"Agri-business firms nationwide have been placed in a difficult position for a number of months because of government controls, trucking strikes, low cattle prices and generally unfavorable economic con-ditions," he explained.

"The number of cattle in the nation's feed yards is declining steadily, even though con-sumer demand for beef remains relatively high. Judging from historical trends in the industry, these factors should bring about stronger support for cattle prices.



Felons Regain Right To Vote

Among the shortest of the Articles tentatively approved thus far for inclusion in the 1974model Constitution-Voter Qualifications and Electionsis perhaps the most important.

The article, as approved, would give automatic voting rights to ex-felons who have served their sentences-with the Legislature given authority to deny those automatic voting

The Constitution of 1876 provides that convicted felons lose their right to vote, though the Legislature may make exceptions. The Legislature has delegated authority by statue to the Board of Pardons and Paroles to make recommendations to the Governor to retore an ex-felon's civil rights. including the right to vote.

Though a mini-controversy erupted over restoration of voting right in the 1974-model Constitution, the controversy is not a new one.

In 1875, Delegate W.T.G. Weaver of Cooke County sought to provide ex-felons the right to vote, although he stipulated such rights be reserved for white males only.

"The right of the voter should not be disenfranchised by reason of felony as much as in the inalienable right of every free man to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness". Weaver said at the Convention 98 years

Schwartz served as Chairman of the Rights and Suffrage Committe in the 1974 Convention. Urging Delegate support of his proposal to place the restoration of rights in the new Constitution, Schwartz claimed 'a vote for this amendment is a vote for all mankind."

"A vote for this amendment is a vote for the hope of human beings, that they can do better in the future than from what they have done wrong in the past. Man was given this right by the first Constitution of the United States", Schwartz said.

Another provision in the 1974 Voter Qualifications and Elections Article would permit the Legislature to require property ownership in elections

held by political subdivisions and special districts for the issuance of bonds payable from property taxes and for authorizing the levying of property taxes.

The delegates made the use of secret ballots clear since the 1876 Constitution does not use the word secret. At issue during debate was the question whether to constitutionally prohibit any law which would require a ballot stub to be

Convention Delegates at first supported unsigned ballots, but backed away from the issue after considerable argument that "purity" of the ballot box against voter and election official abuse is best served by a signed ballot stub.

Ultimately the secret ballot without mention of its being signed or unsigned was adopted

In September of 1963, Lucille Hutchins entered Cousins Hall, a female student resident on the West Texas State University campus, as its assistant dormitory supervisor. Today Mrs. Hutchins, mother of David Hutchins of Hereford, is the director of Brown Hall, a dormitory which houses

hman women.

After almost 21 years of service, Mrs. Hutchins has lecided to retire from her position "so I can travel and see some of the United States," she said.

Since a variety of rules change everyday, there was no doubt that the rules of a college dorm would change with the times. According to Mrs. Hutchins, upon her arrival to the WT campus in 1963, freshman women had an 8 p.m. curfew each day except Wednesday, which was 9:30 p.m. and weekends at 11 p.m. All upperclassmen had a 10 p.m. daily curfew and 12 p.m. weeken

Now there is no curfew at WT for any student because of administrative changes and student support. Combination locks have been installed on the women's residence halls so they may come and go as they wish.

"I LIKE THE combination lock very much," Mrs. Hutchins said, 'because the girls feel more free and that they are not in jail, locked in and can't get out.

"Some don't stay out as much as they used to think they would like to. It's just the idea that they couldn't get out that

Supporting no curfew further, the director said "There is no discipline for coming in late. Disciplinary actions are part of the work I never liked anyway; however, it seems like everyone wants to cooperate with us and follow the rules."

When asked about the advantages and disadvantages of

supervising as many as 200 young women, Mrs. Hutchins said "I think there are a lot of advantages. You have a younger or broader point of view on things, and more of an open mind to what's going on in the world."

"It keeps me from being alone, also, because sometimes I feel blue and kind of depressed; and then some of the girls will come along and talk to me and I feel like a different

The soon to be great-grandmother said that she thinks any of the girls should and do 'feel free to come to me and discuss problems of any kind."

