Despite this situation, however, Dollar Day last Monday was a January record-breaker for many merchants. Heavy sales were reported in most lines and 1953, from a business standpoint, was considered off to an excellent start.

The County Commissioners are scheduled to meet Monday, Jan. 12, for the first regular session in 1953. Judge Horace L. Schloss predicts a busy meeting which may possibly remain in session for a full day. The court, among other things, will set salaries for the county.

The Hereford Riders Club is scheduled to meet Thursday night in the courthouse. New officers will be installed.

Being nice to people is one of the most important factors which is being stressed this week in the police school which opened in Hereford Monday morning. Bill Kavanaugh, Administrative Assistant to the Director of the Department of Public Safety, got the school off to a flying start this week stressing public relations as one of the most important phases of the policeman's job. There have been 14 police officers from Hereford and the surrounding territory enrolled in the school so far this week. Other officers are expected to attend the school during the four-week period.

"It Was A Good Show," Says Youth -- "But It Wasn't That Good"

Frequently the theatre people call the police when boys try to slip into the show -- but this case is different.

Sunday the city police received a hurry-up call from a 15-year-old boy who wanted out of the show. It was around 2:30 in the morning and the lad, according to officers, was getting "just a little bit upset."

It all happened when Roy Dale Manning went to the show Saturday evening and happened to locate in one of those big, double seats on alternate tiers. He saw quiet a bit of the show, then dropped off to sleep. When he

awoke, everything was dark. Roy made a bee-line for the front door, and it was locked securely. He spied the telephone and called the police. They, in turn, called Francis Hardwick, manager, and after a brief delay the youth emerged -- with benefit of a police escort.

Theatre employees are also baffled over the incident, since they reported carefully checking the house before they left to be sure that no one remained. They say hardly a week passes that they do not awaken someone who has "dropped off" during the show.

Mail Campaign The Business and Professional Women's Club will have charge of the mail campaign again this year. Mrs. Bruce Rose is president of the organization and she said that it will get underway probably next week.

"Plans are all set for the month-long drive," Gib Howard, coordinator said, "and we hope to pass the \$5,000 quota before the month ends."

George McLean is City Chairman for the drive and C. C. Acker is treasurer.

Pat Sullivan will have charge of dime collections in the schools.

The radio collection will again be under the supervision of the Jaycees, John Aiken, president, and will be conducted over KP-AN as in years past. Date for this event will be announced later, Aiken said.

Church and Sunday School collections have been turned over to the Ministerial Alliance.

County Is Without Service Officer; Smith Volunteers

Deaf Smith County is without a County Service Officer, due to resignation of Ralph Smith, Jan. 1, when he assumed the duties of County Clerk.

"Since examinations and specific requirements are necessary before a service officer can be appointed, Mr. Smith is now filling the office ex-officio and without pay," County Judge Horace L. Schloss pointed out.

Mr. Smith invited any veteran with a service problem to contact him in the clerk's office.

Cotton Acreage Increase In '53

"More cotton acreage this year than in 1952" is the prediction of County Agent Hugh Clearman. Approximately 7,500 acres were planted to cotton last year -- yield of around 6,500 bales in this county, possibly 6,800 including adjoining areas, Clearman estimated.

"All who had cotton this year seem to be planting again," was the basis of Clearman's prediction, plus "many of them are planting more, and quite a few new cotton growers will join the ranks in 1953."

Supporting Clearman's prediction is the fact that a new cotton gin is already under construction south of town. Good yields and prices this year are also expected to be conducive to greater acreage in 1953.

Financial Recap In 1952 the March of Dimes drive totaled \$4,938.28 in Deaf Smith County; \$2,469.14 went to national headquarters and the same amount remained in the local chapter. Expenses this year

During 1950 the local chapter repaid loans close to \$5,000 to the national foundation. The few cases here in 1951 and 1952 has enabled the chapter to continue on a solvent basis, Paul Harvey general chairman, said.

