Fun is the best word to describe the Don Harrington Discovery Center's Summer Science program that begins June 13.

Astronomy, Astronautics, Nature Study and Computer Programming are topics available in twice-a-week classes for children. Evening computer classes are being offered to adults.

Most classes meet for an hour twice a week for three weeks. Among the classes available to 6 and 7 year olds are "Sky Hunters" and "To Fly," activities about astronomy and flight.

Eight to 9 year olds may join the "Weather Wizards," "Go Fly a Kite" or select other activities to keep them busy all week long.

Computer classes are available to 10, 11 and 12 year olds along with activities in biology, ecology and space science.

Young adults may also learn about programming the COCO, the TRS-80 Color Computer, in "Introduction to Computers" and "Introduction to Programming."

A special offering for girls and boys entering the seventh grade is "Baby Sitting." The class emphasizes the basics of temporary care for young children and includes topics of health, safety and nutrition.

The "Introduction to Computers" offered to adults will also use the COCO, a microcomputer employing the BASIC language. However, unlike the daytime classes, the adult sections meet for two hours once a week for six weeks.

76ers subdue Lakers

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — A sticky defense that shut off the Los Angeles Lakers for most of the fourth quarter saved the Philadelphia 76ers when Moses Malone, who had saved them many times before, was not around to do the job.

The 76ers beat the Lakers 103-93 Thursday night, rolling to a 2-0 advantage in the best-of-seven National Basketball Association championship series.

Philadelphia held the Lakers to 12 points in the first 11 minutes of the fourth quarter, breaking open a close game to take a 103-90 lead with 23 seconds left.

With Malone on the bench with five fouls, 7-foot-2 Lakers center Kareem Abdul-Jabbar scored 10 of those 12 points and finished with a team-high 23.

"We knew they would go to Kareem Abdul-Jabbar more, because it definitely was a mismatch with me giving up five inches," said Earl Cureton, the 76ers' 6-9 reserve center who was called to fill in for Malone.

"But I've played him before, and I knew my best bet would be to try and get in front of him and deny him the ball."

"We tried to make them beat us from the outside," added Sixers guard Maurice Cheeks. "We got some steals, and good weakside help."

Malone led all scorers with 24 points and hauled down 12

rebounds. Cheeks and Andrew Toney added 19 points apiece for Philadelphia and Julius Erving and Bobby Jones had 14 each.

Jamaal Wilkes scored 17 points for the Lakers while Michael Cooper and Earvin "Magic" Johnson added 12 apiece.

The Lakers held a 55-51 lead at halftime after outbounding Philadelphia 26-17.

"They were in the right place at the right time," said Cheeks.

"In the second half, we stopped them from getting the offensive rebounds, and we stopped their transition game."

The 76ers also held an advantage at the foul line, where they connected on 23 of 32 shots while the Lakers made only three of five.

"We're going home now," said Lakers Coach Pat Riley. "We have to regroup. And I'll guarantee you this: They won't take our title from us the way they did tonight."

Los Angeles, which beat Philadelphia in the finals in 1980 and last year, wants to become the first NBA team to repeat as champion in 14 years.

And the 76ers, who haven't won a championship since 1967, know the title is not yet theirs.

Temporary injunction issued

Albeck cannot sign pact with Nets

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — Stan Albeck cannot sign a contract with another team and the New Jersey Nets cannot negotiate with the San Antonio Spurs head coach until a state district judge reviews the matter next month.

Judge Fred Biery issued a temporary injunction Thursday against Meadowlands Basketball Associates, which owns the Nets, and Xtazee Inc., of which Albeck is president.

The judge scheduled a June 3 hearing to decide if he should make the injunction banning Albeck from signing with another team and the Nets from negotiating with Albeck a permanent order.

The San Antonio Express-News reported Thursday that Albeck was to sign a contract this week with the New Jersey team. But a Nets spokesman said Albeck has not been offered the job.

"The Spurs have reason to believe that if Meadowlands is not immediately restrained, it will continue to induce Albeck and Xtazee to breach their contract with the Spurs."

The Express said Albeck already has negotiated a salary of \$250,000 a year with the New Jersey club.