"I'VE SEEN A lot of frightened little girls who are very unsure of themselves when they come to Brown. Now they have developed into secure professional young ladies," Mrs.

Hutchins explained.

The mother of three children, Mrs. Hutchins plans to live in Canyon 'because I want to be near my friends and so some of the girls can come to see me.

"I've enjoyed my work and I wouldn't trade anything with anyone for my experiences with the girls.

The Hutchins children are Barbara Mantooth of Lub-bock; John Ed Hutchins, Yuma, Ariz.; and David Hutchins, Hereford. There are nine grandchildren.

Mrs. Hutchins will be replaced by Mrs. L. Knowles, former assistant at McCaslin Hall, June 1.

Mrs. Hutchins' hobbies include needlepoint, knitting, experimenting with new recipes and growing house plants.

OUR GARDENS are a good way

of expressing ourselves.
Our gardens also show our personalities. Let us be kind to our plants by giving them good treatment. We select new avenues to develop our personalities so let us select new

plants for our gardens.

A new one I would like to suggest is crocosmias better known as montretia. It is a plant that is grown from bulbs, which should be planted 4 to 6 inches

Its growth pattern is similar to the gladioli. The foliage is very much like that of the day lily, having wiry stems which make it a good keeper. Florets are more erect than the gladioli and good

material for arranging.
. For fragrance grow lily of the valley (Europe). These are recommended for growth on the north side of the house, and are grown from rizons. They do well in our soil. They are good plants to grow in pots. Fragrance is vey

Lily of the valley is the official flower for May. It makes a charming compliment for a birthday package. It is a plant which has been grown for many years. The foliage is beautiful, both in texture and color. The color reminds one of the birthstones for May, the emerald.

PLANNING and planting are very important to the gardener. Here are some figures which I hope will be helpful to you as you plan and plant.

Fifty plants set out 6 inches

apart cover approximately 12 sq. ft.; at 10 inches apart they will cover 35 sq. ft.; 12 inches apart, 50 sq. ft.; 18 inches apart, 110 sq. ft.

This table should be helpful in planting both in the flower and the vegetable garden. Many plant too close, therefore do not get the benefit of the soil and plant. For example plants which vine require much more space than those which bush. Also ground covers require more space than those which grow erect, such as the gladioli.

Gladioli corms have the following scale: 100 equal up to 2½ inches acros miniatures), 200 equal 21/2 to 31/2 across (small glads), 300 equal 31/2 to 41/2 across (medium glads), 400 equal 41/2 to 51/2 across (large glads) and 500 equal over 5½ across (giant

Converting fertilizer Amounts: For each ton of organic material such as compost, manure, etc., figure 50 pounds for 1,000 square feet or 5 pounds for 100 square feet.

For individual plants 1 lb. of fertilizer is recommended for 100 square feet. This would mean using 1 ounce per plant when spaced about 30 inches apart in rows the same distance apart, or when plants are 24 by 18 inches apart.

A packed bushel of manure weighs approximately 30 pounds. Dry straw or leaves, tightly packed, come to 15 pounds in a bushel. (This information is quoted from Organic Gardening Magazine and refers to organic materials only) I recommend this magazine for any who are interested in gardening. Also it is a good practice to hold membership in one of the horticultural clubs. This year I have joined the Mass. Horticulture Club.

Another practice which gardeners should develop is that of having a compost heap. Plan now to start yours. In the meantime, instead of putting your peels, foliage discards, etc. through the disposal, chop them into small pieces and bury at the base of shrubs, trees or other

Also in dressing chickens or other fowls, bury the waste at the base of your favorite tree or shrub. Waste from fish, after cleaning them is an excellent material to use as a fertilizer. Try this practice, and you will have good results. Tuberose begonias thrive on fish

POTTED PLANTS. The time has come to take our potted plants outside. Do not take them directly outside without first keeping them in the garage, an open shed or a slatted protection. Leave them in this location for 10 days to two

If an Easter lily was received cut the bloom off, prepare soil for planting, lift bulb and place

multiply and in a few years make a nice showing.