Rev. M. M. Beavers, Early Day Preacher, Dies Sunday

Funeral services for M. M. Beavers, 81, pioneer pastor and church builder, were held at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning, Jan. 6, from the First Methodist church in Hereford with Rev. T. Edgar Neal, pastor, in charge.

"Brother Beavers", as he was known to literally hundreds of friends over the Panhandle, died around 2 o'clock Monday morning in the Deaf Smith County hospital following an illness of two weeks.

Marcus Milton Beavers was born June 26, at Camden, Ark., but moved to Texas with his parents when he was 12 years of age. Rev. Beavers always phrased it, "As soon as I saw my mistake."

As a Methodist circuit rider for many years, Rev. Beavers rode the open range, marked only by trails and a few wire fences. He organized churches in community school houses or other points where he found a need. He recalled the early days as "often a mission without a parsonage, a church, or a salary."

He married Alma A. Munn 37 years ago at Cisco in Eastland County, Texas, and the couple have spent practically all of their married life in West Texas. "I never had any dollar mark ambitions in my preaching," Rev. Beavers always said. He did,

however, achieve wide recognition in Methodist circles and before his retirement wielded considerable influence in conference activities. Rev. Beavers twice served as District Superintendent, first in the Plainview District and second in the Clarendon District. Points where Rev. Following close on the heels of the first baby was another which was born on Wednesday morning. This baby, also a girl, was born to Mr. and Mrs. B. J. Endree.



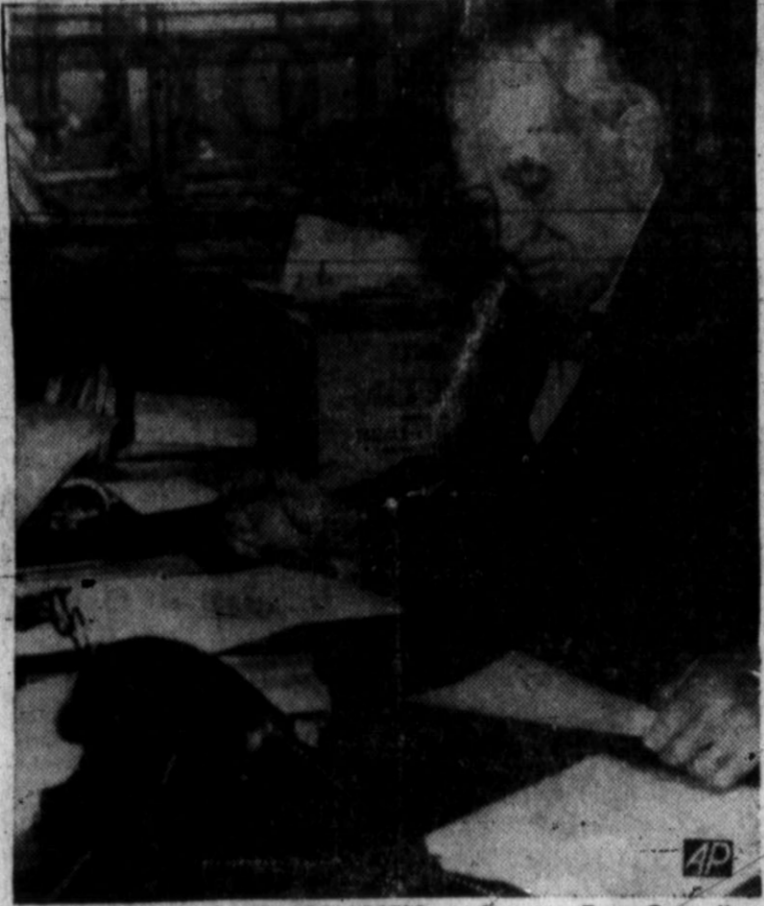

...Canadian, Hereford (Tex.), Colorado City, Sweetwater, and Lamesa.
Under Rev. Beavers leadership numerous church buildings over the Panhandle have been erected. These include the church at Canyon and the completion of the first brick building in Hereford.
He came to Hereford first in

