

Texas Republicans- led by state party chairman Ray Hutchison- expressed amazement and disappointment after Ronald Reagan, locked in an 11th hour battle with President Ford for the GOP nomination, named liberal Sen. Richard Schweiker of Pennsylvania as his choice

for a running mate.

Hutchison, who has not publicly endorsed either Reagan or Ford, said Monday night in Dallas that Reagan's choice could cost him the election if nominated.

"The price he is paying for the nomination could be the price of the election," Hutchison said.

Hutchison has backed former Texas Gov. John Connally for the second spot, and indicated he would go for a Ford-Connally ticket. He predicted the move could also cost

Reagan delegates in Mississippi. Reagan's 96 Texas delegates are

committed at least through the first national convention ballôt.

State Sen. Betty Andujar of Fort Worth, new GOP national committee

woman and a Reagan supporter, said, "My candidate is still John Connally. I'm very surprised. He Schweiker wouldn't have been my choice. I guess it is along the lines of what is expected when you are putting together a national ticket."

Cattle Killing Weed Comes Toward Texas

EL PASO, Tex. (AP) - A plant in Mexico that kills cattle so quickly this is has been labeled "lightning weed" is slowly creeping closer to the borders of Texas, New Mexico and Arizona, according to a survey being conducted by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Research Service.

Since February, Dr. Howard Morton has been studying the little plant know as alfombrilla.

"It's another poisonous plant, no worse than say, locoweed," said Morton, referring to another cattle killer that already haunts ranchers in the South-

"It's just that we don't need another poisonous plant in this country," Morton said. "If I was a rancher along the border, would familiarize myself with it, what it looks like and how it grows. In other words, I'd be moderately to highly interested

Alfombrilla is a Spanish word meaning "rug." The plant grows quite close to the ground, is fine-stemmed and bushy. It reproduces from numerous minute seeds - like those of grass - which readily break away and scatters in the winds.

The plant produces white, five-petaled flowers, each petal appearing two-lobed.

Alfombrilla thrives on bare, eroded or overgrazed ranges. Only 0.4 per cent of alfombrilla eaten in relation to a steer's weight will kill the

The first notice the U.S. took of alfombrilla was in 1956 when with the La Campana Research

least 40 miles from the border.

Mexican cattle shipped to the U.S. were poisoned after having been kept in an area abundant with the white-flowered plant in central Chihuahua.

By the time the 600 steers arrived by train in Juarez, El Paso's sister city across the border, more than 100 were dead and many others were trembling with muscular spasms and convulsions.

A 1960 survey showed the plant had advanced to about seven miles south of the international port of entry in Antelope Wells, N.M., in addition to being found in an area of the Mexican state of Sonora, 20 to 25 miles south of the Arizona border.

A report the following year said that alfombrilla "now infests about 750,000 acres in Chihuahua. It has killed 3,000 to 4,000 cattle there."

In addition the article placed the plant's advancement to within three miles of Antelope

To date, no findings of alfombrilla have been pinpointed in the United States. . Sightings have been reported, but no one has been able to retrace his steps to what appeared to have been the

Department scientists, working in association with the University of Arizona, have begun a research program in cooperation

City, Mexico, to study the ecology and control of the plant.

"The only solution now is the one the Mexicans are using of avoiding grazing in the pastures with abundant growth of the vegetation, especially during late summer and fall," Morton

"Normally cattle don't graze on it, except apparently in the fall. After the plant matures it becomes sticky and cattle do seem to graze it then fairly

regualrly," he added.
The Southwest New Mexico Resource, Conservation and Development Project SWNRC&D, under the U.S. Department of Agriculture, has been concerned about the harmful potential the plant could have in southern New Mexico.

The organizations's concern was stimulated by a letter received in the spring of 1973 from Mexican ranch owner Francisco Ramonel warning "the deadly poisonous plant alfombrilla...has now moved to the northern boundary of my ranch which is also the international boundary of the neighorboring states of Chihuahua and New Mexico."

"It was new to many ranchers," said Bob Ambercrombie who, as project coordinator for the SWNMRC&D, has spent hours collecting data on alfombrilla and helping cattlement near the

The best solutions to the alfombrilla problem, according to studies, are good range management resulting in proper forage and fencing off infested areas from grazing livestock.

Research has shown some success with spraying the flowering plant with a one per cent solution of silver in water, but because of the impossibility of determining how many years the seeds have been dormant in the soil, applications for two or three years are needed before any decrease in plant population can be noticed.

Until needed research and solutions are accomplished, however, American ranchers can only adopt the philosophy of their Mexican counterparts: "Learn to live with it."

