating certain conservation and reclamation districts."

**NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 26)**  
Article V, Section 8 of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new paragraph which: Provides that the district court, concurrently with the county court, shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court and in a probate proceeding shall also have the jurisdiction otherwise conferred on it by law. It also provides that the jurisdiction increase, diminish, or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, may adopt rules governing the filing, distribution, or transfer of cases and proceedings as between the courts having jurisdiction of probate matters, and may provide that all appeals in probate matters shall be to the courts of civil appeals.

**NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 6)**  
Article III, Section 49-b of the Texas Constitution is amended to: Provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund. This amendment increases the present \$400 million authorization to \$500 million. Remove the present provision which permits buying of land only by those veterans who served between September 16, 1940 and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the armed conflict in Viet Nam. This amendment would allow all veterans who served after September 16, 1940 to buy land from the Veterans' Land Fund, provided they are otherwise qualified. Provide that, in the event of the death of an eligible

**NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 12)**  
Article XI, Section 7 of the Texas Constitution is amended to: Provide that all counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are authorized to levy a tax to pay for bonds issued for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a majority vote of the resident property tax-payers. Counties and cities are presently authorized to levy such taxes and this amendment only changes the required vote from a two-thirds majority to a simple majority. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds

Article VIII of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 2C which: Allows the Legislature, by general law, to exempt all real and personal property used by non-profit water supply corporations or cooperatives from all property taxes. The exemption would apply only to such property as is reasonably necessary to conduct the business of a non-profit water supply corporation or cooperative. The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from property taxes certain property used by a non-profit water supply corporation or a non-profit water supply cooperative."