But Lewis Schaffel, Nets executive vice-president and chief operating officer, Lewis Schaffel, said Thursday that he has not held any discussions with Albeck.

"He has not been offered the job," said Schaffel. Team president Angelo Drossos said that Albeck, who has led the Spurs to three straight NBA Midwest Division titles, does not have a written contract with the Spurs.

"Stan Albeck is still the coach here," Drossos said, "and until he tells me otherwise, I'm going to take everything I hear with a dose of salt."

The San Antonio Light quoted the coach's wife, Phyllis, as saying that Albeck has coached his last Spurs game.

Mrs. Albeck said of New Jersey: "I don't know if that's a lock, but I know what is a lock — Stan won't be here next year."

Albeck earlier denied reports he was leaving San Antonio. He has had no further comment.

Schaffel said he has interviewed three other candidates, including interim Coach Bill Blair, and that he would be interested in meeting with Albeck if it is determined that the coach is not legally bound to the Spurs.

"If that's the case then obviously we're interested and we'll talk to him," Schaffel said.

Spurs General Manager Bob Bass said he has received permission from the Dallas Mavericks to talk with Dallas assistant Bobby Weiss.

San Antonio assistant coach Morris McHone also has said he would be interested in the Spurs' head coaching job if Albeck left.

Other names that have surfaced are former Spurs player and assistant coach George Karl and Portland assistant coach Jimmy Lynam.

Bass said contacting Weiss was only part of a "preliminary search."

In Memorial Tournament

Wadkins, Crenshaw share lead

DUBLIN, Ohio (AP) — Lanny Wadkins always knew he could play Muirfield Village Golf Club.

He proved it again Thursday, grabbing a share of the first-round lead in the Memorial Tournament.

However, Ben Crenshaw, matching Wadkins' 5-under-par 67, is just discovering the right way to master Jack Nicklaus' 7,116-yard layout.

"I love playing courses in good condition. It goes with my game. With good fairways and the greens holding, I can do what I want with the ball," said Wadkins, this year's leading money-winner bidding for his third 1983 title.

Wadkins has finished in the Memorial's top 10 three of the past four years. Twelve of his 21 rounds have matched or broken par on this course of swift, undulating greens.

"I have a history of putting well on faster greens. That's why I've done well here," said Wadkins, the winner of \$251,000 this year.

Crenshaw and Wadkins both posted their best performances over Muirfield Village in the cool, sunny weather. However, it was only the fifth time in 25 rounds that Crenshaw had been under par here.

"I've hit too many bad

shots," said Crenshaw, reflecting on the fact he's been no higher than 18th in seven Memorial attempts, missing the cut twice. "I wouldn't think my way around this course properly. You can't get upset with bogey or double bogey here. It's going to happen to everyone."

Thursday may have typified Crenshaw's 1983 comeback from last year's slump when he failed to win a tournament and earned only \$54,000. Already he's earned \$207,000 and won once this year.

"Jackie Burke told me he didn't have to turn the newspaper upside down to follow me anymore," Crenshaw said. "Life seems rose again. I've been up and down my whole career. I'm not as consistent as other players."

Two shots off the first-round lead, each at 69, were Andy Bean, holing two chip shots from 40 and 54 feet for birdies. Gary Koch and Canadian Jim Nelford. Among the challengers at 70 were Tom Weiskopf, Gary Hallberg, Lu Liang Huan of Taiwan and Peter Jacobsen, second to champion Ray Floyd here last year.

In a logjam at 71 were

Johnny Miller, off three weeks with a leg injury, and two-time U.S. Open champion Hale Irwin. Calvin Peete, last week's winner at Atlanta, and Floyd matched par of 72. Tom Watson and Arnold Palmer shot 73, Tom Kite 74 and Lee Trevino and Gary Player 75.

Nicklaus, the founder of this \$400,000 tournament, struggled to a 76, nine shots off the lead. But he insisted:

"By no means am I out of it. I just have my bad round behind me."

Portions of the final rounds Saturday and Sunday will be televised by CBS.

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Cowboys sign three more draft picks

DALLAS (AP) — The Dallas Cowboys of the National Football League have signed three more draft selections, including two running backs.

