A minor skirmish with "Right to Life" amendment supporters, a handshaking tour of downtown and candid dinner talk greated incumbent U.S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen when he ended a day of Texas Panhandle campaigning in Hereford Thursday.

After arriving at the Hereford Municipal Airport at about 5 p.m., the 55-years-old legislator, who is battling Alan Steelman, Republican from Dallas, for his senate seat, proceeded in a three-car escorted caravan into Hereford. He commenced quickly up and down Main Street greeting shoppers and merchants concerning his re-election

EARLIER IN THE DAY he had campaigned in Amarillo, Pampa, Perryton, Dumas, Dalhart and Vega. He travled this morning to Tulia, where he met supporters. His next visit is into the deep forrest of East Texas according to

The highlight of the local whistle stop was a confrontation with Right To Life group members at Mothers Park at the intersection of Main Street and Park Ave. With about 50 persons present, Bentsen discussed the pros and cons of abortion and the need for an amendment of the U.S. Constitution to provent them.

The senator told the crowd, the largest he met except at the evening dinner at the Hereford Country Club, that he would not make efforts to enterfere with the last ruling on abortion by the U.S.

Supreme Court. Essentially, it states that teenager and wives do not need the consent of their parents and husbands to seek an abortion.

He urged strict interpretations of the law and expressed sympathy with their cause. "I understand the issue even though I don't agree with you," he told the listerners: "It's the toughest issue I've had to confront."

Several of the Right to Life members, each of whom wore small roses as symbols of thier cause, voiced strong opinions on the issue. They said only God has the right to decide life and death, not

One woman present said, "Who's going to be next...old people and retarded persons?"

WHEN QUESTIONED on his opinion of Equal Rights Amendement (ERA), he said "My wife and I don't agree sometimes, but I have her on a pedestal and I want to keep her there."

Again, he said the law had to be interperted as written. He supports it.

At a question and answer session following the Country Club reception and dinner, Bentsen touched on numerous topic ranging from the energy shortage to the depressed cattle market.

In his opening speech, the told about 55 supporters present that he favored the recent tax bill passed by the Senate and which is now in a conference committee of the house and Senate.

It dropped the estate tax exemption from \$60,000 to a value of \$120,000 for persons passing on land in an inheritance. This would progress to \$200,000 in five years.

"This is accomplished through a \$30,000 tax credit, which has a net value of \$120,000," Bentsen said. "With the average farm valuation at \$300,000 farmers need a higher exemption to keep ranches and farms in the family.'

He noted that 25 per cent of all farms are sold for tax purposes.

Also, the bill helps middle income families through extended tax cuts and aids the small businessman with \$25,000 to \$50,000 tax exemptions. "I think this will stick in the conference with the house," he added.

DURING A SHORT INTERVIEW with The Brand following the speech, Bentsen said he didn't think his presidential withdrawal affected his senate campaign much. "Those who wouldn't vote for me for president say they will vote for me for Senator."

He characterized his opponent Steelman as a fairly good legislator, but noted that he tried to change his image more toward conservatism before running against Bentsen. The senator was confident of victory in November, but claimed he would not take anything for granted and work for it.

Sunset legislation, which would require review of federal government agency existence, is favored by Bentsen. "We need to cut back government programs that don't function," he said. "I learned in business that expect what you inspect."

The bill would demand that federal agencies be reviewed by Congress every five years to reconsider the need for a particular arm of government. Along this line, he said that \$18 billion a year is spent on paper forms and red tape. He help to create a paper commission to investigate where this expense can be cut back. Presently 50 pages of regulation result from one page of legislation.

He recommended that foreign beef producers be required to meet the same inspection grade standards as are required of domestic cattle raisers. "They (foreign producers) must be put on

a equal footing with our producers."

A raw spot with local farmers is the high cost of natural gas and the senator was asked why it is sold interstate at 52 cents an MCF and \$1.45 within the state.