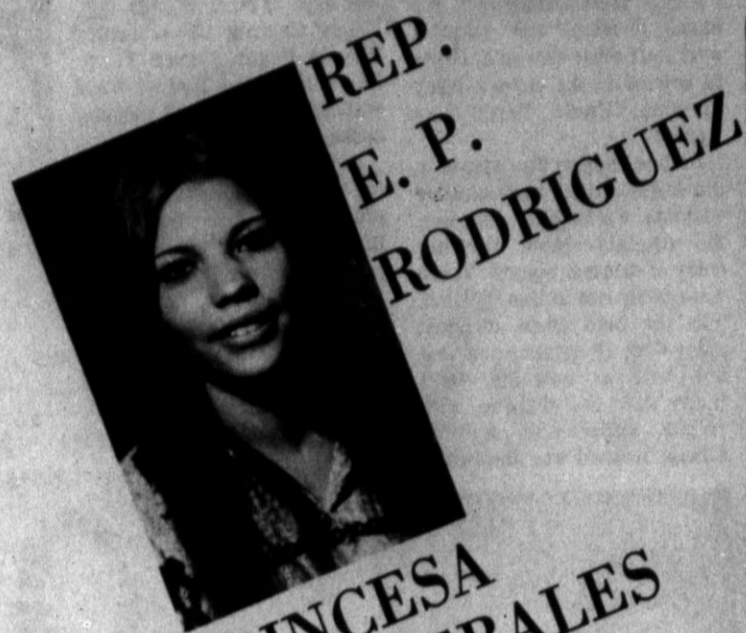

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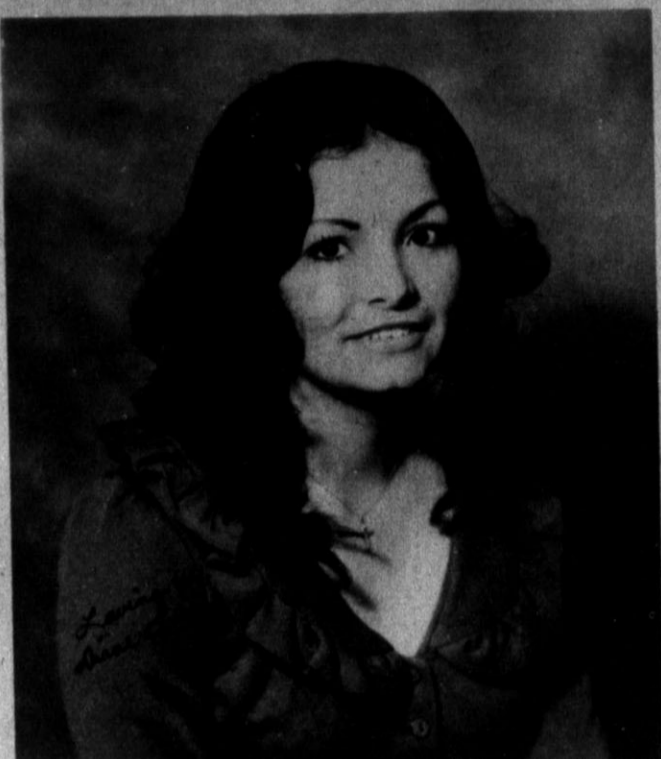

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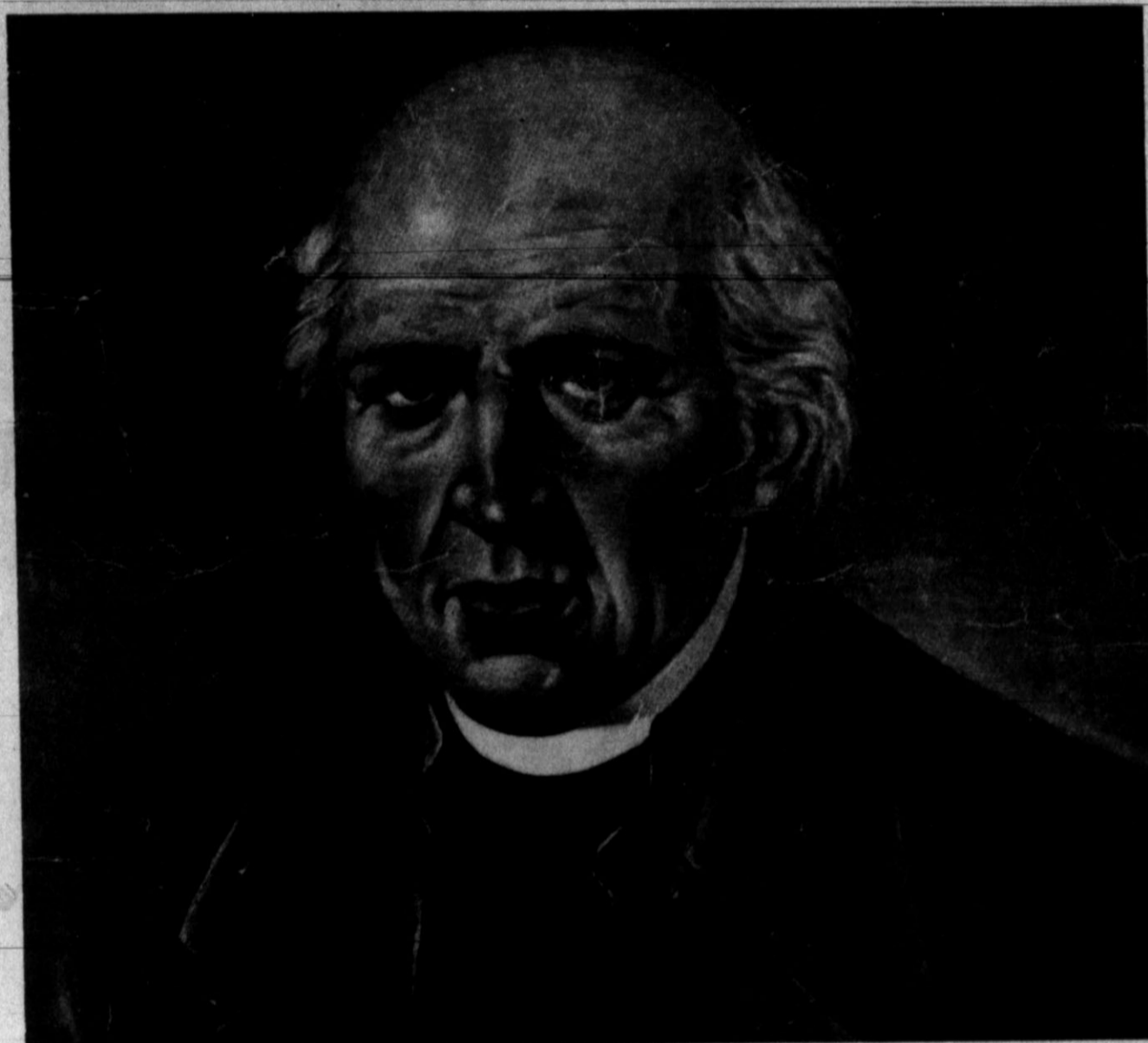