If you received an azalea, when it has completed its bloom prune carefully and plant in a protected place or leave in the pot to take in for winter. They exquire a source will having require a sour soil having a large percentage of peat moss, and feedings of nitrogen to

promote foliage growth.

The money bag or pocketbook plant (Calceolaria) needs bright light, humidity of 40 to 50 per cent and temperature at night approximately 40 to 50 degrees. Foliage will wilt if soil becomes ge will wilt if soil becomes dry, so water is important for correct maintenance.

It is a difficult plant to keep,

so do not become discouraged if it does not respond as you wish it to. Ceneria is another plant which is beautiful but requires humidity and regular watering. Plants which you leave in the house should be reported if needed, also groomed and kept clean so that the foliage pores are open for breathing. If dusty or dirty they should be cleaned well with soft cotton balls dipped in tepid water or a total strength of the soft cotton balls. well with soft cotton balls dipped in tepid water or a mixture of sweet milk and warm water. It is important that both sides of the foliage is cleaned.

A well kept plant which has good growth, is well groomed, all dried or bruised leaves, broken stems etc. should be

removed.

poinsettias.

Radio Station Voiced By College Students

"Who knows what evil lurks in the hearts of men? The SHADOW knows!" Those of us who remember "The Shadow" radio serial of the forties close our eyes for the famous, chilling opening lines.

We enter the time-machine of our imaginations and are transported back to the years when families huddled nightly around the tombstone shaped radios of yesteryear.

Abruptly, the spell is broken by a youthful female voice. "You are listening to WUTS, broadcasting voice of the University of the South in Sewanee, Tennessee."

And as if that were not enough, the program to follow features the hard rock of the "Led Zepplin." No doubt about it, we are in the seventies.

OWNED BY THE university and run entirely by student volunteers, WUTS-Radio observed its second birthday in April. The non-commercial 10-watt F.M. station has a broadcast range of nearly 12 miles and operates 18 hours a day, from 7:30 a.m. until two in the morning.

In addition to much recorded music, both popular and classical, the station handles wire-fed and local news in addition to educational features from outside, such as William Buckley's "Firing Line."

More than 40 students are involved in the station. Broadcasters must have at least the provisional license which is issued by the Federal Communications Commission, good for one year only.

After that they are required to have a third-class license, necessitating a trip to Atlanta where they must pass a written test covering knowledge of radio equip operation and federal broadcast regulations. Nearly half the WUTS broadcasters have gotten their third-class licenses.

Most of the present equipment was donated by Station WNOK in Columbia, S..C., through its general manager; H. Moody McElveen, Jr., father of a former student. Ongoing costs are met primarily through funding by the student activities fee, administration by a committee of college and seminary student activities fee, administered by a committee of college and seminary students.

"We've come a long way in just two years," says WUTS general manager D. Woodbery, a senior from Tallahassee, Florida, "In the brief time we've been on the air we have tripled the number of hours we broadcast daily and nearly quadruple our staff."

WHAT BEGINS AS an interesting and enjoyable extracurricular activity often leads these students to consider careers in the field of radio.

Both Woodbery and the station's assistant manager, Pam Miller of Hereford, see radio work on the horizon after graduation. The station's two previous managers have also gone on into radio jobs.

"I began with WUTS as an administravitye assistant — a secretary, really," Pam says. "It was a work assignment as part of my scholarship help from the university.

'The station just happened to need a secretary, so the student aid office sent me over. Now I'm absolutely 'hooked,' she confesses, "and I'm looking for a radio job after I graduate in June."

The station itself is tiny. WUTS broadcasts from a suite of three small dormitory rooms on the top floor of St. Luke's School of Theology.

A large poster of Sen. Sam Ervin dominates the walls of the front office, surrounded by psychedelic drawings and old ers of Rolling Stone magazine. At the small desk a student

secretary is taking telephone requests.