On Thursday, Dallas signed No. 5 pick Chuck McSwain, a 6-foot, 190-pound running back from Clemson; No. 7 Selection Chris Schultz, 6-8, 259-pound tackle from Arizona; and No. 12 pick Lorenzo Butler, a 6-foot, 206-pound running back from Maine.

The Cowboys have signed two other draft picks, including No. 1 choice defensive end Jim Jeffcoat of Arizona State.

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Oilers' Luck graduates into ranks of anonymous

BLUEFIELD, W.Va. (AP) — Oliver Luck, once the most recognizable man in a football uniform on a Saturday afternoon in West Virginia, has graduated into ranks of the anonymous as a third-stringer with the Houston Oilers of the National Football League.

But Luck, who didn't play a down during his rookie season, says he is confident that next year will be better.

"Sure, I would have liked to have played, but I know I have a lot to learn," Luck said in an interview with the Bluefield Daily Telegraph. "All I could do last year was stay ready and prepare myself each week as if I were starting a ball game. I know I'll get my chance, and I'll just have to be ready when I do."

During his four years at West Virginia University, Luck set 13 school records. But with the Oilers, who won only one game during the strike-shortened 1982 season, he could do no better than sit on the bench behind Gifford Nielsen and Archie Manning.

"Sometimes it gets tough," Luck said. "There were weeks last year when I knew I wouldn't get to play, and I'd slack off and not pay attention in meetings. I just have to keep working hard because I never know when I'll have to go in...."

"In the pros, your job is to play football and only to play football, so you have a lot more free time. In college, not only did you have to play, but you had to study, so I'm enjoying the lifestyle."

Kay Dalton, the Oilers' new offensive coordinator, said he intends to test Luck in game action this year.

"To tell you the truth, I think Oliver was brought along too slowly last year," Dalton said. "He's really good in the classroom and he picks up as well as the other two quarterbacks, but you never know until you get out there on the field."

"Some people are smart, and some are football-smart, and you never know the difference until they get out there with people coming after them. Even in seven-on-seven drills we'll be able to see how well Oliver handles pressure."

Luck, named an academic all-America in 1980 and 1981, said he is preparing for the end of his playing days.

"I'm thinking of going to law school during next off-season, but for right now I'm a professional football player and I'm going to work to be the best pro football player I can be," he said.

Hite garners Corning lead

CORNING, N. Y. (AP) — Don't try to tell Kathy Hite there's no difference in Ladies Professional Golf Association tournament sites.

Two years to the week after her only tour victory — in the 1981 Corning Classic — the 34-year-old ninth-year pro is on fire again in the \$150,000 tournament.

"There's something about this place that is magic to me," Hite said Thursday after shooting a four-under-par 68 to take a two-shot lead into today's second round.

She said she played poorly in the 1982 Corning tournament because she was unaccustomed to defending a championship. But she promised a better effort with another year of seasoning.

Visions of Cornings past also dogged Patty Sheehan, one of four golfers who carded two-under-par rounds of 70.

Sheehan, who shares the 72-hole tournament record of 280 with Sandra Spuzich, finished third to Hite in 1981 after bogeying the 17th hole and lost the lead to Spuzich in 1982 with a bogey on No. 18. Spuzich went on to win on the first playoff hole last year.

Sheehan said the recollection of the late tournament holes here contributed to a slow start which saw her bogey two of the first 11 holes before finishing with four birdies and three pars.

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McEnroe facing more fines

PARIS (AP) — With his temper tantrums rivaling his tennis artistry, John McEnroe is facing additional fines at the French Open tennis tournament and the continued wrath of Ivan Lendl of Czechoslovakia.

McEnroe, seeded second in the \$1.3 million Grand Slam event, moved into the third round with a 6-3, 7-6, 6-3 victory Thursday over Alberto Tous of Spain.

During that match, the 24-year-old McEnroe unsuccessfully sought to have the umpire replaced, repeatedly argued over line calls and at one point screamed obscenities at the spectators when they whistled and booed him.

The French Open moves into its fifth day today with Americans Jimmy Connors and Chris Evert Lloyd facing third-round tests.

Connors, the 30-year-old top seed, met Hans Gildemeister of Chile in his bid to become the first American man in 28 years to win this clay-court title.