Help For Counties Suggested By State

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP)- The Texas Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations says counties no longer should be helpless to protect rural residents from such things as fireworks and shoddy construc-

ded Monday that the 1977 legislature pass a bill granting county commissioners ordinance-making power on a local option basis.

A similar proposal was in the proposed state constitution that the voters rejected in 1974.

The bill would authorize local option elections in each county on whether to grant county commissioners either general ordinance-making power or the authority to adopt laws on a limited list of subjects.

Such an election could be held upon the petition of 10 per cent of the qualified voters in a whichever number was smaller. Ordinance-making power could be taken away through the

same procedure. City councils could exempt their communities from county ordinances.

The commission said rural and suburban citizens sometimes go without needed protection because county commissioners cannot legislate outside city limits.



U. S. Navy Evacuates 300 Americans From Beirut

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP)- The U.S. Navy evacuated some 300 Americans and other foreigners from Beirut without a hitch today while President Ford and top Pentagon officials stayed up most of the night in Washington to monitor the operation.

The 16,900-ton amphibious transport ship Coronado anchored off Beirut's seafront before dawn, and by 10 a.m. 3 a.m. EDT all of the evacuees were aboard. The Coronado was to land them in Athens on Thursday.

Among those leaving was U.S. Ambassador Talcott W. Seelye, whose departure was a closely guarded secret until the last moment. The embassy said he was going to Washington for consultations and would return to Beirut.

An embassy official said 160

Americans and about 390 others signed up for the evacuation, but closer to 400"less than half" of them Americansshowed up this morning. However, to persons watching the departure it looked more like 250 to 300 persons, and the White House said there were about 300.

About 1,000 other American citizens remained in Lebanon despite warnings from the White House and the embassy that it was the last evacuation the U.S. government would organize. Most of those remaining are of Lebanese birth and have dual Lebanese and American citizenship.

President Ford kept abreast of the evacuation in a White House situation room, flanked by senior advisers. He was in telephone contact with Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld and his chief

military and civilian advisers at the Pentagon.

Rumsseld sent Ford's "thanks for a good job" to the Coronado.

Heavily armed soldiers of Yasir Arafat's Palestine Liberation Organization and leftist Moselm Lebanese police stood guard as the evacuees boarded an unarmed U.S. landing craft at the former military officers' swimming club.

The PLO also guarded the previous U.S. evacuation of 110 Americans and 157 others on June 20. This time, as then, one Palestinian standing on the seawall above the loading dock caused a brief stir by firing several shots into the air. There was no explanation.

A C130 circled overhead to seaward, providing a radio link between the embassy and Sixth Fleet ships offshore. The giant aircraft carrier America was reported about 60 miles away in case its fighter planes might be needed.

However, there was no atmosphere of tension or foreboding about the evacuation, which the embassy arranged after plans for a motor convoy to Damascus were abandoned because the road was not considered safe.

Many of those leaving said they would be coming back. Some said they were taking advantage of the free transportation to get a vacation.

"It's a free ticket to Athens," said one young American girl. "Why not?".

But some said they could no longer take it after 15 months of civil war in which more than 33,000 persons are estimated to have died. County

Tax Dollars At Stake In Foreign Sales Deals

WASHINGTON (AP)- American firms that boycott Israel or use bribery as a foreign-sales tool stand to lose millions of dollars in tax benefits under a provision

approved by the Senate.

Business executives would be subject to up to a year in jail for failing to report any corporate income derived as a result of a bribe or earnings in any country that requires participation in a boycott.

requires participation in a boycott.

The provisions, far tougher than the

Ford administration has recommended but still subject to House consideration, were added to a multibillion- dollar tax bill.

The antiboycott and antibribe provisions were part of a package, approved 86 to 1, hat affects tax treatment of income earned by Americans or U.S. businesses abroad. There was no debate on the sanctions, which were written by the Finance Committee.

Reagan's Pick 'Desperate' Move, Say Ford Backers

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) Ronald Reagan's strategists say
the selection of Sen. Richard S.
Schweiker as vice presidential
running mate has strengthened
Reagan's presidential campaign
and broadened his political
base.

But backers of President Ford called the Reagan announcement a desperate play for delegates by a losing candidate.

Reagan named the Pennsylvania lawmaker - one of the most liberal members of the Senate - in a surprise move Monday.

Just three weeks before opening of the Republican National Convention, Ford is-36 delegates away from the nomination with 1,093, in The Associated Press survey. Reagan trails with 1,025 and 141 delegates were uncommitted, including 28 in Schweiker's home state.

Reagan backers were generally mum about the announcement. Spokesman for the Regan campaign emphasized points where Schweiker agrees with the former California governor's conservative philsosphy.
