A&M Poultry Specialist Named to Face Hightower

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — A Texas A&M University poultry specialist who has been recommended as the Republican candidate for state agriculture commissioner says he will campaign for consumers' support in the race.

Fred Thornberry, 45, has been recommended to replace Waller rice farmer

Donald Hebert for the November battle against Democrat Jim Hightower, a Republican official said Wednesday.

Party leaders were expected to make the formal recommendation today in a press conference at the state capitol.

"If I am elected, I hope that I can do as good a job as

humanly possible for the consumers and food and fiber producers of this state," said Thornberry, 45, a project group supervisor and state specialist for the A&M Agricultural Extension Service.

"I hope that I can offer the leadership we need," said Thornberry. "I intend to take an active role in state leadership."

Thornberry will be recommended for nomination by the state Republican Executive Committee, said Republican executive director Wayne Thornburn.

He said party chairman Chester Upham recommended Thornberry from a field of about 20 other candidates. Republican officials had sought a stronger candidate to run against Hightower, who defeated incumbent Reagan Brown in the May 1

Board Considering Proposal

Insurance Going Down?

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The Texas Board of Insurance considered but made no decision on a proposal to reduce overall property insurance rates by 16 percent in Texas.

Board Chairman William P. Daves said Wednesday after a day of testimony that the three-member board would take the proposal under advisement. The proposed rates would go into effect Sept. 1.

Representatives of the industry quarreled with the formula the board's staff used to calculate rates, particularly regarding hurricane risks. The board staff used com-

parisons of premium intake and loss outgo to arrive at their figures.

Under the staff plan, homeowners insurance would go down an average of 20 percent statewide. Farm and ranch owners' insurance rates would go down 17.5 percent. Extended coverage policies would decrease an average of 15.1 percent.

The only category that showed a major increase was tenants insurance, which the staff said should go up 22.3 percent. But tenants' policies would not necessarily go up that much, said staff actuary Gaylon Daniel, because they are calculated in conjunction

with fire insurance, for which the staff recommended a 25 percent decrease.

Although the staff did not delve into reasons behind the increased losses on tenants' policies, they later said increases in theft and simple inflation could easily account for the rise.

Daniel said a "catastrophic loss" factor was figured into the rate recommendations and contributed to the reductions. Loss from catastrophic events, such as hurricanes and tornados, was calculated over the past 10 years, and there have been no major losses of the kind experienced in Texas in the '60s and early

'70s. Industry representatives complained that rates should not be reduced based on the absence of significant storms in the past 10 years.

"A hurricane loss will occur in the seacoast territory even if one has not occurred in the past ten years," said attorney Sam Winters, representing the Texas Insurance Advisory Association. "Failure to consider this element by following a formula, without adjustment for the inevitable, is to disregard a fundamental element in arriving at a proper rate for the future."

Joe Eddins, the TIAA ac-

tuary, recommended that the board "always include at least one excess loss year" in its calculations of 10-year "catastrophic loss."

The industry representatives also complained about the board's lowering the investment income it figures into rates. "The net effect, in the real world," said Eddins, "is that the insurers are, now, as a practical matter, using their investment income in the rates they actually charge the insured."

But Eddins denied Commissioner Lyndon Olson Jr.'s suggestion that the industry was insinuating policyholders are paying for the lowered investment income calculation.

'Heavy Discussions' Coming

Reagan, Mitterrand Confer

PARIS (AP) — President Reagan opened the first full day of his European tour by conferring with French President Francois Mitterrand today on the Middle East, Central America and the fighting in the Falkland Islands.

On the eve of an economic summit of major industrial democracies, Reagan said he and Mitterrand detoured "heavy discussions" of the economic issues straining America's allies until they join the other leaders at Versailles.

The two leaders met over lunch in the splendor of the Elysee Palace. Reagan said it was a good meal. "How would the food be? Delicious. We're in Paris."

Reagan was greeted at the Elysee Palace by a military honor guard and a salute from a drum and bugle corps. He and Mitterrand shook hands and then met over lunch.

Despite political differences between the conservative American president and the socialist French leader, the two officials have a cordial working relationship. Even so, senior French officials said Mitterrand will oppose Reagan's effort to persuade America's trading partners to limit their credit sales to the Soviet Union.

Before talking with Mitterrand, Reagan met with Mrs. Charles Ray, the widow of a military attache at the U.S. Embassy who was killed in a terrorist attack Jan. 18. White House deputy press secretary Larry Speakes said Reagan told Mrs. Ray he would promote her husband posthumously one grade to full colonel.

The president also conferred with Secretary of State Alexander Haig and Treasury Secretary Donald T. Regan on summit issues.

Reagan, who arrived here Wednesday night for a 10-day trip, had a leisurely schedule today as he adjusted from jet lag. Aside from his conference with Mitterrand, the president was to meet with employees of the American Embassy and attend a formal dinner for Mitterrand.

Reagan, accompanied by his wife, Nancy, arrived at Paris' Orly aire ceremony shortly before midnight local time on his first trans-oceanic trip since becoming president.

The official party descended from Air Force One in a thunderstorm, and the Reagans were protected by umbrellas as they walked the red carpet to the VIP terminal, where their motorcade awaited them.

French Foreign Minister Claude Cheysson greeted the Reagans, who motored immediately to the home of U.S. Ambassador Evan Griffith Galbraith to spend the night.