The senator said federal intervention through the Federal Power Commission should be lessened and that costs of exploration should be split equally among all states. "Others shouldn't be able to pay a third of what we have to pay."

He suggested extensive investigation into energy alternatives such as coal and solar energy. "We're the Saudi Arabia for coal and we should develop it."

"USDA estimates of production costs indicate that feeding losses are even higher in the Great Plains than in the Midwest," he wrote. "Some forecasters are now saying that cattle feeders will continue to lose money through 1976, unless demand improves, and a greater effort is made to sell fed beef."

He cited questions farmers have asked the federation.

"Do food retailers reflect lower prices paid for animals as quickly as they increase the prices at the meat counter when prices for live animals move up?" Grant asked.

Grant asked for a General Accounting Office or a Justice Department investigation of beef prices and asked Butz what could be done to eliminate labor rules by some meat cutters' unions which prohibit supermarkets from selling meat cuts after 6 p.m.

He said evening sales in Chicago, St. Louis, Kansas City, Houston and eight other U.S. cities might result in more meat being sold.

Manson Receives Package

VACAVILLE, Calif. (AP) - Charles Manson, convicted mass murderer of actress Sharon Tate and others, received a package of prison officials initially feared was a bomb - but turned out to be a teddy bear and a Polish travel book.

A checking device at a state hospital indicated Tuesday that the package contained wires. Then, a "bomb-sniffing" dog went into a "classic alert" position that suggested a bomb.

The five-by-eight-inch package, with a

return address in Poland, was carted to a nearby orchard.

Idi Amin Challenged

COPENHAGEN, Denmark (AP) Presidnet Idi Amin of Uganda has been challanged to a duel with pistols while hanging from parachutes. The challenge came from a Danish journalist who says Amin insluted him during a July 5 telephone call after the Israeli raid on Entebbe airport.

"Amin used four-letter words and bawled me out in a way that did not correspond to his high office. Now I have formally challenged him," newsman Jens Thomsen, 51, said Thursday.

They came out against busing children to schools on a basis of racial balance and for constitutional amendment if needed to stop the practice.

Another constitutional amendment was proposed to allow local communities to have prayer in schools.

Bentsen noted. "If another embargo occurs (from Arab countries), we will go directly to gas rationing.

He opposed the Humphrey- Hawkins Bill, which attempts to solve the unemployment by offering government created jobs.

"I think the emphasis should be placed on the private enterprise, not government," he said. "I favor a 10 per cent tax credit for private industry when it hires persons during times of high unemployment."

This, he said, would provide guaranteed jobs that would last and not allow the unemployed to collect freely off the government.

SHIRLEY GARRISON, a local agriculturalist, asked Bentsen if a balanced budget was possible by 1979 as predicted by Democratic presidential nominee Jimmy Carter.

"Yes. I think a balanced budget is feasible by 1979. If not, then by 1980," he

This would occurr through a budget system being used by the Congress for the first time this year. So far the federal deficit has been cut to about \$51 billion and this year's deficit is below expectations, a trend Bentsen sees as continuing.

"It will take a very popular president committed to it (balancing the budget) early in his term of office;" he concluded

came during a sleepless night. Food stamps help pepole who can't eat, reasoned Charles Hopkins, but what about people who go cold because they cannot pay fuel bills?

The answer was "energy stamps," and the Lorain County Community Action Agency, which Hopkins heads, now is taking applications.

Low income residents pay \$25 for stamps worth \$75. The money comes from a \$7,500 trial grant from the federal Community Services Administration. The grant will provide stamps for 650 to 200 persons.

"So one night I thought of the food stamps that help people who have trouble paying for food, so I figured we needed something like an energy stamp," he explained.

The Community Services Administration agreed it was worth a try. The agency, a unit in the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, directs the program that remains from what was foremerly the Office of Economic Opportunity.

A group of researchers of the Human Development Institute at Berkeley, Calif has decided differently. Their idea is that children who have suffered death or divorce of parents can actually benefit from these experiences.

