## Six turnovers are key to quarter-finals loss for Herd

# Grand jury returns ll indictments Friday

The Deaf Smith County grand jury moved through a list of 12 persons Friday in a three-hour session and returned 11 indictments, including a joint indictment against two men for raping a 16-year-old girl.

The grand jury, with Paul Harvey as foreman, began its session at 9 a.m. and were completed by noon.

# Second suspect in Snow hurts beet crop, rape case arrested aids businesses, wheat

Sugarbeet growers, seeking to come out of the hole after several bad years, were dealt another setback last week when snows up to six inches settled on fields and caused the shut down of the Holly plant here.

The snow also caused some concern for the meager remainings of the 1971 grain sorghum crops that still are in the fields.

"The snows have stopped harvest again and we are out of beets and have the factory shut down," Holly agricultural manager Bob Ginn said Friday. "We ran out of beets yesterday (Thursday) and we have no idea

of when we can get rolling a-

Only 38 per cent of the area sugar beet crop has been harvested, leaving some 12,900 acres still left in the fields. Some farmers indicated they would do some harvesting late at night and early in the mornings while the ground is still frozen enough to hold the weight of the heavy harvesting machinery.

If the snow melts, farmers will

be unable to get into the fields. "The snow itself if not going to hurt us at all," Ginn said, "as far as the sugar beets are concerned, but it is going to keep

us from getting into the fields." Juston McBride, county agricultural agent, said Friday the grain sorghum that is left in the fields faces some problems in three diseases being noticed.

The danger involved in some of the remaining grain sorghum he said, is some of it is beginning to fall or "lodge." The diseases are causing this and the longer and later the crops are left in the fields the more of it that will be lost.

"As far as winter wheat goes, it won't hurt it except farmers won't be able to graze it. As far See SNOW Page Two





Generally speaking, the mere fact that a motorist has no license loes not make him automatically could be imposing an extra penilly upon him, in addition to the regular penalty the law already. imposes for driving without a

Furthermore, an unlicensed driver is himself entitled to collect damages, if someone else negligently injuries him. Otherwise, noted one court, he would become a helpless target for any

other driver on the road. On the other hand, there is nodoubt that the state does have right not only to require a license but also to enforce that requirement rigorously.

In one case a citizen became incensed at the idea of police roadblocks, which were used from time to time to check up on the licenses of passing motor. ists. Finally he went to court for an injunction demanding an endto this practice.

"Until a motorist has done something wrong," he said, "the police have no authority to stop him. He has a right to use the public streets without any inter-

But the court rejected his demand, saying that the right to se the public sfreets is subject to restrictions necessary for the public safety. A roadblock, said he court, is a logical and practical method for weeding out drivers not fit to drive.

# \$20,000 available through REAP area farmers

Local farmers and ranchers still have some \$20,000 in Rural Environmental Assistance Program funds available to them through the ASCS office here but those funds must be used up before the end of the year according to Dan Herring to no fothe Soil Conservation Service.

If the money is not used before Dec. 31, it will be scratched from the books and that could mean an overall reduction in REAP funds for this county for next

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service provides the money through REAP and the Soil Conservation Service provides the technical as sistance.

Practices available through the program are:

-Establishing perma n e n t grasses such as Western Wheatgrass, Tall Fescue, Smooth Brome, Orchard Grass and Tall Wheatgrass. The cost-share for this practice is 50 per cent of the seed cost not to exceed \$6 per acre with payment of seeding operations set at 75 cents per acre. -Constructing wells for live-

stock water with a cost-share of drilling the wells set at \$1.25 per linear foot. The water storage facility is 30 per cent of the actual cost not to exceed \$225 per

-Constructing or sealing dams, pits or ponds with a costshare set at 12 cents per cubic yard of earth moved.



# A step back into history

On any day a person can step from the streets of modern-day Tulia, Tex. through the door of the Elm Tree Inn and find himself face to face with a part of the past.

The Elm Tree Inn, located at 200 West Broadway in Tulia, is one of the Panhandle's historical landmarks as designated by the Texas State Historical Society. The two-story hotel can accomodate 40 guests and resertions can be made for daily, weekly an dmonthly guests.

The history of the Inn is preserved in its furnishings and hospitality since it was first opened in 1906 as the Tulia Hotel. At that time it was a meeting place for cattle buyers, cowboys and travelers of the Panhandle region.

About 10 years ago a Tulia family completely restored and redecorated the Inn at a cost of \$200,000. It was furnished throughout with valuable antiques and the decor is reminiscent of the turn of the century when the Inn was first built.