After a round of private staff meetings this morning, Reagan is to call on President Francois Mitterrand, the socialist leader of France who will host an economic

summit of seven industrialized nations, the first major event on Reagan's schedule.

U.S. Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr told

reporters crossing the Atlantic aboard Air Force One on Wednesday that the meeting

Mrs. Thomas Sets Write-In Effort

Political newcomer David Ruland won the Democratic nomination for county clerk in the May primary and had no Republican opponent, but Wednesday he drew a write-in candidate.

Marjorie Thomas, a deputy clerk in the county clerk's office, announced Wednesday that she will file an intent to run as a Democratic write-in candidate and "wage an intensive and positive campaign" to win the race.

Mrs. Thomas, 55, has been a deputy in the clerk's office the past three years and had worked for six years as a clerk in the tax assessor's office.

"I had thought about being a candidate until Mr. Cain announced his intentions to seek re-election. In view of the results of the primary election, I have now decided to offer my candidacy in this manner," said Mrs. Thomas.

Another Budget Battle Expected

WASHINGTON (AP) — With President Reagan refusing to "split the difference" on the 1983 budget, Democrats and Republicans are bracing for another head-to-head clash on the House floor.

The Democrats' strategy includes a plan to revive Reagan's nearly-forgotten

original spending blueprint as the vehicle for the showdown.

In addition, Democratic leaders appeared ready to push a more liberal budget plan than they had supported last week while Republicans said they would move in a more conservative direction.

After the House rejected more than half a dozen budget plans last week, House Budget Committee Chairman James R. Jones, D-Okla., suggested that leaders of both parties "split the difference" between the unsuccessful packages they had each brought to the House floor.

Jones convened a meeting of his panel Wednesday, announcing that "the White House informed me last night that particular path would not be possible."

Jones then suggested that his Democratic-controlled committee report out the president's original budget — submitted to Congress in February — and use it as a vehicle for debate in the full House.

Jones added that the action would be taken with the understanding that the committee would recommend the president's plan not be approved and Democratic and Republican leaders would offer separate substitutes to the administration package.

Such action would amount to a potentially embarrassing blow to Reagan and his House allies because the president's plan, with its high deficit projections, failed to garner even GOP support on Capitol Hill.

Gasoline Prices Inch Up Due to Demand

In what analysts said could be the first round of price hikes, some major oil companies raised wholesale gasoline prices as much as two cents a gallon Wednesday.

Summer demand increases have boosted pump prices in the Panhandle 5 to 6 cents higher than three weeks ago. Fuel price checks in Hereford Wednesday showed a range of \$1.03 for diesel to \$1.24 for unleaded. Mean prices were \$1.15 for regular and \$1.20 for unleaded. Hereford gasoline prices during the first of May were ranging from \$1.07 to \$1.12.

Lynton Allred of Allred Oil in Hereford said he has been getting a price increase about every three days during the last three weeks.

Allred's comment on the reason for the increase was, "you know what you read, that's all."

After the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries reduced production in April, the oil glut began to fade. Buyers who speculated

that prices would keep falling suddenly began buying more

in anticipation of tightening supplies and OPEC prices. As a result, crude oil prices rose sharply.

"Somebody just decides it's going to go and it goes," Allred said, explaining that the OPEC people are basically Aramco (Arabian and American Oil Company) which is owned by four major American oil companies. Aramco, Allred said, controls most of the oil flow from the mid-east.

Exxon jobber R.L. Blakely said "it would strictly be a guess" to project gasoline prices through the summer.

He said with the 42-gallon barrels going at about \$34 each, then "shipped halfway around the world" before refining, it is not easy to make a profit. He said he read where an average of one refinery a day was shutting down.

The average 6-cent increase at the pump has not sufficiently covered the refineries' needs.

"The cost at the refinery

I had received an honorary degree from Sterling College in Kansas. Among those who graciously offered congratulations was a commercial gardener from over on Cow Creek. Vigorous, virile, he strode forward, grabbed my hand: "Pleasure to meet you, Paul Harvey...good speech...hope you'll come again."

It was farther down the receiving line that somebody informed me that "Wally Lattimer—is 100!" "We didn't believe what he said was true. That a man that old could act 22."

A neighbor in Lyons, Kansas, wrote that about Wally Lattimer. Wally was a three dollar-a-day harvest hand in 1903. It is

difficult to imagine that he was any more vigorous then than now. In 1913 he bought the land he still farms—12 hours a day. Wally has outlived two wives, takes winter cruises to places like Tahiti and Hawaii, New Zealand or the Panama Canal. But retire? He's "Never given a thought to it."

I sought out Wally for a second look. Here is a man who was half a century old when I was born—yet his muscle, his keen eye, his quick wit, his almost unlined face would fit a man of 30! Everybody who meets Wally seeks his secret. He eats three meals a day—no meat. Mostly fish or chicken, livers, fruits, vegetables. Lives alone now, tending the tidy five-bedroom white house himself. And farms—mostly vegetables and peonies—by himself. He's up every morning at 4:30. "Had 22 bushels of early peas this year, 30 bushels of beets."

That, and the commercial peony business, keep him busy and reasonably prosperous. Drives his own farm truck, and his license is good for three more years. Watches a little television, mostly just comedies. Like Johnny Carson and has been a repeat guest on the Carson program. Carson, also sought the secret. "A cigar once a day, a beer just now and then."