Some famous Americans did not have what we call "normal" childhoods. Gerald Ford's parents, for example, were divorced when he was quite young. Eleanor Roosevelt's dad

was an alcoholic and Thomas Edison was beaten so severly as a child that his hearing was affected. A friend of mine who has

been through one tragedy after another says that she figures that nothing will happen to her greater than what she can handle.' This is probably true, because she has been building inner strengths that enable her to cope with the next situation.

On the other hand, I have known people who had "ideal" childhoods and as adults can't seem to understand, cope or even tolerate anything other than the ideal.

The kids that we associate with at Big Brothers-Big Sisters start out with a few libilities, but with our encouragement and support, we can turn these liabilities into assets. We can lp them to become useful and productive human beings.

DALLAS (AP)- The president of the American Optometric Association says large corporations in the ophthalmic industry are motivated by profit and not quality eye care in their support of a proposal to permit advertising of eye glasses.

Dr. Ron Fair of Brighton, Colo., told a Federal Trade Commission hearing Thursday that advertising may result in lower prices but "the lowest possible cost will produce the lowest possible visual perforproposal to permit advertisements dealing with the price and availability of prescription eye-glasses.

Fair said large corporations, in which there is "a potential for the profit motive," need advertising to attract enough patients "to sell high volume, low quality, mass produced ophthalmic materials.'

If advertising is allowed, as it is in Texas, it should inform the public about the range of quality available in eyeglasses, he

He said, however, traditionally eyeglass advertising deals

only with low quality products. Among those testifying ear-lier in behalf of the proposal was Dr. Gordon Black, a market analyst from Rochester, N.Y., who said "There is no evidence that current advertising practices...have led to a lower quality of services or products."

Black stressed that advertising is one way to overcome the public's lack of knowledge of the

In the Attica prison riot in New York, Estelle said, the prisoners took 43 hostages. "They couldn't have gotten 43 hostages at Coffield as they did at Attica," he said.

Estelle told the budget examiners he has only two major priorities in his budget request for the 1978-79 beinnium-personnel and construction.

He wants to reduce the guard-prisoner ratio to 1-10 and build a new prison unit, which will cost \$111 million if done by contractors and \$72 million if the prison is allowed to do it. And, because of expected inflation increases. Estelle said. he can save the state \$9 million to \$10 million if he gets all of the

construction budget at once.

Estelle said he will gladly compare the record of Texas prisons with those of any other state on escapes, assaults or homicides even though the guard-prisoner ratio nationally is 1-5.

Texas' prison population has jumped from 13,708 in 1969, when each prisoner had his own cell, to 20,948 today, when more and more prisoners are being doubled up, he said.

The population is expected to hit nearly 31,000 by 1981, but the system's projections always have been low, Estelle said.



Women Traveling In South America

By MARY LENZ RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) — "I would never travel in South America by myself because the men are imposs

The woman traveler, who refused to give her name, knows what she is talking about. She was raped while traveling by herself in Bolivia.

American women who live and travel alone on this continent face difficulties and dangers their male counterparts don't even think about.

Yet women do come to South America alone and find jobs, friends and a romance to life they say has been homogenized out of existence in the United States.

They are women like Jean Smith, 30, a former book editor in New York who backpacked by herself along the Inca Trail from Machu Picchu in the Peruvian Andes. Jean later talked herself into a job as a maid on a tourist boat, getting paid to travel from Tierra del Fuego to Antarctica.

Linda Louk, a woman in her early 30s, came alone to Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, after five years of travel in other countries. Within a month she found a job as assistant editor on the country's only English business magazine.

Rosie Kelburg, 29, a free-lance artist in Rio who also works for the city's English language newspaper, said she came here because life in the States is "too depersonalized, too dehumanized."

Living in a foreign country at what most middle class Americans would consider poverty level does not disturb these women. "What are you going to do with the money you make in the States?" asked Rosie. "I used to save it to travel."


