

Deaf Smith, Oldham Counties Pass Resolutions

Bill For New District Court Supported

If you don't succeed, try again," goes the old phrase. Although it's trite, it's the hope of the Deaf Smith County Commissioners Court that another try for a state judicial court composed of this county and Oldham County will be approved by the next session of the Texas Legislature.

During regular meetings Monday, both the Deaf Smith and Oldham County commissioners courts unanimously approved resolutions to push through a bill to create a state district court seperate from the existing six-county 69th Judicial District Court. It is presided over by Judge Mike Metcalf of Dumas in Moore Gounty.

LAST YEAR, ALL lawyers in Hereford and Vega (Oldham County) backed the creation of a new court to handle criminal and civil cases. However, it was lumped an omnibus bill of other district courts, which was defeated in closing minutes of the legislative session due to a technicality. State Senator Oscar Mauzy, opposed to a court creation in his Dallas area district, ousted the bill on a point of order.

The proposal has been backed numerous different times, but last year it was the first time that all attorneys of the Deaf Smith County Bar Association were in favor of the bill. Deaf Smith County

Judge Sam Morgan said representatives of Hereford would probably be joining a delegation from Vega to visit Austin

officials concerning the bill's passage. Mack Tubb, president of the local bar association, told the court that another bill was going to be submitted. The association met last week to give support to the bill and draw up resolutions for the courts to pass.

Also present to support the bill were attorneys James Witherspoon, Earnest Langley, Rex Easterwood, Ray Cowsert and Bruce Miller.

TUBB SAID that enough cases were handled in Hereford to warrant a seperate court. By adding Oldham, a better "political package" would be presented to the Legislature, he added.

Also, visiting judges have had to handle cases in this district due to the amount of time it takes for Metcalf to travel to different courts in this district, which composes one of the largest geographical regions.

Witherspoon verified that a heavy case load does exist here from information

provided by the current district court reporter.

Easterwood explained that attorneys presented large numbers of statistics during last year's attempt to have the bill passed and that fewer numbers were supplied this year since the information is essentially the same.

Langley said that clients could save money if a court existed in Hereford since lawyers wouldn't have to charge for long distance trips to Dumas to have minor cases handled such as the signing of just one or two legal documents.

CRIMINAL DISTRICT Attorney Andy Shuval confirmed that the initial costs to the county would be the court reporter's salary and the expenses and pay for probation officers and secretaries. Presently, Deaf Smith county pays about 38 per cent of the district court costs and it would be responsible for 91 per cent of the costs if a new district were created.


Miller, said the main problems now concern time and distance, which could both be saved if a judge was located locally. The first judge would be appointed by Governor Dolph Briscoe if the court is created. Metcalf now serves Hereford by coming here about every six weeks to process cases within scheduled jury dates that last no longer than two weeks. The next one is set for Sept. 27 for criminal cases and Oct. 23 for civil cases.

In some weeks, so many cases are set that they can't all be processed according to attorneys present.

A local court would allow cases to be processed throughout the whole year and decrease prison levels since so many defendants wouldn't be held on bond so long. Easterwood added that justice would be better served if this came about. Tubb said that a local court would serve

principally Hereford's case load since the Oldham County Court has only about two weeks worth of business a year.

Both state senator Max Sherman and 'Bill Clayton, speaker of the Texas House of representatives and the local representative, are in favor of the seperate court and hope to win its approval.



County Okays Revenue Sharing Fund Expense, Approves Bids

The Deaf Smith County Commissioners Court moved rapidly through a lengthy agenda during a regular meeting Monday at the county courthouse.

It approved the use of Revenue Sharing funds for a county barn in precinct two, okayed a water supply line for the City of Hereford, accepted a request for a new phone line to the Juvenile Probation Department Officer of Juvenile Officer Phil Sciumbato, accepted a bid for a new sheriff's department patrol car, and received bids for a typewriter and electrical work at the Little Bull Barn.

THE COMMISSIONERS also approved

Criminal District Attorney Andy Shuval was granted approval to use about \$250 in reserved budget money to pay for a secretary's salary. The funds were already budgeted but not yet spent. No budget amendment was necessary.

budget amendment was necessary. Commissioner Earl Holt asked that unal'ocated Revenue Sharing finds be used to pay for a new county barn being constructed in Austin Rose's precinct two. Some \$100,000 in Revenue Sharing has already been split by the four precincts, but additional funds from that source are available.

The court granted its okay. Originally,

SCIUMBATO SAID another phone was needed in his office to handle outgoing calls. "The additional cost would run \$13.25 a month and \$10 for installation," he added.

The new line would facilitate contacts with parents and area schools. The court gave its unanimous approval.



SPRINGFIELD, Mass. (AP) -Three persons charged with conspiring to murder Sen. Edward M. Kennedy pleaded innocent Monday to an alleged plot that investigators say may only have been idle talk.