"Some sugar, some salt, some coffee."

"Washes without soap."

Is moderation the explanation? Wally will tell you also, "I don't worry and I don't get mad."

Wally reads a lot, mostly history; never wears glasses. Johnny Carson invited Wally to return on his 100th birthday recently, but Wally declined the invitation. Said he had 70 relatives coming over for the day and he was not about to leave them! Hard work, cheerful disposition, temperance. Wally's secret is no secret—but for most of us it is a difficult prescription.

American Airlines Announces Fare Increases

DALLAS (AP) — American Airlines plans to increase fares on many of the routes where it once competed head-to-head with defunct Braniff International, an airline official said Wednesday.

The increase — affecting almost half of the carrier's 1,400 routes — will begin on June 18, senior marketing vice president Thomas J. Plaskett said.

American will guarantee current fares on the 650 routes to travelers with advance reservations and to passengers who meet certain restrictions and make advance reservations by July 9.

Though most of the increases come on routes formerly flown by both carriers, Plaskett said the fare increases are not solely attributable to Braniff's demise.

Braniff suspended operations May 13 and filed for protection from its creditors the next day under Chapter 11 of the federal bankruptcy laws.

American had increased some fares before Braniff went out of business, and needed higher fares "that will cover our costs," said Plaskett.

American lost \$41 million in the first quarter this year, he said.

Five Patrol Cars Damaged In Lubbock Chase

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — Two Snyder men face felony prosecution for leading police on a high-speed chase that left one policeman injured and five patrol cars damaged.

Authorities said Wednesday they were preparing charges against the two men, aged 19 and 20. The charges will include aggravated assault on a police officer, theft, evading arrest and possession of marijuana, said police spokesman Bill Morgan.

He said the 20-year-old also will be charged with criminal mischief.

The two men also accumulated 74 traffic tickets during a chase that lasted 33 minutes, reached speeds of 90 mph to 100 mph and covered about 36 miles.

"I would bet they never missed an episode of the 'Dukes of Hazzard,'" a popular television show noted for high-speed chase sequences, said Morgan.

The chase began early Wednesday morning when a detective said he saw two men cut through a fence at an auto parts store and steal the "complete front end assembly from a 1980 Z28 Chevrolet Camaro," said Morgan.

Detective Says Hinckley Seemed 'Relieved' On Day Of Shooting

WASHINGTON (AP) — A detective, who spent seven hours with John W. Hinckley Jr. on March 30, 1981 says the suspect seemed normal, laughed at an off-color joke and even appeared "relieved he had shot the president."

Detective Arthur Edward Myers of the Washington Police Department told a federal jury hearing the case against Hinckley that the defendant was "in total control of himself."

At one point, Hinckley "laughed out loud" when an off-color joke was told during his physical examination, said Myers, who is returning to the stand today. The detective also said Hinckley was amused when someone commented: "You must be a Democrat."

Before Myers took the stand Wednesday, Dr. William Brownlee was the first rebuttal witness called by the prosecution, which is trying to show that Hinckley was sane when he shot the president.

Brownlee said Hinckley didn't appear depressed or psychotic and that "in the same situation, I think I would have been more anxious."

The physician, who conducted his 45-minute examination in an FBI witness room five hours after Hinckley was arrested outside the Washington Hilton Hotel, said, "He did not appear abnormal at all."

"He seemed normal to me except he was a little anxious."

Brownlee gave a dry, physician's sketch of the patient he saw, but Myers strung together anecdotes from his seven hours with Hinckley, who he initially referred to as "the suspect."

During the questioning at Washington police headquarters, Myers said he was having trouble spelling "assassinate" on a form. Hinckley, who spent seven years enrolling and dropping out of college, spelled it for him, the detective said.

Later, at the FBI's Washington field office, Hinckley kept asking for the score of the college basketball championship being played that night, Myers said.

"Anything asked of him, he responded. He was able to perform various directions given to him. His demeanor, his physical appearance was completely normal," Myers said.

Three defense psychiatrists and a psychologist testified that when Hinckley shot Reagan, he was so driven by his fantasies he was unable to stop his violent crime.

Inner forces, they said, led him to believe he would enter a magical union with actress Jodie Foster after he fired his .22-caliber revolver. Reagan was hit, along with White House Press Secretary James Brady, Secret Service Agent Timothy McCarthy and Washington policeman Thomas Delahanty.

Agency Sold To New Company

CINCINNATI (AP) — United Press International, born 75 years ago but losing money for more than a decade, has been sold to a new company formed by investors with interests in newspapers, television sta-

tions and cable TV, E.W. Scripps Co. announced.

The news service had been up for sale for some time. The new owner, Media News Corp., has no plans to change the name, said Scripps President Edward W. Estlow in an-

nouncing the sale Wednesday.

Estlow said all of UPI's stock was sold to Media News — the 95 percent owned by Scripps and the 5 percent owned by the Hearst Corp.

"I am pleased a group of

experienced media people is acquiring UPI," Estlow said.

Media News did not plan staff changes and Roderick W. Beaton has agreed to remain as president of UPI, Estlow said.

Bill Adler, a UPI

spokesman in New York, said UPI employees "seemed to react well" to news of the sale, adding the new owners were "charging hard and have big plans for us. You couldn't ask for anything more."

Adler declined to reveal financial terms but said, "They (the new owners) are confident they have the capital to run UPI."

