# Hereford School Hours To Change With DST, Trustees Review Bids

Hereford School Trustees Tuesday decided to combat Daylight Savings Time by changing regular school hours to 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

The change becomes effective Jan. 7, the next day after DST goes into effect, and will continue until April 1 when the school hours will return to 8:30 a.m. to

The change was approved after Trustees decided DST would have an adverse effect on the local energy con-servation method and in fact, cause the school to consume more energy. Had Trustees not made the change, the normal tardy bell under DST in Hereford would ring at 8:30 a.m. and the sun would be rising 22 minutes later.

IN OTHER action during the special meeting of the board, Trustees opened bids for the new elementary building, but set another meeting at 6:30 a.m. Thur-sday to accept the bids. All six bids submitted to the board were well over the \$700,000 figure school officials had hoped

However, apparent low bidder, Wilev Hicks of Amarillo, said a delayal of action by the board until Thursday might allow him to investigate ways of reducing

Hicks had submitted a bid of \$779,000. The other five bids ranged upward, including one of \$926,000.

SOME. Hereford students in the northern and western portions of the school district catch buses as early as 6:45 a.m., which would be more than two hours before sunrise under the DST plan. Trustees said with the new hours these students would be catching the bus at 7:45 a.m., which will be an hour before sunrise, as is the situation now under Standard Time.

Trustees also duscussed the problems relating to working parents who have to bring their children to school. Several of the board members said they felt many of the Hereford businesses and governmental agencies would change their normal business

MANY Hereford merchants have expressed concern over the new DST plan and Deaf Smith County Commissioners last week decided to put county work crews under a 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. schedule when DST goes into effect. Commissioners also discussed changing courthouse hours, but delayed the action pending action by other businesses and governmental officials.

Board members also decided to take up other energy-saving proposals Thursday morning following discussion of recommendations of Supt. Roy Hartman. Board members had asked Hartman and other school officials to "come up with recommendations relating to ways to conserve energy within the school system."

THE CHANGE of school hours was one of the recommendations of school administrators which was approved. Other proposals to be studied and possibly approved Thursday morning

-Reduce thermostats in all school

-Review and eliminate out-of-school activities which are not essential to the over-all education program.

-Review all requests for use of transportation including the reduction of out-of-town athletic events, out-of-town student activities, field trips and other travel requests.

-Review ways to reduce fuel consumption of regular bus routes including making fewer stops; reduce highway speed of buses; eliminate pickup and delivery of pupils who live less than one; one-half mile off established bus route; consolidate bus stops.

THE RECOMMENDATIONS also appeal to Hereford citizens concerning use of school facilities. The proposals suggest local residents reduce requests for use of school facilities that require additional heating and lighting; make arrangements for pupils living in the same neighborhood to share nides to and from school and school activities; and co-operate and support efforts to reduce unnecessary use of fuel on regular bus



# Front Brrr-ings In Winter

The first major winter storm of 1973 slammed into the Hereford area Tuesday afternoon, with winds gusting up to 45 mph and the mercury dropping from 57 degrees around 4 p.m. to 34 degrees an

Strong winds continued during the night, along with light snow, and the temperature dipped to 18 degrees by 11 p.m. Tuesday. No snow accumulated in the Panhandle.

Blizzard conditions, however, were

seen in northeast New Mexico late Tuesday. The blowing snow cut visibility to zero

at several points in New Mexico and down to half a block in the upper Panhandle late Tuesday. Tucumcari and Clayton reported heavy snow, and US 874 was reportedly closed by blizzard conditions between Clayton and Raton Tuesday evening.

Hereford experienced blowing dust before the cold front arrived and brought some swirling snowfall Tuesday night.

There was not enough moisture to cause hazardous streets in the city however.

Dalhart and Dumas had only traces of snow on the ground Tuesday night, but driving conditions were said to be hazardous in those cities. Perryton reported a heavy snow about 8 p.m. Tuesday.

# City Names Street, Discusses Widening Of City Intersection

Hereford City Commissioners, in their final meeting of the calendar year, discussed the widening of the city intersection of U.S. 385 and Park Avenue and designated a new street as Pine Street.

Plans for widening the controversial inersection have been in the making for several months. Commissioners are presently negotiating with property owners around the intersection in an attempt to add another lane of traffic to aid vehicles in turning at the intersection.

The new street named by the city was onceunder county jurisdiction and was called Park Street. However, to avoid conflict with the present Park Avenue, the Commission renamed the street to Pine.

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


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# Funeral Of S. A. Fangman Scheduled This Morning

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



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#### Honored For Public Service

"We're here," said Plunk, "to let people know that there are good jobs available with Xerox in this area for people with degrees or technical training. For instance, in Amarillo, of the six people in our sales office, four are WTSU graduates, Plunk said, "and at least four of the nine people in our technical office are enrolled at WTSU or attended there."


Interviewing people for jobs is one of Plunk's duties. For Roberts, it is good experience. The men praised Public Services' objective, because, it not only helps the graduate looking for a job or an alumnus exploring the possibility of a job change, it is a help for companies who are looking for employees.