The Attorney General WITH A 2.48 ERA. LIFETIME may, however, obtain an injunction against those firms which violate the Deceptive Trade Practices Act. If the firm continues its deceptive practices the Attorney General may secure up to \$10,000 in penalties for each and every subsequent violation of the injunction.

# Those Demos'--Connally

Treasury Secretary John Connally has one thing every candidate for public office wants-he is in the spotlight at the center of the stage.

As Phase Two of the new economic policy goes forward. Connally seems to loom larger than life in the role of the Administration's almost indispensable man. It is a role which any can didate might covet.

But Connally's candidacy for any office is purely speculative, and the Secretary of the Treasury denies he is a candidate for anything.

But from the moment last December that President Nixon announced his plan to appoint Connally to the Treasury post, there has been speculation that the former Democratic governor of Texas would become a candidate to succeed Vice President Spiro T. Agnew on the 1972 Nixon ticket. Now, almost a year later, nourished by Connally's emergence as the foremost advocate of the Administration's economic policies, the speculation has intensified.

Connally has denied having any interest at all in the Vice Presidency. Asked about press speculation on his possible candidacy, he replied that he did not know where the press was getting its information—but that it was not coming from him

President Nixon has turned away questions on who his 1972 running mate will be. But he has left open the possibility of a change by saying that he has not made a decision.

A combination of charm, skill, forcefulness and hard work have made Connally the Administration's most effective negotiator of economic issues with

Congress, the business community, the press and the public. He has attained this distinction in less than a yearand without the usual financial and economic background of a Treasury Sec-

Connally is a close friend and former protege of President Lyndon B. Johnson and a Democrat who maintains firm relationships with prominent associates in his party.

But he is scrupulously loyal to the Republican Administration which he serves. He is meticulous in deference to the President, ascribing all credit to Nixon's policies while serving as a lightening rod for much of the criticism and difficulty that are inevitably en-

In every respect he is "good soldier" of the Administration.

Nixon and his party endured serious disappointment in the November 1970 mid-term election. The voter's refusal to elect more Republican candidates was widely attributed to the President's economic policies, which had brought on a recession and rising unemployment without abating inflation

Prospects changed Aug. 15 when the President, announcing a new economic policy, imposed the wage-price freexe, proposed a tax cut, levied a surcharge on imports and "floated" the dollar in world currency exchanges.

Connally's counsel, no more than hinted at before mid-August, prevailed in determining the new course of economic policy.

He headed the Administration task force that devised the new policy. He became chairman of the Cost of Living Council, which has over-all responsibility for administration of the program in the domestic area. As Treasury Secretary he shouldered the burden of negotiating solutions to the U.S. balance of payments and foreign trade problems and the problems of the international monetary systems.

Connally's fast ascent from provincial governor to national figure and his independent Texas base, with a conservative electorate and 26 presumably deliverable electoral votes which Nixon did not win in 1968, make him an attractive possibility as a running mate for the President in 1972.

Some Washington observers believe Connally's eye is actually on the presidential nomination in 1976. Whether as a Democrat or a Republican, a term as Vice President would give him the exposure and leverage he would need to insure the nomination and a strong national race.

Although Connally insists he remains a "Democrat," one thing was quite noticeable at his press conference following the AFL-GIO 11-22-71 convention. Over and over in criticizing the Democratic Congress he referred to the Democrats as "they."



Leaded Paint Canses Problems Auto pollution is by no means the only envirnomental problem confronting the lead industry. Lead poisoning of children from old paint has been known for decades but has been heavily publicized in recent years. As far back as 1959, New York City reported 12 deaths of children due to lead poisoning from paint. Last year there were only two. despite many more cases, due to increased knowledge and more

It has been established that lead poisoning of children occurs chiefly among youngsters under 6 years of age living in dilapidated housing in slum areas. Lead paint applied from 10 to 50 years ago peels and falls into food, or is ingested by gnawing on woodwork.

Earlier this year the Federal Lead-Based Paint Poisoning Prevention Act took effect. It provides support for local programs to detect and treat lead poison cases, seeks new ways to reove old lead paint, and bars interior use of lead-based paint. The industry supported this leg-

A trade group, Lead Industries Association, has published booklets on the problem of lead poisoning of children from paint, and 100.000 copies have been distributed within two years. Lead poisoning of children is wholly preventable and the industry expects the problem will be eradicated.

#### Ceramic Poisoning Rare

Isolated but well-publicized cases of lead poisoning from ceramic dinnerware have given the lead industry another headache of late. A national magazine told of a doctor's family poisoned by a poorly-glazed pitcher from Mexico. That one case and the publicity it received led to an investigation by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.

