Demo Primary Draws 2,965 Voters Here

****** County Parley Saturday ******

A total of 2.965 voters turned out for the Deaf Smith County Democratic primary Saturday, endorsing the nomination of seven county and district candidates who were unopposed and sending all three contested county races into a runoff election.

THE DEMO executive committee met Tuesday morning to approve a canvass of the votes and okay election expenses. Several precinct convention reports were also on hand along with the names of delegates elected to the county convention-scheduled at 2 p.m. Saturday in the Community Center.

The closely-contested county judge's race saw challenger Sam Morgan draw 46.6 per cent of the votes and go into a runoff against incumbent H.C. (Hank) Williams, who garnered 42.3 per cent of the ballots in the three-man race. J. Mike Ranspot rounded out the race with just 11.1 per cent of the votes. Vote totals were: Morgan 1,361; Williams 1,233; Ranspot 324.

AUSTIN ROSE Jr. and Clinton Jackson emerged as runoff opponents in the Precinct 2 commissioner's race, while James Voyles and M.W. (Webb) Blankenship will be in the runoff in Precinct 4.

Rose drew 41.3 per cent of the votes in the five-man race in Precinct 2, and Jackson made the runoff with 19.2 per cent. Grant Hanna polled 16.6 per cent, Joe Zinser 12.0, and Bill Griffin 10.9. Vote totals were: Rose 273, Jackson 127, Hanna 110, Zinser 79, and Griffin 72.

Voyles had 44.7 per cent of the ballots cast in Precinct 4, and Blankenship followed with 33.2. Luther Lesly rounded out the three-man race with 22.1 per cent of the votes. Totals were Voyles 283, Blankenship 210. and Lesly 140.

ELECTED by the Demos without opposition were Archie McDonald, district 69 judge (2.400 votes); Criminal D.A. Andy Shuval (2.191); Dist. Clerk Lola Faye Veazey (2,461); Co. Surveyor A.J. Schroeter (2.456); and JP Glen Nelson (2.457).

WATER SAFETY classes for children and adults will be conducted at the municipal pool under the supervision of the Hereford Red Cross Chapter beginning June 3, Mrs. Richard Zinser, chairman, has announced.

The classes are free to the public.

PRECEDING classes the County Red Cross chapter will offer two training classes for instructors, as a number of new instructors will be needed for a larger number of classes this summer. Several hundred pupils, mostly children, learn to swim in these classes each year.

The first senior life saving course will begin May 13 and continue through May 18. Classes will be held from 4 to 7 p.m. each day of that week at the city pool.

A native of West Texas, he is a graduate of Odessa High School and Angelo State University in San Angelo.


He is married to the former Loretta J. King, also of Odessa. They have no children.

County Follows State Balloting

Deaf Smith Democrats followed along with statewide trends on the nomination of state candidates Saturday, including an overwhelming endorsement of Gov. Dolph Briscoe.

The local count showed Briscoe drawing 2,147 votes to only 467 for "Sissy" Farenthold, 82 for Bill Posey, and 53 for Steve Alexander. State Treasurer Jesse James also had almost a 2-1 margin over Don Yarbrough-1,827 to 926.

BOB BULLOCK drew 1,939 for the state comptroller's post, while Hugh Edburg had 547. Ag Commissioner John White won reelection as the Demo candidate, drawing 1,919 votes here to 732 for Herbert (Peanut) Schroeder.

State Rep. Bill Clayton was an easy winner over the area and he tabbed 2.013 votes here to only 658 for challenger Harvey Floyd of Vega.

A BIG SURPRISE, locally, was the closeness of the referendum, on pari-mutuel wagering on horse races defeated in the county by a margin of only 4 votes. The count was 1,384 for the proposition, and 1.388 against. The proposal was defeated statewide. Voting boxes 1,2,4 and 6 went for the proposal here. The boxes are at the D.A.'s office, commissioner courtroom, Simms and Ford. Bippus split with a 6-6 vote at that box

With only one candidate on the local level, county Republicans had a small turnout of about 30 voters, Jim Granbury of Lubbock was the statewide winner for the gubernatorial nomination, but local voters favored Odell McBrayer by 19-10. LeRoy Williamson, GOP candidate for commissioner, precinct 2, drew 28 votes here,

DEAF SMITH also had a turnout of American Party voters, who were registering in an attempt to gain a position on the November general election ballot. Wes Owen, chairman, reported that 37 persons participated in precinct conventions.

Some Experts In Doubt About Possibility of Drought

(Reprinted from The Cross Section)

While many forecasters of gloom are predicting deepening drought on the High Plains of West Texas, by the High Plains of West Texas, by drawing attention to the possible exis-tence of a 20-year drought cycle, ex-perts who actually live and work on the High Plains seem less pessimistic about the blowing dust and high winds. Oliver Newton, Advisory Agricul-tural Meteorologist with the National Weather Service for Agriculture, says you first must define the word

you first must define the word "drought." "We are in a drought condition, rather than a true drought," explained Newton. "And I certainly don't think there are enough years on record to actually determine the exis-tence of a drought cycle."

Noting that a drought is only effec-tive as it affects living things, Newton pointed out the lack of a substantial amount of planted crops in the field because of the time of year and the coolness of the soil.

Effect of Drought Condition "The only effect of the 'drought condition'," says the weather special-ist, "is that the soil is made to blow and this condition is physically uncom-fortable to the city dweller and farmer alike."

According to Newton, this year "the farmer connot afford to depend on rainfall." More water has been pumped for pre-plant irrigation during the last month than during any year lately.