## Maestro De Ceremonia Sr. Jose Luis Liscano

This year's fiesta, as in years past, is in celebration of Mexican Independence Day. It is for us who have pride in our heritage.

Mexico's independence—which was begun 159 years ago — was not fully achieved until some fifty years ago.

Scholars believe that the Toltec Indians came into the Valley of Mexico some time before the year 900. These Indians made beautiful pottery and erected large buildings of finely carved stone, and by the 1100's, they had spread all over central and southern Mexico. But the Aztec became the leading tribe by the early 1300's. Their capital stood on the site of the present-day Mexico City.

Then the Spaniards discovered Mexico and Hernando Cortez was sent to conquer all the tribes there in 1519. Afterward, Mexicans were not permitted to mine or produce any goods which duplicated those in Spain. Mexico not only had to buy these products from Spain, but they were also forced to pay heavy taxes on them. The people became resentful.

In 1808, Napoleon I conquered Spain and forced Ferdinand VII to abdicate. Napoleon then placed his brother Joseph on the Spanish throne. This left the Spanish colonies — including Mexico — without a recognized ruler.

At 11 p.m. on Sept. 15, 1810, Miguel Hidalgo y Costilla, a priest

in the town of Dolores (now Dolores Hidalgo), called upon his Indian followers to revolt against their cruel Spanish overlords. From his pulpit, Father Hidalgo shouted the famous "Grito de Dolores": Long Live Our Lady of Guadalupe! Long live independence! Death to the Spaniards!

The priest organized 100,000 followers in a poorly equipped army and they began fighting.

The Grito de Dolores marked the beginning of the fight for Mexican Independence. Mexicans still celebrate Sept. 16 as Mexican Independence Day.

Each year on Sept. 15, the president rings a bell in Mexico City and repeats the Grito de Dolores. Next day, all Mexicans begin a colorful celebration.