All three had lawyers appointed for them, and their cases were continued in Springfield District Court until Sept. 20.

One of them, David J. King, 31, of Springfield, was almost an hour late for the court session, and before he appeared Judge George Bregianes threatened to issue a warrant.

On Sunday, King told reporters that he had been offered \$30,000 to help kill the sole remaining Kennedy brother at a Springfield hotel where he was campaigning for renomination in the Massachusetts Democratic primary today. King had been released on personal

recognizance Saturday by a District Court clerk. The two other defendants were Sandra R. Rondeau, 37, of Westfield, and Robert E. White, 42, a resident of a Salvation

Jaworski, in a taped interview shown on CBS-TV's "60 Minutes" Sunday, was asked if he knew who erased the crucial segment of a conversation between Nixon and his chief of staff, H.R. Haldeman. The conversation took place several. days after the June 17, 1972 break-in at Democratic National Committee headquarters in Washington at the Watergate complex.

"In my own judgment, it came down to three people," Jaworski, a Houston lawyer, said. "I will not mention their names because it would be unfair for me to do so since we didn't have enough proof to indict any one of them."

Interviewer Dan Rather then asked: "Well . . . you can't mention the names, but it's obvious that it's Richard Nixon, Rose Mary Woods, Nixon's secretary and Steven Bull, Nixon's personal aide. Now you say you don't want to mention

"I'm not certain, but it's my judgment that only one of them did it," Jaworski replied.

He then suggested that Miss Woods probably was not the

Jaworski pointed out that during court hearings on the tape gap, the secretary had acknowledged erasing an early portion of the gap, "but she said it couldn't have taken over four or five minutes . . .

Very frankly, the first few minutes was not the most damaging part as we constructed the events."

Jaworski said he had a suspicion of who erased the rest of the tape, but he refused to specify the person, since he said he didn't know for sure.



PARIS (AP) - Bottling up your emotions or not rebelling at

conditions that annoy you may be contributing factors in cancer, according to a psychologist who has done extensive research in psychosomatic disease.

"The cancer patient is locked into himself and has difficulty with self-communication," said Dr. Claus Bahnson of the Eastern Pennsylvania Psychiatric Institute in Philadelphia. "He is unable to decode his own feelings and express them.

"In other words, he is a good solid citizen, someone called square in the United States, who doesn't rebel against conditions even though they gnaw at him," Bahnson told the Fifth International Congress of Psychosomatic Medicine, which just concluded here.

Others at the session cautioned, however, that there has been no definitive proof of a

"There has always been a taboo about looking at the psychological causes of cancer" Bahnson said. "Usually it is viewed in the biological and environmental framework.

"However, throughout history many researchers have spoken of a relationship between stress and cancer, and two main trends have emerged:

depression and ego-defense." Bahnson said his studies in

the United States, and parallel ones carried out in Germany. showed that the repression of feelings was a common characteristic of cancer patients. He said studies have shown

that body's ability to ward off disease weakens under such conditions, giving hostile elements such as cancer cells a greater chance of survival.

He said to demonstrate his theory about the link between said. cancer and bottled up emotions, he and his co-workers devised a questionnaire that was used on cancer and noncancer patients

in the United States and Germany. "The importance of this is that it was a cross-cultural study that came to the same conclusion, that is, a psychological type emerged among the

cancer patients, as opposed to the control group," Bahnson

Asked whether getting rid of repressed feelings through psychotherapy might lead to preventing cancer. Bahnson said: "You can be alerted by these traits perhaps, and might look forward to prophylactic work, but for the moment we are more concerned with defining the problem."

Adult Smoking Rate Declines; **Teenagers Increase Daily Habit**

Smoking appears to be on the decline in Deaf Smith County. but only among adults. Among teen-agers, on the other hand, especially girls in the 13 to 17 age group, it is increasing.

Such are the findings, based upon nationwide surveys conducted by governmental and private health organizations. They point to a marked drop

in the percentage of adults who continue to smoke cigarettes and a cutback in consumption on the part of many others.

Their figures show, for the United States as a whole, that only 39.3 per cent of men over 21 are smokers now, as against 42.2 per cent in 1970 and 52.4 per cent in 1964, when the Surgeon-General's anti-smoking campaign began.

As for the women over 21, some 28.9 per cent now smoke, compared with 30.5 per cent in 1970 and 31.5 per cent in 1964. Quite different is the trend among younger people. The number of girl smokers in the 13 to 17 age bracket has increased by a half-million in the last five

years. One-fourth of them smoke and, of these, 40 per cent consume more than a pack a

Cattlemen's assessments could be as high as one half of one per cent of the value of each animal slaughtered, with provisions for refunds to producers not wanting to participate.

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
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