Lloyd, seeded second among the women in her quest for a fifth French crown, faced Australian Evonne Goolagong in third-round play.

In other key third-round matches today, Lendl took on Bolivian Mario Martinez and No. 6 Yannick Noah of France played American Pat Dupre.

On Tuesday, McEnroe was fined \$350 for "abusive use of balls" during his first-round match, during which he also shouted obscenities at a French linesman and kicked a photographer's camera.

Tennis officials said Thursday they would review a video cassette of McEnroe's first-round match to determine whether he also should be fined for obscenities.

"If a player uses bad language, then the officials should penalize the player," Lendl, the No. 3 seed, said Thursday after defeating Sergio Casal of Spain 6-2, 6-2 in a second-round match. "I think the officials are scared to penalize the top players. They just penalize the low-ranked players."

Earlier this month, Lendl blasted McEnroe's behavior during their five-set championship match in the WCT Finals at Dallas.

Tournament supervisor Roy Dance, who officiated at both of McEnroe's matches, said he never heard any foul language from McEnroe. "If I had heard obscenities, I certainly would have fined him," Dance said. "If I missed something, I am at fault."

Hagler says competition was tougher

PROVIDENCE, R. I. (AP) — Marvelous Marvin Hagler, who defends his world middleweight championship tonight, feels the competition was tougher when he was fighting his way toward the title.

"The fighters today aren't like the ones I fought coming up — the Bennie Briscoes and the Willie Monroes," said Hagler. "But I don't underestimate anybody."

However, of Wilford Scypion, who Hagler won't "underestimate" tonight in a 15-round defense, the champion also said: "I don't think his style will give me any trouble after one or two rounds."

Hagler apparently will fight without the sanction of the World Boxing Council and World Boxing Association, but the bout is sanctioned by the new United States Boxing Association International.

The WBA had agreed to let the WBC run the fight because Scypion is its No. 1 contender. The WBC has withheld sanction because the fighters agreed to let the USBA appoint the fight officials. The Rhode Island Commission on Horse Racing and Athletics approved of the move.

While the WBC and WBA haven't sanctioned the fight, they continue to recognize Hagler as champion.

Unsure about having kids



DEAR ANN LANDERS: My 30th birthday is breathing down my neck. The old biological clock is shouting, "Time is running out!"

I don't know whether or not to have children. My gynecologist says I should begin soon, because risk factors increase among women over 35 when they have their first. I'm terrified that I might have a baby with serious health and mental problems just because I was selfish and put my career first.

I have a wonderful, loving husband who says he'll go along with whatever I decide. This puts a tremendous burden on me. If we have kids and then resent the changes in our lifestyle, it will be my fault. If we discover, after it's too late, that our marriage is

incomplete because we don't have children, I will bear the brunt of having made the wrong decision.

I've talked with friends who have had kids and are glad. Others who had them are sorry. Still others chose NOT to have them and are perfectly content. Those who wanted children, but couldn't have them, feel cheated.

When I read in your column several years ago that 70 percent of parents wouldn't have kids if they had it to do over again, it shook me. How horrible to bring a life into this world and then regret it. Those unwanted kids must sense their attitude. It must have a terrible effect on them.

I'm afraid I won't have the patience for a screaming baby when I have to give 75

percent of my attention to a full-time job that I must hold down in order to help pay the bills.

On the advice of our minister, we took in a foster child to see if we could handle it. Well, it was tough being a working mother, but a lot of the difficulties were related to our little girl's problems of having been uprooted from an unstable home. Knowing it was a temporary situation made the experiment easier to get through than had it been a lifetime commitment.

I know you don't have a crystal ball and can't predict whether or not we'd make good parents or would be content without kids, but I'm truly torn.

Am I selfish? So many women wait five or 10 years to insure their financial security. But isn't that risky? I read about one woman having her first child at 40. She said she was going to have amniocentesis to see if Down's Syndrome or other problems might be present in the fetus. If a genetic defect was discovered she could have an abortion. Right? How many fetuses is it OK to kill before you get one that looks as if everything is all right?

Please help me make up my mind.—To Be Or Not To Be

DEAR HAMLET: I would not presume to make this decision for anyone. It is strictly a do-it-yourself project.