"There's a lot of money here. There has to be," Adler said. "It would be a pointless effort to try it without the money."

Appearing with Estlow as the announcement was made at Scripps headquarters here was Douglas F. Ruhe, managing director of Media News and president of Focus Communications of Nashville, Tenn. Focus has been involved in developing new broadcast technologies including low-power television and direct broadcast satellites. It also operates a subscription television station in Chicago.

Ruhe said Media News would accelerate UPI's changeover to satellite delivery of its news report and improve UPI services.

"We believe that UPI is a basically sound company with an excellent staff and with a high quality news product," Ruhe said in a statement.

Keith Fuller, president and general manager of the AP, said in a statement issued in New York, "We at The Associated Press are pleased to learn that a new company has acquired our chief competitor in the United States, United Press International."

Under the Scripps ownership, UPI has had its place in the industry, and we are gratified with the prospect of continued competition between the two services."

In addition to the 38-year-old Ruhe, principals of Media News Corp. are:

—Len R. Small, 39, editor and publisher of the Daily Dispatch of Moline, Ill.

—William E. Geissler, 36, senior vice president, planning, of Focus.

—Cordell J. Overgaard, 48, partner in Hopkins and Suter, law firm in Chicago. He is also president of Community Cablevision Inc., a cable operator in southern Wisconsin and northern Illinois.

Democratic primary. Party officials had said Hebert would withdraw if a stronger candidate could be found.

Hebert could not be reached for comment Wednesday.

"It has been indicated to me that I will be offered the opportunity to run for agriculture commissioner," Thornberry said from his home in College Station.

"I had been considering a race for commissioner of agriculture for several years and I felt that I would one day run," he said. "I hesitated to run against my friend,

Hightower, a journalist, had run a consumer-oriented campaign and accused Brown of being insensitive to the public's needs.

"Even though the campaign is for the Texas agriculture department, it is of critical importance to consumers that its leader be sensitive to their needs," Thornberry said. "You need so-

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meone who can appeal to them."

The Republican committee is scheduled to vote on the recommendation June 16, he said. About 20 people were considered for the nomination, he said.

Thornberry has three degrees from A&M, including a Ph.D. in poultry science in 1968.

Nonetheless, Rep Delbert

Latta of Ohio, the ranking GOP member of the budget panel said, "We have no objection to using the president's budget as the vehicle."

Republican leaders have indicated that the substitute they offer to Reagan's budget would project a 1983 deficit of \$100 billion or less.

The committee was ex-

pected to meet again today after Republicans and Democrats had an opportunity to confer separately in private.

The collapse of the budget plans last week was triggered by a revolt among conservative Republicans upset by the deficits in the various plans.

Meanwhile, House Speaker

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Thomas P. O'Neill Jr., D-Mass., said Wednesday the Democratic plan would be more liberal this time.

Democratic leaders are trying to quiet the objections of liberals in their party who refused to support their leadership's position because of anger over being ignored during the writing of the Democratic budget.

said he expects retail gasoline prices to rise "a few cents" a gallon over the next several weeks.

Allred said the prices in Hereford do not usually follow a wide pendulum swing as in larger towns, such as

Amarillo.

Exxon, the third largest marketer, boosted its wholesale prices as much as 1.5 cents a gallon in parts of the South, mid-Atlantic states and Colorado.

Gulf Oil Co., the fourth largest in the U.S., raised prices between 1 cent and 1.5 cents a gallon in the East, South and parts of the Southwest.

Texaco Inc., the fifth largest, posted increases of 1 cent in some southern states and 1.5 cents in Rhode Island.

Marathon Oil Co., a smaller retailer, raised prices between 1 and 2 cents a gallon throughout the South.

Standard Oil Co. raised prices in Ohio by up to 2 cents a gallon.

Conoco Inc., jacked prices

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2.5 cents a gallon in several southern states.

The Lundberg Survey Inc., which tracks retail gas prices, said the national average retail price for all grades of gasoline was \$1.21 a gallon as of May 21. That was up more than 2.5 cents from early May and nearly 3.5 cents higher than mid-April.

Average prices in March 1981, when President Reagan lifted price controls on domestic oil, peaked at \$1.38.

The wholesale and retail price of gasoline fell rapidly earlier this year as a huge oversupply of crude oil depressed the price of all oil products. The decline also was supported by oil companies' efforts to reduce inventories, further increasing supplies.

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Hannah and Mattox Accusing Each Other Of No Experience

HARLINGEN, Texas (AP) — Attorney general candidates John Hannah and Jim Mattox took turns three days before the runoff election of accusing each other of lacking the qualifications necessary to be the state's top lawyer.

"He knows his legal qualifications aren't enough to make him attorney general of Texas," Hannah, a former U.S. attorney in Tyler, said of Mattox on Wednesday.

Hours later, the Dallas congressman flew in for a similar touch-and-go news conference in the same room at the airport.

"We are both running for what is a civil law office," Mattox said. "My opponent has no experience in that particular area. He's never tried a civil case."

The winner of the top statewide race on Saturday's runoff ballot will face Republican Bill Meier, a state senator from Euless, in November.

Both Hannah and Mattox made several stops in South Texas to maximize media coverage in the heavily Democratic and Hispanic area.

Hannah has recently become more critical of his opponent. Mattox launched

an aggressive campaign the day after he received the most votes in a four-man May 1 primary.