1920 and often recalled that it was a small village "made up largely of a courthouse, a railroad and a Main Street" which, he said, was the first paved road he had ever seen. He was returned as pastor in Hereford again in the early 1930's, and held the position until he retired in 1938, after 33 years in active ministry.
Rev. Beavers' influence and friendship always spread much further than the realm of his church circle. Down through the years, from place to place, he acquired scores of friends outside his own church, due to his deep understanding of human nature and his down-to-earth outlook upon things. Furthermore, as in Hereford, he always became a community leader in any crusade which stood for improvement and welfare.
As a pioneer preacher, Rev. Beavers was a tireless worker, ever interested in national and local developments. His one hobby was camping trips, during which he liked to study nature and relax. "Going fishing" was alright with Rev. Beavers, whether the fish were biting or not. He went chiefly for the outing. During more recent years, however, his health has not permitted these annual outings into Colorado and other points.

In addition to Mrs. Beavers, 77, Rev. Beavers is survived by three sons, Lama of Hereford, Milton, of Big Delta, Alaska, and Morris of Lubbock; four daughters, Miss Zoe Beavers of Dalhart; Mrs. Hubert R. Reeman of Mesa, Ariz.; Mrs. J. W. Hendrix, Hereford, and Miss Lovie Beavers of Lubbock. Also three sisters, Mrs. M. L. Brittain, and Mrs. C. L. Jackson, both of Woodward, Okla.; Mrs. Ola Leveridge of Pauls Valley, Okla.
Pallbearers were: W. J. Stanford; S. O. Wilson, F. L. Terrell, Buck Parsons, Hugh Clearman, and Crawthorn Bryant.
Interment was made in West Park Cemetery by Gilliland Funeral Home.

