Spokesmen for a Spokesmen for a number of air carriers, including Pan American
World Airways, United Airrines and Northwest Airines, sald Monday the inspections already were under way and were not expected doy disrunpt service. They all said the intitial findings revealed no cracking problems. The FAA directive, sent to the airlines during the weekend, calls Yor Boeing $77 /$ with more than 1,000 andings to be inspected within
25 fight $y$ cyces $-a$ a takeoff and a landing - and newer ones within 50 flight cycles. Planes with fewer than 10,000 landings or those that have had the frame inspected within the past two years need not undergo the special Inspection, the directive said. FAA spokesman Stephen Hayes said the agency estimated bet-
ween 150 and 160 of the planes would be subject to inspection, including those belonging to U.S. airlines and foreign carriers serving