No matter what you decide, you're bound to have moments of regret, as well as moments of unbelievable joy. But once you decide, don't look back. Stick with it and let there never be a doubt whether it was the right thing to do.

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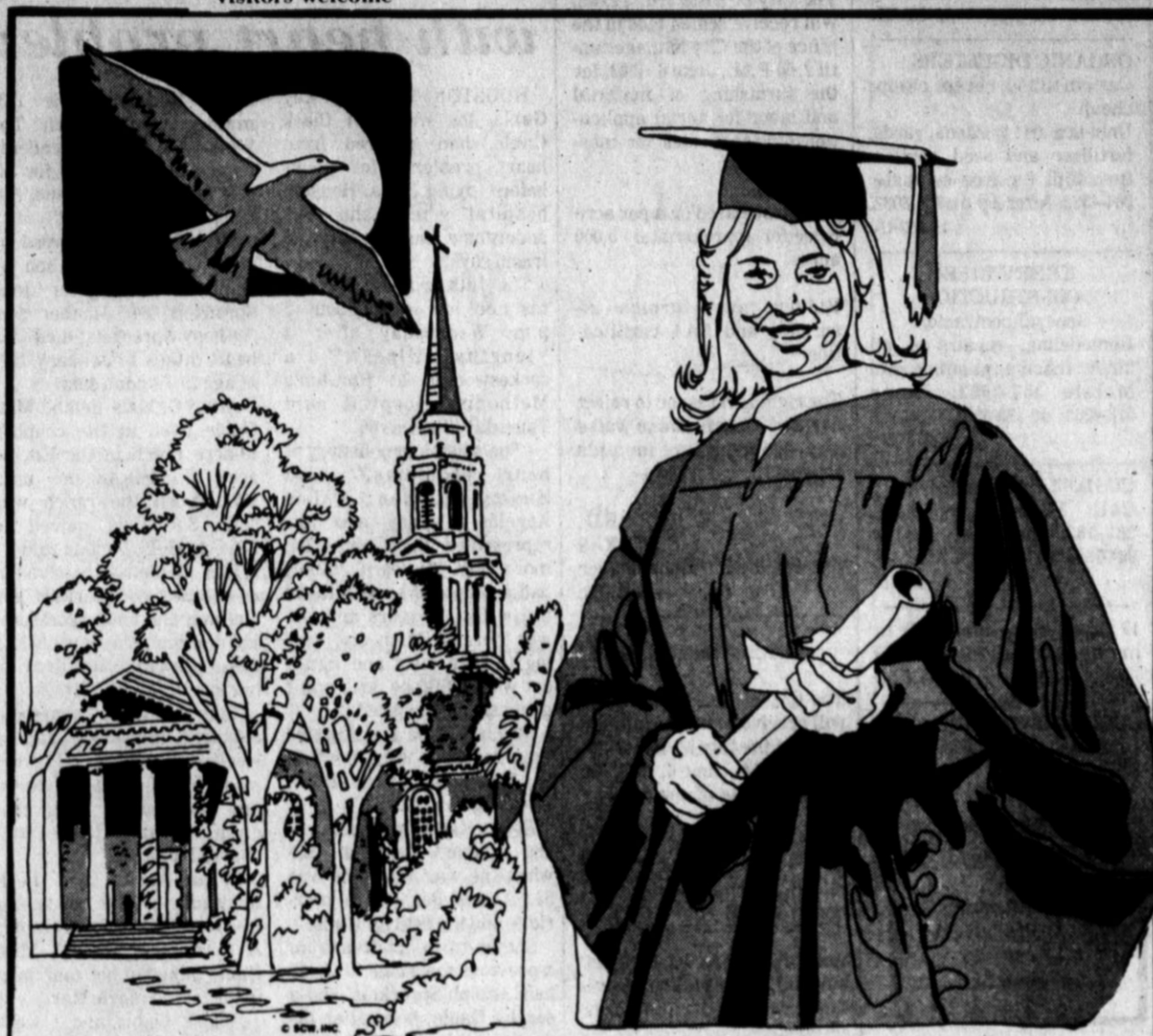
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
