



The 1952 total was about three inches short of the 1951 mark for the county. In turn, the 1951 recorded was three inches short of the previous year's record. The 1950 and 1951 records were for the entire county, while the lat-est record is for the town of Hereford alone. There were no earlier records on the amount of moisture in Hereford during previous years.

Not all of this moisture was in the form of rainfall. The January 1952, precipitation came in the form of a six-inch snow-fall on the third of the month. It melted to a measurement of .40 inches.

The .10 inch recorded during he month of February was also the result of a snowfall. Rainfall during March came to

THE SOCIAL SECURITY PRO-GRAM: Most of you remember that much attention was paid to the proposed expansion of the social security program by both the Republican Party and the Democratic Party during this election year. This proposed expansion anticipated an increase in those eligible for social security payments of about 14 million persons. Keep in mind that this does not mean an increase in the amount of payments to each individual, but is an increase in the number of people who will be on the social security rolls. 