Dr. Craig C. Black, director of The Museum of Texas Tech University, reviewed the progress of Lubbock Lake Site archeological studies for the fall meeting of the Texas Tech University Foundation Board of Directors when they met for dinner and business at The

Black said that the first summer's dig in the current series of explorations provided evidence of an early horse, which may have been butchered as long as 15,000 years ago, to the site of a building, which could have sheltered archaic man 3,000 to 3,500 years ago.

"We hope eventually to demonstrate at this site that man has inhabited the place some 15,000 years, from the current Coke bottle era to the time of Clovis man," Dr. Black said in his slide lecture.

He showed one slide which demonstrated the care with which layers of dirt are removed. The claw marks of a power shovel were revealed, archeological evidence of digging that went on in the 1930s. Another slide showed a Folsom level almost "paved" with bison bones.

(3) Rep. Head to pit a divining rod and a shovel against one sand hill crane and three jack rabbits furnished by

When confronted by the three alternatives and a challenge to carry the chains at the championship battle, Clayton rebutted, "My team has never lost a game while I was carrying the chains. I do not believe that will change Saturday. Vega has an outstanding team—one which I will support and defend whatever challenge it might require. We accept any one of the alternatives or all three of them. We'll win the game Saturday and the Speaker's race."

Leading the defensive work for the Horns were Cresap, Ralph Paschel, Kenny Fangman and Gerald Berry. The Coons had averaged more than 400 yards a game in total offense, but the Vega team held them to 180 total yards - with 140 coming on passes.

### College Entrance Tests Dates Are Announced

more decisions. Those words would describe a senior's mind while trying to decide whether or not to attend college and especially where.

What many juniors and seniors do not realize is that the ACT and SAT tests are designed especially for this purpose to show them how their score stands with other college students scores at the particular colleges which they are interested in attending.

"ACT" stands for "American Collegiate Testing" and "SAT.." stands for "Scholastic Aptitude Test." If a student plans to attend a college, whether in Texas, somewhere else in the US or overseas, he willalmost certainly take either the ACT or the SAT test. The largest majority of colleges require one of the two tests to

enter college Both the ACT and the SAT test take about four and one-half hours to complete. The ACT test deals with five areas: English, math, social studies, natural science, and composite, while the SAT deals with two major areas: verbal and math. However, both compare the

Decisions, decisions, and students to other college

One of the two tests is mandatory to enter a college, and students are urged to sign up to take the test well before the actual testing time.

dates for signing up for the test are as follows: SAT application deadline - Dec. 27, 1973 and ACT application deadline -Jan. 28, 1974. The registration must reach its destination by the deadline. The next dates for the actual tests are as follows: ACT - Feb. 23, 1974 and SAT Feb. 2, 1974. Applications to take either of the tests can be obtained in Mrs. Willie Braddy's office. The location of the test will be disclosed at the counselors' office. Fee for taking the test is \$6.50 and it is necessary to take the test only one time.

Mrs. Braddy, HHS counselor, commented, "I would en-courage students to start making choices of their favorite colleges by at least junior year." She also invites any student to look through the many college catalogues which are in her office.

AN INTRIGUING reminder of a holiday party in long-ago Hereford is contained in a 60year-old party invitation en-closed in the Christmas card Ezra Norton received from Mrs. Ernest May this week.

It gives a glimpse of a society more formal than we have today, even though this was a little town just past the pioneer

stage then. Even before the yellowed envelope is opened, you see some changes -all in the postal system. The tiny envelope, just large enough to hold the calling card-sized invitation, is not allowable by present postal

regulations.

Neither is the address simply "City" instead of the name of town, state and zip code. And it was delivered with a one-cent stamp.

Inside, the invitation is hand written in formal style: At Home Wednesday, Dec. 3, 1913

Mrs. Ezra Norton Mrs. Will O'Brien in honor of Mrs. Fred Brownlee O'Brien residence 5 to 6 P.M.

YOU'LL NOTE that no address was given for the O'Brien residence. Naturally, everybody in town knew it was 'the brown house three blocks from the Baptist Church," or some such description.

The invitation was addressed

to Miss Grace Hopkins; she was the sister, Mr. Norton says, of Bess Hopkins, now Mrs. May, and of Mrs. Lem Carlyle. The party honoree was a relative of the O'Briens, Mr. Norton

The invitation was sent back to him with the suggestion that it might be put in the Deaf Smith County Museum. It gives a charming glimpse of early social life in Hereford, which still puts considerable emphasis



Peronne, his protagonist, Waugh has threaded the people and places he knows and has known; such as his brother Evelyn, his cousin Claud Cockburn, Robin Maugham and, most of all, himself, at once the real person and a fiction of his own pen: the ultimate fruit of his own paradox.

In Raymond Peronne, Waugh the novelist has created a character both sympathetic and complex. He has drawn the picture of a man for whom all good fortune seems to be waiting, in tense anticipation, simply to be tripped over-and who mysteriously fails to take the opportunities that present

simultaneously envy and feel sorry for, whom we can only too easily forgive his silver spoon-a hero without arrogance, a nonsuccess who is not an anti-hero.