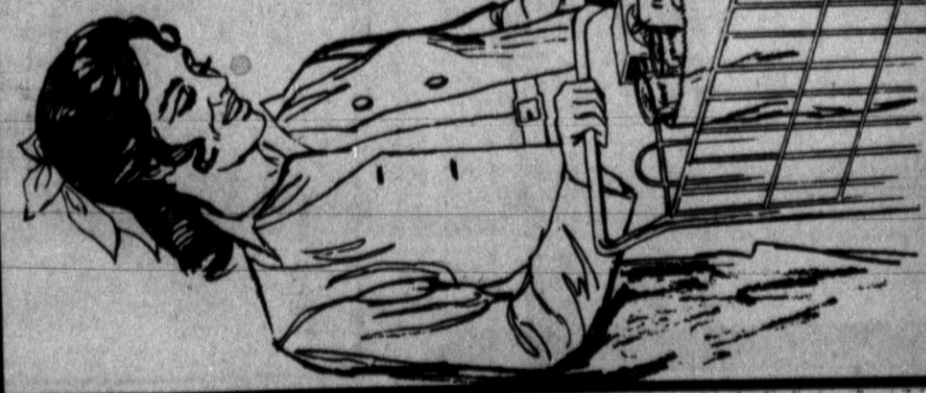

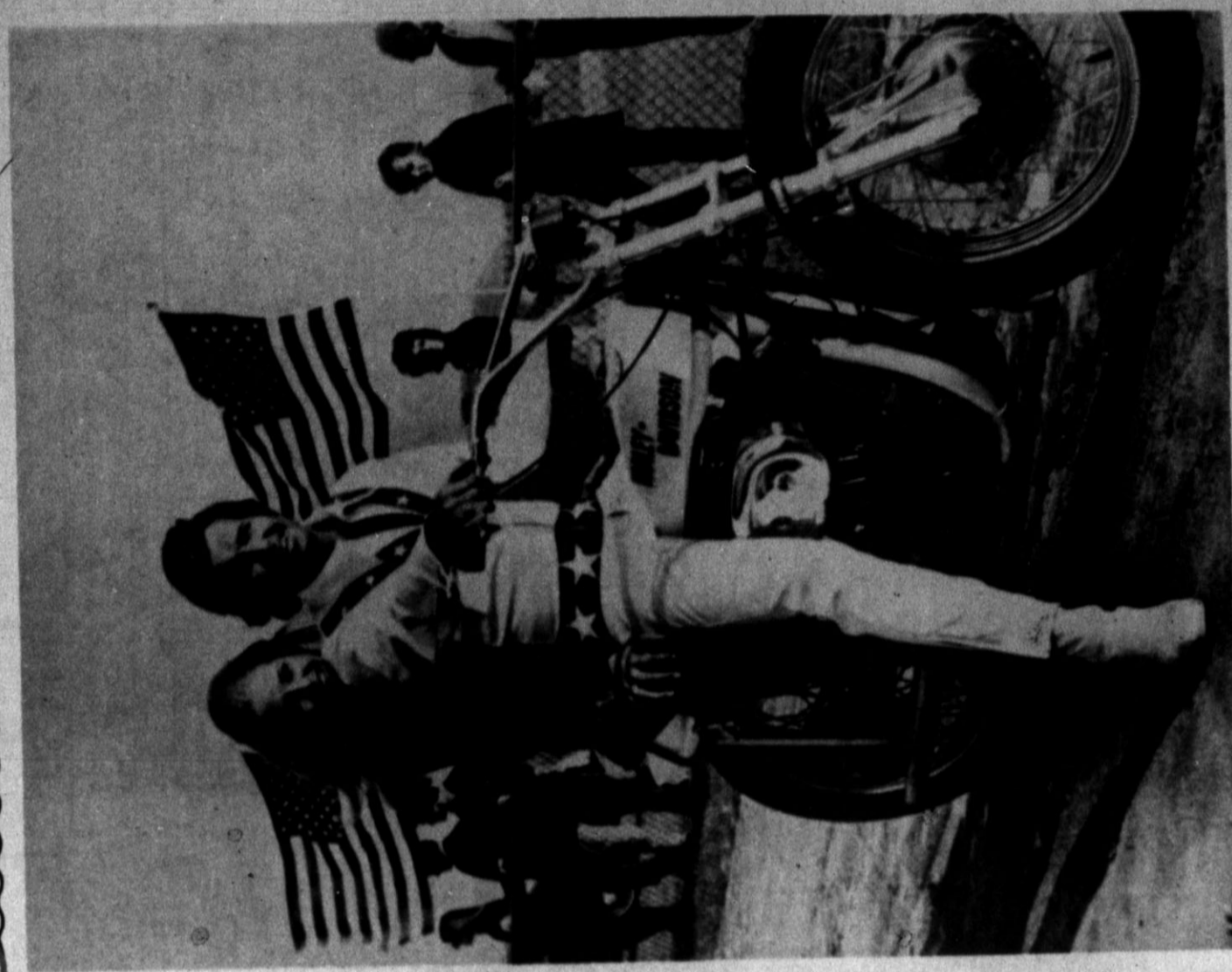