Newton went on to explain that there is no reason to say we are in a critical stage now because "we don't need the rain now."


Other Problems To Be Considered However, there are a few problems other than the immediate need for rainfall that must be considered. The meteorologist emphasized that, in order to produce a cotton crop, the soil must receive eight to 12 inches of moisture.

"This means that, in the coming months, we must add 15 or 16 inches of rain before the crop will finish." He explains this is due to the 35- to 40-percent evaporation of the rainfall before it actually enters the soil.

"This means we will need more-than-normal rainfall in order to get a good dryland cotton crop," he explained

Newton noted two other minor problems with receiving the necessary rainfall in May—wet fields at planting time and the difficulty of coping with weeds.

Young T. Sloan, Meteorologist in Charge, Weather Forecast Office at Lubbock, when asked about the high winds and lack of rainfall characteristic of West Texas, explained that the wind speed is traditionally





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Pets Easy Prey To Rabies

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article is the second in a series concerning the presence and influence of rables in the local vicinity. This opisode dwells on the family pot which can be helpless victims of the vicious disease.).

Those that look upon the household pet as part of the family should care for the pet in that manner. If that pet is to be expected to protect the family against intruders, or just be

a companion to love, then that pet deserves proper care. Neglect endangers not only the pet, but more important the children and adults are exposed if the pet becomes ill. There are signs indicating illness in a pet, and one should

be educated enough to recognize these signs.

THE AMERICAN Veterinary Medical Association clearly coints out, "There are two types of rables, 'dumb' and furious'. Furious rables in a dog, for example, can be recognized by certain specific signs. "At first, the dog infected with the virus will act

strangely. There will be a departure from normal habits wher the animal will be unnaturally withdrawn or abnormally affectionate

"Following this stage, which lasts about two days, the dog usually wanders far afield. And it is then, that the most damage is done, for it is during this period of roving that he is 'mad' or 'rabid' dog.

"Actually, this is caused by drooling of the saliva due to difficulty in swallowing. When the roving is over, the animal may come home to die. Returning to his familiar haunts, he finds an isolated place to suffer his final paroxysms, lapse into a paralytic state, and die," says the association.

'Dumb' rabies differs in that there is no roving or 'mad' period. Paralysis, usually of the lower jaw, is the first ecognizable symptom. This soon spreads to the limbs and rital organs, resulting very shortly in death.

The signs of dumb rabies may be confused with the gns indicating an obstruction in the throat, or choke or colic. Such misjudgment can lead to needless human exposure to

UNLIKE THE city pets that must be in a fenced area or on a leash, country dogs are not as confined. These dogs are in need of the Rabies Vaccine.

"Due to the number of animals that are running loose,"



rear, the owner will be notified, but the owner will be fined before the dog is released, for violating city ordinance #970 Sect. 1-1 (The Leash Law)," Mrs. Hagar of the Animal Control Authority has announced.

"We urge people to contact animal control when they wish to get rid of unwanted pets.

"Do not take them out into the rural areas and turn them loose. Do not abandon daily feeding and needed affection in hopes that they may wander off and fine new homes.

"A hungry dog soon depends on instinct for food. If he has to, he will kill for his dinner, no matter how domesticated

he may have once been. "Dogs that form in packs are a definite danger to people and to other animals," Mrs. Hagar said.


A teenage Board of Directors for Hereford's Community Center was chosen Tuesday night by 60 teens who want a voice in the running of the Community Center.

months.



Need To Heed Law

Many boaters across the nation had better change their ways after July 1, 1974.

This is the date a new U.S. Coast Guard regulation goes into effect outlawing bilge pump discharge leaving a visible film or oily sheen on the water.

Law enforcement officials say there is some confusion among boat owners about the new regulation because most think it applies only to oil tankers and industrial vessels. Pleasure boats 26 feet and

longer will be required after July 1 to have a fixed or portable means of preventing discharge of oil bilge spots over the side.

According to law enforcement officials, the installation of drip trays under the boat's engine is one answer to the problem, and scrubbing the bilges before





The sease of the s **Small Talk** By SUE COLEMAN Women's Editor

SOMEBODY is always telling the City Commission what it should do, whether or not the idea is feasible, so a remark or two from this direction probably won't bother them any.

Headlines and photos from Amariilo after that city's two-inch rain, detailing the plight of people whose homes were flooded, reminds me of an apparent threat of that nature for Hereford. It looks to me like somebody ought to do something now before we get floods from a two-inch rain.

If you think i'm crazy, people in Amarillo would probably have thought such talk crazy a few years ago. and Hereford is growing fast. I've lived in another West Texas city that developed the same problem before anyone realized what was happening.

TROUBLE is that in dry weather nobody thinks a Plains town could possibly be in danger from a flood. Then real estate developers sell lots and build houses in a dry playa lake bed, people move in, and then it rains. That's where they get those news photos of Odessa residents being evacuated from their homes by boat.

That old lake bed, very dry, just south of the new elementary school location looks to me like possible trouble. Building is moving in that direction and it is not improbable that it might be considered a choice residential area before too long.







I am happy to repeat that Hereford's Meals-On-Wheels program has completed another. ear of service to our community with plans to continue into a new year of service to our fellow

It is a joy and a privilege to share our love in this manner and to pray that we will be more able to serve more people in the future.

From the beginning of our 2nd fiscal year, May 3, 1973 to the same date of this year, with 258 serving days, we have served 2,624 meals to some 37 people. The most we have served in one day was 17 people; and are presently. serving 11 people daily, five days a week, Monday through Friday, the noon meal.