The pottery industry has developed a seal of approval. Dinnerware which has been tested and found to release less than the allowable amount of glazes bears a seal on the package. One pottery maker fires the seal on the product itself, on the back of

SAILORS OF FORTUNE-The Republic of Texas once rented its famous Nevy to the Mexican state of Yucatan.

Yucatan had revolted against the Mexican federal government and needed all of the help that it could get. The Texas Navy, having little to do after helping the Republic win its independence from Mexico, was available for hire. Commodore Edwin Ward Moore let the Yucatan government rent both ships and men for \$8,000 a month,

Yucatan still lost its war.

TO YOUR GOOD HEALTH - Texas is one of only four states whose health departments manufacture vaccines to save taxpayers the cost of buying commerically produced

Since 1933, the Health Department at Austin has been making vaccines for Texans. It turns out hundreds of thousands of doses of serum each year to combat diseases like tetanus, diptheria, smallpox, polio, measles, German measles and others. Most of the serums are given to the poor thrugh local health departments. They also are stockpiled for use in emergencies like hurricanes and epidemics.

CAPITAL LOSS-Padilla, the Mexican city that once was the seat of government for Texas, soon will disappear from the face of the earth.

Located between Matamoras, on the border with Texas, and Cluadad Victoria, Padilla was the Texas capital when Texas was a part of the Mexican state of Tamaulipas. It was founded in 1749.

#### SENSING THE NEWS

A report by the District Committee of the U. S. House of Representatives is notable for an exceptionally candid and truthful assessment of an urban problem. The report expressed proper concern about the swarm of intruders in the District of Colombia. "It is not the Congress or the federal estalishment which is the interloper here—as some District spokesmen maintain," the report said, "but rather the thousands of persons who have swarmed here, most of whom add little or nothing to the day by-day operations of the federal govern ment, who are 'local' in character and needs, who are the intruders and who are not vital to the federal government's op-

U.S. Rep. John McMillan, chairman of the District committee, and the other comittee members deserve public thanks for authorizing such a forthright statement, Unless American cities obtain some form of influx control, urban problems will remain out of hand

The nation's capital is a prime example of the difficulties America's big cities face. It is loaded with "intruders" who are responsible for high crime rates and appalling welfare loads. America's capital city is one of the most unsafe cities in the world. It is less dangerous to walk the streets of Saigon at night than to walk a few blocks from the White House after

Unfortunately, the federal courts persist in denying cities and states the authority to restrict the flow of newcomers seeking welfare. For example, a three-judge federal court in Providence, R.I. recently ruled that Rhode Island's one-year residency requirement for welfare recipients is unconstitutional. A requirement of this sort is essential if the welfare population is to be checked.

Scant attention is being paid to the flood of imigrants-many of them illegal immigrants-from the Carribean area, "The New York Times" recently reported that there are more than 200,000 Dominicans in the metropolis. Many of them travel from the Dominican Republic to Puerto Rico and then "pass" as Puerto Ricans. Under existing law, Puerto Ricans can move to the continental United States without entry formalities. New York City also is gaining a big population of Haitians and other Caribbean islanders. Many of these people bring to the United States crime, superstition and a penchant for idleness.

Unfortunately, middle-class Cubans who come to this country, as refugees from Castro's tyranny-and worked hardare disliked by Puerto Ricans and Dominicans and other Caribbean peoples who drift into crime and welfarism.

While one can sympathize with the economic plight of the Caribbean peoples, it is imperative that the influx of unskillea newcomers be stopped. The United States cannot continue to absorb the proletarian populations of the Caribbean.

The Caribbean newcomers are only one part of the urban problem. Central cities are decaying because white collar and blue collar working people are fleeing to the suburbs. The reason the productive people are moving to the suburbs is because the inner cities are dangerous, public schools have been turned into centers of sociological experimentation, and the enfranchisement of dependent people has created political regimes that cater to the ignorant, unpropertied and lawless."

At the moment I don't know what the final outcome will be, but Congress has been considering a bill to finance Presidential campaigns with tax money.

FOUR IN A WILD PLACE By John Stallard

What was it like living on a farm before the turn of the century? What was it like carving a homestead out of the wilderness without electricity, without running water? What was it like for children to grow up in such circumstances?

These were some of the questions John Stallard asked himself one Sunday when he and his family happened upon an abandoned homestead 100 miles north of their home in Milwau-

Stallard was a top reporter with the Milwaukee Journal, He had a car, a modern home, security, and a bright future. And yet like many of us, he sensed that this was not enough, that there was more to life than commuting to work and punching the time clock.

To find the answer to these questions, the Stallards sold and went back to the woods with their two children, aged three