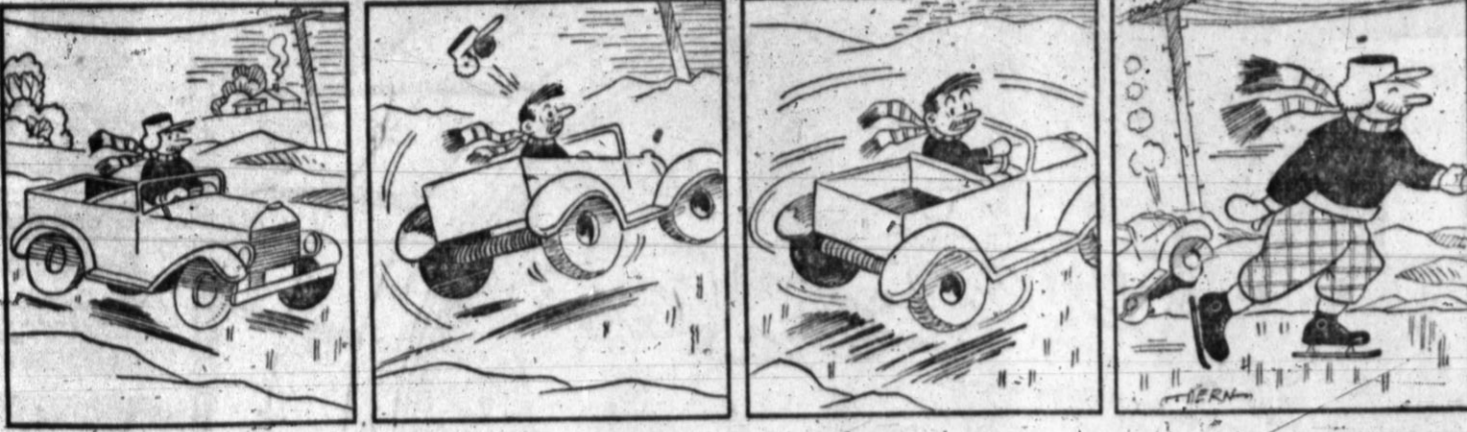

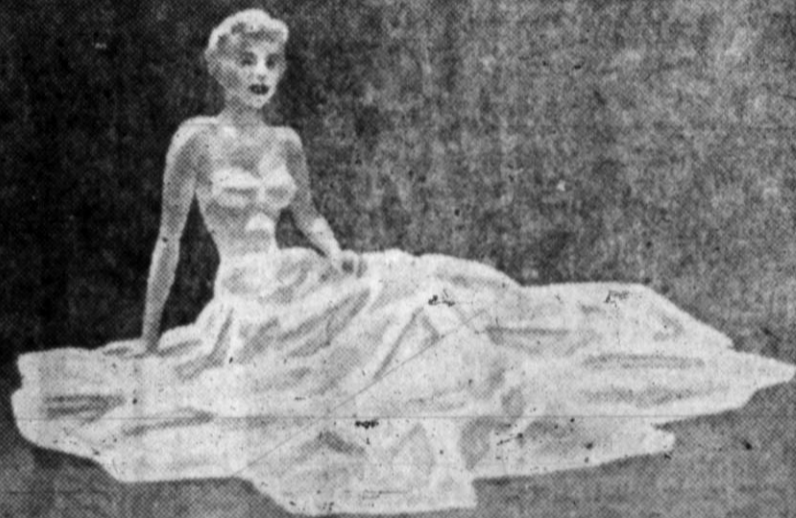

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Progress In Legislative Government Is Foreseen By Cong. Walter Rogers

THE NEW CONGRESS: The 83rd Congress will convene the day after this letter is being written. This is some five days prior to the time that the readers will have occasion to see this letter. However, I felt it important to point out one or two things that indicate the possibility of a smooth-running legislative branch of the Government for the coming two years. Both the Republican Party and the Democratic Party held their caucuses in preparation for the organization of the new Congress. The Democratic Caucus was a most congenial meeting in which no occasion for high tempers arose and no controversies were brought up that were of sufficient importance to cause heated argument or debate. It is my understanding that the Republican Caucus was governed by the same spirit of cooperation and understanding. The spirit of service for the best interest of the country prevailed, and it is my deep hope that this same spirit will continue to prevail on the Floor of Congress. The division of the House between the two parties is almost as close as it could possibly be. This close division will necessitate whole-hearted cooperation between the members. The old members with whom I have had the opportunity of serving all express their desire for a peaceful and constructive two years in the House of Representatives. The new members are all looking forward with great anticipation to the rendition of a signal service to the country. All of this added together should result in marked progress being made in the legislative branch of the Government. I do not look for obstructionism or disagreement merely for the sake of disagreement. There will be many issues both domestic and foreign that could be the subject of delaying tactics. However, I believe that the 83rd Congress will undertake to attend to the most important matters with the greatest possible dispatch. This will mean that many issues of secondary importance will be subordinated to the more important measures. This will be especially true if the Senate rules on unlimited debate remain the same. There will no doubt be a void insofar as the legislative program is concerned between January 3rd and January 20th. The mechanics of the Congress will be at work but any affirmative action on a proposed program will await the inauguration of the new President.

It is my intention to introduce several bills on the first day of the new Congress. Some of these I have heretofore introduced. I shall introduce a Tideland bill which is in effect with the Walters Bill that passed the House of Representatives last year. This bill not only returns the Tidelands to the State of Texas, but in addition makes provision for the management and operation of the lands lying outside the Tidelands strip. I shall also introduce a bill requiring all decisions of the Supreme Court to be rendered by a full nine-judge Court. You will recall that the Tideland decision of the Supreme Court which took away our tidelands was a decision by a seven-judge Court, two of the Justices being disqualified. The division was four judges holding for the Federal Government ownership and three holding for State ownership. This means that a minority of the members of the Supreme Court, which is constituted of nine members now, decided the Tidelands case against the States. Had a full Court been sitting, the four members holding for the Federal Government would not have been sufficient to have decided the case. My bill provides for a substitution of judges from the Circuit Courts of Appeals to fill the place of any disqualified member of the Supreme Court. Two of the bills provide for the correction of an injustice that now exists concerning reservists called into active duty. Another bill calls for an amendment of the Fair Labor Standards Act having to do with agricultural labor and interstate commerce. I have explained this bill in several previous newsletters. Probably the most important bill that I will introduce, and the one that is of great interest to every individual, is a bill to increase the personal income tax exemption from \$600.00 to \$1,000 and to increase the exemption for dependents from \$600.00 to \$70. The passage of this bill would bring much relief to many, many people in the small income brackets and at the same time would not discriminate against those in the higher income brackets.