The lighted "On the Air" sign switches off and the inner. door swings open, revealing a closet-sized room lined with perforated soundproof tiles and jam-packed with impressive

The pretty blonde co-ed sitting at the microphone does not stop to look up. Her attention is fixed on the control board in front of her where a needle indicator sways across the gauge in time with the music coming over the air.

Behind her sits a second student, equally oblivious to the presence of intruders, who is getting a lesson in radio

There is no time for idle chatter between the two. The student announcer swivels in her chair to put another record on the turntable, then turns back to the controls, turning switches and pressing buttons with the expertise of a telephone switchboard operator.

MUSIC CURRENTLY constitutes most of the station's programming. A mixture of rock, folk, jazz, country and "top 40" is broadcast in addition to a daily two-hour program of classical music and a weekly opera.

On Tuesday night the only non-student announcer - Bud Sutherland, a Sewanee policeman - takes over as anchor man to bradeast two hours of country-bluegrass. "Issures on the Mountain," produced weekly by the news

staff, features interviews with guest lectures, university administrators and student leaders.

Outside educational features include programs from National Public Radio and Radio Canada.

Another popular feature is "Sexual Re-education," a series designed to answer questions and clarify misunderstandings regarding human sexuality. It is moderated by a physician associated with the Human Sexuality Institute in

Radio classics are broadcast two nights a week. Besides 'The Shadow," Sewance listeners have an opportunity to follow the Lux Radio Theater's Production of "The African Queen," the original Lone Ranger serial and a 1941 series starring Humphrey Bogart.

Local residents are getting into the act too. Writer Cynthia Keyworth, wife of one of the college's political science instructors, tried her hand at writing a serialized

Her product, "The Secret Life of Margaret Painter," used student and faculty actors to tell the story of the heroine detective's investigation of a mysterious disappearance in the "Hidden Creek" commune.

Sewanee junior Janet Leach, who played the part of the heroine, has found it difficult to get out of the habit of radio

"I find myself pointing out the obvious to people around me as if they were listening to the radio," she laughs. "I say things to my roommate like, 'Look! It's sunny outside,' when of course she can see that for herself." THE WUTS STAFF also found the play to be a valuable

Compared with people in other areas of the country, how much are Deaf Smith County residents paying per year for

health care? How large are their personal out-of-pocket expenditures for medical, dental, hospital and other health services, over and above the portion of their bills covered by insurance?

Because the cost of medical care is a matter of major concern, a special study was conducted by the National Center for Health Statistics to determine how big a burden it represents for families in various sections of the nation.

THE ONLY OTHER full scale study of this kind that it has made was in 1962. Since that time, it finds, an increasing proportion of these expenses are being paid through in-surance benefits, through medicare and through other government programs.

Despite this, however, because medical costs have zoomed in recent years, the consumer is left with bigger bills to pay than ever before. In Deaf Smith County's

regional area, the figures show, some 13.4 per cent of the population incurred no medical expenses at all in the year. Of the others, 38.0 per cent had no more than \$100 to pay.

The out of pocket costs for the

area as a whole came to \$182 per capita. Included in this amount were insurance premiums paid.

ELSEWHERE IN the United States, the expenditures were a little higher, \$183 per capita. It broke down to \$47 for doctors, \$29 for dentists, \$27 for prescription medicines, \$21 for spital care, \$10 for optical expenses and the rest for miscellaneous health services.





Shells To Make Vases

By SANDY INMAN

DON'T crack that egg shell in the morning when you re preparing scrambled eggs. Insted take a little extra time the night before and blow the egg yolk out of the shell and make a

Mrs. Stan Solomon loves making craft articles and says that making attractive, inexpensive vases from egg shells is simple.

First, punch a hole the size of a pin head in one end of the shell and cut a small hole with cuticle scissors at the other end. Blow gently until the contents come out easily.

NEXT pour wax in the bottom of each shell to make the structure stronger and heavier; use colored marks-a-lot to paint wanted designs on the shell; paint the shell with clear

fingernail polish to produce a marble effect.

The last steps include glueing large beads at the base of the shell to make legs and then trimming the top edge of the shell with braid.