"I thought it especially ironic that he made an issue out of the nursing home operators being for me," Hannah said. "Two of his campaign workers were indicted and convicted for registering people to vote illegally in Dallas in 1980."

The two workers were convicted in February 1981 and sentenced to probated prison terms for illegally witnessing absentee votes of elderly nursing home residents in Dallas during the 1980 congressional race in which Mattox was elected.

Mattox said in Austin Tuesday that the Texas Nursing Home Association threatened him because he wants to establish a division to investigate nursing home fraud. The association has endorsed Hannah.

"I think the people of Texas need to become acquainted with Mr. Mattox," Hannah said.

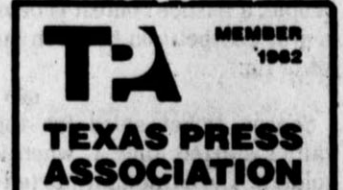

Parents CAN take steps to prevent abductions. Here they are:

1) Make certain your child knows his full name, your name, address and telephone number.

2) Have pictures taken yearly. For pre-schoolers, four times a year. Photograph birthmarks.

3) Keep records of footprints, fingerprints, dental information.

4) Get your child a passport.

5) If you are separated, obtain legal custody.

6) Inform your child's principal if you are the only one to pick him or her up from school.

Please inform your readers, especially the children, that a non-profit organization named Child-Find, Inc., will help children and parents locate each other. Children have a special free number to call. A child can dial 1-800-431-5005.

Parents searching for their children can contact Child-Find by dialing 1-914-255-1848. (The 800 number must be kept clear for children only.)

We are asking parents and teachers to give some thought to the 150,000 missing children and encourage them to help educate children in a non-frightening, matter-of-fact way about their own safety and abductions.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: A certain member of our family is driving me crazy. She is an

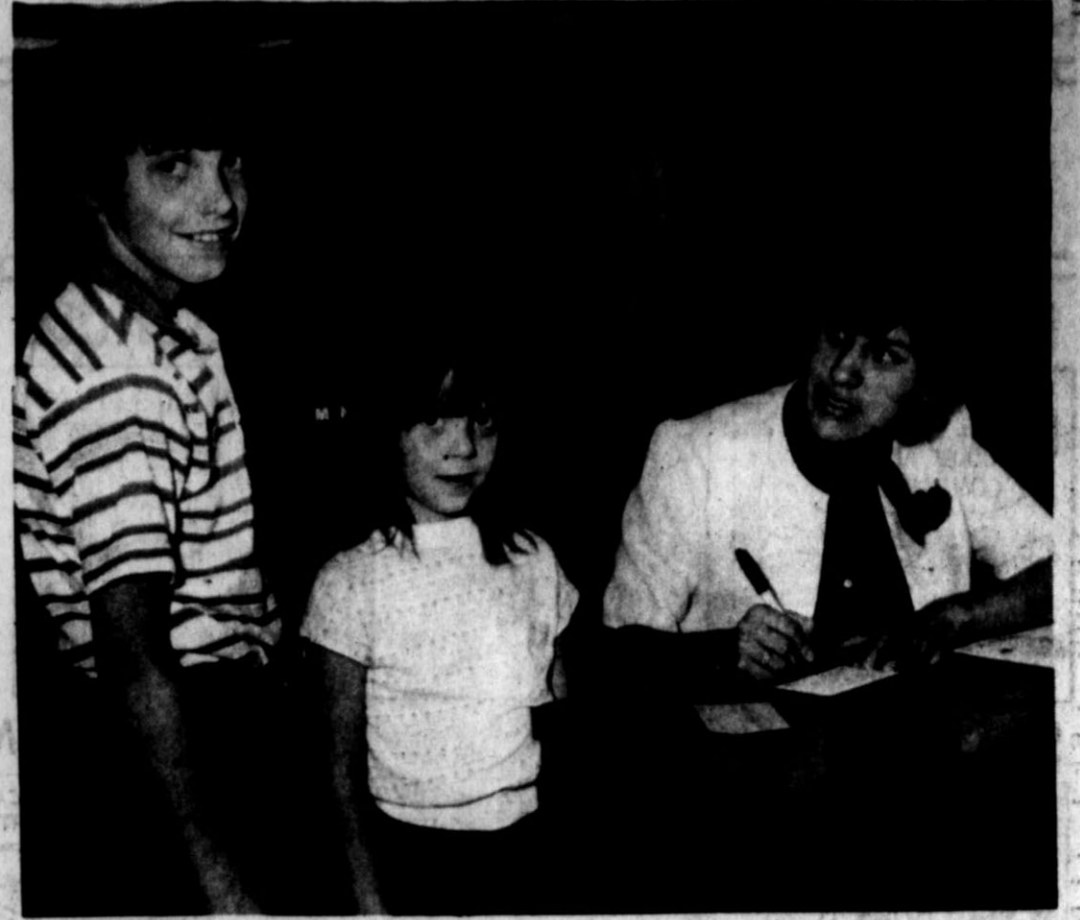
immature, selfish, spoiled woman who loves to talk on the phone by the hour, describing her litany of "illnesses."