I again call your attention to the fact that I have moved my office from the Old House Office Building to No. 1712 in the New Office Building. 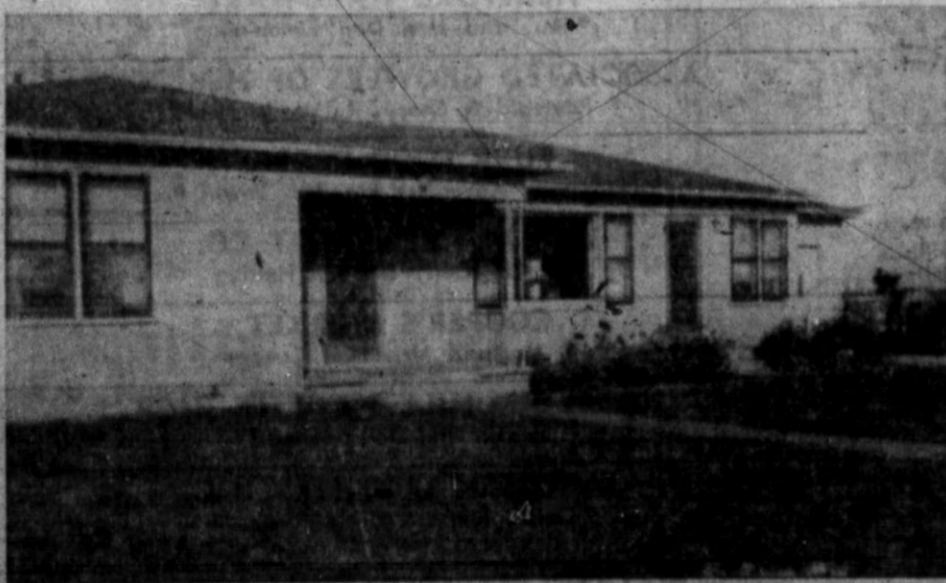
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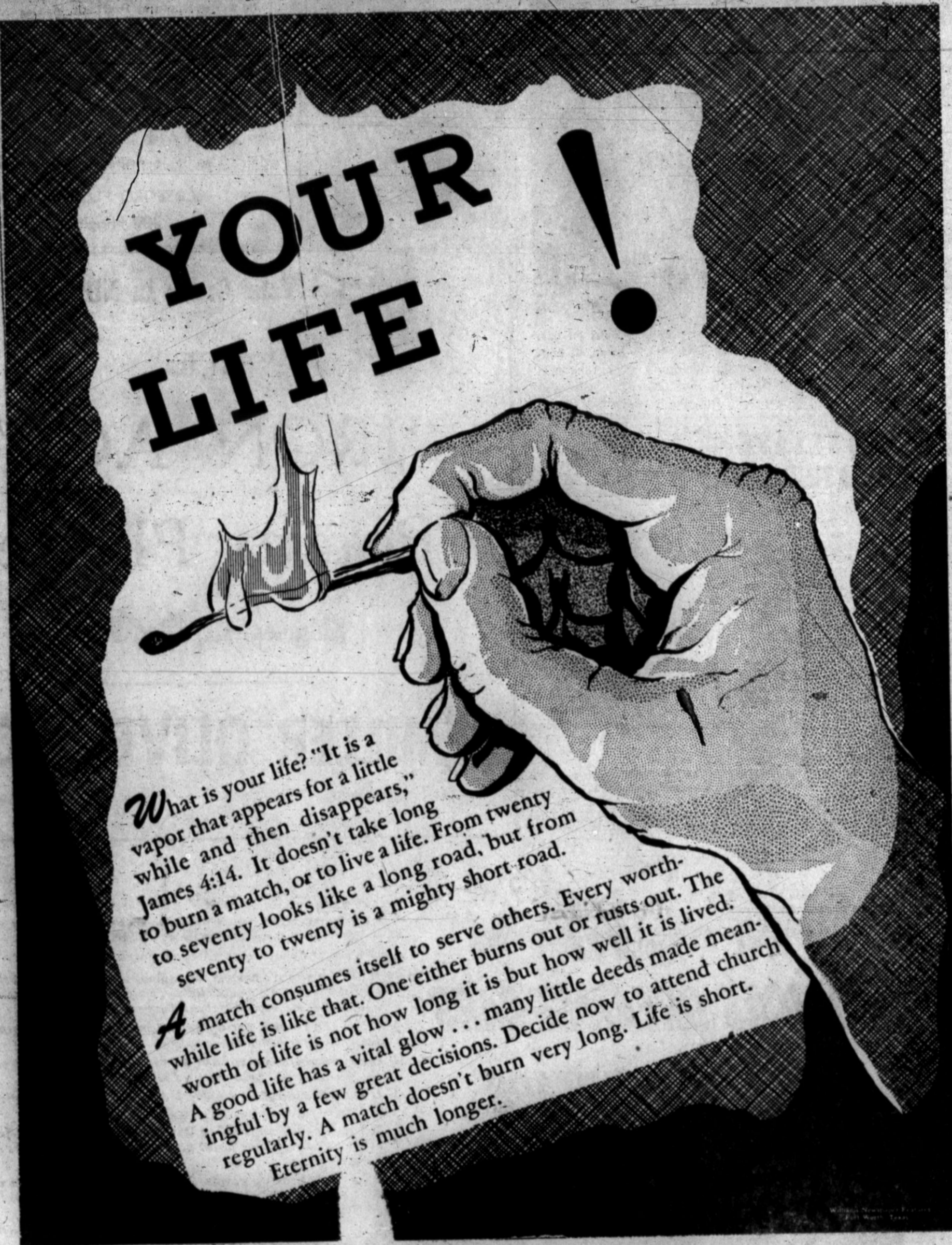

