(AP) - A Houston law enforcement official says authorities are searching for a Mexican man believed to have masterminded a scheme to defraud Mexico's government with counterfeit government checks.

Another man apprehended in Houston has been extradited to Mexico in connection with the alleged scheme that failed, Lt. Charles Cowan, director of the Harris, County organized crime unit, said Thursday.

Carlos Antonio Esparza, 40, was arrested April 25 on charges of forging a document of another nation, Cowan said in a telephone interview Thursday.

Dealer admits diaries fake

HAMBURG, West Germany (AP) - The Hamburg Prosecutors Office said Friday that Nazi artifact dealer Konrad Kujau had admitted forging the Hitler diaries sold to Stern magazine.

The office spokesman, Peter Beck, also said Stern reporter Gerd Heidemann, who acquired the bogus Hitler diaries for the magazine, was arrested Thursday night and will be charged with criminal fraud. Heidemann, 51, was fired by the magazine after West German authorities found portions of the diaries had been copied from an obscure book on Adolf Hitler. Heidemann, at news conference in his home May 10, said he was innocent of any wrongdoing.

He said he bought the diaries from Kujau, who claimed he got them from an East German identified only as Mirdorf.

Kujau, 44, was arrested May 14 after voluntarily turning himself in to authorities.

Stern said it paid \$3.75 million for the 62-volume set of phony journals. But Kujau, in a statement released by his attorney, said he received only \$938,000 from Heidemann.

Stern magazine asked the **Prosecutors** Office to indict Heidemann on fraud charges shortly after West German authorities declaed the journals fake.

Shamir warns Syrians

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) -Foreign Minister Yitzhak Shamir said today that Israel was watching Syrian military moves in eastern Lebanon with increased concern and warned the Syrians not to "make a fatal mistake."

Shamir also said Israel did not want war with Syria but that the Jewish state would "decide its moves in accordance with its interests and it will determine the rules of the

game." The foreign minister spoke to reporters at Ben Gurion Airport outside Tel Aviv before he departed for Brussels for a meeting with European foreign ministers.

"We hope that Syria won't make a fatal mistake and we are taking all the necessary precautions," Shamir said. He also said he is "worried

OBERLIN, Ohio (AP) - At age 77, former U.S. Rep. Charles Mosher is about to achieve a goal he set for himself 30 years ago.

On Monday, the former Republican state senator and congressman will earn a master's of government degree from Oberlin College. Officials believe he is the the oldest person to receive such a degree in the college's 150-year history.

Mosher also will receive an honorary Doctor of Laws degree, becoming the only person to receive both an earned and an honorary degree at the same Oberlin commencement.

In the early 1950s, Mosher earned 18 hours toward his master's degree by attending evening seminars while he was editor and publisher of the Oberlin News-Tribune and a state senator.

This academic year he earned the remaining 12 hours he needed. He audited courses in American political theory and American intellectual history. He has been writing a thesis entitled "Reinterpreting the Congress and Its Works."

Mosher served in the Ohio Senate from 1951 to 1961. Then he was elected a representative from the 13th Congressional District, where he served until he retired in 1977.

He says he returned to college "just for the fun of it."

HOUSTON (AP) - The pilot of an ultralight airplane was in stable condition in a hospital burn unit after he buzzed the crowd at a high school graduation, then crashed about a mile away, officials said.

The 20-count indictment was returned last Friday but remained sealed until Thurs-

Longoria said Williams is accused of acting as a middleman for drug dealers.

Williams is accused of giving cash from drug deals to clients - Marshall and William Calhoun, a father and son who own Custom Steel Co. Inc., and Steve Rosenblath, who operated Rosenblath Landscape Service - in exchange for checks in 1979 and 1980, according to Longoria.

The businessmen reported on tax returns the checks were "payments for contract services," Longoria said. In fact, those services were not performed, Longoria said.

Rosenblath, an unindicted co-conspirator, has cooperated with the government, the prosecutor said.

Williams kept 10 percent of the drug profits for himself, Longoria alleged.

Longoria called the alleged scheme "simple but ingenious and insidious."

Drake Williams and his twin brother, Vance, "are believed to have a Swiss bank account containing a large amount of money," Longoria said. The two operated a printing business in Houston, A-Jiffy Inc., but the indictment does not allege that it was involved in the money laundering.

The indictment charged all 13 defendants with conspiracy to violate drug laws by possessing cocaine with intent to distribute.