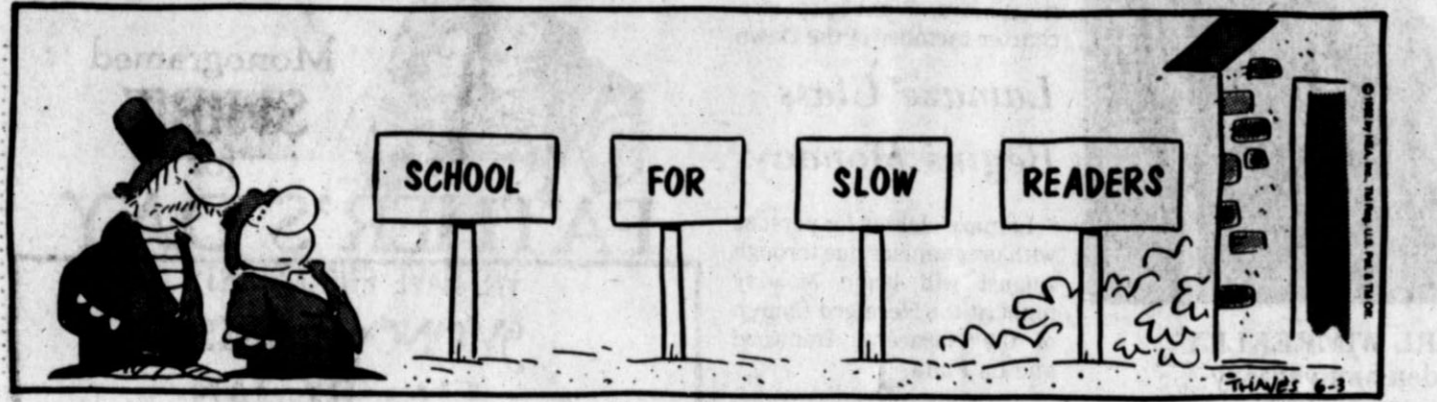

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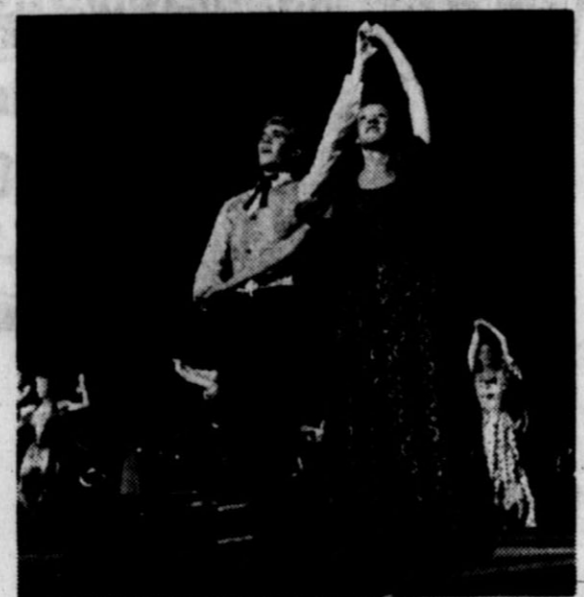

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Niekro, Eichelberger Flirt with No-hitters

San Diego's Juan

Eichelberger flirted with no-hitters, but Lady Luck, only gave them the evil eye in return.

"You need a lot of luck to pitch a no-hitter," said Niekro, who pitched one against San Diego in 1973.

"Actually, a no-hitter is nothing but pure luck." The 43-year-old knuckleballer went seven no-

hit innings Wednesday night in his bid to become the oldest major league pitcher ever to hurl a no-hitter. He eventually surrendered four hits, starting with Bob Bailor's leadoff single in the eighth, and needed last-out help from Steve Bedrosian to nail down a 3-1 victory over the New York Mets.

Eichelberger lost his no-hit bid in the second inning through a disputed ruling by the official scorer on a ground ball by Scot Thompson of the Chicago Cubs that skipped off the glove of second baseman Tim Flannery.

"I thought it was the wrong call. I thought it was an error," said Eichelberger, who walked two and struck out three in pitching the Padres to a 3-1 triumph. "But there's nothing you can do about it. You can't let it upset you or the next batter will get you."

In other National League games, the St. Louis Cardinals blanked the San Francisco Giants 1-0, the Houston Astros downed the Montreal Expos 6-4, the Philadelphia Phillies defeated the Cincinnati Reds 4-2 and the Pittsburgh Pirates edged the Los Angeles Dodgers 8-7.

The Braves, who had lost seven of their last nine games, scored all their runs in the third inning. Claudell Washington led off with a sacrifice and an infield out and scored when left fielder Foster dropped Dale Murphy's line drive. Bob Watson followed with a two-run homer.

"It was heck of a performance for a 23-year-old," Atlanta Manager Joe Torre said of Niekro's 243rd big league triumph.

Padres 3, Cubs 1
While Eichelberger was silencing the Cubs' bats, San Diego scored all its runs on a dropped fly ball in the sixth inning. Loser Dickie Noles walked Garry Templeton and Ruppert Jones and Sixto Lezcano singled to load the bases. They were running with two out when Joe Lefebvre lofted a fly ball to left-center. Leon Durham camped under it at the base of the 368-foot marker, then dropped it as all three runners scored. The Cubs got their run in their half of the

inning on a three-base error by San Diego left fielder Gene Richards and a sacrifice fly by Bump Wills.

Cardinals 1, Giants 0
Joaquin Andujar fired a six-hitter for his third shutout of the season and Keith Hernandez's third-inning single drove in the game's only run. Andujar struck out three and walked one en route to his second consecutive shutout over the Giants. He outdueled rookie Bill Laskey, who also scattered six hits. Hernandez's RBI single was his ninth game-winning hit of the year.