Irrigation Offers Expansion Program For Many Farmers

COLLEGE STATION - Texas agricultural producers know the value of water and what a lack of it can mean to a maturing crop or to a pasture. The present drought has greatly increased interest in irrigation—to make up this lack—even in sections of the state where little or no irrigation has been previously used.

For the agricultural producer who may be thinking about an irrigation system, R. V. Thurmond, an irrigation specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says farmers should give consideration to many factors before making a final decision. The water supply, he says, may come from streams, lakes, ponds or wells provided of course there is plenty which needed most. He points out that a supply equal to at least five gallons per minute per acre or storage capacity of from one to three acre feet per acre will be needed to irrigate most crops.

There are problems connected with the use of water regardless of its source and a big one, according to Thurmond, is its quality. A chemical analysis will show whether or not the supply

is suitable for crop production and Thurmond recommends that state chemist, for a nominal fee, can make these determinations. If water is taken from a stream, river or lake, a permit of use should be obtained from the Texas Board of Water Engineers. Percolating ground water pumped from wells may be used at the discretion of the owner.

The topography of the field to be irrigated will determine whether surface methods or a sprinkler system should be used. Soils best adapted to irrigation have sufficient depth for storage of water; texture and structure that readily permit water to enter; good surface and subsoil drainage and with sufficient fertility to produce good yields.

To be profitable, says Thurmond, irrigation must result in increased yields sufficient to more than pay the costs involved. These costs include additional equipment, land preparation, expense of operating the equipment and such a test be made. He adds the additional labor. A plentiful supply of water for irrigation, if properly used, can mean increased yields and may also make possible the successful growing in an area of higher priced crops which could not otherwise be produced without supplemental water.

Farmers interested in an irrigation system for their farm are advised by Thurmond to consult with their local county agent. He can furnish information on irrigation in the area.