Nineteen other counts include one charge of conspiring to violate tax laws, 12 counts of violating tax laws and six counts of possession with the intent to distribute cocaine.

Drake Williams, charged in eight counts, could be sentenced to a maximum of 72 years in prison if convicted of all charges. The other defendants are charged with lesser numbers of offenses.

By late Thursday, Federal Drug Enforcement Administration agents had arrested nine of those charged: Vance Williams, 36, of Houston; Beverly Springer Lunday, 35, of Houston, comptroller of A-Jiffy; Tanny Gerald Miller, 32, of Waller Marshall Calhoun, 64, of Spring and the owner of Custom Steel; William Calhoun, 32, of Houston, vice president of Custom Steel; and Javier Valdez, 32, who is jailed at the **Texas Department of Correc-**



PHILADELPHIA (AP) - A sticky defense that shut off the Los Angeles Lakers for most of the fourth quarter saved the Philadelphia 76ers when Moses Malone, who had saved them many times before, was not around to do the

The 76ers beat the Lakers 103-93 Thursday night, rolling to a 2-0 advantage in the best-of-seven National Basketball Association championship series.

Philadelphia held the Lakers to 12 points in the first 11 minutes of the fourth quarter, breaking open a close game to take a 103-90 lead with 23 seconds left.

With Malone on the bench with five fouls, 7-foot-2 Lakers center Kareem Abdul-Jabbar scored 10 of those 12 points and finished with a team-high 23.

We knew they would go to Kareem Abdul-Jabbar more, because it definitely was a mismatch with me giving up five inches," said Earl Cureton, the 76ers' 6-9 reserve center who was called to fill in for Malone.

"But I've played him before, and I knew my best bet would be to try and get in front of him and deny him the ball.'

Malone led all scorers with 24 points and hauled down 12

The Lakers held a 55-51 lead at halftime after outrebounding Philadelphia 26-17.

"They were in the right place at the right time," said Cheeks

"In the second half, we stopped them from getting the offensive rebounds, and we stopped their transition game.

The 76ers also held an advantage at the foul line, where they connected on 23 of 32 shots while the Lakers made only three of five.

"We're going home now," said Lakers Coach Pat Riley. "We have to regroup. And I'll guarantee you this: They won't take our title from us the way they did tonight."

Los Angeles, which beat Philadelphia in the finals in 1980 and last year, wants to become the first NBA team to repeat as champion in 14 years. And the 76ers, who haven't won a championship since

1967, know the title is not yet theirs.

Oilers' Luck graduates into ranks

of anonymous BLUEFIELD, W.Va. (AP)

– Oliver Luck, once the most recognizable man in a football uniform on a Saturday afternoon in West Virginia, has graduated into ranks of the anonymous as a thirdstringer with the Houston Oilers of the National Football League.

But Luck, who didn't play a down during his rookie season, says he is confident that next year will be better. "Sure, I would have liked to

have played, but I know I have a lot to learn," Luck said in an interview with the Bluefield Daily Telegraph. "All I could do last year was stay ready and prepare myself each week as if I were starting a ball game. I know I'll get my chance, and I'll just have to be ready when I do."

During his four years at West Virginia University, Luck set 13 school records. But with the Oilers, who won only one game during the strike-shortened 1982 season, he could do no better than sit on the bench behind Gifford Neilsen and Archie Manning.

"Sometimes it gets tough," Luck said. "There were weeks last year when I knew I wouldn't get to play, and I'd slack off and not pay attention in meetings. I just have to keep working hard because I never know when I'll have to go in....

"In the pros, your job is to play football and only to play football, so you have a lot more free time. In college, not only did you have to play, but you had to study, so I'm enjoying the lifestyle."

Kay Dalton, the Oilers' new offensive coordinator, said he intends to test Luck in game action this year.

"To tell you the truth, I think Oliver was brought along too slowly last year," Dalton said. "He's really good in the classroom and he picks up as well as the other two quarterbacks, but you never know until you get out there on the field.

"Some people are smart, and some are football-smart, and you never know the difference until they get out there with people coming after them. Even in seven-onseven drills we'll be able to see how well Oliver handles pressure."

Luck, named an academic



all-America in 1980 and 1981, said he is preparing for the end of his playing days. "I'm thinking of going to

law school during next offseason, but for right now I'm a professional football player and I'm going to work to be the best pro football player I can be," he said.

Visions of Cornings past also dogged Patty Sheehan, one of four golfers who carded two-under-par rounds of 70.