Teen Jockey A Bit Nervous

NEW YORK (AP) — One would expect 16-year-old jockey Jack Kaenel to be a bit nervous about Saturday's Belmont Stakes even though he does have the mount on one of the top choices, Preakness winner Aloma's Ruler.

He could become the youngest jockey ever to win the Belmont.

"Only time I was nervous before a race was the Watermelon Derby," said Kaenel Wednesday after galloping Aloma's Ruler around the Belmont Park track.

"I was a nervous wreck. I was afraid I wasn't going to win the Triple Crown, but I did."

Kaenel explained that the Watermelon Derby is held at Rocky Ford, Colo., "on the bush circuit." He won it aboard Play With Rob and he was only 11 years old at the time.

A lot more will be at stake Saturday for the 114th Belmont Stakes, 1 1/4-mile third leg of the thoroughbred Triple Crown.

Eleven 3-year-olds were expected to be entered today. Other leading contenders were Gato Del Sol, the Kentucky Derby winner who skipped the Preakness, Linkage, who ran second to Aloma's Ruler in the Preakness, and Conquistador Cielo, winner of four straight including the Metropolitan Mile last Monday.

Cut Away, Estoril, High Ascent, Illuminate, Lejoli, Royal Roberto and Wolfie's Rascal were other likely starters.

Kaenel, known as Cowboy Jack because he usually wears a big Stetson, drew raves for his heady Preakness ride, slowing down the pace and holding off Linkage, ridden by veteran Bill Shoemaker, by a half-length.

Kaenel's bush circuit travels took him through Kansas, Oklahoma and Colorado and currently lives in Lanham, Md.

He scored his first triumphant victory at Assinobia Downs in Winnipeg, Canada on Sept. 13, 1980.

When he was only 15 years — a year under the legal age to be a jockey — Kaenel was the leading rider at Pimlico. When it was discovered he had falsified his age, he was suspended for 88 days, until

he turned 16.
When Aloma's Ruler won the Bahamas in February, Angel Cordero was the jockey. But the colt suffered a wrenched ankle and was sidelined for several months.
By the time the Withers came around on May 8, Cordero chose to ride Shimatorette.

Other top jockeys also passed-up the mount on Aloma's Ruler and Lenzi finally picked Kaenel, who rode the colt to victory in the Withers and then the Preakness.

Kaenel almost didn't get his mount on Aloma's Ruler in the Preakness because of a concussion he suffered in a car accident which wrecked his \$20,000 Cadillac.

What probably saved him was his riding helmet.
"I don't know why I wasn't wearing my cowboy hat," he said. "Just lucky."

Cooney Very Ready For Delayed Fight

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — "I just like to fight," says Gerry Cooney. "I don't like what goes along with it."

One of the things that goes along with it is the continual questioning a fighter has to undergo.

It is something Cooney says he could do without, but he has been cooperative with the media since coming here to prepare for his bid against champion Larry Holmes for the World Boxing Council heavyweight championship June 11 at Caesars Palace.

"The questions aren't important," he said at a news conference after a workout Wednesday in which he sparred two rounds each against three partners. The only thing that matters is June 11.

In the large crowd watching the training session in a hotel conference room was Frank Sinatra, who is appearing at Caesars Palace.

One of the questions usually is about Cooney's left shoulder. He tore a muscle in it while sparring Jan. 11 and his fight against Holmes, originally scheduled for March 13, had to be postponed.

The question was asked again Wednesday.

"It's 100 percent better than it was before," said trainer Victor Valle.

"It's 150 percent better," said Cooney, raising his

voice. "There's no chance of it recurring."

But Cooney also displayed a sense of humor.

On opening the news conference, the 25-year-old challenger from Huntington, N.Y. said, "As far as I'm concerned, my view on foreign policy..."

He also said that he had been measured by ABC-TV for a pre-fight show and that his listed height of 6-foot-5 is inaccurate.

"You know I'm 6-foot-7 now," said Cooney. "I hope I don't grow no more."

Valle said that Cooney is right on schedule in his training and conditioning.

"Right now he's at his peak and I got to be a little careful."

Cooney's mental condition is in top shape, too, according to co-manager Mike Jones and Dennis Rappaport, who kept interrupting Cooney during the news conference to give answers to questions directed to the fighter.

Rappaport said it's Holmes not Cooney who is feeling the pressure and that the champion has been keeping to himself and not talking to the media.

However, Holmes, who took a day off from training, is talking to the media.

The champion was to resume training today at the Caesars Palace Sports Pavilion.

Spuzich Says Chances 'About 5,000-to-1'

MALVERN, Pa. (AP) — Sandra Spuzich says she figures her chances of hitting a golf jackpot this week are about 5,000-to-1.

Spuzich, 45, won last week's LPGA tour stop at Corning, N.Y. If she triumphs in the \$250,000 tournament starting today at White Manor Country Club she'll earn an extra \$100,000.

The sponsors of the McDonald's Kids' Classic over the 6,283-yard, par-72 course are putting up the extra money for the consecutive victories.

The tournament is the second richest on the Ladies Professional Golf Association tour.

Spuzich joked about the \$100,000 "pot of gold": "I thought of asking the girls if they'd like to split it. But they wouldn't do it."

Then, in a serious vein, Spuzich said, "There hasn't been any pressure so far. I guess if I come up to the final hole close to winning I'll feel a little bit of something."

Spuzich, in her 21st year on the tour, has won only six times.

Has she suddenly found a Fountain of Youth?

"I keep in fairly decent

shape," said the 5-foot-6 golfer from Boynton Beach, Fla. "Hopefully I keep in good mental shape, too."

"Age is a myth in sports," she added. "You can play as long as you have the desire, as long as you don't put limits on yourself. Maybe I'm getting more patient. I've hit the ball well all my life. I just didn't win many tournaments."

Spuzich will have a tough time earning that \$100,000. Eighteen of the top 20 money winners are on hand for this tournament.

The 115-player field includes Sally Little and Beth Daniel, both three-time winners this year, Patty Sheehan, Nancy Lopez, JoAnne Carner, Amy Alcott, 1982 two-time winner Hollis Stacy, Jan Stephenson, Sandra Haynie and Pat Bradley.

L and C Defeat Carolina; Advance To Fourth Round

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — Jeff Mace ran a little too fast, but there was nothing wrong with his vision as Lewis and Clark defeated Coastal Carolina, 8-7, to advance to the fourth round of the NAIA World Series baseball tournament.

Lloyd, who has won the French Open four times in the past eight years, would tie Australian Margaret Smith-Court's record for the most French titles if she wins this year.

Going Off The Welfare Rolls In Dade County

SWEETWATER, Fla. (AP) — Alberto Morales hiked up his pants and waded through the rain-soaked high grass to busy Flagler Street, then patiently dangled a freshly caught red snapper toward the passing cars.

With luck, a motorist would stop to buy the fishmonger's catch for a few dollars.

For the 34-year-old Morales, a Cuban auto mechanic unable to find work in the United States, it is his only income.

The poorly dressed men hawking fish, oranges or apples along Miami-area streets — not an uncommon sight since the 1980 Cuban boatlift that brought nearly 100,000 refugees to Dade County — had new urgency Tuesday.

For some 32,000 Cubans and Haitians, it was the day their names were taken off federal welfare rolls.

Since 1980, the refugees have depended on cash payments of up to \$119 a month to pay for housing and other living expenses. However, the Reagan administration this year halved the eligibility for the special cash assistance from 36 months to 18 months.

Florida, like most states, doesn't have its own cash-assistance program, other

than Aid to Families with Dependent Children. It paid out \$10.1 million in the last two months, but stopped after a federal judge declined to order the federal government to reimburse Florida and to resume the monthly payments.

State officials said Tuesday they will continue to seek relief in the courts, but are concerned about the impact on crime in Dade County — fueled to record levels in 1980 and 1981 by Mariel refugees — for jobless refugees suddenly unable to pay for a place to live.

"It's a shame, because of the inroads we have been making in controlling the crime problem in Dade County. You have to be concerned about this large number of jobless refugees being put into the streets," said Gov. Bob Graham.

"I can't predict the impact on crime, but I can say that of all the refugees we've talked to who were receiving the payments, only three have told us they have found

jobs....when you have such a large number of jobless people suddenly with no money, there are going to be problems," said Linda Berkowitz, refugee coordinator for the state's Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services.

Another 6,000 refugees will lose their eligibility Aug. 1.

The aid cutoff may hit hard in this heavily Latin, flood-prone East Everglades town of 8,000 residents. Local officials estimate between 1,000 and 2,000 refugees here had been receiving an average of \$98 monthly in federal assistance.

"It may mean some stereotypes are taken and hubcaps are stolen so they can pick up \$30 here and \$30 there," said Ana Perea, social services director for the city. "This could lead to chaos."

Florida last month caused an uproar among welfare officials in other states by sending letters to the refugees advising them of 10 states from Massachusetts to

Hawaii where they could continue receiving welfare for up to 18 months.

But officials say few refugees show any interest in leaving the Miami area, and that the state hasn't organized any effort to move them from Florida.

"The state wouldn't put them on a bus and let them fend for themselves," says state HRS spokesman Danny Pietrodangelo in Tallahassee. "That would be morally wrong."

Officials expect that more refugees now will ask about moving to other states.

Stephene Altone, one of several thousand Haitian refugees affected, earlier sent his wife to Chicago to join a relative there who has a job. The 36-year-old man said he may soon move to Georgia, not for welfare, but

to look for a job.

He said he and his wife have lived in Miami's Little Haiti area for a year, sending part of his welfare check to 14 children they left behind.

"Here I am, a young man, I left my kids, looking for a better life for them and for myself, but things have gotten worse. I can't look back, though, because it is too late for that," said Altone, who said he has been unable to find work.

Ms. Berkowitz said the Cuban refugees are victimized by a much-publicized minority of hard-core criminal refugees who arrived during the 1980 boatlift.

Ms. Berkowitz said she thought few, if any, refugees had settled in other states. "The resettlement agencies have had a real hard time finding sponsors for these peo-

ple."

A recent survey, taken by the Miami Beach Community Services Department, indicated that most of some 8,000 jobless Mariel refugees living in cheap hotels want to

stay even though the city doesn't want them and their welfare checks have stopped coming.

"These refugees have been through hell and they don't want to go anywhere else,"

said Rolin Rodriguez, the city's community services director, who administered the survey in the South Beach area.

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
